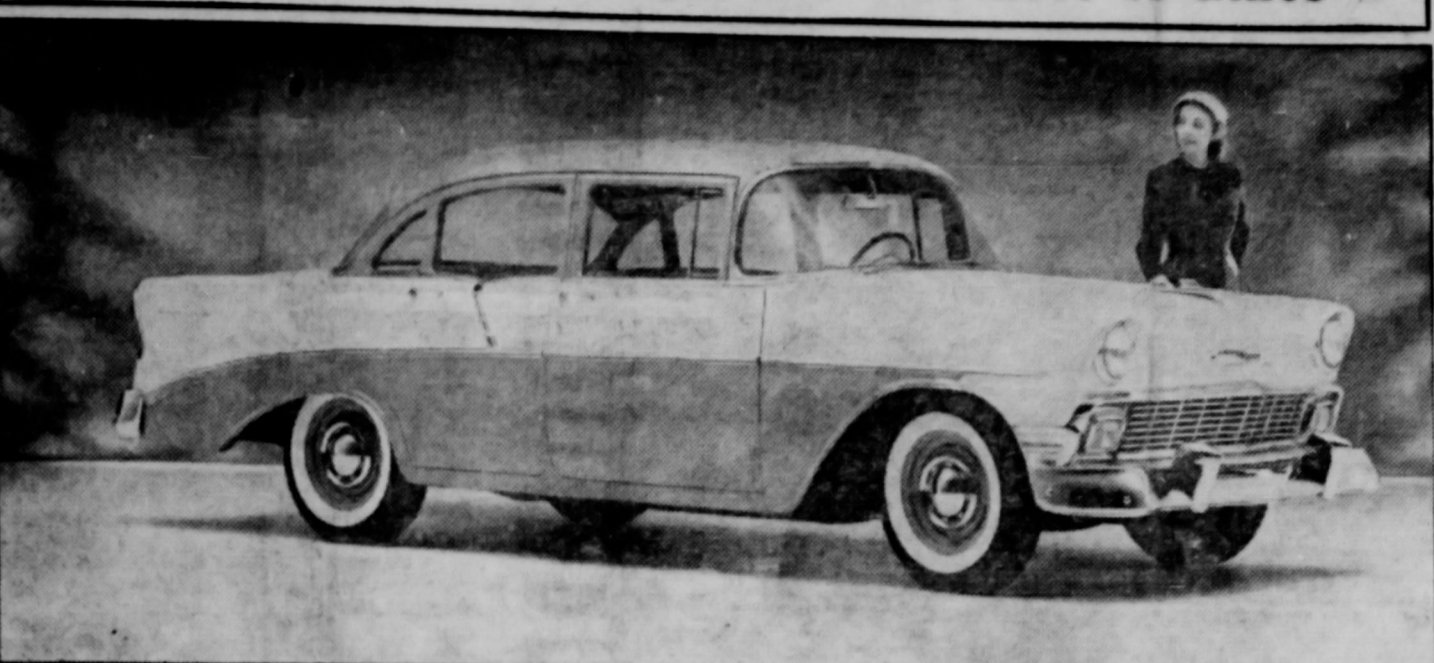
Parents Asked To Visit School

Community Public Wins First For Third Consecutive Time!

For the third consecutive year, the fleet of Community Public Service Company has been awarded first place in its group of the Public Utilities Division of the National Safety Council's fleet safety contest. In addition, the local utility company was also a second-place winner in a passenger car division of the contest. Announcement of the awards for overall safety performance of CPS drivers was made at the 48th National Safety Congress in Chicago in late October. Community's fleet, which includes 163 pickups and trucks, operated 1,880,577 miles during the 12-month period with only five accidents, a rate of only 1.2 accidents per 100,000 vehicle miles. Under contest rules, the slightest scratch or fender dent is considered a reportable accident. In the passenger car division of the contest, Community employees operated 74 passenger cars 1,488,823 vehicle miles during the 12-month contest period with only two accidents, a rate of only .14 accidents per 100,000 vehicle miles.

Man And Boy Banquet At Gruver First Baptist Church

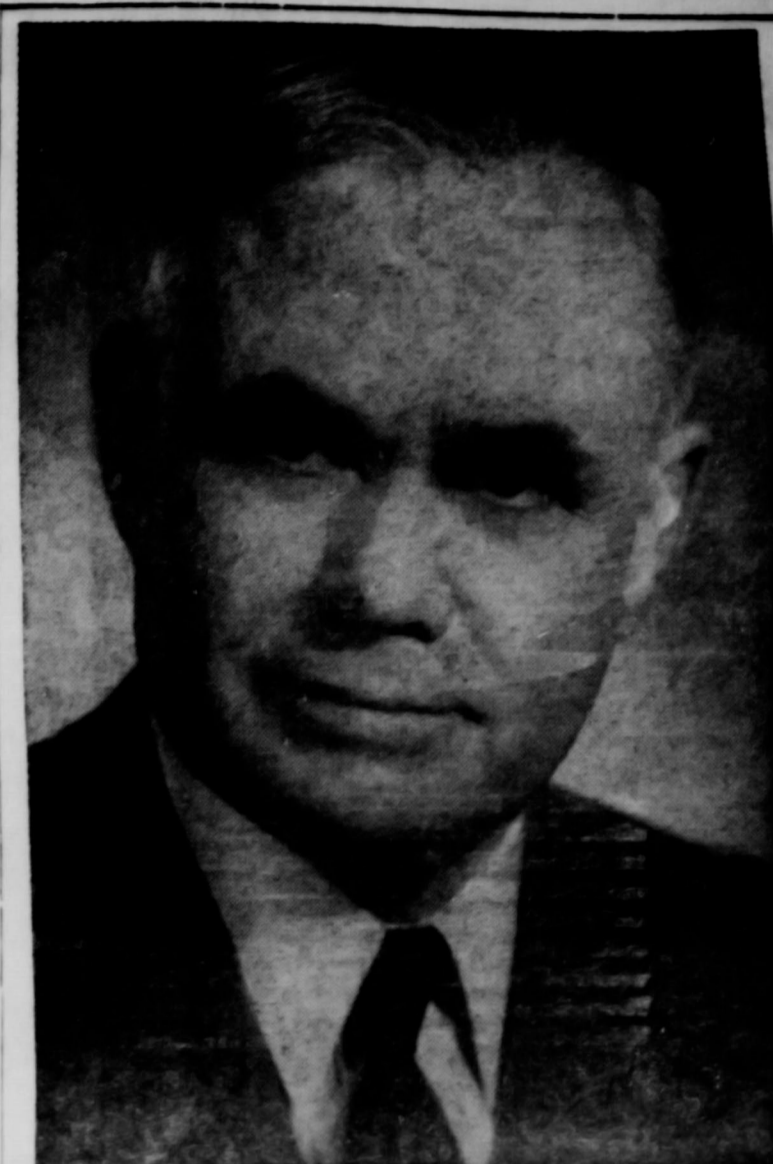

Greyhounds Slip By Elks In Thriller To Cinch District

STRATFORD, Oct. 28 - The Gruver Greyhounds rolled in the last two minutes of play here Friday night to sweep by a final upland of Stratford 13-13 in a District 1-B battle royal. The win will cinch Gruver a tie for the championship, if they can defeat either Spearman or Vega in their remaining two games. Only Stratford could have stopped the fabulous Greyhounds, and that game is now in the record books. The Elks spotted the Gruver club 13 points in the first half, then came back during the second half to tie the game at 13-13. But the Greyhounds, pacesetters in the conference, were not to be denied and punched across the tie-breaking tally in the fading moments of action. When the Elks tried desperately to fight back they took to the airways but Gruver's slick quarterback, Al Mitts, intercepted a closing minutes of play. Taking the kickoff on their own 36, they drove the distance in 10 plays with a 15 yard rushing penalty charged against the Stratford team, aiding the cause. After driving to the Elks 19 yard line, strictly on the ground, Mitts foxed the Elk defenders with a roll-out pass to Robert Dahl, who stepped into the end zone for the tally. Mason once again converted. The highlight of the first quarter occurred in the opening moments when the Elks held the Greyhounds for downs on the Stratford one-yard line. The Elks couldn't move the ball, however, the necessary 10 yards and were forced to punt - the ball rolling down on the Elks 30. From here the Greyhounds needed only six plays to punch across the first tally.

**Pastures Can Cut
Pork Production Costs**

College Station, Oct.—"Don't
overlook pastures in figuring how
to cut swine production costs,"
says E. M. Regenbrecht, exten-
sion swine husbandman. The pas-
ture, he adds, is the best place
to keep the bred sows at all times
except during bad weather in the
farrowing season.

The exercise, sunshine and pas-
ture will help to farrow a strong-
er and more vigorous litter. But
a clean, dry, well-bedded shelter
is as essential for the cold weather
months, says Regenbrecht.
The sows will need plenty of
water and a balanced ration but
the pasture will reduce the feed
bill. Too, with lower hog prices,
any management practice which
will cut costs is an important
item.

It is now time, says the spe-
cialist, to plant the pasture for
fall, winter and spring grazing.
Oats, rye, winter wheat or barley
are suggested as crops which can
be planted in most sections of
the state. Moisture conditions
are now favorable and for maxi-
mum yields, Regenbrecht suggests
that from two to three bushels
of seed an acre be planted. The
plants should be five to six inches
high before being grazed.

The spring litters will be able
to graze the small grain pastures
before most other pastures are
ready. The earlier the sow and
litter can be turned on the pas-
ture the better.
A good acre of small grain,
fertilizing is recommended before
planting and nitrogen applied as
a side dressing when needed dur-
ing the spring season.

the mixtures to give effective con-
trol of worm parasites.

They have two children, Lynn, age 8, and Patty age 3.

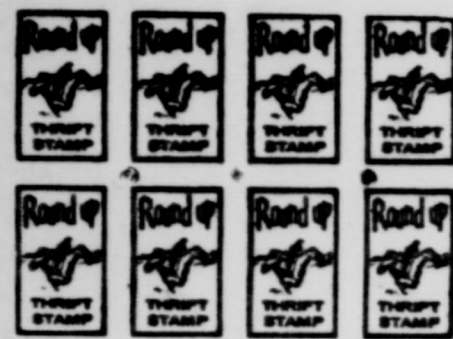
