**MYSTERY HOME LAST WEEK IS LOVELY HOME OF MR. AND MRS. CLARENCE RENNER . . . A PART OF THE JOHNNY O'LOUGHLIN ESTATE**

The Mystery home of Hansford county for the past week is the three bed-room, modern home of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Renner. It is one of the comfortable old-timers of this area, and is a part of the late Johnny O'Loughlin Estate. Mr. and Mrs. Renner handle two and a half sections of the O'loughlin land, farming one and a half sections in small grains, mostly wheat, and using a section of pasture land for their cattle operations. At the present time this popular and aggressive young couple have a herd of more than a hundred head of white faced cattle. They follow the

pattern of most rancher-farmers of this area, namely planting wheat, using wheat pasture augmented by grass pasture.

Originally Clarence came from Andle, Kansas. He moved to Texhoma with his parents back in 1930. He farmed with his folk and gained a liberal education in farming and ranching. When Clarence had completed his military service in 1945 he came back to the Texhoma area, and began farming for himself. His parents are deceased.

One of the rather smart acts of Clarence was to persuade Eloise Gist of Texhoma to become his bride back in 1942. Mrs. Renner is a native of the Texhoma area, having been born and reared at Tex-

homa. She is the mother of three fine children, an important cog in the progress of Hansford county, since she is one of the popular Registered Nurses that keeps folk healthy at our Hansford Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Renner have three children, the oldest, Diane is an 11 year old daughter who is in school in Spearman. Phillip is a six year old son and Amy is the one and a half year old daughter.

In addition to the lovely family residence, the Renners have a large grain storage barn, and the shed formerly used as an airplane hangar by Howard Brillhart, when he lived at the Mystery home.

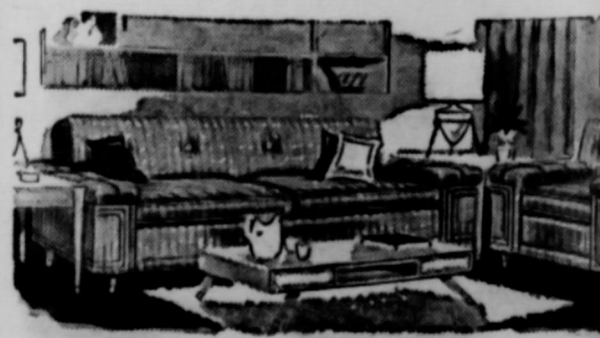

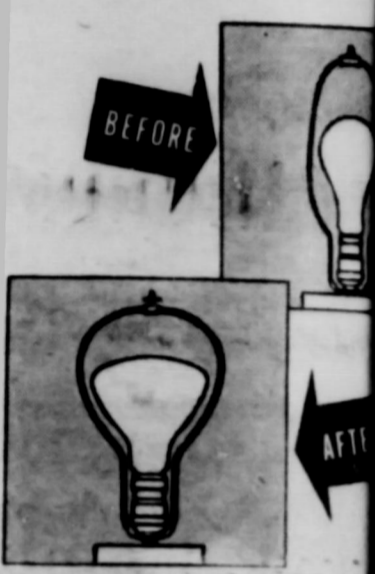

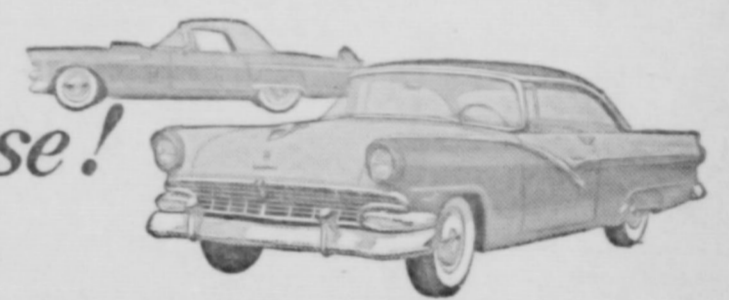

CONGRESSIONAL CONGRESS

There seems to be a great deal of increased activity in the field of grading Members of Congress. This is done by the numerous organizations throughout the country that hold themselves out as representing particular business groups, labor groups, manufacturing groups, political groups, and so forth. You would be surprised at the number of such groups that have sprung up in this country in the last ten years.

As soon as a session of Congress is over, the individual voting record of each Member is thoroughly scrutinized by someone connected with the organization doing grading. Usually the organization has picked out sev-

ten per cent. The organizations then take the results and hand them out as absolute conclusions of fact that cannot be challenged. That is where the fallacy of the whole proceeding lies. In the first place, no mention is made of what basis it was originally concluded that the best interest of the country would be served by a yea or a nay vote. The truth is that these decisions are so often made on the basis of —not what is best for the entire country—but what is best for the particular group that happens to be compiling the statistics. Sometimes the issues chosen are not remotely connected with the particular interest of the group. Sometimes they get the yea and nay votes mixed up and give a Member a black mark when he should have a white mark according to their yardstick. For instance, on one occasion several years ago, a Member was listed as having opposed a certain piece of legislation that was supported by the particular group. It developed that the member had actually vigorously supported the legislation. However, a motion to recommit the bill had been made which would have meant the death of the bill. Of course, this Member voted "no" on the motion to recommit. What the group had done was to see that he had cast a nay vote and apparently did not take the trouble to find out what he was voting "no" on.

The point I want to make is that these matters should be carefully scrutinized by readers. It would be a very simple matter for a committee group to pick ten issues at random and grade the Members of Congress, both House and Senate, on how they voted on those issues, to then list these Members as having voted in ac-

ch against the farm program, and who seem to get great pleasure out of calling them farm subsidies. Let me say this. The farmers build countries. They do not bankrupt them. Any statement to the effect that a farm program of this nation are bankrupting the nation, just do not coincide with the facts. The truth is that the losses in some portions of the farm program, which were being tested on a trial and error method, do not amount to a thimbleful when compared with the vast subsidies that have gone to industry in this country for years before the farmer was thought of, nor to the vast sums of money that have been sent overseas as gifts and grants to many who had sought to destroy our government and our nation.

The advance of civilization has always required changes in laws and in programs under which people have lived. New problems are created by new discoveries and new advances in many fields. But it must be remembered that none of these problems, especially the farm problems, can be settled by destroying the American farmer, or whatever segment of our population might be affected by a particular problem.

Of course, there are many solutions offered to these problems, and they should all be carefully weighed because some suggestion in each of them might be an essential ingredient in the final successful recipe.

As of September 27, the public debt of this nation was \$277,425,541,342.05. I am of the opinion that this debt is too high. I felt that it was too high when it was approximately 275 billions of dollars. I have consistently voted against increasing the authorization to go further into debt, because I have felt that there was not enough difference between the national income and the national debt. Under the free enterprise system of government, there will always be a public debt be-

### Suggestions On Poultry Culling Offered

College Station, October—Culling, one of the oldest flock management practices used by poultrymen for maintaining high egg production, is less important today because of changes being made in flock handling methods. Little culling, except to remove the hopelessly sick or unthrifty birds, should now be needed for the first eight to nine months of production. Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman, says taking a young hen from the flock just before she fails to lay for a few days is a sure way to cut income.

Wormeli adds that this may seem to contradict former recommendations about culling but it doesn't. He says egg producers who are most successful replace the entire laying flock with pullets at the end of each laying year. Thereby eliminating the job of trying to select the best hens to carry over for the second year of production.

Too, the specialist explains, breeding methods have been intensified to the extent that where top quality chicks have been used the resulting flock will lay at a rate for eight or nine months that makes culling of healthy hens unnecessary. If a flock of top bred birds is not laying at a high rate, Wormeli says the

On the investment. Studies are now indicating, says the specialist, that a hen may take as long as a two week pause and lay a profitable number of eggs before the end of the laying year. If she had been culled early, this could not have happened.

On the other hand, Wormeli says if the hen goes out of production near the end of the laying year, she should be culled because there isn't sufficient time for her to make recovery and produce a worthwhile number of eggs.

careful about buying only chicks for the laying flock which have the very best breeding in then says Wormeli. Too, he says, research findings are showing there is a correlation between death losses in chicks and mortality in the flocks produced from the chicks.

Know the records not only from the standpoint of eggs produced but also the weight of eggs and the mortality record of the flocks from which replacement chicks are purchased, advises Wormeli.

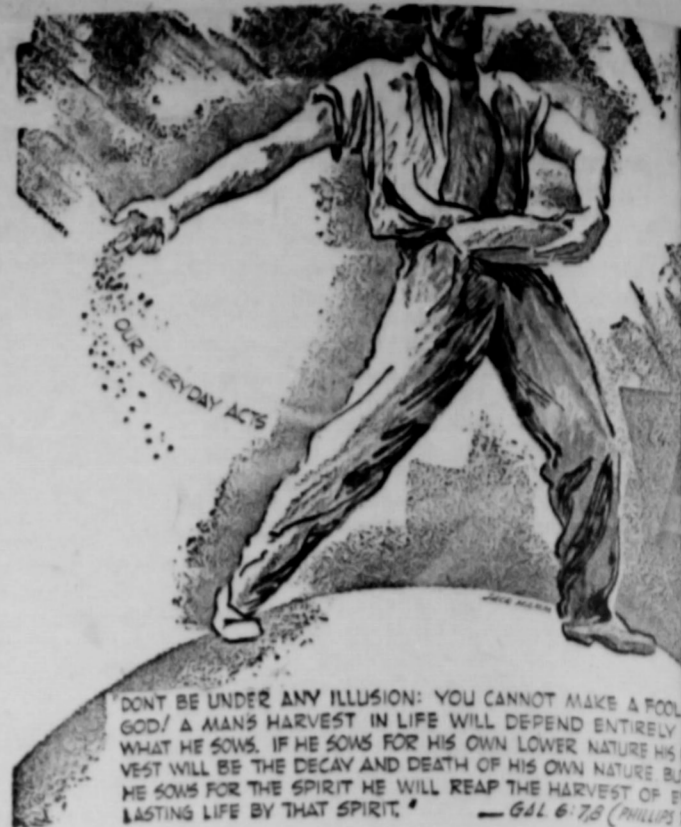

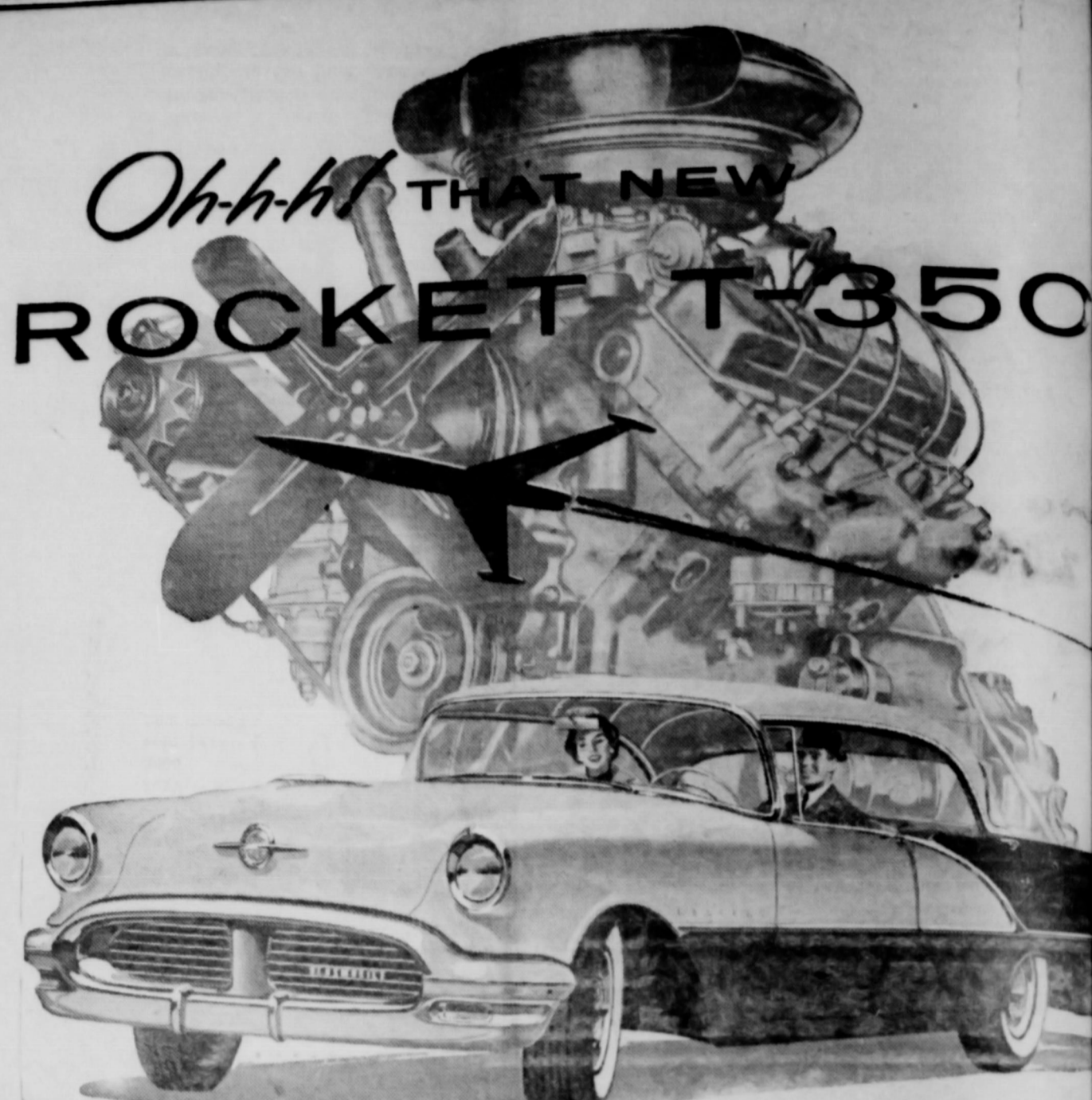

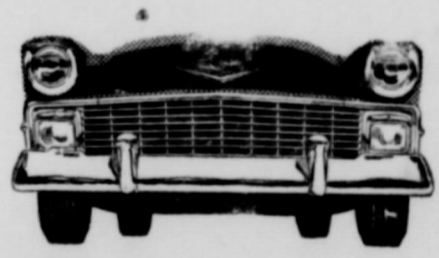
