Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

AUSTIN—Insurance bills have lagged. Water conservation measures are embroiled in dispute. And virtually no start has been made on a taxing program in the legislature.

As a result, lawmakers are eyeing a possible special session. Theoretical date for such a session is May 11. On that date the legislators' pay for the regular session stops.

It has been suggested that Governor Shivers may have foreseen a bog-down in the regular session, and therefore has not pushed his administration program. During a special session, he would have full control of subject matter which may be introduced.

Tax Bill
Rep. Jerry Sadler of Percilla introduced the biggest tax bill of all.

Promising a lot of controversy, the bill would levy a one-cent per gallon processing tax on all gasoline and distillates produced in Texas. It would: Raise an estimated \$160,000,000 a year, repeal the present four-cent gas sales tax, and head off the administration's two-cent gasoline tax increase.

Sadler said its effect would be to reduce the price of gasoline to Texas by three cents a gallon. Sixty per cent of the gasoline is exported, tax-free, he said.

Meantime, Rep. Charles Murphy explained he hadn't yet asked for committee hearing on the administration's two-cent gas tax bill, wanting sentiment to jell.

Some Fared Better
Passed by the House were bills outlawing sale of lewd and depraved comic books; permitting women to serve on juries; and regulating leasing for uranium and hard metals.

Amendments to the women's jury service bill narrowed considerably, the list of those who may be called to serve.

Furiously debated, the uranium bill was attacked as a "give away." Rep. Walling of Wichita Falls added two amendments. One will limit each lease to 80 acres to prevent one minor development from freezing exploration on large tracts. Another limits the primary term of leases

to five years.

Interest was heightened by reports of a real uranium ore strike in Karnes County.

Rep. Maury Maverick's bill to prohibit cross filing of candidates by two political parties won a favorable report to the House.

Also favorably reported was Rep. Tom Joseph's bill to bring trust companies under supervision of the State Banking Department.

Not Faring So Well
Stymied in a House committee was a bill to increase the filing fee of candidates for the Legislature to \$300.

Killed by a Senate committee was Sen. Crawford C. Martin's bill. It embraced nine subjects carried in the series of administration bills offered by Chairman D. B. Hardeman of the water resources committee.

Martin warned that unless the Senate reconsidered and kept his bill alive, all others would be subject to being knocked out on a constitutional point of order.

Grand Juries Takes Over
Meanwhile, three Grand Juries have stepped in on the veterans' land investigations.

Bexar County's grand jury was quickest on the draw, with two felony indictments. Then the DeWitt Co. grand jury at Cuero fired a double-barrel broadside of 195 indictments against six persons. DeWitt County Attorney Wiley Cheatnam started the whole land inquiry.

Travis County grand jury, with venue in every veterans' land transaction, had piles of ammunition and District Attorney Les Proctor had his thumb on the hammer.

Grand Juries in 10 other counties have had some contact with the question.

Work by the Senate investigating committee had dribbled down to a schedule of sessions only every other Thursday.

In intensive hearings each week-end, the House committee approached the question of administration and operations in the Land Office and Veterans Land Board.

Attorney General Shepperd predicted there will be "hundreds of indictments," and indicated more civil suits were in prospect.

Education
UT President Loutan Wilson told the legislative finance and appropriations committee the university must have more money, or face the problem of halting its growth or lowering standards.

Requested, for two years for its main establishment, was \$9,700,000. The governor's budget recommendation cut this by \$2,400,000.

New Highway Maps
Issued by the Highway Department are 500,000 state highway maps for 1955, with a new and simpler fold.

D. G. Greer, State Highway Engineer, pointed out that the old wheeze about needing another map as a guide for refolding an open travel map, is no longer true.

Auto license purchasers can obtain a special card for use in requesting a copy of the new map.

Farmers, Ranchers Look To Land Bank For Much Financing

Sterling C. Evans, president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, in a meeting of stockholders held at Houston, Feb. 23 and 24, revealed that Texas farmers and ranchers had borrowed in excess of \$4,000,000 from the institution during the month of January.

According to the report, land bank loans totaling \$28,260,450 were made during the year of 1954, and loan applications are now being received in the greatest number of volume during

the past 20 years.

The increase, according to the report, was due to the four per cent interest rate maintained by the bank, and the high operating costs along with drought conditions that prevailed over most of the state. Evans further reported that dividends aggregating more than \$2,000,000 were paid by the bank during the past year.

Matador National Farm Loan Association was represented at the stockholders meeting by

Edgar Lee of Matador and Varner McWilliams of Whiteflat.

Life Was Interesting In Pioneer Days El Progreso Club Learns From Guests

If you were a school teacher in Motley county during the early days, no doubt you still encounter some of the pupils you taught then, and if you were a passenger on the old mail hack that traveled between Childress and Matador, and the driver was inebriated, you probably took over the reins yourself in order to arrive safely at your destination.

Or, if you were a young couple (under age) trying to obtain a marriage license, and the clerk refused to oblige, chances are you had to keep traveling, regardless of conventions, until you found an official who would "tie the knot."

These, and other interesting vignettes were described in colorful manner by guests at a meeting Thursday, Feb. 24, of El Progreso Club held in the sanctuary of the Methodist Church.

Mrs. W. D. Lipscomb, program leader, conducted a brief devotional before introducing the guests, pioneer women of the community, in a panel discussion of early days in this section.

Mrs. W. M. Graham, whose late husband was one of the first buffalo hunters in this area, related several incidents which he had told of his early experiences upon coming from Denton county, to Tee Pee Creek with a Mr. Reynolds in 1877, on a buffalo hunt.

It was Mrs. Graham who told of a couple who went to old Tascosa to get married, but the judge refused to marry them because the girl was not of age. "They kept traveling until they did secure a license, and returned and lived happily ever afterwards," she concluded.

Mrs. Claud (Aunt Betty) Jeffers told of her early teaching days, first at Darden Canyon where Elmer Stearns (now ex-

ecutive vice-president of First State Bank) and his brother, Arthur were among her pupils, and of her school at Clements when Henry Ford (present local manager of Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Company) was a big strapping kid. He came with his high top boots un-laced, and after much persuasion he returned one day with them laced to the top with twine string," she recalled.

Drove Mail Coach
It was Mrs. C. P. Waybourn who drove the old mail hack. She was returning from Childress, where she had been visiting her parents, to her farm home on the river. The driver had been imbibing of hard liquor, and when he became too drunk to handle the wild Spanish mules, Mattie, who can meet practically any emergency, took over.

Mrs. W. L. McWilliams told of the social life of the county in the early 1900's, and of a masquerade party at the home of John H. P. Jones, when T. V. Leckie dressed as a girl. Complications arose when the girls were auctioned off for supper partners (the boys using beans for money).

"Mr. Leckie was about the size of a certain young lady with whom Bascom Edmondson was much in love, and Bascom spent all his bean money and borrowed from his buddies until he saw "her". He was a sad and disappointed fellow when T. V. unmasked—and did we all laugh?" Mrs. McWilliams reminisced.

Another member of the guest panel was Mrs. W. T. Patton, who remembered the many happy occasions when her husband, the late Truss Patton, played the fiddle for early day dances. In contrast to present-day jitterbug, mambo, etc., the waltz and schottish were popular steps in those days. The Pattons were also closely associated with the religious phase of community life, as the stock tank at their home was used by local churches for baptismal rites, before baptisteries were

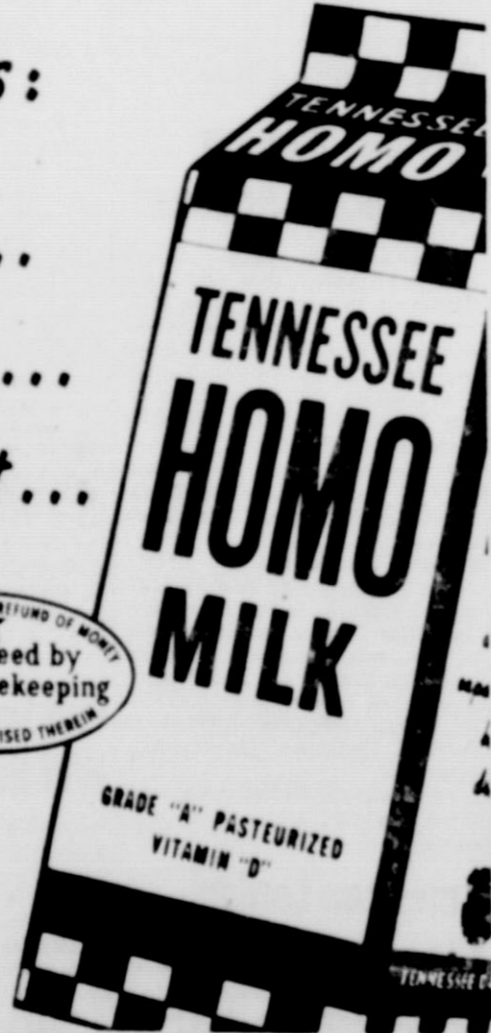

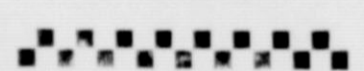

Pioneer Attorney G. E. Hamilton asked Jinkins why the General Telephone Company could not support its share of losses with other businesses during the drought emergency. Jinkins said it might be possible to make the concession if his company could increase its earnings during "good times" to offset the losses. That, he said, was impossible, since the company could never earn more than 8% in any year. Jinkins said his company had been forced to expand, enlarge and improve equipment because of the public's demand for good service. "We have cut every corner possible," he declared.

Payroll Is Impressive

When the telephone company first asked for a hike in its rates the Tribune requested a statement showing the amount of salaries and taxes paid in Matador. The figures were finally supplied and they are impressive.

In 1951 operators here were paid \$12,444.84, commercial labor was paid \$1,554.10 and labor on the plant received \$2,381.23, for a total of \$14,380.17. The figures were much larger from July 1, 1953 to July 1, 1954. Operators received \$20,655.06, commercial labor \$2,419 and plant labor \$4,191 for a total of \$27,265.

The company paid city taxes in the amount of \$175.50 in 1951 as compared with \$187.11 in 1954. The firm pays a 2% gross receipt tax for the use of streets and allies for lines. In 1951 it amounted to \$234.79 as compared with \$371.34 in 1954.

Law enforcement officers are hindered in their work in the prosecution of juvenile offenders by what is known as "professional clemency signers" who affix their signatures to any petition anywhere and at any time.

It doesn't make any difference if a juvenile kills a deputy sheriff or a police officer while the juvenile is in the act of committing a felony, right away after an arrest has been made in

the case, these professional clemency seekers start signing petitions asking for another chance for the defendant (despite the fact that he or she has been given another chance time and again) and should a conviction be obtained the petitioners start in on the old parole plea.

In the days of yesteryear, society blamed juvenile delinquency directly at the door of parents. This is true in some cases. However, society continues to point the finger at the "underprivileged" boy or girl as being responsible for the greater portion of juvenile crime. This picture is as diametrical as day is to night.

One has only to read the series of articles entitled, "The Shame of America" which appeared recently in one of our outstanding national publications to realize the menace of what juvenile delinquency really is today.
