## A Second Glance

Have you been keeping up with the news on the American Ag Movement? A lot of things happened last week and some of the Texas Panhandle farmers called back to their local newspapers with reports of the events. This account ran in the Olton Enterprise.

"Tractors and campers representing the American Agriculture Movement began moving into the nation's capital from surrounding towns in the early morning hours of Feb. 5. This was the final leg of the crosscountry winter trip, involving months of planning and weeks of driving.

"There were several confrontations between police and farmers as the tractorcade brought commuter traffic to a standstill. Some Washington workers chose to return home rather than arrive four hours late. Some tractors were used to block intersections. Police used wreckers and cranes to remove abandoned tractors.

"Farmers never intended for violence to be a part of the tractorcade; however, as temperatures fell, tempers rose. Some farmers were forcibly removed from their tractors by police dressed in riot gear. Tear gas was used. Jim Stewart, radio newsman from KRLB Lubbock said, 'It looks like a battlefield. I can see no reason for American farmers to be treated this way.' Mr. Stewart further commented that an elderly gentleman who was walking away from the area was knocked down by the police.

Group leaders called for a rally on the capital steps Monday afternoon at 2 p.m. to plan their further protest. Farmers had planned to have the tractors back on the streets by 5 p.m. in order to return to their original camp grounds and after the two-hour rally, they found that the tractors, parked on the Mall, had been completely barricaded by vehicles of all descriptions. A comment was made that it looked like a huge cattle pen with the tractors representing cattle

and the police vehicles, the cowboys. They were told NO vehicles would be allowed to leave, and some demonstrators were detained. After 7 p.m. a few small campers were allowed to leave; however, no farm equipment was permitted out. This was guaranteed by a heavy police guard all night.

"By the end of the day, the report was that several farmers were arrested, six injured and two policemen injured. Two instances of the day appear to be responsible for the breakdown of peaceful demonstrations. A farmer was tear gassed by police after they broke the glass of his tractor; and one policeman forcibly removed another from his tractor and began driving and using the tractor as a battering ram against other tractors with the farmer's wife still in the cab!

"Tuesday, farmers woke to another day. Somewhat a calmer day. Confrontations with police were light and calm for the most part. Farmers protested by burning a tractor and one being turned over. At 2 p.m. farmers were told they could have 200 tractors for a peaceful parade to the White House if they returned by 5 p.m. before commuters traffic starts. The parade went as planned. Congressman Kent Hance hosted a chili supper for his constituents from the 19th District. Senator John Tower arranged for two AAM representatives to appear on CBS "Good Morning America" television in response to statements made by Ag. Sec. Bergland the day before.

"Wednesday, national news media continued coverage of the farmers' demonstration. Eight inches of snow blanketed the D.C. area.

"Three hundred tractors were released from the "bull pen" for peaceful demonstrations. As snow had been falling steadily for some time the demonstration began helping police and city workers clear the snow covered streets."

## City Ponders Issue On Trash Removal

The City Council would like to apologize for having picked up the bad trash barrels before notifying the people that they were in bad condition.

Since there is no charge for hauling off the trash, it has been decided that beginning at once the trash barrels must have a bottom and sides that will hold the trash so that it can be picked up and dumped without spilling out.

If the barrels get holes in the sides or bottom that will permit the trash to spill out

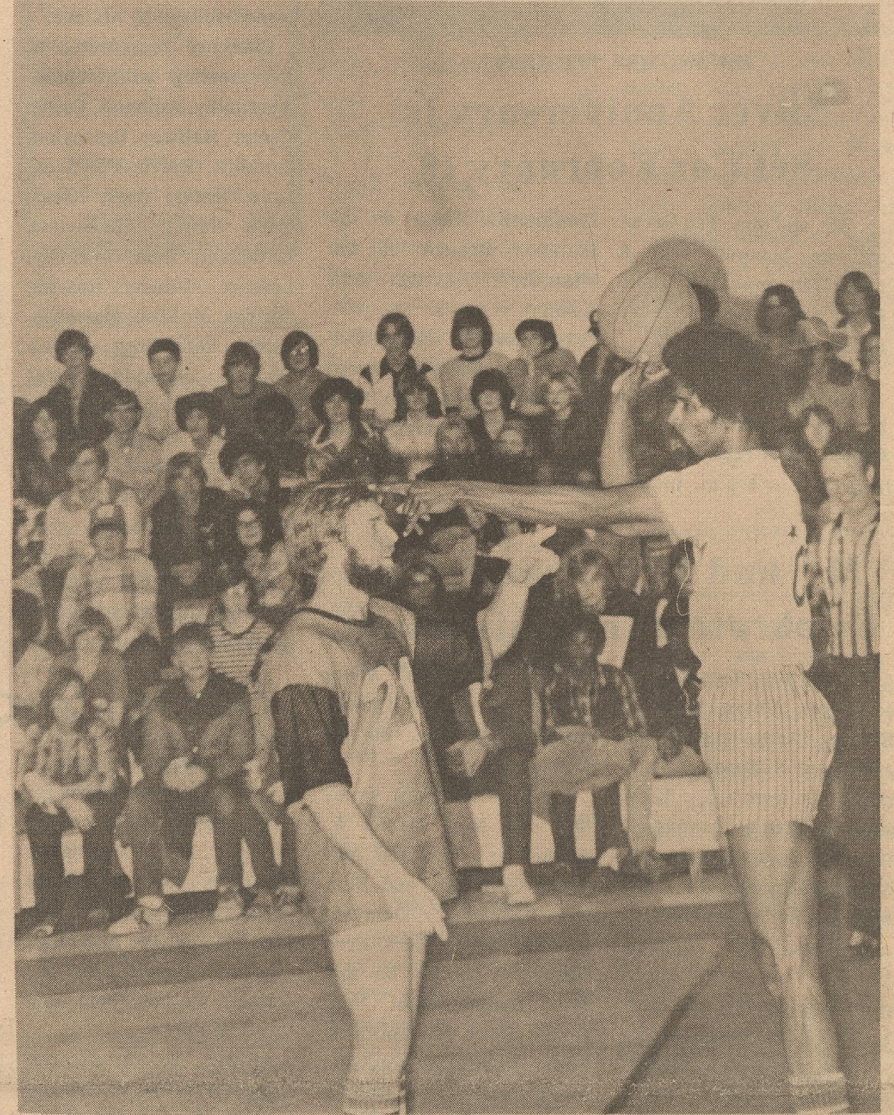
they will be marked with an "X" with paint and after two weeks they must be replaced with a good barrel or, they will not be emptied until they are replaced.

Net wire containers for residences will not be permitted since they cannot be picked up and emptied, and they also create a fire hazard.

We would also like to remind the water customers that they must provide their own water cutoffs, and that the meters and meter boxes are City Property and are

not for private use under any condition, and should not be tampered with at any time. It has been the policy of the City for some length of time and is still their policy that every water customer have their own private water cut off.

The private use of the City's cutoffs has made expense of repairs unbearable, so in future when the City Cutoff has to be replaced the property owner will be required to have their own cutoff installed before the water can be turned on.

## Between the Lines

Khomeini - Red in Iran?

Is Iran going Red? Does Khomeini mean "Communist" in Italian?

The latest upheaval of yet another of our anti-communist allies, Iran, smells strongly Red. Iran was second in the world in exports of oil, provides check against Red aggression into the Persian Gulf and Indian Ocean (as they are landlocked) and borders (1,200 miles) Russia.

In 1949, the Shah was nearly assassinated by a religious fanatic and communist. In 1965, the Shah enjoyed popular vote of 5.6 million as opposed to 5,000

against. Prime Minister Hassan Ali Mansour was assassinated by a fanatic religious follower of Khomeini's. Thusly, Khomeini was exiled (not by his recourse as he said) to Turkey.

Recent accounts portray the Reds as doing anything to diminish popular support of the Shah's government, mainly through religion.

Khomeini's Moslem anti-Shah drive is based as being against modernism, caused by the Shah's progress reforms, such as having women work and leaving old Moslem beliefs -- a threat to

TAX RETURN DUE SOON FOR FARMERS

March 1, 1979, is the deadline for some farmers to file their 1978 federal income tax return and pay any tax due, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1978 gross income from farming

and did not file a declaration of estimated federal individual income tax by January 15, 1979, or pay any amount of estimated tax by this date, must file their return and pay all tax due by March 1, 1979, to avoid a penalty.

IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free from local IRS offices.

Answer: No. The sheet of Copy A's for the W-2 should be unperforated. This is so

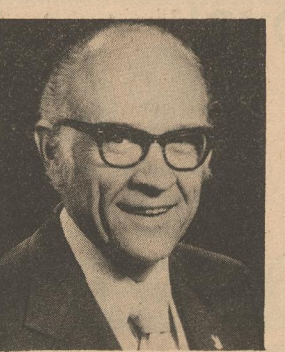
the Social Security Administration can optically scan the sheets and more efficiently process the wage records. This cannot be done if the copies are torn, or if information is illegible.

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### El Progresso Club Has News Program

The News Media was the subject of the program when El Progresso Club met

February 8 in the home of Mrs. J. L. Woodruff with Miss Mary Keith as leader. The program was presented by Mrs. Douglas Meador who gave highlights of her experiences in publishing the Matador Tribune, both as wife of the publisher, the late Douglas Meador, and later on her own. Her subject was "My Newspaper Story."

The meeting was opened by the president, Mrs. Franklin Price. In business session, Mrs. Price announced the schedule for the Santa Rosa District Convention, March 17, in Seymour. Miss Keith read the yearbook quotation: "The dull period in the life of an event is when it ceases to be news and has not begun to be history," by Thomas Hardy, and with several personal observations stemming from an acquaintance of many years, presented Mrs. Meador.

"Publishing a country newspaper can be one of the most frustrating occupations imaginable," Mrs. Meador said. "It can also be the most rewarding. There are fun times and sad days -- such as during World War II. There can be tragic times, and interesting encounters with people from all walks of life."

"Because you are the press, you are extended invitations to many public functions and events. Ironically, the newspaper then prevents your accepting, and because you are busy... or the occasion falls on a Tuesday or Wednesday. Most weekly newspapers are published on Thursday,

which keeps the publishers at home until the paper is in the mail."

"My life has two chapters," she said, "Before I came to Texas, and After I came to Texas." The "after" period spans 50 years, 42 of those being in the newspaper business in Motley County. She described the characters known as "Tramp printers," and others to whom Douglas Meador gave employment, including two youths who had had a brush with the law. "Ben and Sheriff Jinks Wilson worked together to help rehabilitate young people in trouble."

She told of numerous national figures whom they met or heard speak at state and regional press conventions; of her experiences when she wrote a column, "Pied Pinions," and of the young people who had worked at the Tribune, several of whom have remained in the journalism or related professions, and as printers in the graphic arts.

"Regardless of our awards and honors, it remains to be said that our greatest achievements must be the young people who worked for us, and many others who have helped so faithfully through the years. We couldn't have accomplished what we did without the loyal support of our advertisers and subscribers, and the faithfulness of those who volunteered their help, such as the late Helen Patton during World War II, and Hazel Donovan for over 20 years. Rita Groves, Mary Renfro, Pat Seigler, Nell Brotherton, Virginia Hoyle, and others at the time of

Doug's death. "Selling the Tribune marked the end of an era. But as one friend said, it was also the beginning of a new one."

Inspirational Thought was given by Mrs. R. E. Campbell Jr.

## Baseball, Apple Pie And 4-H

4-H is as American as baseball or apple pie! This American educational program for youth had its beginning around the turn of the century. In fact, it followed on the heels of a Corn Club organized in Jack County, Texas, in 1908 and has flourished ever since.

The nation boasts a total of some 5.5 million 4-H youth between the ages of 9 and 19. More than 137,500 of these are Texans. Youth enrolled in the 4-H program in Lynn County total 469.

The 4-H program continues to grow throughout the state and nation. Texas enrollment last year increased almost 25 percent.

More and more 4-H'ers are coming from urban areas. In Texas, about 27 percent of the 4-H youth now come from larger urban and suburban areas. However, well over half the Texas 4-H'ers live on farms or ranches or in a town of under 10,000 population.

Adult volunteer leaders are a valuable asset to 4-H as they give freely of their time

and talents in assisting in the educational efforts of the 4-H program. There are more than a half million 4-H volunteer leaders across the country, and more than 22,500 of these are in Texas. Lynn County is proud to have the leadership of 196 volunteers who contribute much to the overall success of 4-H.

The 4-H program also receives widespread financial support from various businesses, corporations and foundations all over the nation. In this state, the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation garners support from the private sector, both individuals and businesses, to support many 4-H activities.

The 4-H program has enjoyed much success in the past, but the groundwork must be laid now to face challenges that lie ahead. Challenges are plenty as 4-H strives to assist youth along the road of life and to prepare them to be the leaders of tomorrow's America.

## ASCS News

February 15 to April 30, 1979, is the sign-up period for interested producers to sign their intentions in the farm program.

If wheat, corn, grain sorghum, or barley is planted on the farm in 1979, you must comply with the set-aside requirements for these crops. Your planted acres plus set-aside cannot exceed the NCA. Since there is no set-aside for cotton, this means that should you plant all cotton (No corn, grain sorghum, barley, or wheat) on your farm) you would not be required to limit your cotton acreage to the farm NCA.

### 1979 Farm Program Provisions

CROP: Cotton, REQUIRED SET-ASIDE: None, VOLUNTARY DIVERSION: None, TARGET: \$5.77 per lb. (tentative) LOAN: \$5.023 per lb.

CROP: Corn, REQUIRED SET-ASIDE: 10 percent, VOLUNTARY DIVERSION: 10 percent, TARGET: \$2.20 per bu., LOAN: \$2.00 per bu.

CROP: Grain Sorghum, REQUIRED SET-ASIDE: 10 percent, VOLUNTARY DIVERSION: 10 percent, TARGET: \$4.11 per cwt.,

LOAN: \$.40 per cwt.

CROP: Wheat, REQUIRED SET-ASIDE: 20 percent, VOLUNTARY DIVERSION: None, TARGET: \$.40 per bu., LOAN: \$.35 per bu.

The only diversion payment to be made this year is on corn and grain sorghum. The payment rate will be \$1.00 times the farm yield times the acres diverted. There is no restriction to the prior year plantings as in 1978. Notices of NCA and yields will be mailed to farm operators soon.

### 1978 DISASTER PROGRAM

Please remember that you must file an application for disaster within 15 days of the date you finish harvesting grain or cotton. Claims filed more than 15 days after you finish combining grain or stripping cotton require a field visit at your expense. If the land has been plowed, grazed, or the stubble destroyed, the loss cannot be approved.

You may file the report of production when ginning is completed and you have the warehouse weights.

### PRE-MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Pre-measurement service is available to all producers. It will insure you against loss of program benefits due to erroneous certification, reduction in payments for failure to fully comply, or having to destroy some acreage of crops in excess of the NCA.

We will also have measurement service by aerial photography at a cost of \$11.00 per slide plus \$9.00 for each additional slide needed.

## TRACTOR MAINTENANCE SHORT COURSE IS SET

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held March 5-8 under the sponsorship of the Motley County High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Moss, teacher of vocational agriculture, and Mr. Johnson, Superintendent.

Mr. Richard Pivonka, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Pivonka received his B.S. degree in Mechanized Agriculture from Texas A&M University in 1975. From June, 1975 to April, 1977 he has worked for the Rio Grande Valley Sugar Growers, Inc. as a Mechanical Equipment Foreman. He was responsible for the maintenance of a wide variety of shop and field equipment.

The short course at Motley County is scheduled to begin March 5 at 7pm in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held March 6, 7, and 8th.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Pivonka will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction, according to Bill Moss.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Moss, or the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Johnson. An entry fee of five dollars will be charged.

Tractor Maintenance Short Course certificates will be presented to each

individual who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Pivonka states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition. Mr. Pivonka will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life, and improved performance. Throughout the short course, emphasis will be placed on "learning to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. All enrollees will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on their own tractors. Safety and operating techniques will also be stressed.

"Short courses in tractor maintenance, as well as other subjects, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Farm Wiring, Electric Motors, Farm Arc Welding, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance, Pasture, and Oxy-Acetylene Welding.

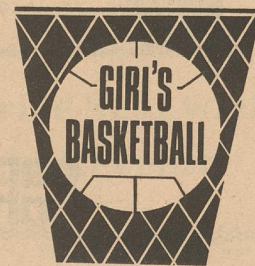

The legislative wheels are beginning to spin in Austin. There have been 688 bills introduced into the House thru January 29, 1979. It is anticipated that 4000 bills will be proposed before the session ends in late May. Here are just a few briefs on some of the new legislation. H.B. 19 requires horses to be tattooed inside the lower lip. This would apply only to horses born or imported into Texas after December 31, 1980. Several bills have been introduced that would restrict or prohibit foreign investments in Texas agricultural land. H.B. 227 would create an Agriculture Relations Board. This bill provides for collective bargaining between employers and labor organizations.

H.B. 491 is bound to bring forth a lot of action. This one tinkers with our long established homestead laws, that prohibit the remortgaging of equity one has built up in his homestead. I would take a hard look at this one. The old homestead law gives a lot of protection to home and land owners who encounter financial difficulty during the course of their lives. It leaves them a nest egg if things go wrong. This prohibits creditors from taking homes and nest eggs away from over extended borrowers.

I would not want to deny any legislator the right to introduce a bill. I am

thoroughly convinced, however that entirely too much legislation is passed during each session.

An emergency appropriations bill for the Railroad Commission has just been introduced in both the House and the Senate. The need for additional money was caused by the newly signed Federal Energy Act. It requires the State to appropriate almost six hundred thousand dollars to complete this fiscal year. Next year the additional is supposed to cost over one million. This is just to carry out the unpopular mandate of the federal government.

I would vote for a federal constitutional amendment mandating that each federal law have a fiscal note attached showing the projected costs to state governments. Such a proposal would require these costs to be paid by the federal government. At the present it is real easy for the federal government and the federal courts to demand that certain things be done without any thought to how much the ticket will be -- or who will pick it up. If we don't already have one we need initiative and referendums as a check on federal legislation. I would suggest the elimination of the Occupational Health and Safety Administration as the first project.

## PCA Increased Loans For 1978

Money loaned for agricultural production by Rolling Plains Production Credit Association increased in 1978, according to R. C. Cobb, the association's president.

Cobb said his association loaned more than \$77.9 million to farmers and ranchers in 1978. Loans outstanding on December 31, 1978, totaled nearly \$45.4 million, a 35 percent increase over the 1977 figure.

Rolling Plains is one of 30 Texas PCAs which collectively provided more than \$1.5 billion in short and intermediate term credit to Texas farmers and ranch-

ers. "Although all types of production costs continue to rise and are going to increase more and more," Cobb said, "we are confident that adequate credit for agricultural production will be available in 1979. However," he noted, "money costs and inflation will make the interest rates higher."

Rolling Plains PCA provides loan funds to Texas farmers and ranchers in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Motley, Shackelford and Stonewall counties.

destroy Moslem religion. Evidences of Red thrust: (A) As Gen. Wedemeyer described the Red takeover of China in 1945: "The pattern is familiar -- employment of subversive agents; infiltration tactics; excitement of disorder and chaos to disrupt normal economy and thereby to undermine popular confidence in government leaders; seizure of authority without reference to the will of the people."

(B) Use of the "association" gimmick of propoganda which infers Khomeini is a religious leader so what he does is right. Let us pause on this one. Doesn't Khomeini's program of rebellion, oppression, threats of death, fanaticism, riots and murder tend to destroy the Moslem religion more than the Shah's programs of putting women to work, etc? (C) Khomeini's refusal to give reporters source of financial support.

(D) His top aid, Sagagh Ghotbzadah (Avalanche-Journal 1-31-79) publicly supports legalizing Iran's Communist Party and was found by French security last November to be an ex-agent of the Libyan Soviet-connected intelligence service.

(E) Henry J. Taylor (Avalanche-Journal 12-12-78) said the anti-Shah movement is tied to the KGB (Soviet Secret Police). The Shah knows their terrorists are Soviet trained in Algeria, Cuba, Libya and S. Yemen; his ex-Maj. Gen. Mogharrabi and Brig. Gen. Darakhshani were Red spies.

(F) Last but not least, not one report has shown any of the communist movement thus far as being against Khomeini. Evidence is his clothing, he is a wolf in sheep's clothing. Is our administration too soft? Carter said we will not

intervene because the Russians are "just applying propoganda". "Our" UN Ambassador, Andrew Young, said Khomeini should be made a saint (Avalanche-Journal 2-9-79). 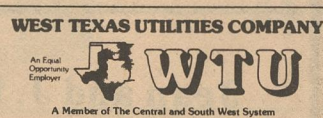

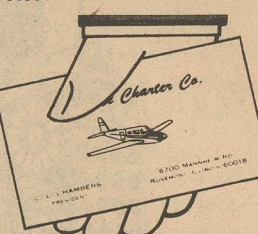
