St. C. Cox, pastor of the local Assembly of God Church, is inviting the public to attend the Revival which will begin in that church March 23.

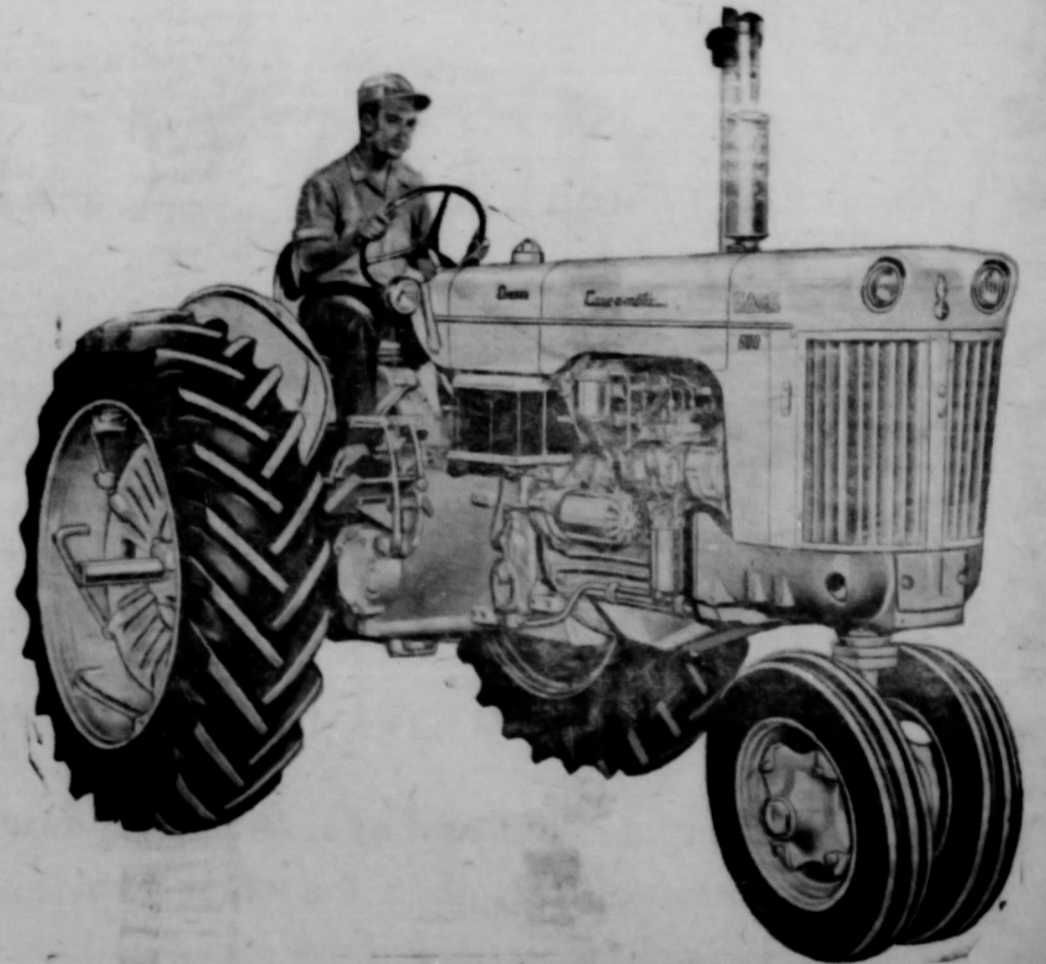

### New Feeding Information To Be Presented At Texas Tech Livestock Feeders Day Program Will Feature Research Test and Discussions by Livestock Authorities

The Texas Tech College Annual Livestock Feeders Day program will be held on the College Campus in Lubbock, Texas, on April 1, according to an announcement by Dr. W. L. Stangel, Dean of the School of Agriculture.

The program is being held at the conclusion of steer fattening experiments which have been conducted by the College under a research fellowship grant provided by the Texas Cottonseed Crushers' Association to study methods of cattle feeding which may increase gains and reduce costs. The experiment was planned and conducted in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It studied the use of hormones, roughage pelleting, and replacement of alfalfa. During the morning program Texas Tech researchers will discuss the results of the experimental test and visitors will inspect the steers which have been fed the test rations. The cotton seed hulls of the Lubbock area will provide a live lunch for those attending the field day at noon.

The afternoon session of the program will be held in the Memorial Auditorium in the Agriculture Building on the Campus. Current livestock developments and the results of the latest research in the field of cattle feeding will be discussed by nationally recognized cattle authorities and research scientists.

The current Texas Tech steer feeding trial is the largest and most comprehensive in the long series of cattle experiments which have been conducted for the benefit of cattle feeders in this extensive feed producing area. Forty steers have received pelleted cottonseed hulls in comparison to forty others which have been fed the usual loose hulls. Preliminary results obtained before the conclusion of the experiment indicate that pelleting of the hulls has increased the rate of gain in an experiment conducted during the previous year, feeding pelleted cottonseed hulls increased the rate of gain about 40 pounds per steer, and the cost per hundred pounds of gain was more than one dollar less than when loose hulls were fed.

The use of the hormone stilbestrol in the graincottonseed

most-cottonseed hulls ration appears to be increasing the rate of gain and decreasing the cost of gain. These trends are in agreement with results obtained with stilbestrol in test conducted throughout the Nation and with those from the Texas Tech experiment conducted with a similar ration last year. In that trial, feeding stilbestrol increased the daily gain one-third of a pound and decreased the cost of gains more than three dollars per hundred pounds. The current experiment which will be reported at the field day, in addition to testing the effect of stilbestrol, gives feeders an opportunity to compare the feeding of stilbestrol with the use of implanted stilbestrol pellets.

Because alfalfa may sometimes be difficult to obtain and relatively high in cost, a third phase of the current experiment was planned to determine whether the usual small amounts of alfalfa which are used in cottonseed hulls rations may be replaced by vita-

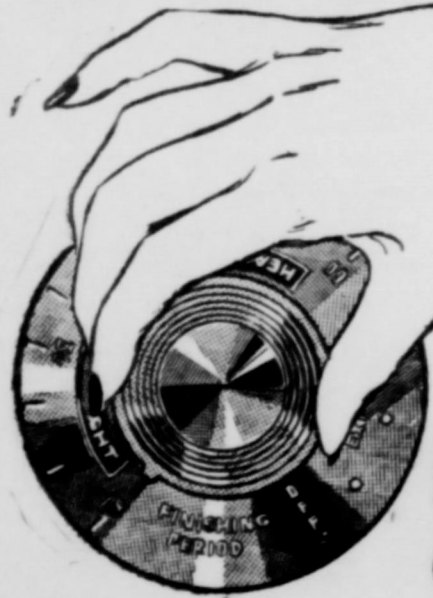

They usually meet during the year at one trial or another and do some visiting while running dogs Tyler, Bethel, Decatur, Abilene, Paris, Canadian, Kingsville are but a few cities that are the focal point of these field trials. The Panhandle trials are high in the top part of Texas and many miles from other trials sites but the boys in this part of the state don't grieve about that.

There is an old popular saying about fishing areas around here "This is the best fishing place in the world five hundred miles in any direction." This is what the natives tell a newcomer when he is asking about prospects for a place to fish. It is about the same with field trialers but they take this fact on their stride, same as the fishermen. Most of the entries at the Canadian trial are from fellows from distant cities, five hundred miles in any direction—Sayre, Fairview, Briscoe and Okla. home City in Oklahoma, Denver, Colorado, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Tyler, San Antonio, Kingsville and Lubbock, to name a few of the places that are represented at this Panhandle trial.

Why do hunters of the bobwhite quail, those from far off, who take pride in their pointing dogs, travel across these many miles to compete in the running at Canadian? The main reason is that the State Game Management area furnished grounds that many dog handlers have never seen but only dreamed about. Five thousand acres of rolling grasslands that have been particularly adaptable to the native bobwhite through the years are available. A fellow has a chance to show his dog on native bobwhite quail, strictly as

for the drawing A. S. Jackson, who supervises the trials grounds, was on hand to greet the guests and extend a hearty welcome hand.

What is the object of such an affair as this? Men and women who love and train pointing dogs enjoy competing their dogs with some of the best of them. It's just an outdoor sport but the average person would be surprised how much time and effort is spent by some along this line—in fact, it is not surprising, it is startling. Many office men, execut-

ives, millionaires fellows of meager means and from all walks of life make up the handlers in the bird dog field.

First place winners in the four events were as follows: All-age, Burt's Speedy Beau, setter, male owned and handler by Bud McMurtry, Amarillo, Shooting Dog, Turner's Stylish Mickey, setter, male owned and handler by Carl Risley, attorney for Sayre, Oklahoma; and Puppy, Miss War Storm, pointer, female, C. W. Wiley, from near Denver Colorado.

The spring trials this year were no exception from the others. The drawing of the braces was slowed down due to the fact that fellows from several parts of the country were calling in entries. After the secretary had completed these calls the drawing got underway with more than 80 dogs entered. The fellows from Oklahoma City didn't show up simply because they were snowed in.

Judges H. M. Shelton and Haywood McDaniel, from Tyler and San Antonio, respectively, arrived and were at the drawing the night before the trial started. It might be warm and comfortable as you read this but when these two judges drove off towards the Panhandle the weather forecast was continued snow and temperatures below 20. The judges made it no Canadian even though there was as much as seven-inch snow near their route, plus snow and ice covered roads for the hundreds of miles that they traveled.

Friday morning didn't break with a shining sun flooding the ranch, but rather, a cold, sub-freezing day with a very heavy as they started out in the running of the all age. Second day of the running there was a vigorous snowstorm in action with the visibility near zero. The gallery (the fellows who watched the running) stood out like a display of an arctic sporting goods store advertising clothing for frigid climes.

Cowboys will understand what this group of dog handlers had to contend with since they all rode horseback. Saddling up a horse with the snow a-blowing usually registers with a horseman. Two fellows were bucked off, one suffering a broken knee and the other three broken ribs.

The Texas Game and Fish Commission personnel, as well as the civic leaders of Canadian, went above and beyond the call of duty to provide for the arriving guests. Clean kennels with wheat straw, water, etc., greeted each dog handler who wished to bed his dogs down a few nights at the Texas Game and Fish Commission area. The City Hall in Canadian was at their disposal.

## Prices Progress And Problems In Texas Farming

The "between-crops" period in farming is always a time for weighing prospects both on the

farm, at the market place and in the country. Probably even more people have been set to wondering what's in store for them this year, considering unusual weather, uncertain legislation, and the fact that the weather. Onion harvesting has been seriously delayed, by as much as a month in some cases. During the delay old-crop onions prices climbed higher in commercial trade.

Wet weather has blessed many and burdened many others. Plains-West Texas wheat prospects look general good, having already attained enough moisture to carry the crop well into spring. This is

good news to Texas farmers if not to surplus-minded government chiefs who have been having some trouble marketing their goods abroad lately. Farther south, in the Rio Grande Valley, farmers are less happy with the weather. Onion harvesting has been seriously delayed, by as much as a month in some cases. During the delay old-crop onions prices climbed higher in commercial trade.

The recession, along with better supply prospects, is expected to help lower beef prices somewhat from the present healthy level. Some livestock men say prices probably have reached their peak and will gradually drop by as

much as 20 percent by early summer.

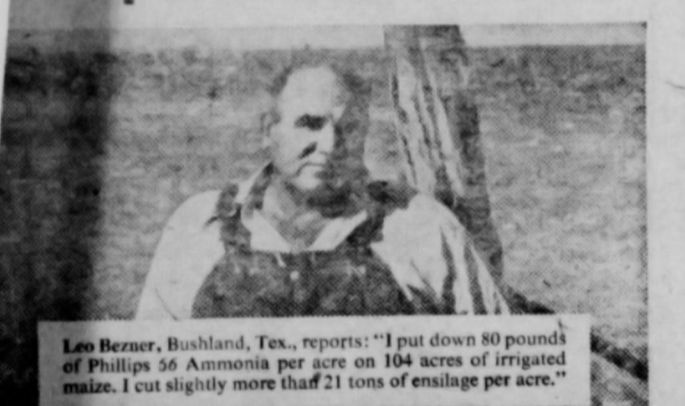

American Cancer Society Seeking \$30,000,000 During April Crusade: For Research

Praising the present Texas Cancer Program now supported by the annual April educational fund-raising Crusade, Governor Daniel stated, "Remarkable advances have been made in the control of cancer, to the extent that the disease can now be arrested in one out of three cases. The American Cancer Society has played a significant role in these advances through its threefold program of education, service to the patient, and research."

Pointing up the fact that "the medical resources of our Nation are centered today on developing a cure for cancer," he emphasized that with our present knowledge of the disease, "half of those who develop cancer could be saved if they would accept the personal responsibility of informing themselves of the dangers of cancer and heed the message of the American Cancer Society to have regular health checkups."

"Through the efforts of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society," he continued, "lives are being saved—and many more will be saved in the future."

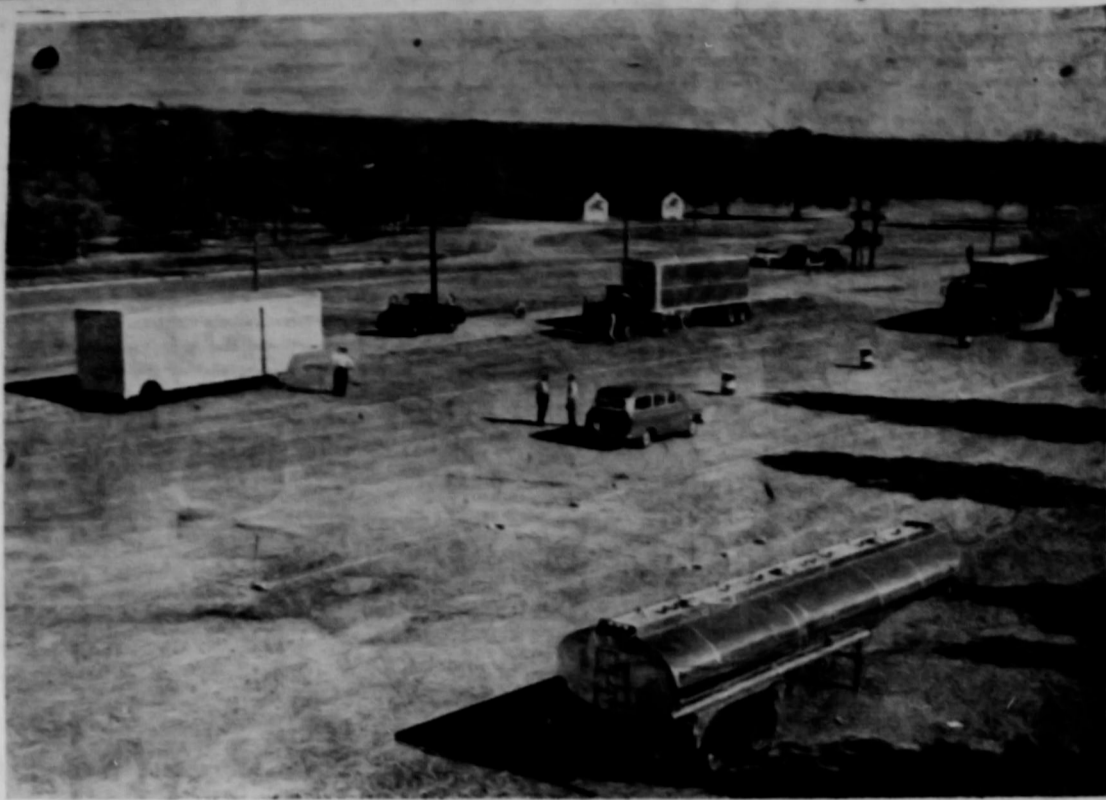

When he meets or passes a transport truck on the highway, the average motorist immediately places child-like confidence in the professional ability of the driver, whom he has never seen before nor is likely to ever see.

Young men, with limited and in some cases no previous truck driving experience, are given personalized instruction in all phases of truck and trailer operations. They learn to handle all types of equipment and loads, and to shift complex transmissions in both ranges, up and down.

Little time is spent in classroom work since the Driver Training School of Texas is basically a "learn by doing" type of course. However, some related information, such as orientation; state and ICC regulations; license, weight and load requirements; driver responsibilities; customer relations; fuels and lubricants; tire maintenance; brake systems; gas and diesel engines; preventive maintenance and first aid are taught in the classroom.

When the field work begins, the student receives actual driving experience under careful supervision. He quickly reveals basic driving skills through constant practice, then is taken into simulated traffic problems which add realism to the truck handling problems he may later encounter on the job.

The program financed by fees charged to persons who enroll in the course, requires only that the student should be 21 years of age, have a valid driver's or operator's license, and be capable of passing the physical examination required by the Interstate Commerce Commission, a mandatory procedure for securing employment with trucking companies operating under ICC regulations.

The Engineering Extension Service began this series of four week courses on March 10, 1958. Other classes are scheduled to begin April 21 and June 2.

Students for the school come from all walks of life. Boys who have just graduated from high school join those returning from military service, and others with previous experience as drivers come to polish up their techniques and to familiarize themselves with the latest equipment—and the school has the very latest equipment available, supplied by principal manufacturers, including Diamond T, GMC Motor Truck Division, International Harvester Company, Mack Motor Company, Inc., Brown Express Co., Truchauf Trailer Company, Gulf Oil Corporation, Hobbs Trailers, Luftkin Trailer Company, Magnolia Petroleum Company, The Texas Company, and others.

The Texas Department of Public Safety and the transportation industry both have shown keen interest in the school because it is a smaller means of combating the ever mounting traffic toll on the national and state highways. Well-trained truck drivers will

help reduce that total, and the Engineering Extension Service is happy to serve as the training agency.

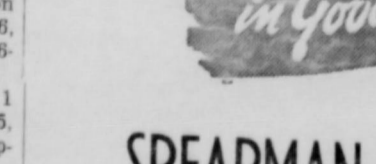
