Hosting the dedication and open house will be Bailey County officials and the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

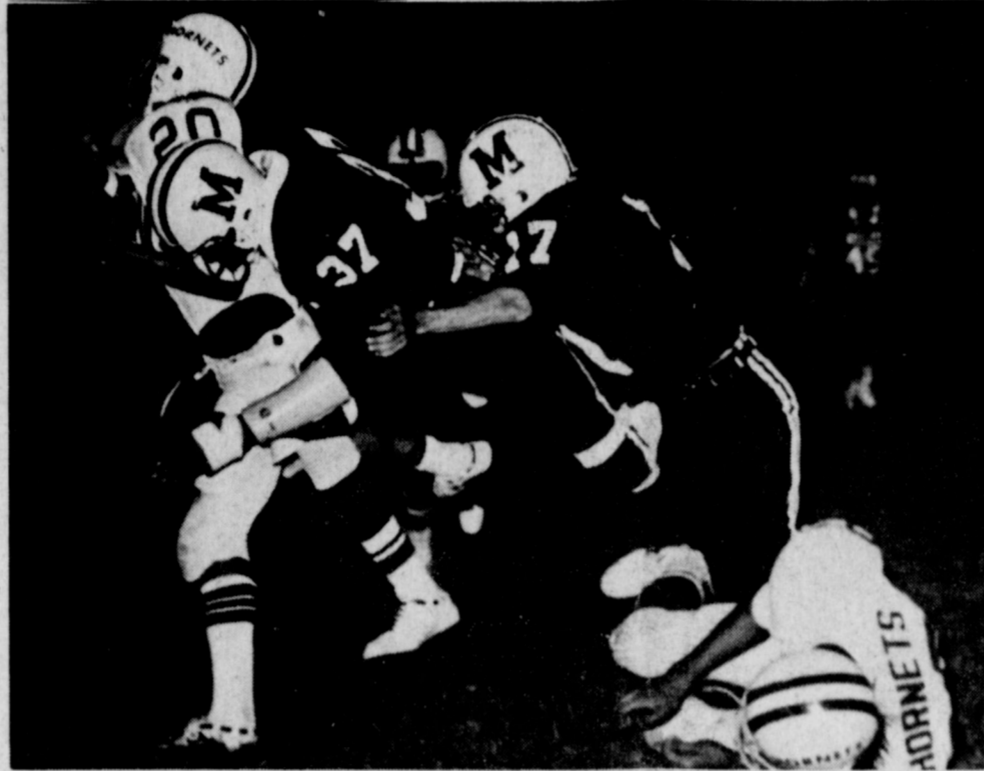

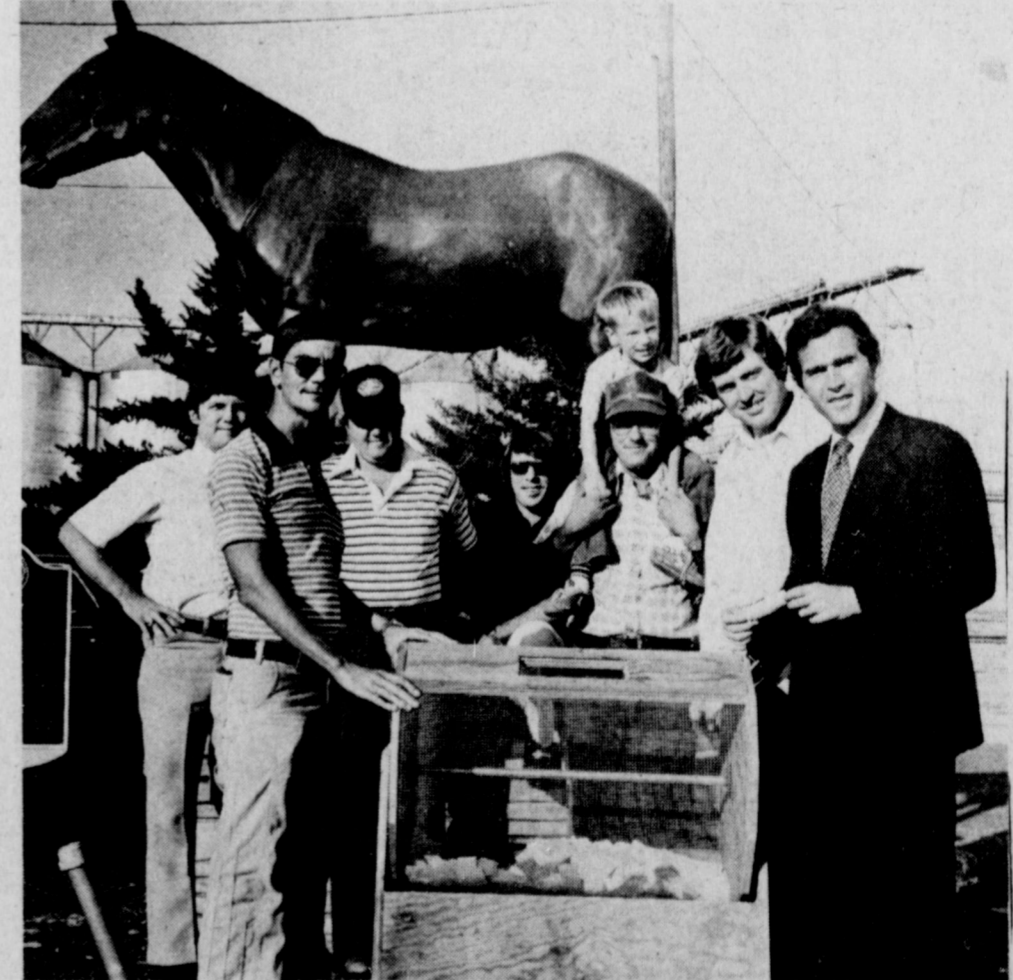
