Between The Lines

Stabbing a friend in the back is what Carter did to yet another ally, Free China. This is the latest of a string of such dealings with our allies. It has got to stop! Samoza, an ally of America for thirty years and under attack by communists for conquest of his country, Venezuela, presently has all aid stopped by one Mr. Carter. Ian Smith and his country, Rhodesia, presently has all our aid to them stopped, while they are under attack, not by Black Nationalist but Black Marxist Nationalists. While Carter is saying no to "white" minority rule, he is saying yes to "Red" minority rule. Not only that, he is having us buy chrome from Red Russia (who does far worse to mankind than the alleged racial discrimination) and not from Rhodesia. Another ally, South Africa, has none of our support either, even though they are anti-communistic and pro-American as the above countries, and are presently threatened by communist takeover.

Carter is making enemies of our anti-communist allies and befriending communist countries like Red China and Cuba.

Carter, against strong national defense and security too, has cancelled the B-1 bomber, many defense missiles, aircraft carriers and is for a weak Salt II disarmament package to be dalt to Russia's advantage. Carter, against our right to keep and bear arms as citizens as demonstrated by his cunning back-door tactic through the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, who tried to implement national computer registration, would have been one step futher toward disarming free citizens and further endangering our national security therein, but failed.

Internal security: Carter has weakened the CIA & FBI by allowing open to the public, classified information about operations and has initiated attacks upon agents for exposing foreign espionage agents who seek our downfall.

He further fills the windsails of the "Red" cause by:

1. 20 percent of \$36 million loan to Viet Nam via the International Monetary Fund in January, 1977 and

\$60 million interest free loan through the World Bank in August, 1978. Viet Nam recently used it to invade Cambodia.

2. Present plans to lift the Cuban Embargo, which will hurt American farmers too.

3. Dresser Industries of Tulsa is to sell advanced oil field tools and equipment to Russia to the tune of some \$127 million which will increase their economy and enable them to sell and control world markets. Russia is already number one in oil production of any other country states World Almanac.

4. Weakly saying, "there is no danger" of Russia recently bringing dangerous offensive fighters into Cuba even though agreement of 1962 was broken.

5. Foreign aid to Red countries of Albania, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Cuba, Ghana, Czechoslovakia, E. Germany, Hungary, Kenya, Poland, Rumania, Yugoslavia, Russia and African nations.

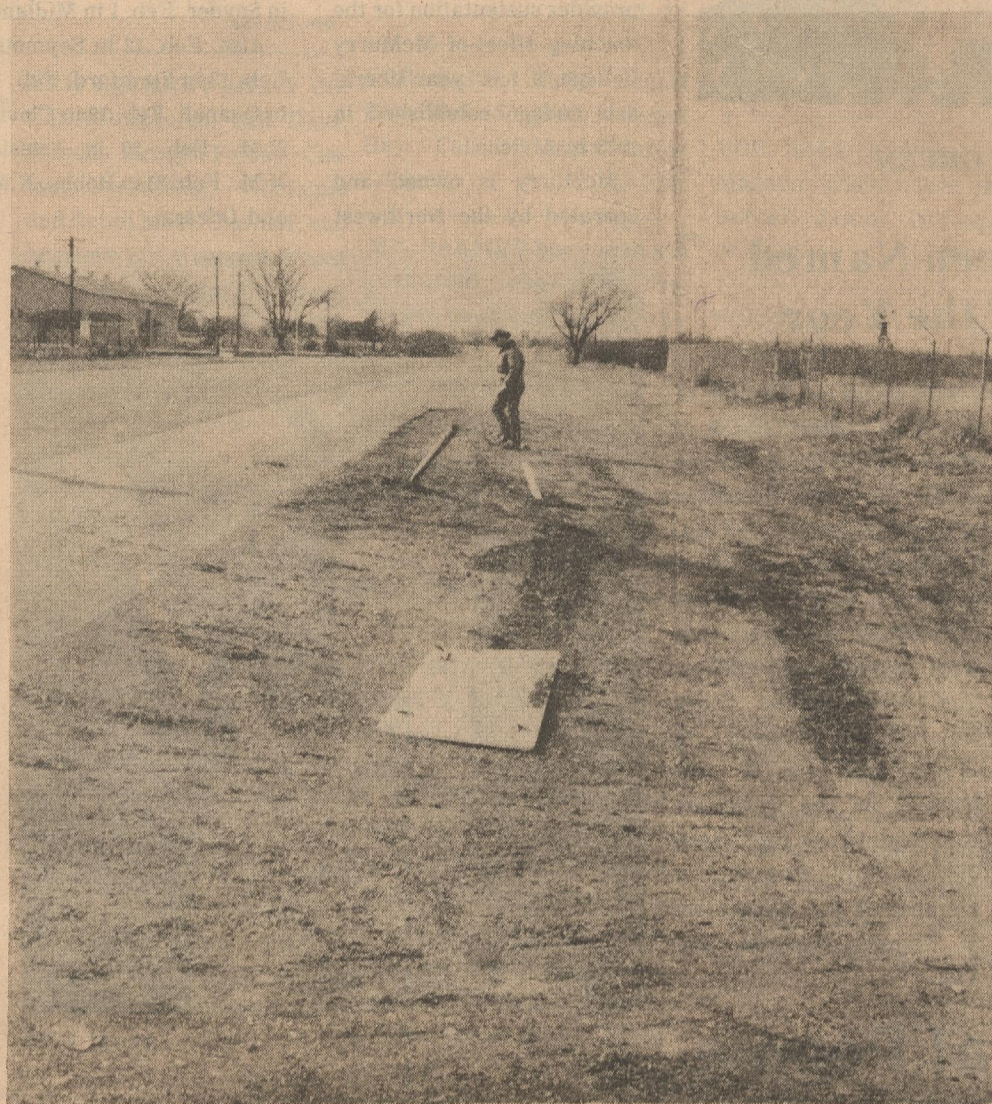
6. Panama Canal Giveaway to communist dictator (within a year of the betrayal of the Republic of China).

Vandal Rampage Damages Local Signs

Two area men were in custody early Monday after a destructive night of vandalism in which 13 highway signs were destroyed.

Charges of destruction of public property were expected to be filed Wednesday, and both state and federal signs were involved in the destruction.

Estimated cost was placed between \$350 and \$400 for replacing the signs. The

figure, according to local officials would have been a lot higher but only two signs were actually destroyed, while the others could easily be straightened. Estimated cost of the two destroyed signs was somewhere around \$60.

The signs had been hit by at least two 4-wheel drive vehicles and evidence, such as tire tracks, chrome, or paint fragments, was left at each sight. The signs had

apparently been pushed over or run over by the vehicles. There was also an eye-witness to the vandalism.

The same night that local signs were destroyed, two Roaring Springs city limit signs were stolen. Last week two Matador city limit signs disappeared. A month ago the Turkey city limit signs vanished.

Larry Fortenberry, convicted of the shooting death of Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson, has once again been returned to death row at Huntsville, after facing new charges in Amarillo.

Fortenberry received 15 years for a service station robbery in Amarillo and an additional 20 years for the car he stole north of Matador.

Fortenberry, who with another man, shot down

Wilson and wounded his companion, J. D. Rogers east of town over three years ago, has made three tips from death row to face other charges.

Recently his lawyers appeared before the Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin in an attempt to get the death sentence appealed. Sheriff Alton Marshall said it would be a few days before they would know anything about the appeal.

Doctor Denies Refusal Charges

Dr. A. R. Parmer has denied all accusations that he refused medical attention to injured persons involved in a car accident two weeks ago near Roaring Springs, and has called for an open meeting with the Hospital Board to discuss the situation before the public.

"I did not refuse treatment to anyone," the doctor said in a Tribune interview last Thursday. "I did not say, No, don't bring them to my clinic."

Dr. Parmer has closed his practice at the local clinic following action by the Motley County Hospital District Board which cut payment to the doctor because of bankruptcy. The announcement by the Board came on the heels of the accident which sent the injured people to a hospital in Floydada. Emergency officials apparently understood that the doctor requested the victims not be brought to Motley General Clinic because there were no facilities to handle injured people.

The doctor explained that on the day of the accident he overheard one end of a conversation at the clinic. He said he heard that there had been a car wreck and there were injuries. He said at that time he did not know where the accident was. "I immediately offered

my advice," he said. "I asked where the nearest hospital to the wreck was and I was told Floydada. I suggested that hospital be notified and the injured taken there. The injured were not denied medical attention."

Dr. Parmer said the truth about this has been distorted, and when truth is distorted it becomes lies. "You can't place the blame of this on my head," he said. "You can't say I refused to give medical treatment to anyone when I have nothing to give medical treatment with."

The doctor explained that by the time patients could have been brought to the local clinic and examined by him, about 45 minutes would have been lost. By that time they could have been in an emergency room at a hospital.

"Suppose you cut your finger. Did you know I can't even put in two stitches at the clinic? Who is there to sterilize the equipment. The board has already taken my nurse away. The receptionist has tried twice to learn to sterilize, and has failed. I am talking about a cut finger. You are talking about a car wreck with three injured people. Suppose I am trying to give a cardiac treatment. Who is there to give the I.V. at the same

time?"

Dr. Parmer said he would not have stayed in Matador had he known the hospital was not going to be opened. "Each week I would ask the Hospital District Board to open the hospital, and each week they would have a meeting. They kept reassuring me and giving me hope. That is why I stayed. I would not even have come here if I had known I would have nothing to work with. Would you try to publish a newspaper without ink?"

He said earlier he would be unable to see patients after clinic hours, and explained the reason for this was because he had had a nurse, and when she was terminated he had no professional help to handle cases.

"I wish you would call for an open meeting with the Hospital Board," he said. "Let the board tell the public how it really is. Let Sherry Burnett, my nurse, and John Burnett be there, and the two doctors before me be there. Call an open meeting at the courthouse and let the people hear the truth."

Dr. Parmer said he was, indeed, leaving and moving to a town where there is a hospital. This action again leaves Motley County without trained medical personnel.

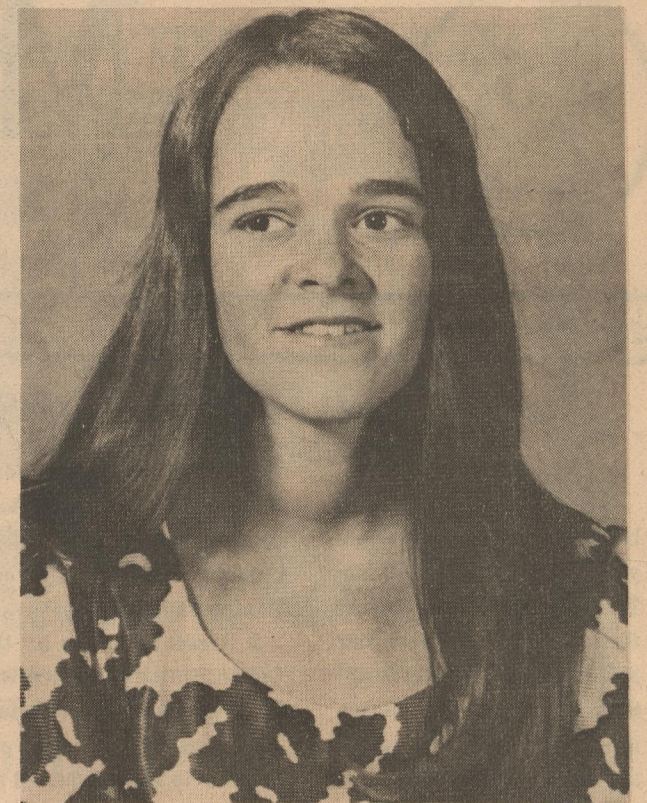
This fund raising effort provides sustentation for the teaching effort of McMurry College, a four year liberal arts college established in 1923 in Abilene.

Social Security Tips

Question: My employer told me I should check my W-2 carefully this year. Why?

Answer: This year, for the first time, the W-2 is being used to report your wages to the Social Security Administration as well as to report your income to the Internal Revenue Service. The benefits you receive from social security when you retire, become disabled or die will be based on the F.I.C.A. wages reported on your W-2. It is important that you check your name and social security number as well as the wage amount.

Question: Do I still have to earn \$50 in each calendar quarter to get a quarter of coverage for social security?

Answer: No. The social security amendments of 1977 provide a quarter of coverage for each \$250 of covered wages earned any time during 1978, up to four quarters on \$1,000 earned. In 1979, \$260 of covered wages needs to be earned for a quarter of coverage, up to four quarters if \$1,040 or more is earned.

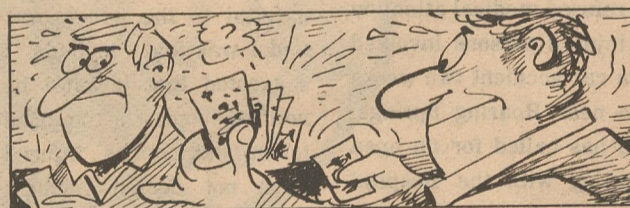

All friends of the couple are invited to attend, and the only gift they seek is "your presence and friendship".



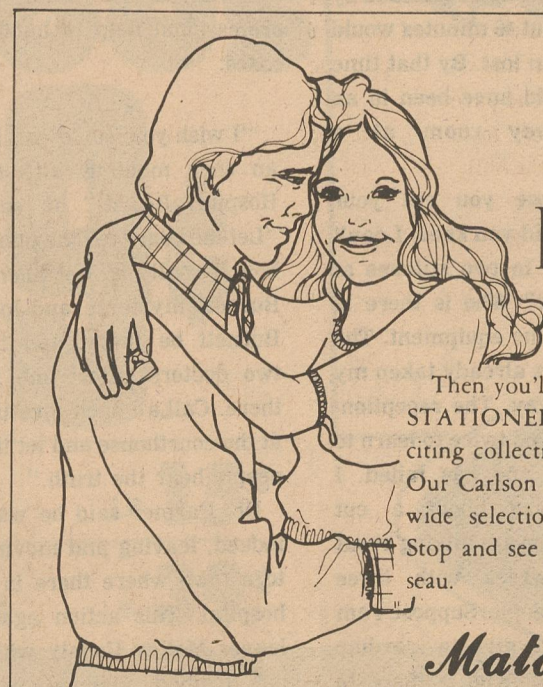

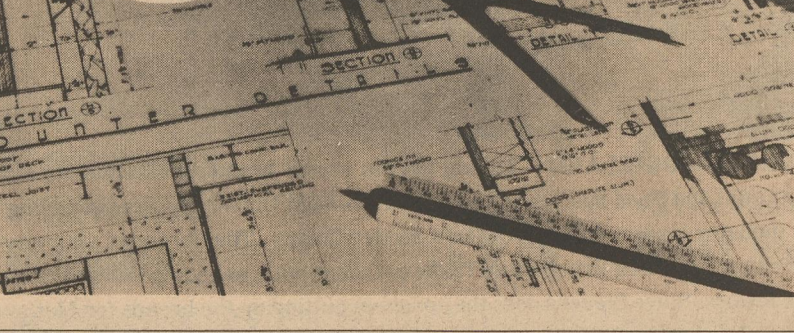
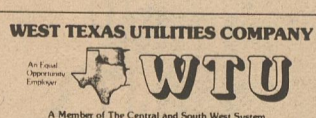

In the past I have been most critical of the fact that far too much legislation is introduced and far too much is being passed. Last year, over 4,000 bills were introduced and about 900 became law. Each year there seems to be an increase. Yesterday an effort was made to place some restrictions in the rules on the number of bills introduced by each Representative. I voted against the restriction because I believe every member should be heard without limitation but I'm sure I will vote "No" on many of the bills. To date there have been 378 bills introduced in the House and 125 in the Senate. Corrective legislation and new laws are essential in an expanding society but far too many laws are introduced for the purpose of giving certain special interest some undeserved advantage.

Representative Bob Close

of Perryton asked me to co-sponsor H. B. 370 which I did. The bill should not be controversial. It will do nothing more than permit County Commissioner Courts to authorize payments for the expense of an autopsy and cost of transporting a body from one point to another. It isn't difficult to see why legislation of this nature is needed.

We might mention that Representative Bob Close of Perryton is one of the most highly respected Legislators down here.

Rep. Foster Whaley Appointed To Committee

AUSTIN -- State Rep. Foster Whaley of Pampa has been named to positions on the Agriculture and Livestock and Government Organization House committees by Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Clayton said Rep. Whaley would serve in these capacities during the next two years of the 66th Legislature.

Rep. Whaley, a farmer by profession is serving his first term in the House.

The eleven-member Agriculture and Livestock Committee has jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to agriculture, horticulture, and farm husbandry. The Committee also has authority over legislation pertaining to livestock raising and the livestock industry. The Agriculture and Livestock

Committee has jurisdiction over the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Animal Health Commission, the Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the functions, powers, and responsibilities of these agencies.

The eleven-member Committee on Government Organization has jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the Sunset Advisory Commission and the extension of state departments and agencies under the provisions of the Texas Sunset Act. The Committee also has jurisdiction over the organization, powers, regulations, and management of those state departments, agencies, and advisory committees being considered by the Legislature under the provisions of the Texas Sunset Act.

Deadline Jan. 31 For W-2 Forms

Employers must provide their employees with completed Wage and Tax Statements for 1978 by Wednesday, January 31, 1979, the Internal Revenue Service said.

If a Wage and Tax Statement is not received by January 31, an employee should contact his or her employer first, according to the IRS. After February 15, the employee should contact a local IRS office.

By not issuing Wage and Tax Statements on time, employers may be penalizing employees who will have to wait until February or later to file their tax returns, possibly missing out on the quick refunds available to early filers.

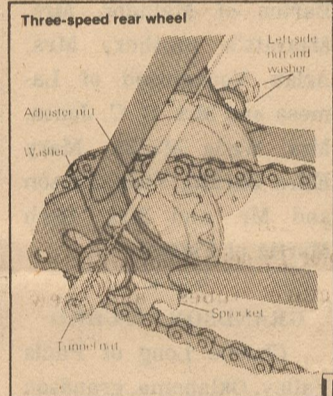
Employees who do not receive their Wage and Tax Statements must still file by the tax deadline. These individuals should report all of their income and attach a statement explaining tax computations for the missing wage and tax statement information, the IRS said. These individuals may also use Form 4852, "Employee's Substitute Wage and Tax Statement," which can be obtained free from most IRS offices.

REPAIRING YOUR BIKE

You can keep your bike safe to ride, without having to take it in to be serviced every time there's a problem, if you know a few simple rules of general care. One procedure you should learn is how to change the rear wheel on a three-speed bike.



THREE SPEED REAR WHEEL—Learning how to change this wheel is easier than you think.

First, turn bike upside down. Then disconnect adjuster nut and loosen left side nut and tunnel nut. Push away fender braces and lift axle from its slots. Free chain from sprocket.

To remount, loop chain on sprocket and slide axle into slots. Pull the wheel back until chain has 1/2-inch play; finger-tighten nut on left. Then center wheel, tighten nuts and connect adjuster.

1979 WHEAT PROGRAM

As noted in an earlier Newsletter, the new program is much the same as in 1978, requiring a 20 percent acreage set-aside and maintaining the target price at \$3.40 per bu. and the national loan rate at \$2.35. Basic provisions regarding compliance set-aside cover, double-cropping and deficiency and disaster payments remain the same. While the 1979 program permits a 6 month grazing period as before, it does not include payments for grazing and haying wheat acreage. It also sets the voluntary acreage reduction at 15 percent, as contrary to 20 percent in 1978, for 100 percent deficiency payment guarantee. The base for this reduction will include credit for set-aside, hayed and grazed acreages, and 1978 voluntary acreage reductions.

COTTON PROGRAM AND OTHER PROGRAM PROVISIONS

There will be no Cotton Required Set-Aside or Voluntary Diversion Acreage Payments in 1979. The Loan Rate has been set at 50.23c and the Target Price at 57.70c.

Farms that have Wheat or Feed Grain planted in 1979 must comply with their Normal Crop Acreage Limitation in order to be eligible for Deficiency Payments, Loans and Disaster Payments. NCA Crops are Upland Cotton, Corn, Grain Sorghum, Barley, Wheat, Oats, Rye, Soybeans, Rice, Flax, Dry Edible Beans, Sunflowers, Sugarbeets, and Sugar Cane.

Farm operators should be sure the cotton production reported is correct and properly identified to the farm by farm serial number. Severe penalties will be imposed for reports found to be in substantial error. Ginner's errors will not

relieve farm operators of their responsibility for furnishing accurate reports.

Farm operators are again reminded that application for low yield disaster payment (production less than 75 percent of the cotton payment yield or 60 percent of the corn, or grain sorghum yield; must be filed within 15 days of the completion of harvest and before devoting the acreage to any other use. Also, if any of the crop will not be harvested, it must be appraised before disposition or any other use is made of the acreage.

OFF-SETTING COMPLIANCE PROVISIONS

apply, which means that you must keep all farms planting crops with required set-aside acreage within the NCA.

Planting only crops requiring no set-aside acreage on a farm eliminates the need to stay within the NCA for that farm. This will not cause this farm to be out of compliance and will not affect compliance on any other farm.

For 1979, you will sign an intention to participate between February 15, and April 16, 1979. Also you will measure and report your crop acreage the same as in

past years. Wheat and barley acreage will be reported by about May 1, and other crops by about August 1, 1979.

COTTON LOAN RATE
The 1979 national upland cotton loan is up 2.23c from last year which is 50.23c. This represents 85 per cent of the average price in designated U.S. spot markets in the 3 year average (excluding the low & high of the 5 years) ending July 31.

COTTON GINS
All county gins have certified that bagging and ties will meet CCC requirements for loan eligibility.

PRE-MEASUREMENT SERVICE

ac.; Coker 312, 232 lbs. per ac.; Cascot B2, 225 lbs. per ac.; and Lambright X-15-4, 220 lbs. per ac.

Billy Roys, Variety test: Lockett 77, 240 lbs. per ac.; Stripper 32, 209 lbs. per ac.; Cascot B2, 207 lbs. per ac.; GSA 75, 186 lbs. per ac.

R. A. Stafford, Rusarium wilt, nematode tolerance test: Lockett 77, 249 lbs. per ac.; Cascot L7, 210 lbs. per ac. on deep broke land, and Lockett 77, 144 lbs. per ac.; and Paymaster 18 on land not deep broken. The first planting also included Coker 5110, but seed were not available for replanting, and Cascot B2 was included in the second planting. This was not harvested separately due to a poor stand that resulted when unfavorable weather was received after the test was replanted.

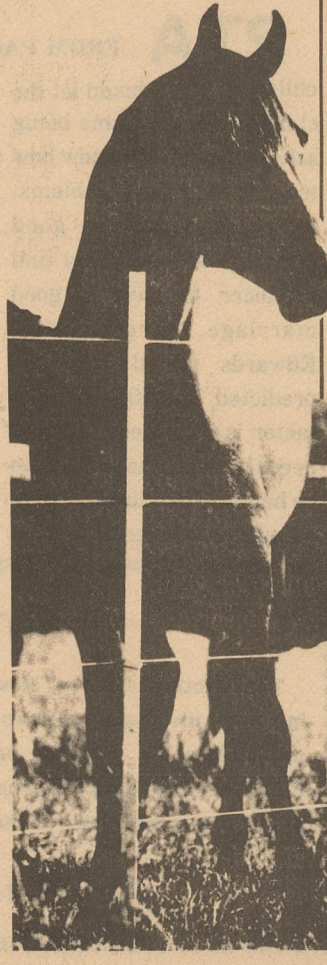
A report was made that

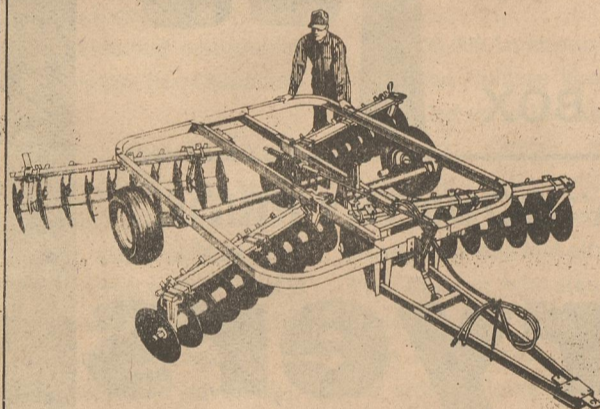

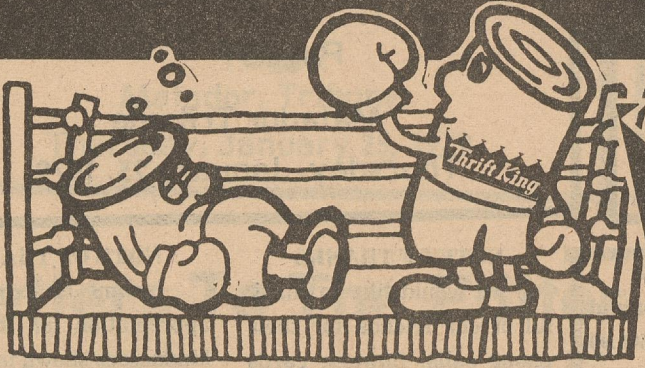
