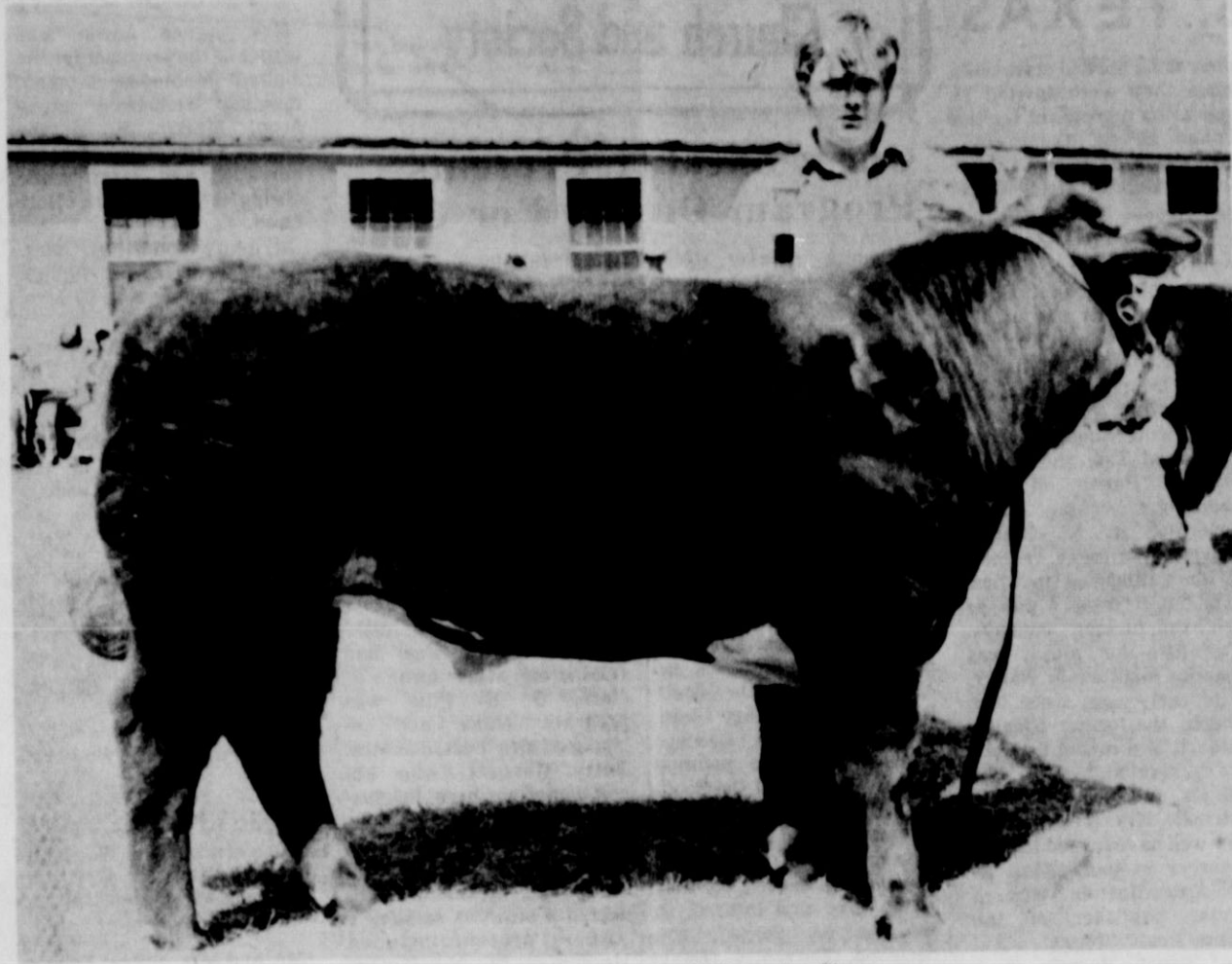

Top Winners Named In Livestock Show

Richard Thomas, Matador, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Thomas exhibited the Grand Champion steer Monday, in the 37th annual Motley County Jr. Livestock Show sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Association in Matador. His 988 lb. crossbred steer bred by Green Bostick was 1st in the heavy steer class, and sold for a premium of \$200 to Billy's Grocery, Matador.

Roy Thompson, Matador, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peck Thompson, exhibited the Reserve Champion steer, a 1080 lb. animal bred by Bill Jones of Matador, which was the 2nd place heavy steer. This animal sold for a premium of \$200 to Motley County Abstract Co. Roy was also the beef showmanship winner, and also exhibited the 2nd place medium steer.

Rebeca Finch, Roaring Springs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Don Finch, exhibited the Grand Champion market hog, a 245 lb. Hampshire which sold for a premium of \$50 to Floydada Livestock Sales Co. The gilt was the 1st place heavy market hog. Preston Pitts, Matador, son of Mr. and Mrs. Freddie Pitts, exhibited the Reserve Champion market hog, a 225 pound animal that placed 2nd in the heavy market hog class. A sales premium of \$39 was bid by Floyd Hardin, Matador. Susannah Woodruff, Matador, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Woodruff, exhibited the Grand Champion lamb. The 95 lb. ewe lamb placed 2nd in the open gilt class. Jim Cooper, Matador, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Cooper was swine showmanship winner. The Grand Champion rabbit was the 1st place buck, a New Zealand White bred by Jerry Slaton of Afton, and exhibited by Michael Likes, Roaring Springs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Danny Likes. The Reserve Champion rabbit was the 1st place doe, a Chincilla, and exhibited by Walter Skinner, Flomot, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ruel Skinner. The Grand Champion heifer was a Hereford exhibited by Clay Hart, Matador. The heifer was also the Champion purebred animal. The Reserve Champion heifer was a Spotted Hereford exhibited by Berry Bostick, Matador, and also the Champion Crossbred Heifer. Butch Renfro, Matador, exhibited the Reserve Champion purebred heifer, a Hereford, and Lewis Bostick, Matador, exhibited the Reserve Champion crossbred heifer, a Hereford x Limousin cross. The 24 steers, 39 hogs, 14 heifers, 6 sheep and 16 rabbits were judged by Billy Roach, County Extension Agent from Snyder, Hal Spain, County Extension Agent from Dickens was showmanship judge, and J. C. Cross, Matador, served as announcer. Don McCandless, Floydada, served as auctioneer, selling the steers to Homer Hill for 38 cents per pound, the hogs to Hi-Plains Hog Co., Plainview, for 37 cents per pound; and the sheep to Andy Taylor Trucking Inc., Plainview, for 40 cents per pound. Additional premiums were provided by other individuals and concerns, and will be listed when a complete list is compiled. Kim Campbell, Matador, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bundy Hal Campbell, was Rate-of-Gain winner in the steer division, with a daily gain of 2.708 pounds per day over the 120 day feeding period with her 1110 pound Hereford that placed 7th in the heavy steer class. Her 1008 pound Hereford which placed 5th in the heavy steer contest was 2nd in the rate of gain contest, with a daily gain of 2.566 pounds per day.

MCHS Takes Track Meet

The Motley County High School boys track team won the Jayton meet Sat., March 26 with a total of 163 points, with their closest competitor, Roby, being 100 points behind. The field events alone gave the tracksters

enough points to win the meet. The Motley girls track team won second place in the Sudan track meet, also held Sat., March 26. In the boys events, Pat Smith, despite a pulled

muscle, won second in the shot put, second in the 100 yard dash, and ran on the winning sprint relay, and also qualified for finals in the 220.

Craig Christian ran on the sprint relay, won the long jump and high jump, won sixth in the 220 and 100 yard dash. Also turning in a good day was Robert Parker who placed in the pole vault, 330 hurdles and high hurdles. Charles Brown won the shot put and got third in the discus throw. Todd McCandless won the 440, ran anchor leg on sprint relay, and was on the third place mile relay. Donnie Martin was second in the 440 and won third in the mile relay. Jerry Lee got third place in long jump, third in the 100 yard dash and ran on the sprint relay. He also won fifth in the 200.

The Motley girls won second place in the Sudan track meet with a total of 75 1/2 points, only seven points behind the winning team, Whiteface. They had an outstanding day on only their second meet. Last week in Spur, they placed sixth out of the 16 teams entered.

The 880 relay broke the existing record with a time of 1:52.1 and the 440 relay also set a new record with 51.8.

BUS SERVICE ENDS FRIDAY

UNLESS negotiations have been made the past few days to continue the bus service in operation between Plainview and Vernon, the final run will be made Friday.

Announcement of the termination of the services was made recently to the Bob Stanley Pharmacy, local bus stop, by Norman Peoples, president and general manager of the Plainview Bus and Transfer, Inc.

James Stanley, local agent for the transportation company, posted a letter received from Peoples, which stated only that the service would be terminated. However, in a news release from Plainview, Mr. Peoples is quoted as saying that "the company is being forced out of business because of financial difficulties."

Quoting further, he said the route, "the only one we ever had," was not paying for itself and added the company lacked sufficient equipment, personnel and operating

capital to continue the operation."

Five towns on the route - Lockney, Floydada, Matador, Paducah and Crowell - will be drastically affected by the loss of the bus service. The bus company took over the Plainview to Vernon route April 16, 1976, when Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma Coaches determined it could no longer continue the service it had offered for 40 years.

Although passengers have been minimum, it was pointed out that travel for many older persons will be curtailed with the loss of the service. A greater loss will be suffered by business firms along the route who have depended on the bus to transport drug supplies, farm equipment and auto parts.

There was a faint hope extended last week when it was learned that other individuals might be interested in assuming the transportation service.

The weatherman pulled all the stops during the past week, following severe dust storms with a good soaking rain Saturday night and Sunday, then returning with more dust and high winds on Monday and again Tuesday. Wednesday was fair and calm. Bob Stanley's official rain gauge measured .34 for Saturday and .37 for Sunday. The 71 added to earlier precipitation brought the total to 2.87 to date. For the same period last year, only .54 moisture had fallen. Total precipitation for 1976 was 20.83. Stanley reported that .34 inches of moisture recorded January 26 this year, was from 3 inches of snow.

Guest Speaker Presents Program On Art For Club

A guest speaker, Mrs. Rudolph Peel of Lubbock, brought an interesting and unique program Thursday, March 24, for El Progreso Study Club, meeting at the home of Mrs. Robert Darsey. The program featuring "The Arts" and "Aspirations of a 'chicken fancier'" included an unusual display of chicken china painting and collection of other objects with a chicken decor.

An artist of note in this area, she exhibits locally and regionally - Mrs. Peel is a member of the Lubbock Art Association and the South Plains Porcelain Art Guild. She teaches three classes a week in porcelain painting and is president of the South Plains Designer Craftsman. She has owned an antique shop and holds membership in two antique clubs. "I have had a love and interest in antiques for years," she declared. Currently she is enrolled in an advanced enamel class at Tech.

"My interest in chickens began during the time I owned an open antique shop," she told the club. "My collection started with the old Staffordshire covered dish hens, and it has accelerated during the years since, until my home is getting to look like a 'chicken house.'"

Mrs. Peel enjoys "doing the chicken" in all the art mediums, including ceramics, porcelain, stitchey, weaving, enamel, water color, pottery and even crochet, embroidery and knitting.

Among her art objects, which she displayed here, were porcelain, tile, water color and other paintings. These included a painting of "Chicken George," a stained glass window reproduction of a rooster, and other paintings, a Japanese book mark, an Easter egg, barnyard plate and lemon squeezer, and other items, many done in pastels, and framed stitchey.

Mrs. Peel has also collected antique cards depicting the fowl. She has been influenced in her work, by such writers as Aldonvanti, an Italian naturalist of the 16th century, who was a "patient, lifelong observer of chickens." She used biblical references in pointing out the position which the cock held in religion. "It is a symbol of the Resurrection, and watchfulness."

The relationship between people and chickens, she said, stems from folklore and quotations such as, Don't count your chickens before they are hatched; Don't put all your eggs in one basket; The chicken is from the country, but the city eats it; to lay an egg (denoting failure); Scarce as a hen's teeth; Cross as a setting hen; Like a plucked chicken in a rainstorm, and many others.

Favorite chicken stories were told by several members after Mrs. Peel had related one of her own. Mrs. D. E. Pitts was program leader and introduced Mrs. Peel, and Mrs. Betty Bennett, who accompanied her here. Inspirational Thought was by Mrs. W. C. Pailmeyer. Preceding the program, Mrs. Harold Campbell, president, conducted a business session.

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
