## Former Commander Claimed by Death

RANKS of the American Legion throughout Texas and the country were stunned with the news of the death of past department Commander Henry H. Hill. He was found dead at his lake home in Kingsland June 1, and had been dead several days. Cause of death was a cerebral hemorrhage.

The American Legion state convention held in Houston Astro-world Hotel July 13-16, was dedicated in his memory. Commander Hill was well-known here. He was principal speaker at the Senior Banquet held by the Fleming Post American Legion and Auxiliary, March 29, 1971. He was introduced at the banquet by Post Commander Joe M. Thacker, then head of the veteran's organization in Motley County. Legionnaire Hill was a retired athletic coach and director and was engaged as a real estate broker at the time of his death. He served during WW II in the South Pacific Theatre of Operations including New Guinea and the Philippines. He was discharged to inactive duty as a Lt. Commander in the US Navy in 1946.

Randy Kennedy, 13-year-old son of Spur's new head football coach, was dead on arrival at the Crosbyton Clinic Hospital about 1 p. m. Tuesday, of injuries he suffered in a tractor-shredder accident on the Spur Elementary School yard shortly after noon. The youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm "Max" Kennedy, former Matador residents when Mr. Kennedy was athletic coach here the 1968-69 school term. The Kennedy family moved to Spur May 29 from Abernathy when Mr. Kennedy accepted the position of head coach of Spur High School.

Randy was riding a shredder attached to a tractor when he reportedly fell beneath the machine while it was moving. According to the report, the tractor was driven by Rusty Crawford, 12-year-old son of Marvin Crawford, Spur superintendent of schools, who with the boys, was mowing the school grounds.

Services for the Kennedy youth were held at 5 p. m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church, Spur, with the pastor, Rev. Norris Taylor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Murray Brewer of Abernathy. Burial was in the Spur Cemetery under direction of Campbell Funeral Home of Spur.

## Range and Farming Outlook is Excellent

MANY farmers who have lost crops to flooding, washouts and hail will take a dim view of the statement that conditions are excellent. On the otherhand the crop outlook is good in most areas of the county. Some have been forced to plant over again and again, but cotton and other

row crops are growing rapidly. The unusual rainfall has presented many problems, one of which is the continued growth of weeds when fields were too wet to cultivate. Late feed crops are in good condition.

While most sections of the county have had more than sufficient rainfall, some reports of "dry spots" have been received. The rancher never had it better. The ranges are lush and green and most tanks and water holes are filled. The rangelands are green at the time of year when they are usually burning. Some veteran ranchers say they have never seen range conditions any better at this time of the year. One rancher-farmer said: "It is true that we have had too much rain in areas, but I would rather wash-out than to burn out during a drought."

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

After checking several fields lately (cotton, peanuts and grain sorghum), I wonder how much attention we are giving the planters. How often are they checked? How often do we check to see that they are putting out the seed desired, and not sticking and causing skips?

If the seed are not placed in the ground correctly, or even placed in the ground, skips will result, and no amount of fertilizer, insect or disease control will cause a plant to grow where no seed was planted.

Worn plates, rusty boxes, dirty boxes or trash can cause the planter to skip, so before you plant again, how about spending a little time checking and putting the planter in top shape.

Three grazing troubles that give producers trouble are grass tetany, emphysema and Bermudagrass tremors.

Grass tetany, also known as wheat pasture poisoning or grass staggers is the result of low blood magnesium. Feeding 2 ounces a day of magnesium oxide per day per cow has been effective in preventing this trouble, but is not easy because the chemical is not too tasty. Mixing in sweet feed helps, but this increases the cost of the feed bill, but may save you money in the long run.

Emphysema is a lung ailment, and in this area is normally associated with grazing lush pastures of Bermudagrass, usually from five to fourteen days after cattle have been put on the forage.

When this trouble occurs, cattle should be removed from the

pasture, and returned when the grass is more mature. Treatment using atrophine and antihistamines are usually very effective, but animals should be handled slow and easy because there is danger of killing sick animals if they become excited.

Bermudagrass tremors are mainly limited to Louisiana and East Texas at the present, but can become a problem here. Symptoms include muscle tremore and high excitability, with animals falling when the advanced stages are reached. Treatment consists of moving the animals from the pasture, with large tall, mature Bermuda fields the most toxic.

Cases of damage from the use of fertilizer, herbicides and insecticides continue to arise. Some seem to think that "if a little will do the job, double the amount will do the job quicker and better", and this is where the trouble starts.

Companies that have received label clearance for their products have spent millions of dollars to see what their chemicals will do and how much it takes to do the job. When these instructions on the label are not followed, you are asking for trouble in more ways than one. First, damage to the crop or animal may result; 2nd, the cost goes up; and 3rd, misuse of chemicals may result on bans being placed on chemicals we depend on. I don't think we want to go back to the fly-swatter entirely, but this can happen if misuse of chemicals continues.

### Getting Your Name Off Mailing Lists

Has this happened to you?

You go to your mail box expecting a letter from your son with pictures of your granddaughter's birthday party. You sort through six envelopes and find you have nothing but so-called "junk mail."

Not only do you have a "let down" feeling, but you are annoyed. You did not ask for these mail-order catalogs, magazine subscription offers and all the other advertisements in your mail. But all of it is correctly addressed to you.

If you want to rid your mail box of all unwanted mail, you should ask the Direct Mail Advertising Association and the U.S. Postal Service for help.

Direct Mail Advertising Association represents 1600 companies that send advertisements to persons on their mailing lists. To remove your name from these lists, ask the association for a "name-removal" application form. When you return the form, the association will request all its members (and some nonmembers) to remove your name from their lists within 60 days.

To get the association's form, write Consumer Relations, Direct Mail Advertising Association, Inc., 230 Park Ave., New York, N.Y. 10017.

The association says that since it usually does not represent local companies and charitable organizations, it does not take the responsibility of asking them to remove your name from their mailing lists.

Also, the association's name-removal service is not

designed to take your name off one company's mailing list—such as a mail-order catalog—without taking it off lists of all companies. To remove your name from an individual company's list, you will have to make your own special written request to the company.

The U.S. Postal Service can help you to get your name off all mailing lists used by "smut peddlers." A Federal law protects you and your family from receiving sexually oriented material in the mail.

Ask a clerk at your local post office for a copy of form No. 2201. Fill out the form, including your name and names of others in your family, and return it to the postal clerk. The Postal Service in Washington will add your form to its list of persons who do not want to receive pornography, and the list will be made available to all mailers of pornographic material. Thirty days after your name is added to the list, any mailer who sends you sexually oriented advertisements is subject to civil and criminal legal action by the Postal Service.

court found no basis for a patent. "The lightness" may prove beneficial," said the court, "but it is not invention. There must be original thought or inventive skill, not mere mechanical change of what was old."

On the other hand, a change of material might actually change the way the product functions. Take the matter of garter buttons. Originally made out of metal, garter buttons had two major drawbacks. If the clasp was tight, the stocking had a tendency to tear. If the clasp was loose, the stocking had a tendency to slip.

Someone finally hit upon the idea of making the button out of rubber. This solved both problems at once. Stockings neither tore nor slipped, because the rubber button gripped the fabric in a new and better way.

Did this change of material entitle the man to a patent? A court said yes.

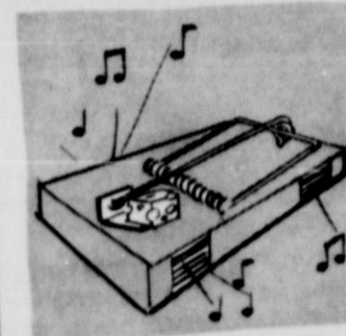
"It is this capacity for accomplishing results," said the court, "which has always distinguished success from failure and the inventor from the mechanic."



### Better Mousetrap

"Build a better mousetrap," said Ralph Waldo Emerson, "and the world will beat a path to your door."

But the United States Patent Office is not so easily impressed. If your mousetrap is better merely because it is made of better materials, you probably could not get a patent. It must also work in a new and better way.



For example: A man came up with the idea of making towel holders out of plastic rather than metal. The plastic holders did have certain advantages. They were cheaper, for one thing. They were also more colorful.

But these advantages of plastic were already well known. Simply applying them to another product was held not original enough to qualify for a patent.

Even if the change of material means added convenience, that usually won't do. Another would-be inventor put together a map case of lightweight metal, making it easier to carry. But again, a

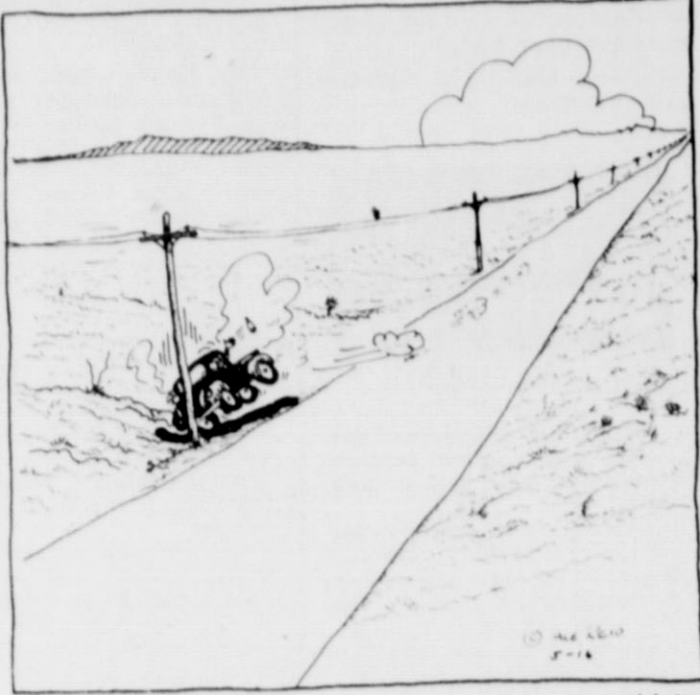

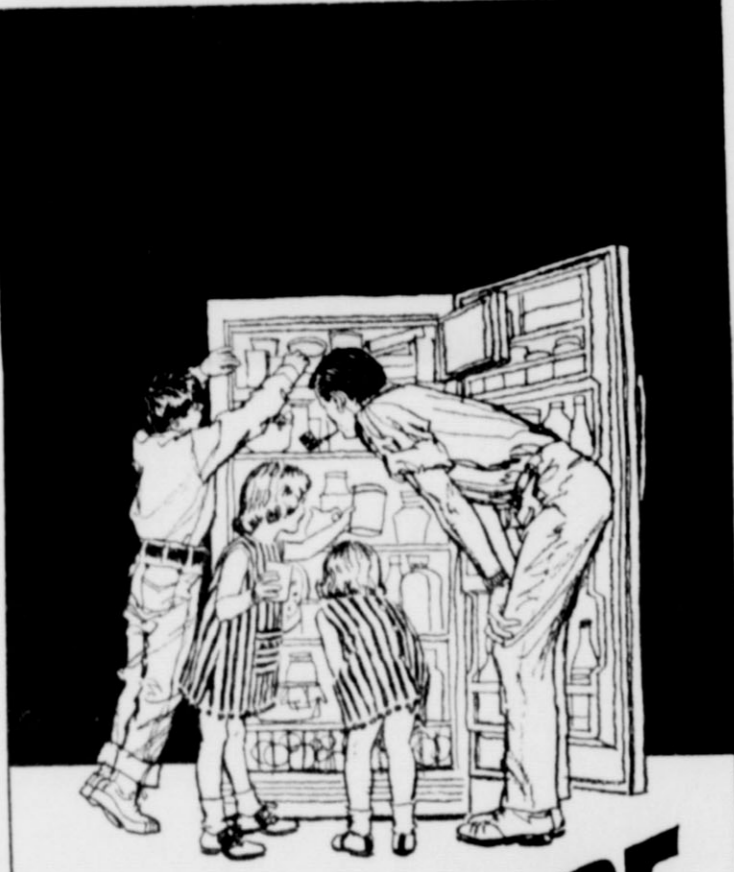
