Stock Show Set For March 28

The 37th annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show will be held at the old FFA building in Matador Monday, March 28, accord-

ing to Vann Francis, President of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsor of the show for the 4-H and FFA members under the supervision of local advisors.

Steers, lambs and market hogs for sale must be weighed and tagged between 7:30 and 9:30 a.m. and all other animals (breeding hogs, rabbits and heifers) must be entered by 9:30 a.m. The show starts at 10 a.m.

The sale of the top 6 animals in the market hog, lamb and steer classes will follow selection of the Grand Champion Steer. After the floor bid is auctioned, sale premium of animals (Dollars over floor bid) will start. Contacts are being made for buyers of the top animals, but those wishing to place a bid that have not been contacted should be at the sale, or give their bid to one of the Livestock Association Show directors.

Billy Roach, Scurry County Extension Agent, Snyder, Tex., will serve as judge of all animals.

Twenty-four steers, 40 hogs, 6 sheep, and 14 rabbits are scheduled to be shown, and heifer numbers are estimated at 22.

The former Lola Price, Mrs. Turner was born September 5, 1918 in Navarro County, Texas and came to Motley County in 1937. She was married November 26, 1938 to Malcolm Turner in Matador. They had made their home in Flomot since that time. She was a member of the First Baptist Church, Flomot.

Survivors include her husband; four sons, Dean and Johnny Turner both of Matador; Benny Turner of Abernathy and Donnie Turner of Lockney; her mother, Mrs. Dora Harris of Lockney; three brothers, C. C. Price of Petersburg, Clint Price and A. T. Price, both of Corsicana; and five grandchildren.

Treatment Of Dyslexia Explained For Lions

An outline of the Lubbock Scottish Rite Bodies' Learning Center for treatment of dyslexia was given by Dr. Lena Waters of Lubbock at regular luncheon meeting of Matador Lions Club, Tuesday in the United Methodist Church.

Dr. Waters - in private life, Mrs. Charles L. Waters, whose husband is an attorney - is associated as a teacher at the learning center and described in detail, the functions of the facility dedicated to children having difficulty in learning to read, write and spell.

"These are not handicapped children," Dr. Waters declared. "Dyslexia can best be described as a type of immaturity. The child may incorrectly interpret what his eyes see."

She said that most children with learning problems have high IQ's and that the problem is not identifiable by the same symptoms. One thing they do have in common is poor coordination, and behavior habits usually are similar. She described these children as having "Reverse and invert processes, are mirror writers, have short auditory memory and short visual memory... they tune the world off and drift into dream worlds."

The Learning Center does not admit children who are mentally retarded or have psychiatric disturbances. (This would be duplication of the effort being made in this field by other centers.)

The Lubbock Scottish Rite Bodies acquired the former Carter School, near the new Civic Center, for the Learning Center to assist and train children to overcome specific developmental dyslexia. The training program usually takes two years, the speed of progress depending on the degree of impairment. Dr. Waters, who is a graduate of Baylor University and has a PhD in English from Texas Tech, has 14 years of classroom experience in junior and senior high school and university teaching. She has just completed a training session in Dallas for her work at the Learning Center.

Dr. Waters was introduced by Lion Furman Vinson. Boss Lion Larry Hoyle made announcements concerning the Lions Volleyball Tournament scheduled for April 7, 8, 9, and the Junior Livestock Show set for March 28. He reported on a Zone meeting in Paducah, which he attended recently, and noted that Matador has the largest membership of any club in this zone. He urged members to increase their attendance record at regular meetings.

Lion Bob Stanley introduced Dude Speed as a guest, and as president of the recently organized Jaycees. Speed challenged the Lions in participating in a drive for blood which is set for May 10. The challenge was accepted and the two organizations will compete in donating blood during the drive.

Also introduced as guests were Lion Art Cook and Lion Bill McCullough, Lt. Governor of District 27-2, both from Lubbock. The Lions expressed appreciation to the Methodist women for the delicious roast beef luncheon.

County Economy Enriched By Ranchers And Farmers

Austin (Special) - March 21 is Agriculture Day in Texas, and Motley County farmers and ranchers can be proud of the \$13,840,000 contribution they made to the economy of their area and the state, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

That figure is the amount of cash receipts and government payments in 1975, the most recent figures published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

"Though 1977 may prove to be one of the lower profits for agriculture, cash receipts

during this year should be substantial," White stated. "Production costs have doubled for many regions in the state in the past two years, but several commodities have been able to stay even with these costs."

State totals for 1975 were \$5.9 billion with livestock bringing in \$3,060,908,000 and crops \$2,785,683,000. Total cash receipts for 1976 are estimated to be more than \$6 billion.

Livestock and products in Motley County were valued in 1975 at \$6,881,000. Crops totaled \$6,700,000.

Crime And The Law Explained To Club

A comprehensive review of law processes with special relation to the conviction of two suspects in the November slaying of Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson, was given for members of El Progresso Study Club, Thursday, March 10, by County Judge Forrest Campbell. The meeting was in the home of Mrs. Frank Price.

The program featured Aspirations for Law and Order, with a quotation from J. Edgar Hoover: "The greatest crime is the tolerance of crime."

"We are confronted with many problems," Judge Campbell told the group. "I know there are questions in your mind regarding spending \$50,000 to \$100,000 to defend these men, who, possibly in seven or eight years, may be loose again."

According to the law, Judge Campbell explained, "They shall be adequately defended. District Judge George W. Miller has wisely obtained four of the best lawyers available for their defense. We are kidding ourselves if we think we can get by with less than the best... one little mistake could throw it all out."

Judge Campbell explained why the men were re-indicted, since they had already been indicted by an earlier grand jury. "This was done to include an additional charge of murder while committing a robbery."

In answer to the question as to why the county had to apply for assistance (South Plains Association of Governments last week approved a request from Motley County for federal funds to defend the two murder suspects) Judge Campbell explained that to use county funds would be a serious financial burden to the people of the county. It would

be impossible, he said, to estimate the amount that would be needed, and added that according to the law, each attorney is to be paid \$250 per day. Each suspect in this case has been assigned two attorneys.

County officials justified their request because of Motley County's low income levels. However, Judge Campbell further justified the request by saying the county had been paying into the Criminal Justice Fund for years.

A pretrial hearing in the capital murder case against Stacy Albert Carter, 25, of Olivia, N.C. and Larry C. Fortenberry, 28, of Mount Herman, La., is set for March 21. Lubbock attorneys John T. Montford and Mark C. Hall are the court-appointed lawyers for Carter. Steve Hurt and Joe L. Cox of Plainview are the court-appointed lawyers for Fortenberry.

Mrs. Harold Campbell, president, served as program leader, and Mrs. Robert Darsey presented the speaker. Everyone present expressed appreciation to Judge Campbell for his enlightenment of the penal code.

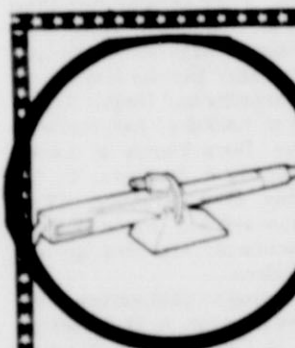
Mrs. D. E. Pitts gave the Inspirational Thought to conclude the program.
