## Escaped Prisoner Captured In Kansas

An 18-year-old Montett, Mo. man escaped from Motley County jail Saturday, stole a local resident's car and was recaptured in Kansas Tuesday night.

John Michael Evans was arrested two miles east of Matador, Friday night for possession of marijuana, after DPS officers Neal Haralson and Dude Speed stopped him for a routine check.

Motley County Sheriff, Alton Marshall, said after the man was arrested it was learned that the car he was driving at the time of his arrest had been reported stolen in Midland.

Authorities also said the

man was on probation in the Spearman-Borger area for car theft.

The escapee apparently took a lever off the cell door and used it to pry the lock off the door. Then, Sheriff Marshall said, the lever was used to break a hole in a wall and the prisoner escaped through the residence of jailor Roger Evans.

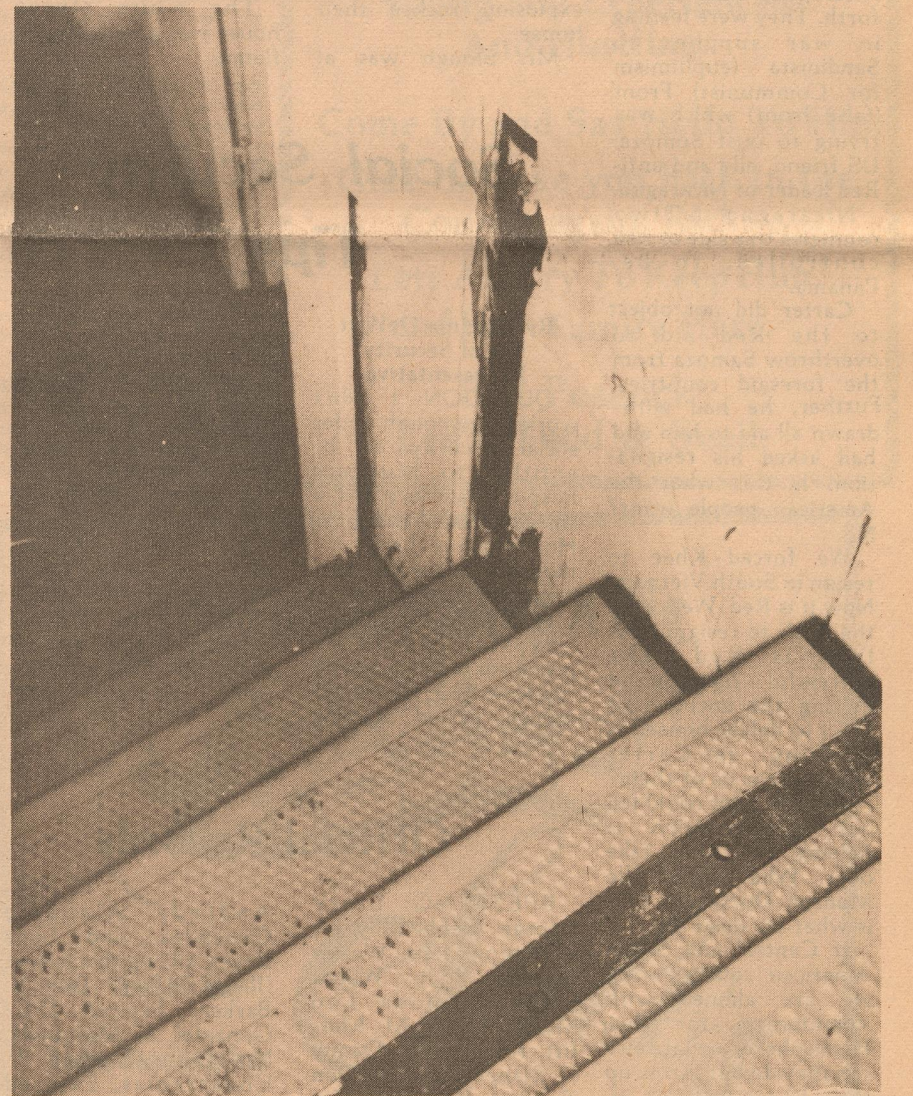
Roger Evans later said the man must have been in a hurry because of all the valuables and money in the apartment the man only took a pair of old shoes.

Marshall said the prisoner broke out between 12:30, when he was given his lunch, and 3:30, when the car of Jesse Perkins was noticed

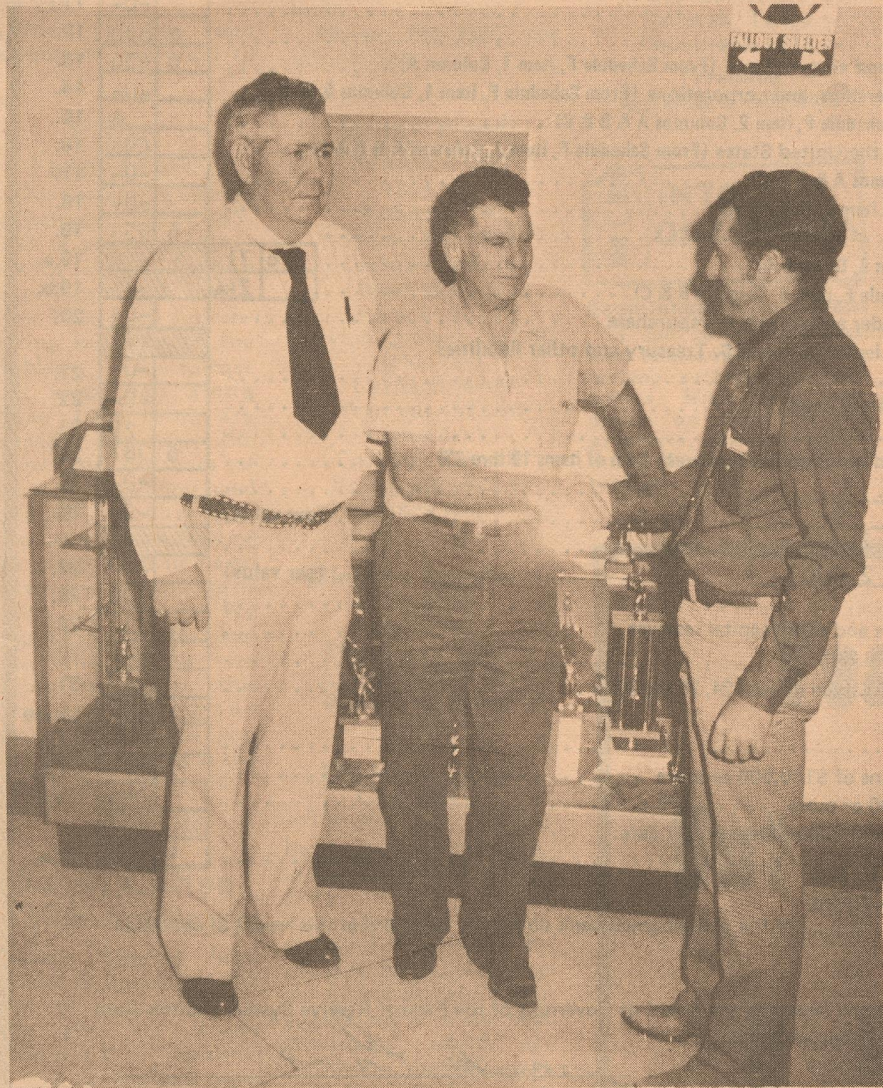
missing from Cooper's Phillips 66 station on U.S. Highway 70. Perkins had left the car there to be washed by the Methodist Youth Group who were raising money for the new church building. The car was recovered in Quanah at about 10:30 Saturday night, but Quanah lawmen reported a pickup missing from there at 5:30 p.m.

Marshall said the man had no identification when he escaped as local officials had taken his belongings when they arrested him.

When he was recaptured in Iola, Kansas, about 100 miles east of Wichita, Kansas, he was in the pickup which was stolen at Quanah.

### Nicaragua's Anti-Red Struggle

Have you ever watched an insect die from heat? There was this man in Borger who left a job for a better paying job at fighting fires at the Phillips Petroleum plant nearby. Funeral services for Green Berry Bostick, 89, were conducted Thursday, July 19, 1979 in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Larry Heard, pastor of the Idalou First Baptist Church and Rev. Jerry Golden pastor of the First Baptist Church of Matador officiating. Burial was in the East Mound Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home of Matador. Mr. Bostick passed away on Wednesday, July 18, in the Caprock Hospital in Floydada after a brief illness.

A native of San Saba, Texas, he moved with his family to Fisher County in 1897 and in 1910 he moved to Motley County. He had lived in Slaton for about 2 years and then moved back to Motley County in 1912. He had worked for the late Uncle Billy Moore and for the late A.B. Echols for a while and

later worked as a farmer and rancher. On April 14, 1916, he married the former Emma Ruth Lewis here in Matador at the Methodist parsonage. They were married for 62 years until the death of Mrs. Bostick on December 28, 1978. Mr. Bostick is survived by one son, Lewis of Matador; 3 daughters,

## Gov. Clements Calls for Strict Enforcement

Calling the 55 mph speed limit "an important part of the whole energy conservation program," Governor Bill Clements stated that as much as a five percent fuel savings could be realized by strict enforcement of the 55 mph.

The governor also noted that highway fatalities dropped more than 16 percent when the 55 mph speed limit was observed during 1973-74.

The statements were made during a June press conference where Governor Clements ordered odd-even gasoline sales

restrictions and anti-topping controls for Dallas, Harris and Tarrant counties.

The governor also requested increased enforcement of the 55 mph by the Department of Public Safety and stressed the necessity of city, county, and judicial officials to aid in the 55 mph enforcement.

"I see the 55 mph speed limit as symbolic of my entire effort," Governor Clements said, "I'd like to see more enthusiasm from the people of Texas for the 55 mph as opposed to more high-way troopers."

QUESTION: I didn't work long enough under social security to be entitled to Medicare hospital insurance, so I'm thinking of buying it. How much is the monthly hospital insurance premium now?

ANSWER: The basic hospital insurance premium is \$69 a month (up from \$63) for the 12-month period starting

July 1, 1979. This premium represents the current cost of Medicare hospital insurance protection. Under the law, the hospital insurance premium cannot be changed more often than once a year.

## County Agent Says

By Bill Pallmeyer

I have some sunglasses that were left at the concession stand during the Jr. Rodeo. They may be picked up at my office. \*\*\*\*\*

Each year I have been asked this question about white insects that are on shrubs, and the answer is still the same. This is a scale insect. They can be controlled if a proper insecticide is used and it is used properly.

Eunonymus scale is present again, and insects can be found on leaves, stems, and trunks. There may be two to three generations a year, so if you haven't kept this information, it might be to your benefit to do so.

Summer oil will control the adults, but Malathion or Diazinon must be added to the oil to control the crawlers. Two to three applications may be required, and be sure to cover the entire

plant with insecticide.

Five tbs. of dormant oil and 1 tbs. Malathion should be added to each gal. of water. Inspect the infected plants 10-14 days after treatment using a white cloth to rub over the areas where the insects are seen. If you get a yellow stain on the cloth some insects are still alive and another application is required. If only brown and white scale coverings are found on the cloth, you have done a good job, and will only need to watch for reinfestation.

No matter what you spray, be sure to follow directions on the label. If instructions are not followed, damage may result. Some of these damages show up as:

**BURN:** Appears on the tips or margins of the leaf, or the entire leaf may appear burned.

**CHLOROSIS:** This appears as spots on tips,

marginal or entire leaf yellowing.

**LEAF DISTORTION:** This appears as curling, crinkling, or cupping of the leaf.

**STUNTING:** A reduction in size of the entire plant, or certain parts as fruits, flowers, and roots. The rest of the plant will appear normal.

**ABNORMAL GROWTH:** This is a stimulation of excessive growth of aerial roots, suckers or the entire plant.

Usually new growth is most likely to show damage when sprays are applied, so follow these guidelines to help reduce plant damage.

(1) Don't apply sprays to plants that are stressed and avoid spraying under extremely hot sunny conditions. Even though it won't apply this time of year, don't spray when temperatures are low either.

(2) Don't spray when conditions do not promote drying. Do not spray when plants are in need of water.

(3) Wettable powders are usually safer than liquids, because they don't contain solvents. The objection to wettable powders is the residue left on the foliage.

(4) Aerosol formulation of pesticides will cause plant damage if applied at less than the recommended distance between the aerosol nozzle and the plant. The distance usually recommended is 18 to 20 inches.

(5) Study the label for rates of application, application instructions, and plant damage information. DO NOT OVERDOSE, and clean out sprayer, hose and nozzle after each use.

Don't try to save time by mixing pesticides and fertilizers. This can be risky, because a larger

quantity of fertilizer is needed than of the pesticide solution.

Several have asked the protein content of different types of hay, so this information may be of value if you remember protein content varies with the care the plants have received, and the growth stage of the grass when cut.

Average digestible protein content of some plants are: Kleingrass, 4.2%; Johnsongrass, 3.9%; Sudan 4.2%; Sorghum alnum, 3.1%; Coastal Bermudagrass, 6.1%; Alicia Bermudagrass, 5.9%; Weeping lovegrass, 4.0%; Oats, 5.0%; and Alfalfa, 14.6%.

I have a list of forage tests that have been run by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If you are interested in information on other grasses on high and low protein contents, stop by the office and this information is available.

## Farm Income Tax Management is Year-Round Task

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of five articles on farm income tax management for 1979.)

"Income tax consequences of farm and ranch decisions should be weighed year-round," contends Dr. Ashley Lovell.

Cash-basis taxpayers tend to think of tax management strategies near the end of the taxable year, notes Lovell, and economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. However, unless tax-saving moves can be completed before the year's end, many tax management strategies become inappropriate after Dec. 31.

"Solutions to business management problems should contribute to maximizing after-tax income and net worth of the business," contends the economist. "When profit opportunities are limited, sufficient taxable income should be generated to equal the manager's zero bracket amount in the appropriate tax table or schedule." Successful farm income tax management requires an awareness of tax provisions applicable

to farming and ranching and of the particular accounting system used.

"Good records are essential for efficient farm management and are useful in preparing credit applications," emphasizes Lovell. "They can also lead to maximum social security coverage and income tax savings."

Accurate and complete accounting of expense and income items is essential to tax management. An omitted \$1 expense in 1979 may cost 14 to 70 cents in extra tax dollars, depending on the tax bracket, points out the economist.

"For year-end maneuvers to be more effective and less expensive, income tax consequences of business decisions should be considered throughout the year," emphasizes Lovell.

"Today's farmers and ranchers must look at income tax management as a year-round task, not just one that requires attention when tax filing time rolls around."

The economist encourages taxpayers to consult a tax accountant or attorney regarding particular business details.

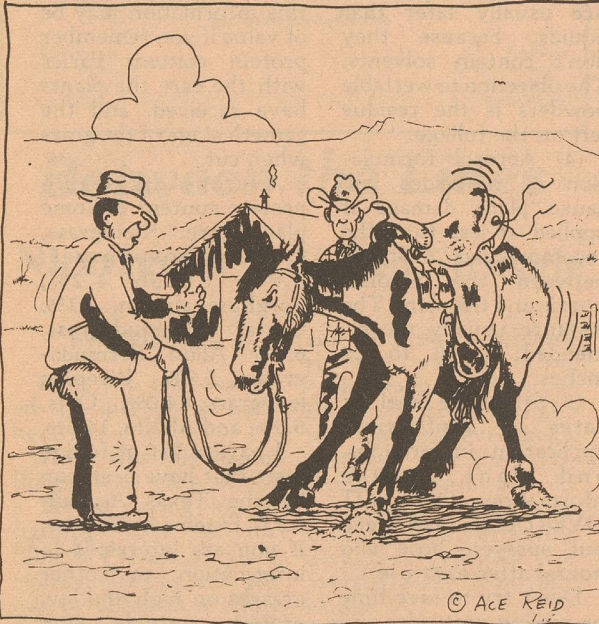
