Marine Veteran Is Content in Matador

A MARINE sees many places in the world as has 15-year veteran Wayne Cartwright who has returned to his native Matador to make his home. He is content to live in the town where he was born in 1936 and to rear his family here.

He enlisted for four years in 1954 and after basic was sent to Korea for 10 months and then to Japan for 14 months. He reenlisted in 1963 and as a machine gunner sergeant, was sent to Vietnam in an advisory group and returned home in 1964, but was sent back to Vietnam for combat duty in 1965. He was sent to Cuba

during the "Bay of Pigs" invasion.

He returned home in 1966 and married Jane Scaff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Scaff. He was then stationed in California until 1967 when he was sent to Vietnam for the third time. He was in Vietnam when his son, Charles Wayne was born, and continued the duty until September 1968 when he was returned. He was stationed in Yuma, Arizona when he was discharged in April 1969.

He returned to Texas and was employed by the Xerox Company for approximately three years. He returned to Matador about a year ago and opened a television, and small appliance repair service in Household Supply Company.

He is well-qualified having taken a course under the GI Bill at the Cleveland Institute of Electronics. During the period he was in California, he worked at bench service for General Electric company. He is thoroughly experienced in the repair of television, radio and appliances. At present he is doing some service work in Floydada.

The Cartwright's have two children, Charles Wayne, 5, and Zane, age 18 months.

Wayne Cartwright has seen the world and he is content to live in Matador. He believes it is the best community he has ever found in which to make his home and educate his children.

Services for Ellis Masey, 72, longtime resident of Roaring Springs, were held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church there with Rev. Douglas Gossett, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Roaring Springs and Matador, officiating.

The V.F.W. and American Legion Honor Squad gave the salute and flag of the United States in memory of Masey's service to the armed forces during World War II. The flag was presented to Ben Masey, eldest surviving brother, by Joe Smith, immediate past Commander of the V.F.W.

Mr. Masey died Saturday, September 2, in the VA Hospital in Amarillo following a lengthy illness.

He was born February 18, 1900 in Jack County, Texas and at his death had attained the age of 72 years, 6 months and 14 days. He came to Motley County with his parents, the late John and Oma Masey in about 1920. He worked for the railroad for a number of years, and served in the Army in World War II. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include four brothers, Ben Masey of Roaring Springs, Jack Masey of Bryson, Henry Masey of Amarillo and Willard Masey of San Diego, Calif.; four sisters, Mrs. Lester Hall of Roaring Springs, Mrs. Allie Smith of San Francisco, Calif., Mrs. Evelyn Setward of Sacramento, Calif., and Mrs. O. D. Clifton of San Diego, Calif., and a number of nieces and nephews.

Removal Starts on Matador Landmark

ONE by one they have faded away until only one completely wooden structure remains on the square in Matador and now it is in the process of removal. The old Burton-Lingo Lumber Yard structure on the south east corner of the courthouse square has been sold to Joe Smith and is in the process of demolition.

The property acquired by Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. about 1954, after the yard had closed, will be cleared, according to Raby Webb, local manager of Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. He said the structure had been of no value to his firm and the costs of taxes and insurance were too high to continue. He will use the lots as a storage for cattle water tanks and other large items that can be placed out of doors. Mr. Webb said his firm might possibly offer the lots for sale at some later time.

Joe Smith said he is going to use some of the lumber to enlarge his motel office space. He also said that many items have been stored in the old building through the years, and that he would appreciate owners notifying him. He said the large building will not be demolished immediately. He said two buildings that have been demolished in Matador, are stored in the main building. One is the old ice plant that was once located south of Matador Auto Co. and later purchased by Glenn Woodruff.

River Adventure Brings Family to Watery Landing

MANY PEOPLE think of far away places when they think of adventure but not the Hamilton family. They survey the situation and utilize what is at hand. When South Pease (Tongue) River south of Roaring Springs began flowing sufficiently to float a plastic raft, they thought of adventure to be gained by utilizing the usually dry and sandy river.

They embarked Monday about 1:30 with docking scheduled at Bird Ranch down the river. Those embarking included Mrs. John Hamilton (Josephine), her two sons, Tom of Plainview and Harry of Lubbock, her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Tom Hamilton, and two-year-old John Hamilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hamilton and C. M. Barton Jr. father of Mrs. Tom Hamilton.

The barge with the adventure-seekers towed two smaller rafts into which had been placed hats, boots and other materials. Sailing was good for a few miles with the exception of a one-wire water gap across the river. Then someone looked up river. A wall of brown water was following them. They tried to steer the plastic boat toward the shore, but it went in circles and ran into a tree, which punctured the craft. Some grabbed tree limbs and others tried for the shore. All were barefooted with the exception of Mrs. Tom Hamilton, who wore tennis shoes.

The two small boats were victims of the torrent. Harry Hamilton lost his glasses. Those who reached shore could not walk because of the abundant growth of grass burrs. There was no one in sight, but Mrs. Hamilton (who had shoes) started for help. She found an old tractor and got it started but noticed the front tires were flat. She located a Latin American youth who helped with the rescue, and provided a car. The two Hamilton boys went on to the Bird Ranch to meet Mrs. C. M. Barton and Mrs. Harry Hamilton who were to pick up the group. No one was injured.

ally started as the Roaring Springs News in 1932, in a hand-set "cold type" plant is returning to cold type. The process of printing is entirely different.

"IN purchasing the machine," declared Douglas Meador, publisher, "we realize the Tribune is a small newspaper for this type of equipment, but on the other hand we have a great debt to our subscribers and advertisers and we owe to them the best product we can produce. The new machine will produce sharp, clean and easy-to-read copy. It will produce it faster and easier than our present "hot metal" process.

The change will mean that all the present equipment, including the Linotype, has become obsolete, and worth little more than its value as junk metal. Most of the equipment will be kept, however, for use in commercial printing.

The present Linotype machine was purchased in 1934, and shipped to Matador by rail. It was hauled to the old location at the Masonic Building on a dory wagon, where it remained in service for 19 years. It was moved to the present Tribune Building in 1953.

"Our cab driver was from Ohio," Mrs. Porter wrote, "Our guide took us to see the beautiful new Capitol, the old palace the old mission homes and pointed out the oldest church and governor's palaces."

Their next stop was Hong Kong. "The most interesting thing we did was to ride in a sampan propelled by a Chinese woman; this was her home," the letter continued. "The area, Aberdeen, has thousands of old fishing boats that even more thousands live on. If our poor could see how these people live, they would realize how much they have ... the children don't go to school at all; all schools charge ... while on the boat we were hit by a fishing boat - a little frightening, but no injuries ... if we had not had a Chinese driver who spoke English, we could not have made this boat ride! He envied Pete his sons, and said his third child was a boy. If his wife had not had a son, he could have discarded her and taken another ... the Chinese can have six wives."

"On a hill overlooking the bay is a seven year cemetery; after seven years the remains must be removed and the casket cleaned by the family. We also saw where the rich live, and the fairly rich; the area of vice - Happy Hill - and looked across about 25 miles of water to Red China.

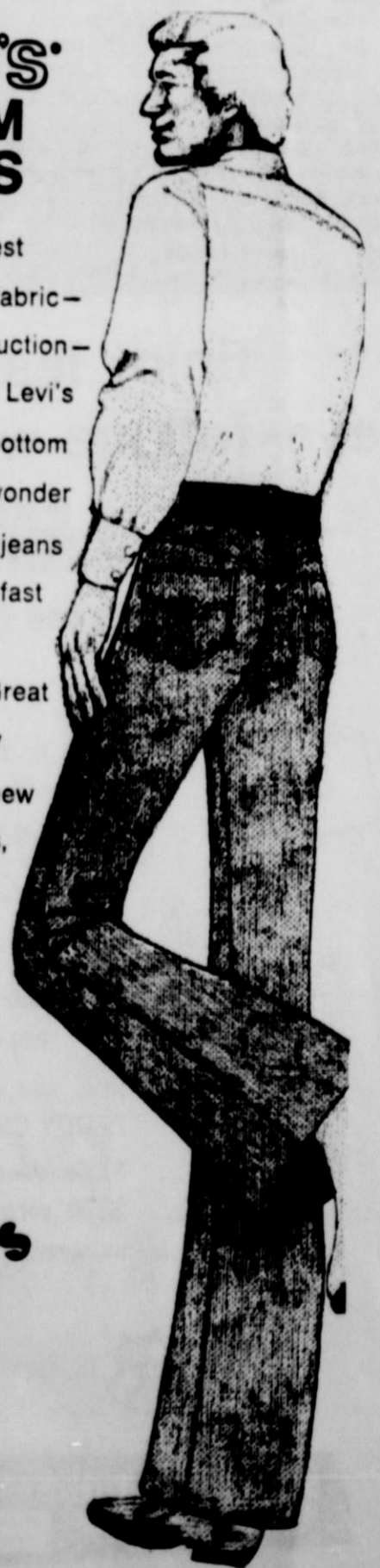

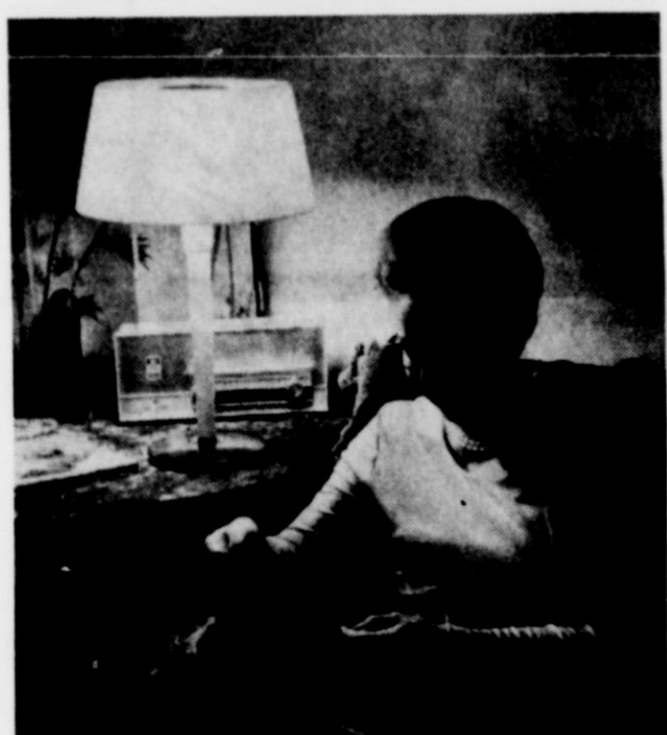

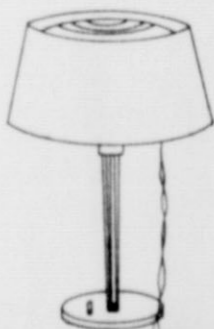
