## Program On Americanism Features Talk On Alaska

With slides of Alaskan scenery and activities, and narration of a visit to the 49th state, Mrs. John Hamilton took members of El Progreso Study Club on an interesting tour of the far north, Thursday, April 14, with a program, "Is Alaska What 'they say'?"

The meeting was at the home of Mrs. W. F. McCaghren, with Miss Mary Keith as leader.

Quotation for the day was from The World Book Encyclopedia: "Many Americans thought the region was a worthless waste of ice and snow. They called it Seward's Ice Box, Seward's Folly, and 586,000 square miles of icebergs and polar bears."

"Alaska is a land of many great distances and contrast," Mrs. Hamilton declared. In a historical background she explained that Alaska was once a part of Asia owned by Russia, and that explorers were sent out by Peter The Great. The United States purchased Alaska from Russia in 1867. She described the topography of the land, the wildlife and the inhabitants and their customs. Contrary to popular belief, she said, the igloo is used as life-saving stations, rather than a place in which to live.

Mrs. Hamilton described the Alcan Highway and the 798 mile long pipe line that is being laid from Prudhoe Bay to Valdez. Many Texans, she said, are employed in the work, since they are more familiar with oilfield work than persons from other areas.

"Everything has to be enclosed for man to be able to work. About one-half of the pipe line is buried and the other half elevated... all had to be fixed so that the terrain would be disturbed as little as possible... many caribou roam the tundra, and it is not an unusual sight to see them in the vicinity of the oil wells."

The biggest project ever undertaken by man, the pipe line is scheduled for completion late this year, she said. The views which Mrs. Hamilton showed included family groups as well as scenery, as she was visiting her son and family, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Hamilton, daughter Suzan, and sons, Richard and David in Eagle River. Richard Sr., is currently in one of the plants on the North Slope, where diesel and other by-products are made from the oil. During the summer the

family operates a fishing lease on Kenai peninsula. When the Hamiltons first moved to Alaska, both Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton taught in the Anchorage school system, until he became interested in the oil activities about three years ago. Mrs. Hamilton, the former Patti Craven, still teaches, and is third grade teacher in the Eagle River Elementary School.

Inspirational Thought to conclude the program was given by Mrs. Douglas Meador. The meeting was opened by Mrs. Harold Campbell, president, who conducted the business session. ## County Agent Pallmeyer Says

The Texas Experimental Ranch Field Day and Tour will be held Thursday, April 28 starting at the ranch headquarters which is 10 miles north of Throckmorton at 9:30 a.m.

Included in the morning program will be seasonal trends in forage and diet quality throughout the Rolling Plains. Livestock response to grazing management on the experimental ranch; weaning weights of crossbred sires and dams compared to straight Herefords; and influence of common broomweed on plant and animal production. A report from the Texas Experimental Ranch Committee will also be given.

After a catered lunch (\$3.00), tours will show the effect of grazing treatments and supplements on livestock and range conditions; studies on forage intake and milk production and "mini" grazing systems.

Local producers are encouraged to attend and see the exhibits and demonstrations planned to familiarize producers with the advances in range management and range research techniques.

Rule changes for the 1978 Jr. Livestock Show are few, but those involved should make note of the following. ALL STEERS MUST WEIGH AT LEAST 800 LBS. at show weighing. The old minimum was 750 lbs. ALL LAMBS MUST HAVE A FULL SET OF LAMB TEETH. No tooth rule was in effect for the 1977 show.

## Cotton Industry Fights Government Regulations

LUBBOCK - (Special) Congress created OSHA, EPA and all other federal regulatory agencies, and it is from Congress that any lasting relief from their heavy-handed regulations will have to come.

This is the message going to legislators in Washington from Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Meanwhile, the organization continues to battle alongside the rest of the cotton industry against the steady flow of what the industry considers unreasonable regulations

and proposals. PCG officials point out that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) is proposing impossible dust standards for cotton processing plants of all kinds, and that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has called hearings in response to petitioners wanting a ban on use of Treflan, Trysben 200 and Benzac, pre-emergence herbicides widely used in cotton and soybean production.

"Other regulations and requirements that damage the agricultural economy are already being enforced, and more are inevitable unless Congress acts to prevent them," comments Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President.

"So long as OSHA and EPA have the responsibilities and the virtually unbridled authority they have been given by Congress," Johnson continues, "we can expect the onslaught of unpalatable regulations to continue. And we have no choice but to work with officials of these agencies, present testimony at their hearings and do whatever we can to mitigate the effects of their actions."

But these at best are only stopgap measures, the PCG official believes. "What is needed," he says, "is new

legislation from Congress - legislation that will assure full consideration of economic effects before regulations are issued."

A step has been taken in this direction. Congressman Kika de la Garza of Texas' 15th District, has introduced HR-322 which would require all Federal agencies to submit proposed regulations to the appropriate committee of Congress. De la Garza, Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations, Investigations and Oversight, is receiving broad support for his bill from any number of agricultural and business organizations.

A resolution recently adopted by the Texas Independent Ginners Association of Lubbock pointedly depicts the mood of agriculture and other industry leaders and is deserving of reproduction.

It reads "Whereas American business is drowning in a river of regulations flowing from Federal bureaucracy, whereas these misguided regulations confuse, bewilder and otherwise derange the mind before they take you under for the third time, and whereas the surviving business community needs immediate relief and resuscitation, be it resolved . . . that we commend the Honorable Kika de la Garza, for his introduction of HR - 322."

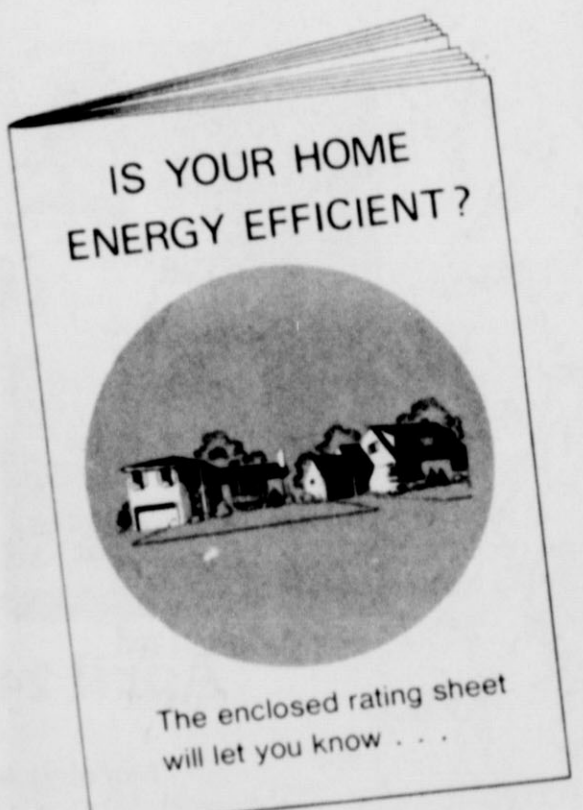

# Bentsen Proposes Tough Penalties For Criminals

Washington, D.C. (Special) - Senator Lloyd Bentsen Thursday proposed a basic change in the federal criminal justice system that would provide tougher sentences for federal crimes, reduce the discretion of judges in sentencing criminals and eliminate parole.

The Bentsen bill, similar to one introduced by the Senator in the last Congress, seeks to replace the current wide-ranging system of "indeterminate" sentencing with a new approach known as "presumptive" sentencing.

"It is now widely recognized that the current system is not working. Mass murderers like Charles Manson and Richard Speck are eligible for parole. Other dangerous offenders go unpunished. And glaring disparities in the sentences of those who are punished lead to numerous and great injustices," Bentsen said in remarks accompanying his legislation.

"No longer should the dangerous criminal feel that even if convicted the odds are in his favor, so that he may do violence at will to the lives and safety of innocent citizens. Certainty of punish-

ment, the fact that the criminal believes that punishment will be imposed is a deterrent. The criminal should know in advance the cost of his crime."

Senator Bentsen noted that under the present "indeterminate" system the law might read: "imprisonment for any term of years or for life." The judge is free to set virtually any sentence he decides on and after the sentence is imposed the person convicted is eligible for parole, generally, after serving one third of that time.

Under the Bentsen presumptive sentencing bill, specific prison terms would be established by law for specific crimes. For example, punishment for bank robbery, first offense, in which violence is involved would be seven years in prison. The sentence would increase for subsequent offenses. A judge may vary from the presumptive sentence by 40 per cent if there are aggravating or mitigating circumstances but any sentence outside this 40 per cent range would have to be explained by the judge in writing and would be subject to appeal. Early parole

release would not be permitted.

"As it now stands, there is no certainty to the criminal that he will be punished, no certainty to society that the dangerous will be incarcerated, and no certainty that punishment, when it is meted out, will be fair,"

Bentsen said.

"We should work toward a system of criminal sentencing that is, as John Greenleaf Whittier once described justice, 'The hope of all who suffer, the dread of all who wrong.' This legislation is one step forward," Bentsen said.

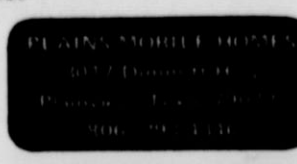
