



don Murrah, were elected to serve as Bailey County president and vice president, respectively. The new GSPA officers

will take office for a two year term on October 1. GSPA represents grain sorghum farmers in legislation at the state and national levels. GSPA's goal is to speak in behalf of sorghum producers on all farm policy decisions and to see that they get the best deal possible. Grain sorghum targets

were set at \$4.07 per hundred weight in the

weight for the 1977 crop. The increase in grain sorghum targets was the result of Grain Sorghum Producers Assoc. working to establish a nationwide Cost of Production Study in 1973, said a spokesman, and getting Congress to set the targets of sorghum in relation to corn based upon the cost of production rather than the nutritional value. Deficiency payments

were made to grain sorghum farmers on 1977 allotted acres in production. This payment was 68 cents per hundred weight times the normal farm vield on allotted acres. Amounts ranging up to \$20,000 per farmer were paid to grain sorghum producers on their 1977

Simpson did not score, but he carried 174 yards in 22 tries, with Tucek picking up 120 yards in his 18 carries.



We were very pleased with the effort our young men gave against the Lazbuddie Varsity Thursday, September 17.


They worked extra hard all week and had a positive mental attitude in the game.

Juniors And Seniors **To Face National Test**

Five weekend mornings during this school year will probably be especially important to Muleshoe High School juniors and seniors who are thinking about going on to school after graduation.

Those Saturday mornings --- the first of which is October 21---are national test dates for taking the test section of the ACT Assessment Program. The registration deadline for the Oct. 21 national test date is Sept. 22, it was announced by Mr. Ben Gramling, counselor. Also announced by Mr. Gramling, was the com-plete 1978-79 ACT Assess-

program remains \$7.50 this year. Information reports resulting from the test and questionnaire sections are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as to colleges and other institutions specifically designated by the students.

Muleshoe students who are uncertain if they need to use the ACT Assessment, or concerned about location of the nearest ACT test center, are urged to contact Mr. Gramling. Students can also obtain appropriate ACT Assessment registration packets, as well as other college and career planning materials, from the counseling office.

It is recommended that students use the ACT Assessment in their junior year or early in the senior year in order that the resulting information will be available in time to be of maximum assistance to
