LIVESTOCK SHOW SET FOR MARCH 20

The 38th annual Motley County Jr. Livestock Show for the 4-H and FFA members of Motley County will be held at the old FFA building in Matador Monday, March 20th, according to Vann Francis, President of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsor of the show.

Classes are provided for market steers, market hogs, market lambs, breeding hogs and rabbits. In addition crossbred and straight bred heifer classes are provided for anyone living in Motley County, or owning land in Motley County.

Market animals (steers, hogs & lambs) must be weighed and tagged between 7:30 and 9:30 AM, and all other animals (breeding hogs, rabbits & heifers) must be entered and in place by 9:30 AM.

Steers must weigh 800 lbs. or more, and not show any permanent teeth at time of weighing.

Market hogs (either barrows or gilts) must weigh 190 to 250 lbs. and breeding hogs must weigh 150 lbs. or more. An exhibitor may show no more than 6 market hogs.

Lambs must weigh 70 to 125 lbs., and must have all baby teeth intact. No more than 2 lambs may be shown by an exhibitor.

Two rabbits, 1 buck & 1 doe, or 2 bucks or 2 does may be shown by an exhibitor.

Heifers must be 12 to 18 months of age at show time, with an owner eligible to enter a maximum of 2 animals. Animals will be identified by number, and placed in a pen. They will not be weighed or shown at halter.

The show will start at 10:00 AM and proceed as follows: Open gilts, bred gilts, sows, Champion Breeding Hog, Light market hogs, medium market hogs, heavy market hogs and Grand Champion Market Hog. Light market lambs, heavy market lambs, Grand Champion Market Lamb. Rabbit does, rabbit bucks, Grand Champion Rabbit. Crossbred heifers, straightbred heifers, Grand Champion Heifer.

The steer show will start at 1:30 PM, and follow this order: Light steers, medium steers, heavy steers, Grand Champion Steer.

Road To Be Closed

Farm to market Road 599 in Motley County, four miles north of Flomot will be closed to all traffic beginning next week, according to Everett Monroe with the Texas Highway Department of Engineering in Clarendon. The road will be closed while the Quitaque Creek Bridge is being replaced. Contract for work on the bridge was let in February by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with low bidder being Gilvin and Terrell, Inc., of Amarillo. Their bid was \$363,689.98.

According to Mr. Monroe, work will begin sometime next week and is expected to be completed in July. There will be no designated detour route, but traffic may use FM Road 1065 from Quitaque south, or State Highway 70 through Turkey.

The new bridge will be 26 feet wide, which is six feet wider than the existing bridge. The overall length of the bridge will be increased by ten feet. The bridge is being replaced due to the deterioration of the sub-structures and super-structure.

LEGAL NOTICE

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has filed tariffs with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to implement the Federal Communications Commission's telephone equipment registration program (FCC Docket 19528). The tariffs have an effective date of April 15, 1978. The proposed changes will reduce rates for extension telephones and 25 foot long cords; will restructure one-time charges for service connection, moves and changes, increasing some and reducing others; and will offer reduced monthly rates for one-party business and residence customers who provide their own primary telephone instrument. 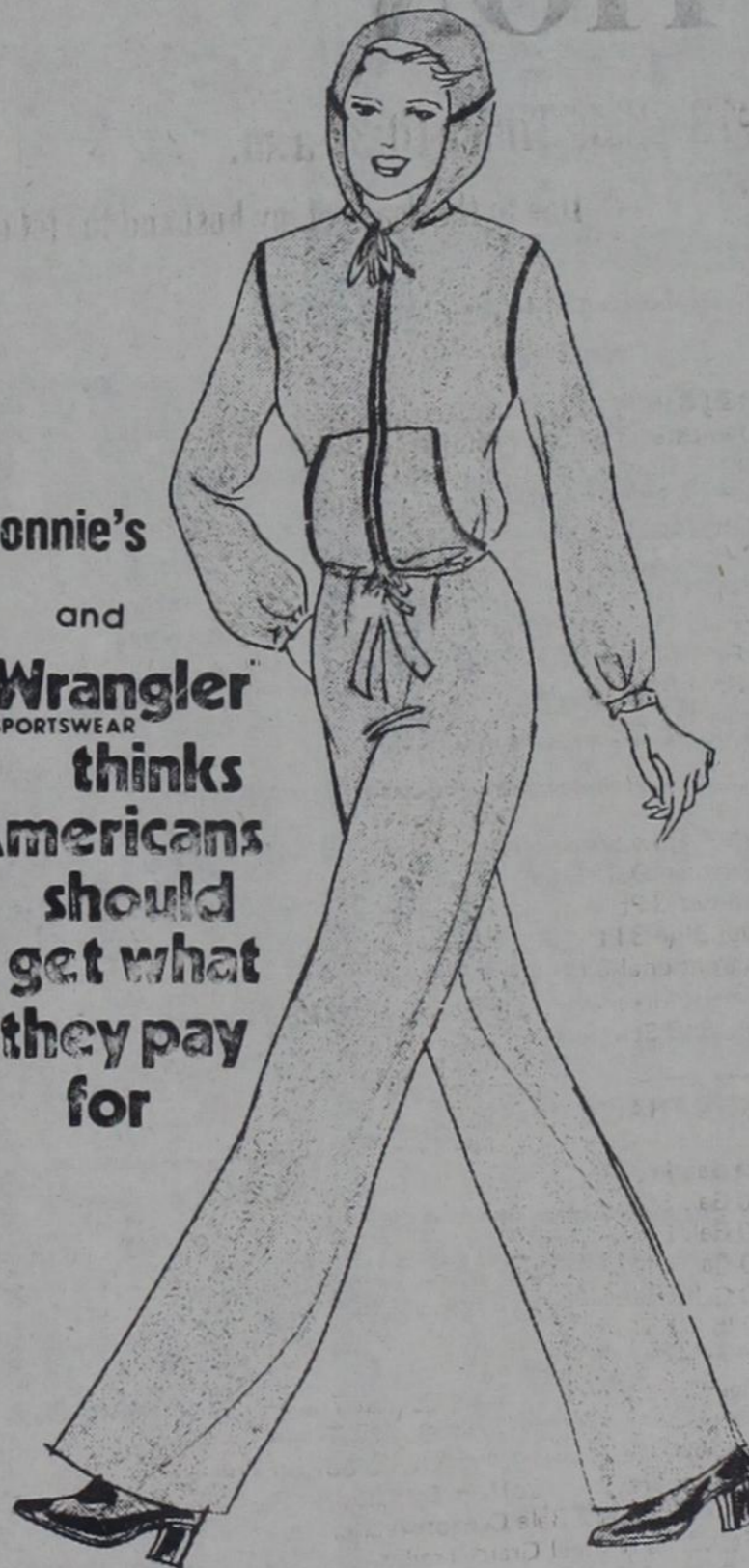

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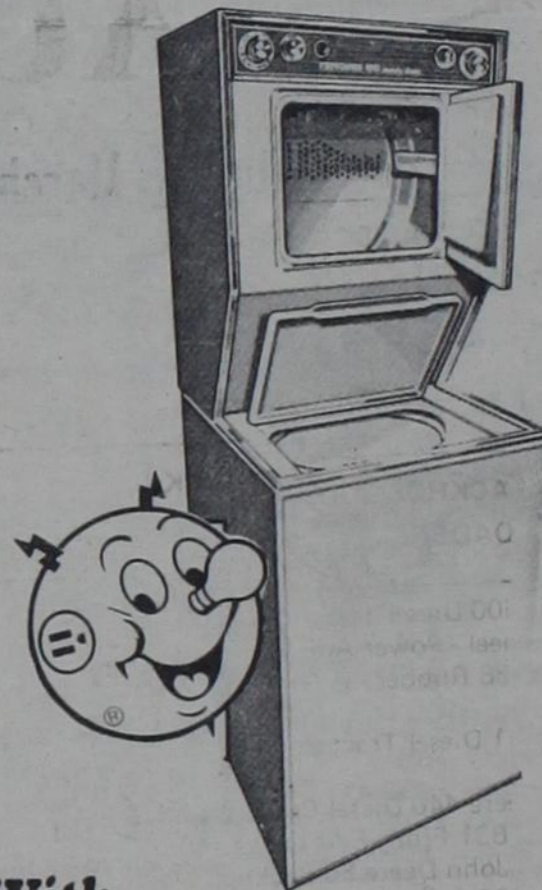
