Charges Are Filed For Pickup Theft

Multiple charges were pending early this week against two young Quitaque men accused of stealing a pickup from a Flomot resident.

The pickup, a 1978 Chevrolet owned by Malcolm Turner, was found early Saturday morning two miles East of Turkey by Hall County deputy Johnny Butler. Turner did not realize the vehicle had been taken until lawmen notified him Saturday. It had been parked in front of his house North of the Community Building in Flomot. Motley County Sheriff Alton Marshall estimated it had been stolen between midnight and 5 a.m.

There was between \$800 and \$1,200 damage done to the vehicle. When it was

found, the pickup was still running, in gear, and had been run against a state highway sign. The two youths are suspected of being intoxicated when the incident occurred.

Marshall said officers had a sworn statement from one of the boys, an 18 year old, that they had taken the pickup. But both the 18 year old and his juvenile friend denied taking the CB radio which was missing from the pickup Saturday.

The Tom Ross family, of Flomot, had all the butane taken out of their tank and a butane hose stolen sometime Friday. Marshall said he did not think there was any connection between the Turner case and the Ross case. Investigation is continuing in both cases.

Both the Motley County boys and girls basketball squads finished district play Tuesday night with 8-0 records to capture District Championship honors, in what proved to be an exciting season for each

The girls defeated Jayton Tuesday, 40-24, after being hampered by turnovers early in the contest. Jayton led 8-4 at the end of the first quarter, and Motley County did not take the lead until 1:25 remained in the first GRADE 8: Vonda Hamhalf. Drilling Continues On Wildcat Well

Working "twenty-seven hours a day, seven days a week," drilling crews continue to core deeper into the earth on the "rank wildcat" in the Dougherty commun-

Labeled "the Dougherty Prospect," the wildcat is on Bundy Hal Campbell land, northeast of Dougherty. It is

16 miles West of Matador.

The 48th daily report was filed Friday morning, a spokesman told The Hesperian. Drilling started Dec. 16. Wayne Durrett of Level-

land is the "pusher." The spokesman declined to state how deep the crew had drilled, but stated that the operation was in the "intermediate" stage. He added that "the string had been set."

The drilling operation could continue "possibly another month." The crew is "drilling to a possible TD in the granite."

Severely cold temperatures had been detrimental to the drilling crews although this has not halted the operation.

Search Continues For Cattle Brands

The search continues throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include in another chapter of their history by "burning 'em in" Texas A&M University's "branded stairway"

Brands that were selected from Motley County to be placed in the new Animal Science Building at Texas A&M University by the Livestock subcommittee were:

J Z first brand registered in Motley County, April 1, 1891 by L. C. Lancaster. Cancelled April 21, 1930.

T 41 Cattle Brand on cattle driven to Motley County by the Matador Land and Cattle Company, and registered May 31, 1893. Discontinued Feb. 16, 1898.

50 Brand used by the Matador Land and Cattle Company, registered March 31, 1893, and representing the \$10,000 each put up by 5 men to form the capital of the Matador Ranch.

V cattle brand of the Matador Ranch, registered Feb. 16, 1898, and still in use. HH (Double H) registered by Harry Campbell August 17, 1901, first white person born in Motley County, and son of Henry Campbell, the person who put the Matador Ranch together. Used today by Harold Campbell.

T+ (T cross) registered by C. D. Bird, an original homesteader in Motley County. Used today by Lois Bird.

(Lazy F) Cattle brand for the Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company, registered by Al Barton, Manager on August 11, 1896. Used today by Pepper Jones. Quitaque.

r (Script r) Registered to the Red Lake Cattle Corporation on June 22, 1953 for the use on cattle grazing a shinnery pasture. Transferred to Johnny Stevens, Nov. 4, 1959.

Brands were placed on the stairway panel at the Kleberg Center by Steve Stevens, Matador, a student at Texas A&M at the time of the branding on Oct. 30, 1978.

L. A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,500 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences

"County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said. "We now have slightly more than 500

and on file with the Texas as well as with research and

and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record. The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O. D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science De-

partment and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle.

"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus educational work throughout Texas," Butler said.

Application of the brands was initiated last June during a meeting of directors of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. Officials of other livestock groups also are being invited for a "branding party".

Maddox said that branding ceremonies also will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded." This probably will be about next April 2--3 when the annual Texas Animal Agriculture Conference is staged at Texas A&M.



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Former Teacher Honored

A former science teacher in Matador High School, Dr. Ruth Hartgraves of Houston has received the 1978 Houstonian of the Year Award from The Foundation for Children Inc. The same award was received also by Dr. Goldie Ham of Houston. The recipients began practicing gynecology and obstetrics in the 1930's and are considered "female pioneers in the male-dominated field of medicine" according to a feature appearing in the Houston Post.

Dr. Hartgraves taught here from 1925 until 1928, when she entered medical school in Galveston. She was in the same class with the late Dr. J.S. Stanley. She was a popular member of the school faculty here, and returned in 1968 to attend Homecoming as the guest of Randall Whitworth and his wife, the late Margaret

Barbara McIntosh, reporter for the Houston Post, gives this account of Dr. Hartgraves' achievement with this observation, "Houston has been enriched by Ham's and Hartgraves' dedication to medicine."

DR. HARTGRAVES.. When Ruth Hartgraves first moved in to Houston to begin her practice, she had a spotlight installed on her car so she could see house numbers at night when she




