Two Perish In Sunday Storm

A SAVAGE tornado swept out of the darkness in western Plainview early Sunday morning to claim two lives, leave 25 injured and a wake of millions of dollars damage.

One of the victims of the storm was David Bryant, 31, news editor of the Plainview Daily Herald. Kevin Lewellen, 3, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Lewellen, was the other victim. Approximately 50 families were left homeless, according to news reports.

The storm struck with little warning. Latest estimates are that damages will amount to \$4 or \$5 millions. Some of the finest residences in the city were destroyed. Governor Duff Briscoe and Senator Jack High-tower were among the state officials visiting the stricken city Tuesday. Briscoe assured the community that all state aid possible would be rendered.

Many former Motley County residents live in Plainview, including former county judge Albert Reeves and Mrs. Reeves. The storm missed their home by about five blocks. Mr. Reeves said while here Sunday.

District Attorney Tom Hamilton, his wife Jan (Barton) and two sons John Thomas and Brent escaped injury, but most of the windows were blown out of their home, and a large plank was driven through a bathroom door. The storm ruined one of their cars, and drove a nail through one of the tires. The brick was blown off the north side of their home.

Two rains here
Two rain storms swept Matador in the past week. Thursday evening a storm swept the area and dumped 40-inch moisture here. Another storm Sunday morning (probably the same system that had earlier struck Plainview) dumped another 40-inch.

Bob Stanley said yesterday that a total of 1.68 inches has fallen during the month of April. The total for the year is 9.38 inches.

He held his hat in his hand and looked across the hills.

Attends Rites In El Paso For Richard Wright

Mrs. Henry Ford returned home Sunday from El Paso, where she attended funeral services on Wednesday for Richard O. Wright, Mr. Wright, 58, was the husband of Mrs. Ford's niece, the former Juanell Litteral. He died Friday, April 6, at his home, 6133 Tesuque, following an apparent heart attack.

Services were held at 10 a.m. April 11, in Harding-Orr & McDaniel Pershing Chapel, officiated by Dr. Brodace Elkings and the Rev. Leonard E. Gilingham. Burial was in Ft. Bliss National Cemetery.

A resident of El Paso for 22 years, Mr. Wright was known as "El Paso's guitar doctor," and "the maestro" of guitar repair.

He had retired as a draftsman for the El Paso Electric Co. A veteran of World War II, he was a member of St. Pauls Methodist Church and the American Association of Retired Persons.

In the late 1930s and early 1940s he played the mandolin in a hillbilly band led by his uncle, who lived with the Wrights on a farm near Mangum, Okla. His mother played the piano and violin, and his three brothers completed the group.

He built his first guitar as a boy and in later years experimented with such inventions as a banjo made of an automobile wheel, a bodiless guitar, and an instrument which combined the guitar and sitar.

After retirement Mr. Wright repaired instruments in his home, often charging only for parts and shipping. His reputation spread to New Mexico, California, and throughout much of the nation.

He enjoyed a rapport with young people which few adults ever attain. He was known and admired almost to the point of reverence by hundreds of young guitar players -- and some not so young -- in El Paso and the Southwest, and it was noted that a major part of those attending the funeral rites were his youthful associates in the field of music.

Besides his wife, Juanell, survivors include six brothers, Eddie Wright and Bill Wright, both of Gallup, N.M., Hub Wright of Mangum, Okla., Bob Wright of El Paso and Glenn Ray Wright of Window Rock, Arizona.

Notaries To File For Appointments

White, Jr. has announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1973 and ends June 1, 1975, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1973 and May 15, 1973, inclusive.

Secretary of State White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1973, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, 1973. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.
