## Workers To Get Quarterly W-2 Reports

For the first time this January, American wage earners will know the exact amount of their earnings being reported to the Social Security Administration without having to ask for the information, Ray Purcell manager of the Plainview social security office said today.

In the past, an employee never saw the quarterly reports sent by his employer; instead he had to mail a postcard to the Social Security Administration in order to get a copy of his earnings history. Now each worker will have a current record of each year's earnings through his W-2.

It is extremely important that a worker check his

name and social security number on the W-2 form, as well as the amount of earnings shown, Purcell stressed. This is especially true if the worker had several employers during the year, or if he worked for only part of the year.

If the worker finds an error on the W-2 he should report it immediately to his employer. The employer will send a corrected W-2 to the Social Security Administration. When the worker files his income tax return, he should use the corrected information.

Because of the change in reporting social security information, 6 million employers will have less paper work when reporting

wages for social security and Federal income tax purposes.

For the past 40 years, most employers have had to report employees' wages to the Internal Revenue Service every three months. In addition, all employers completed a Form W-2 at the end of the year for each employee which showed total wages for income tax purposes.

Since the W-2 form now has information for both IRS and the Social Security Administration, employers must complete only one wage report a year, rather than five. They still must send summary wage and tax liability information to IRS once a quarter.

## Ice Storm Damage May Be Deducted

The last two days of 1978 brought destructive ice storms to much of North Central Texas. Taxpayers whose property was damaged by the storms may be able to deduct some or all of their losses on their Federal income tax return this filing period.

Losses to business property are generally deductible in full. Personal property loss deductions,

however, are limited to the amount of loss exceeding \$100 for those taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions.

To claim a personal casualty loss for damage to ornamental trees and shrubs, taxpayers must establish that there has been a decrease in the total value of the real estate. In general, the amount of loss is the decrease in fair

market value, limited to the adjusted basis, and reduced by any insurance or other reimbursement.

Decrease in the fair market value is the difference between the value of the property immediately before and immediately after the casualty. It is not necessarily the cost of replacing or repairing the property.

The difference between the fair market value of the property immediately before and immediately after the casualty should be ascertained by competent, independent appraisals. Choose an experienced and reliable appraiser. The appraiser's knowledge of sales of comparable property and conditions in the area, familiarity with your property before and after the casualty and method of determining the amount of loss are important elements in proving a casualty loss.

In addition to obtaining appraisals, you will want to consider photographing the damaged property. Photographs of your property before it was damaged will be helpful in showing the condition and value of the property prior to the casualty. Photographs taken after the casualty that show the extent of the damage will be helpful in establishing the condition and value of the property after it was damaged. Photographs showing the condition of the property after it was repaired, restored, or replaced may also be helpful.

IRS has prepared a free publication to answer your questions on how to claim a deduction for a casualty loss. Write or call IRS and ask for Publication 547 "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses, and Thefts."

## Best Crime Prevention Practices Are Begun At Home

**A FAMILY COUNCIL**  
The best place to start practicing crime resistance is in the home and an easy way to make crime resistance a part of the family routine is through a Family Council.

A Family Council is simply an informal gathering of family members during which they discuss the family's individual and collective vulnerability to crime and ways to reduce this vulnerability. Crime resistance literature, usually available from local police, can be used both to learn about crime problems of particular concern in your area and as a source of helpful preventive tips.

Although crimes such as burglary, robbery and assault are of concern to the family generally, individual family members should be aware of specific crime problems that might face them because of their age or sex. Children, for instance, must be warned of child

molesters and bicycle thieves; women should recognize the dangers posed by purse snatchers and sex offenders; men should guard against pickpockets, and the elderly must be wary of swindlers.

To improve protection for the family as a whole, consider assigning specific crime resistance responsibilities to family members. For example, one member of the family could insure that the home is always secured for the evening before the family retires. Another could assume responsibility for insuring that all windows and doors are locked prior to the family's departure from the home.

After developing your family's anticrime strategy, suggest to your neighbors that they adopt the Family Council approach and then join your police and other families in your neighborhood to form a unit front against crime.

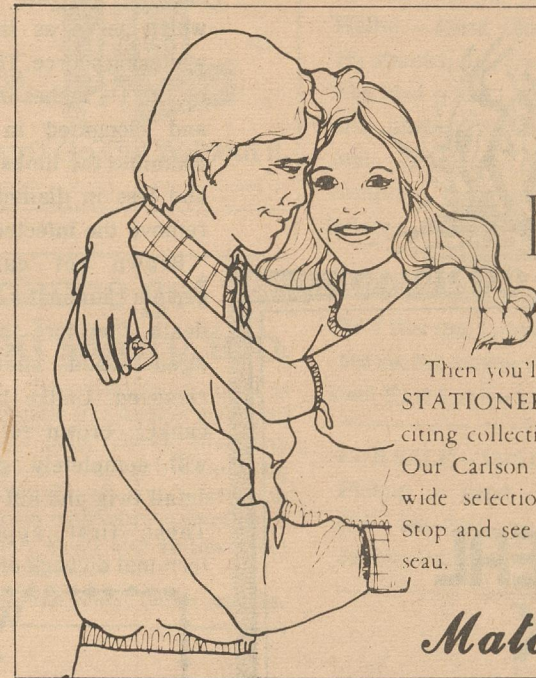

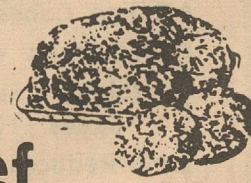

## Pruning Season Nears For Trees

Before long, many will start pruning trees, but have a reason that will help the tree, states Extension Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Peaches require a great deal of pruning to maintain production, but diseases such as bacterial leaf spot and brown rot can be reduced by pruning. Bacterial leaf spot causes deterioration and disfigured fruit, and can be reduced by pruning out the cankers which serve as the overwintering source. These will be 1 to 1½ inches in length, and elongated in shape. Examine the limbs ¾ inch and less in diameter, and remove the infected ones.

Brown rot causes a certain amount of twig death, therefore this damaged wood should be removed. Unlike bacterial canker, brown rot lesions will completely girdle a small twig and kill it back. These first appear as terminal dieback of 12 to 18

inches.

Mechanical damage injury to pecans is the main reason these plants need help. Decay will start, and tests have shown that when cuts were made and left untreated, within 12 months decay had advanced down the pruned limb 2 to 3 feet. On treated limbs, the decay did not advance below the cut. Cuts should be examined every 3 to 4 months, and if the protective layer has been broken, apply another layer to prevent water from getting between the sealer and the wood.

Cuts on large limbs should be made 6 to 8 inches below the point of damage, or below the lowest point of visible disease sign. On smaller limbs, remove the entire limb, especially if your aim is to control fire blight on pears.

Finally, keep equipment sharp and make a clean cut. Also sterilize equipment after making a cut so you won't spread the disease.

## Texas Arbor Day Set For Jan. 19

COLLEGE STATION -- Texas Arbor Day, the day traditionally set aside to plant trees, will be observed this year on Jan. 19.

"What better way to aid in preserving our environment than by planting a tree adapted to our area of this great state," emphasizes Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Arbor Day was once a special event in the lives of many Texas citizens. In many communities, the trees that are so admired today are the direct result of the labor and attention given so readily by children and interested adults of by-gone generations, notes Janne.

"In recent years, much has been written about the value of trees for purposes other than to provide lumber and shade. Research reports indicate that tree barriers can reduce noise levels as much as 50 percent. They also serve as giant air cleaners filtering out the dust as well as using the carbon dioxide in the air to produce the lumber and shade we need," says Janne.

"Too often we take the majestic beauty of our trees

for granted; we forget the benefits they give us. As a gift to future generations, we should initiate programs in our community to plant trees in our home yards, parks, public grounds and many of the so-called waste lands, contends the landscape horticulturist.

When planting a tree, give some thought in selecting varieties and species suited to the area, advises Janne. Too frequently people are impatient and want immediate results, so weak, fast growing varieties are used. All too often the silver maple, cottonwood, Siberian elm and other rapidly growing trees grow, mature and die out in one or two generations. For permanent plantings select oak, pecan, magnolia, bald cypress, Deodar cedar and similar species.

"Remember, Texas Arbor Day occurs during the prime tree planting season. The cold, usually moist soil at this time allows tree roots to become established before top growth occurs. Trees are usually in prime condition for transplanting at this time and the chances for success are greatest," says Janne.

Dear Sir:
