The Floydada office is a satellite office from the Central Plains MH-MR Center in Plainview. Mrs. Audette Kincaid is the Community Mental Health Worker local ly, who has regular office hours for people having questions or needing information about Mental health and mental retarda-

tion services.

A therapist visits the office on Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week. Joe Tillman M.S.W. has appointments with individuals, families, and groups throughout this two county area. According to Tillman, "individual marital, family group, counseling is available locally through the Floydada office." The type of therapy provided each client or clients depends on the presenting problems that people are wanting to work

Tillman explains therapy as a sitting where individual (s) verbalizes a stressful situation." Therapy gives people a chance to look at their intradynamic personality make-up, and how a person may want to change behavior according to pressure."

A large majority of counseling done through the local Family Service Center involves marital and (or) family therapy. These types of therapy involve more than one person and usually other family members. "In family therapy," Tillman states, "the identified client may not be the only one with a He continues, problem." often the presenting problem is only symptomatic of the relationship pattern within the family unit.

The local office provides therapy for the public on a Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pohl sliding scale fee charge commensurate with a persons ability to pay. According to Tillman, "the services provided through the local Mr. and Mrs. Howard office attempts to meet the needs of the community and of those asking for help." Its early maturity (slightly earlier than Paymaster 18) along with being a highly determinate variety, allows it to set bolls early, then "cutout," resulting in the production of more mature bolls with higher lint quality. It is well adapted to narrow-row as well as conventional planting because it matures early and the close-fruiting plant holds the low bolls off the ground. Lockett 4789-A normally produces a good yield of quality fiber with staple length of an inch or more. It is recommended for both dry and irrigated land. However, under irrigation it should be grown only on wilt-free soils.
