## MCS Is Center For Special Education

The Rolling Plains Special Education Cooperative is helping meet the educational needs of handicapped children at early childhood, elementary and secondary levels in seven area public schools around Matador.

In compliance with the Texas Education Agency recommendations, the Motley County school district, the fiscal agent to the cooperative, provides the comprehensive special educational program and serves handicapped pupils between the ages of three to 21 years.

This program is designed in a flexible manner to meet the educational needs of each handicapped child. The needs of each child is the dominant factor in determining the services offered.

In general, handicapped students who need special education are defined as students who are physically handicapped, mentally retarded, emotionally disturbed, learning disabled or speech handicapped.

With Motley County, cooperative members are Guthrie CSD, McAdoo IDS, Paducah IDS, Patton Springs IDS, Spur IDS and Turkey-Quitaque IDS.

"One of our main functions is to find and serve

special education students we are not already serving," Tommy Wilson, director of the cooperative said. "We need the help of the people to find the handicapped children. There may be a family who has a handicapped child and do not know these services are available. We need for people to tell us if they know of a handicapped child who is not receiving special help."

A conference is held with the parents of each child being considered for referral to the program, to explain the program and notify them of screening and referral activities involving their children.

Many of the children in the program are handicapped in reading or math and can, by attending the special education class only one hour a day, stay abreast of their classmates. After attending the special ed class, the student returns to the mainstream of school and most of the time other students do not know the child is enrolled in the special ed class.

The parents of students in the program have the right to examine all data regarding their child and can withdraw the child at any time by contacting the principal.

## Dickens Electric To Sponsor Tour

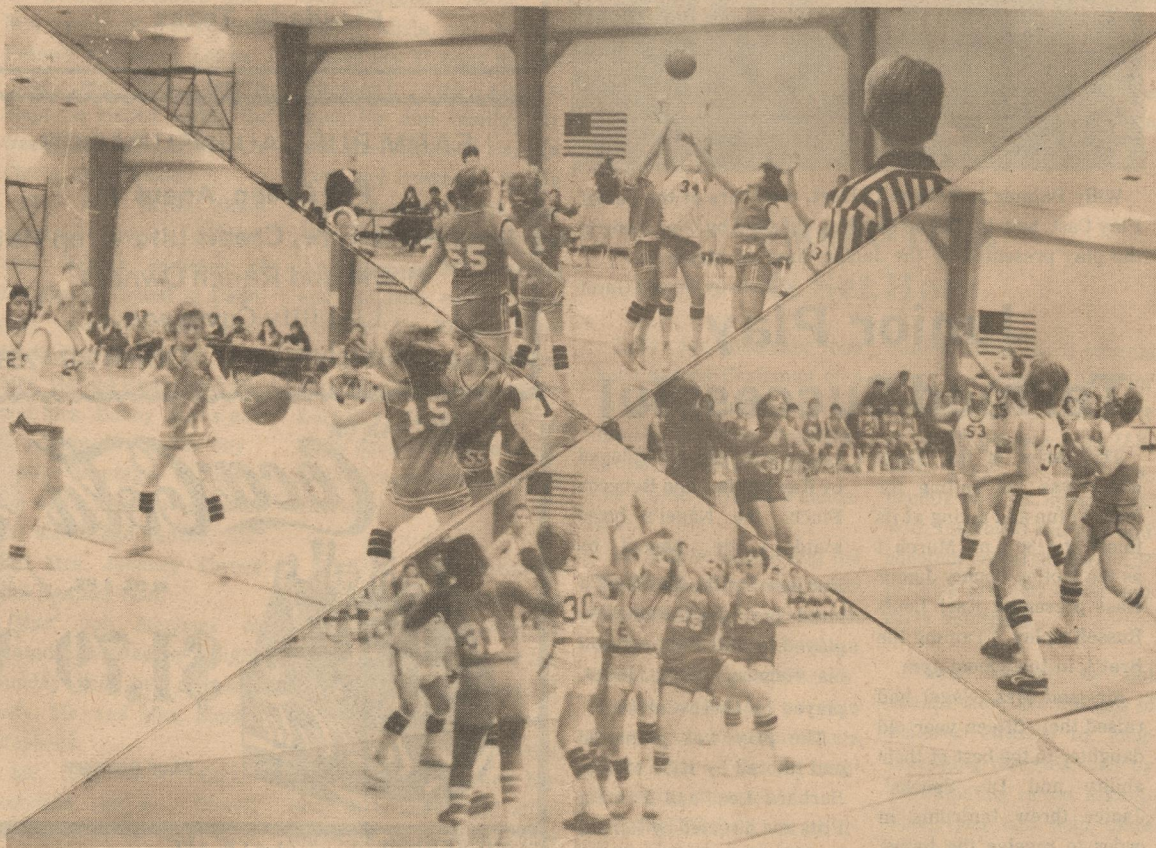

## Livestock Show Set

The 39th annual Motley County Jr. Livestock Show sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Assn. will be held at the old FFA building in Matador Monday, March 26th, with judging starting at 10:00 a.m. by Milton Mann, Vocational Agriculture Instructor from Clarendon.

Due to health regulations, breeding classes of swine have been eliminated. Classes to be shown by 4-H and FFA members will be market hogs, market lambs, breeding rabbits and market steers. A class of heifers, straightbred or crossbred open to anyone living in Motley County, or those eligible to show in the Jr. Livestock show will again be

provided. (See additional article in paper.)

Following the selection of the Grand Champion Steer, the sale of the top 18 steers, lambs and hogs will be held. (Top 6 in the light, medium and heavy classes.) After the floor bid has been auctioned off, the premium sale will start, with bids in addition to the floor bid if the buyer wishes to retain the animal.

A concession stand will be operated by the 4-H clubs, and directors whose terms expire are Larry Bynum, Flomot; Gale Stafford, Matador; and J. Don Finch, Roaring Springs. Hold over directors are Ros Bearden, Roaring Springs; Roy Stephens, Matador; and Joe Clay, Flomot.

## Money Is Taken From P.S. School

(Patton Springs Roundup)

The Patton Springs School building was broken into and robbed Thursday night or early Friday morning. Superintendent Glenn Sanders stated, "I first saw the office door open and wondered who left it open. Then I saw Room Seven and knew what had happened." He then walked around to assess the damage, and a few minutes later called the sheriff.

Mr. Sanders said that the robber or robbers must have climbed in through a window in Room One, used a crowbar to open the door, then used the crowbar to open several other doors including Mr. Marshall's office, Room Seven, Room 11, the library, and Mr. Sanders' office. Damage to the library, office and Room 11 doors was minimal, while the other two door frames were cracked and partially ripped off.

In the office, the thief pried the safe open, threw

the contents about, and while in the process got around \$400.00. When he visited the library, he found the fine box, which contained ten or twelve dollars, the annual money sack, which also contained ten or twelve dollars, and another small box containing about two dollars.

Mr. Sanders said that school was called off today because the sheriff and the Texas Rangers were investigating, and they did not know how long the investigation would take.

Eighth grader Martin Jimenez about summed it up when he asked, "Why would they want to rob a poor school like this?"

The ironic part is: in Room One, which was first broken into, Ms. Buckner had \$10.80 in the cabinet, which was not locked. But the money was not taken! "We, as Jerry Slaton said, were robbed!"

The Federal Government is working to eliminate this unfounded discrimination against older workers.

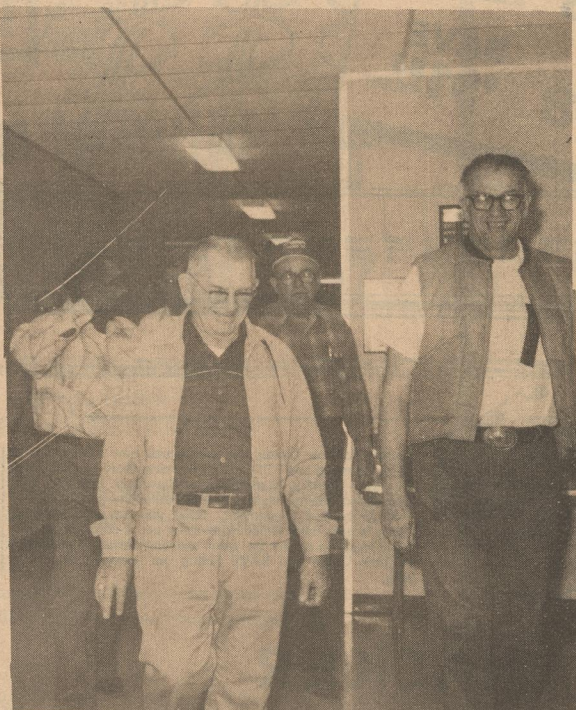

## Matadors Defeated In Semi-Finals At Regional Tourny

March 2, Coach Larry Neighbors, in his first year coaching at MCHS, led the Motley County Girls Varsity basketball team to the Regional contest in Level-land for the first time since Matador High went to State in 1953.

In the opening contest against Groom, Motley, despite skepticism in their ability pulled a sneaky. In the first quarter MC looked cold, as they had multiple shots but none would go in the basket. Groom scored first and kept on scoring. With 4:22 left in the quarter, Glouris Sims sank MC's first two followed by a superb assist from Bunni Zabielski to Pamela Pitts for 2. At the buzzer, Groom led 15 to 4.

In the second quarter MC again had trouble getting the ball to go into the basket, but they finally came through with 13. At the half, Motley had narrowed Groom's lead, 27 to 17.

No one knows what was said in the Motley locker room during half-time, but when the girls came back out onto the floor they were RED HOT! MC scored 9 points in two minutes compared to only 2 for Groom. Junior Sharlene Smith owned the boards with 13 points in the quarter. The home team scored 17 points to double their first-half score, holding Groom down to 11. At the end of the quarter, Groom led by only 4 points, 38 to 34.

The fourth quarter was electric. The Matadors scared GHS when Pamela Pitts scored 2 to bring MC within one point with 5:04 left on the clock (44-45). Glouris Sims' freeshot tied the game up at 48 with 2:33 left to play and, then Pamela again scored 2 with freeshots to give the Matadors the lead for the first time in the contest (50-48). Once again the score was tied at 51 but Glouris scored and MC was ahead 53 to 51. Maintaining their lead Motley County, the "underdog" team, won 56 to 53.

Motley County was led in scoring by Junior Sharlene Smith with 22 points, while Connie Crowell led GHS with 29. MC had a total of 20 fouls

while Groom also had 20. **MOTLEY DEFEATED.** Saturday morning, March 3, at 9:30, the Motley team faced Greenwood High School in the semi-final contest.

Greenwood scored first in the first quarter, but Bunni Zabielski made two free throws to quickly even things up again. The quarter was mainly fast breaks and quick passes to the post girls. Bunni came out with six and Gwen Calvert had 4 with 15 foot jumpshots to lead at the buzzer 12 to 10. Rebounding caused a problem for MC in the second, but not the less, Gwen Calvert's quick steals and Pam Francis' remarkable 20 ft. shots held MC on top. At the half MC lead Greenwood, 26-21.

In the third quarter, rebounds were still hard to come by for MC. Greenwood picked up and MC made extensive bad turnovers to give GHS the lead with 5:28 left to play at 29-29. Once again Pam Francis came off the bench to score twice again at 20 ft. to give Motley back the lead. At the quarter's end, Motley maintained the lead, 38-35.

The fourth quarter proved crucial to Motley as fouls, resulting in Greenwood free shots, brought them down. After Freshman Shelley Jackson scored a three point play with 2:11 left to tie the score, GHS pulled ahead once again as the result of Motley fouls. Greenwood defeated the Matadors 52 to 49.

Motley had 26 fouls which resulted in 20 GHS freeshots compared to 14 fouls for GHS and 7 freeshots for Motley.

Sharlene Smith led scoring for Motley with 10, followed by Bunni Zabielski with 9 and Pam Francis with 8. Jenni Anderson led Greenwood with 13.

The Motley girls finish this year's season with a 21 and 9 record. Coach Larry Neighbors commented, "We are well pleased with this year's season and are looking forward to next year."

Everyone is very proud of you girls. Now people know who Motley County is!

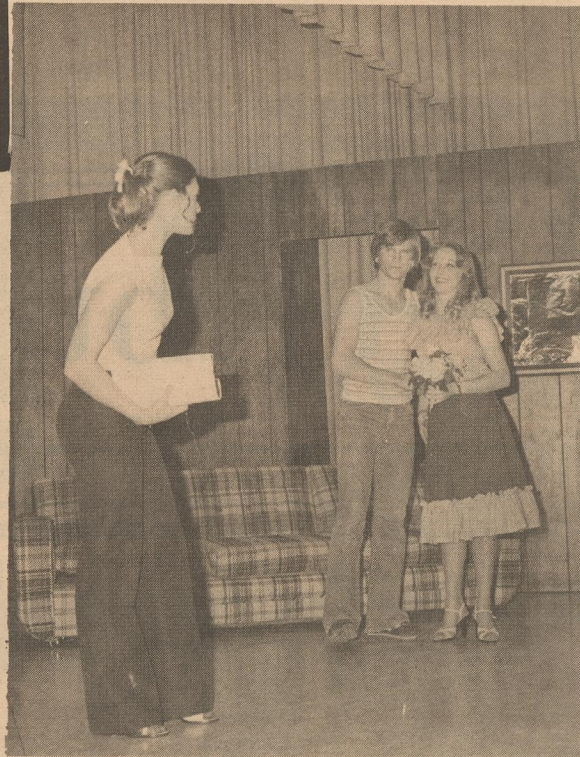

Mr. and Mrs. Nagel, played by Jeff Braselton and Pam The play consisted of an all-star cast of ten people.

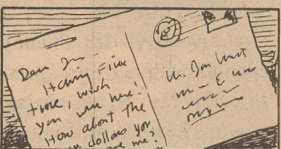

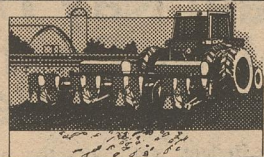

## End of Season Near For Fur Trappers

Caprock Trapper's Association announces the end of the 1978-79 trapping season with its final fur sale Saturday, Feb. 24. First of all we would like to express our gratitude to all residents and trappers who have helped make this a safe and successful season.

At Saturday's fur sale there were 8,333 furs tagged and registered. Trappers showed up from all over Texas from as far away as the Mexican border in south Texas to the panhandle in north Texas. Fur buyers were also well represented. This is by far the largest fur sale that we have had. Prices on bobcats went from \$185.00 to \$320.00 with an average of \$250.00 to \$300.00. Prices on coyotes went from \$19.00 to \$75.00 the average of which was about \$48.00 to \$50.00. Badgers sold for \$16.00 to \$60.00 and averaged in the neighborhood of \$30.00. Coon brought from \$11.00 to \$40.00 averaging \$30.00. Skunks sold from \$2.50 to \$6.00 averaging \$3.50

and ringtail cats sold at \$3.00 to \$8.00. Fox also averaged good with grays averaging \$30.00 to \$45.00 and reds bring \$45.00 to \$75.00. These averages were taken from all three fur sales this season. So you trappers can see that a lot of expense money can be made by saving your skunks, o'posoms and badgers.

Preparations are already being made for the 1979-80 trapping season. Our fur sales have grown to where we will need more room. Plans are being made to modify an old chicken house of Dean Shaws where we can have an auction with an auctioneer.

Caprock Trappers Association now has a membership in the 200 member range and still growing. With the large quantity of fur that was taken out of the area this season and the growing amount of registered trappers in the area, more and more people are showing a concern for the governments program of killing coyotes from helicopters. Several ranchers have estimated to me that in this program over 350 coyotes were shot in one afternoon. CTA is trying to work out a program with ranchers to where if the rancher is having a predator problem he can call CTA and we would help him control them if the rancher won't sign up with the government helicopter program. We are discussing this with the game commission now and further plans include discussions with the county commissioners, county agent, and the government trapper. Anyone wishing to discuss their feelings on this matter feel free to contact me or Larry Burks of Afton, Larry Pate of Idalou, Dean Shaw of Dickens or any other Caprock Trapper's Assn., officer or member.

We will have an officer's meeting in the very near future. Also the regular monthly meeting will be held sometime in March. Watch for details in the Matador Tribune. We are planning a trappers camp-in sometime in May and again in Sept. There will be activities ranging from trap setting contests and lessons to trap shooting and rifle and shotgun shooting contests.

Again thanks to everyone who helped make this trapping season so successful. Preston Mynatt

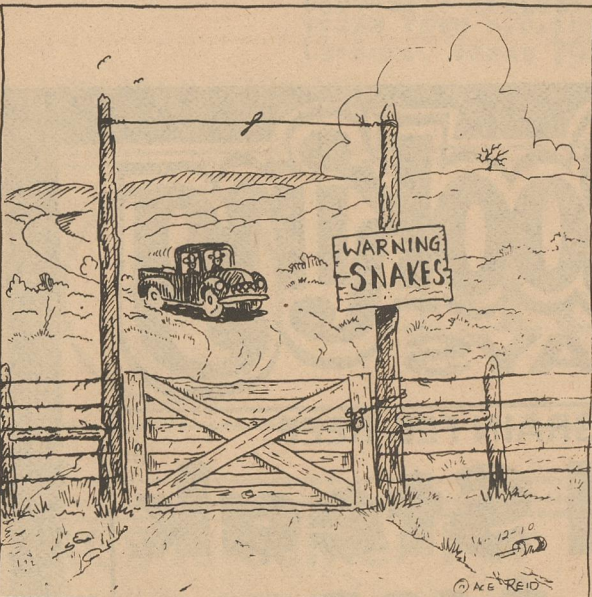
