Looking 'em Over Politically

Looking 'em over politically. Reporter is giving his opinion on several of the state races week. As this is a free country you have the privilege of saying as you please, but here's my opinion about the candidates:

U. S. Senator—O'Daniel has so miserably that you'd vote either for James V. O'Daniel or Dan Moody. These candidates are so well known that after readers should know one they favor.

Governor—six candidates are in the race, but it is believed Gov. Coke Stevenson will win the field. He is making a good nomination for his first term.

Attendant Governor—Nine candidates are in this field and are several splendid men. Choice is Boyce House of Worth, one of our kind.

Comptroller—Geo. H. Sheppard holder of this office, apparently is going to win this long as he lives.

Treasurer—Jesse James holding this office by appointment of Gov. Stevenson. James is a splendid man and has made a good office holder. He had years of training in the office before he was appointed.

Commissioner—Bascom is exceptional in his administration of the office and deserves reelection.

Attorney General—Gerald C. is a candidate for a third term. He has made a great record in the office and should be re-elected.

Supt.—L. A. Woods has held this office several terms; it is that when a man is elected is most difficult to displace, and Woods is no exception.

Commissioner of Agriculture—J. E. McDonald walked off the Democratic reservation two years ago. Support Wilkie. W. N. Bill made a good race against McDonald in the general election. Mr. McDonald should be nominated to teach a lesson.

Commissioner of Public Accounts—O. Thompson is up for reelection. The Panhandle should be an overwhelming endorsement. He is undoubtedly an office holder as there

is in Austin.

Railroad Com. (unexpired term)—This race probably will be between Pierce Brooks of Dallas and B. H. Jester of Corsicana with J. E. Kilday of Houston in 3rd place. Knowing little about the candidates, we have no choice, but lean toward Jester.

Criminal Appeals Judge—Usually these men are competent candidates. Harry N. Graves, incumbent, is opposing Walter H. Strength, and probably will be renominated.

Congress, 18th dist.—Eugene Worley deserves the nomination. He should not lose many votes in this county.

7th Court of Civil Appeals—When it comes to choosing among a good group of home folks to succeed M. J. R. Jackson, we just shy off. E. C. Nelson of Amarillo, E. L. Pitts of Lubbock, J. Ross Bell of Childress and W. T. Link of Clarendon are candidates. Just vote as you please, and you won't make a mistake.
