Favorites in the western sector, where we are more concerned, naturally are the Abilene Eagles just as they were last year and the year before and just as they will continue to be as long as the city of 20,000 has just one high school.

Nevertheless the War Birds were not to have the romp they have had in the past and don't have a conference breather this time. Sweetwater, San Angelo and Big Spring are all pretty tough with the Mustangs drawing the most support.

Speaking of the Ponies, Coach Lawrence Friday is having his troubles in the Sweetwater camp. No less than five regulars have been sidelined due to injuries or illness. Cecil Voss, all-district end of 1937; W. B. Thomas, back; Jake Webster, back; Bob Hendrick, back; and Buck Johnson, tackle; have been inactive of late.

The horses open next Friday in Sweetwater, opposing Ft. Worth Tech.

Sam Flowers, who leaves this week to enroll again at Rice Institute but who will not be eligible for football until 1939, predicts that the Owls will win the Southwest Conference championship in a breeze and even goes so far as to say that the Night Birds are Rose Bowl bound.

Smith And Nance Due Back Today; Heavy Work Slated

The gridiron mentors of the local high school call their charges back into camp this afternoon with promise of heavy work before the Longhorns debut against the Lamasa Tornados in Lamasa next Friday night.

The center of the line was Head Coach Pat Murphy's major problem. Weak at guards last season the team may be handicapped with the same weakness this fall but the Irishman is experimenting and may present an entirely new and stronger setup this weekend.

Bill Fletcher seems a fixture at one of the guard slots and present plans would move Dearing to the other hole over from tackle. Fletcher wasn't exactly a world beater at that position last fall but the year's experience plus the fact that he has grown some 15 pounds may help him tremendously.

The ability of Dearing is unquestioned but whether he can conquer the obstacles of the new position remains to be seen. The 185-pound cruiser is not as awkward as he was last year and can be expected to hold down his end of the troubles.

Due Back
Clyde Smith and Winsett Nance, tackle and center, respectively, are expected back in camp today. Both were ill the latter part of last week and did not take part in the training session.

In Smith, Murphy should have a man of all-district caliber provided the big boy really bears down and plugs on all cylinders. He is probably the best goal kicker to present himself at the local school in a decade and that ability helps a lot in determining starting material.

The other first string Smith, Check, has expressed a preference for line play but his deadly blocking and defensive work in the secondary seems to have clinched a backfield berth. Charles Ray may also end up as a ball carrier.

The team will go back to the Birdwell training site for drills this afternoon but is expected to move to Steer stadium for scrimmage drill either tomorrow or Wednesday.

HUBBERS TAKE WT-NM TITLE BY DEFEATING CLOVIS, 13-4

CLOVIS, N. M., Sept. 11 (AP)—The Lubbock Hubbers hit three Clovis pitchers hard here Sunday afternoon to take the deciding and final game of the Shaughnessy playoff series of the West Texas-New Mexico league, 13-4, adding the official title to their full season championship.

The Hubbers finished first in the season's play, defeated Wink three straight games in the first playoff series and then took three out of four games from Clovis for the title. Clovis defeated Midland in their playoff.

STATE CHAMPS TANGLE WITH DALLASITES IN TOP HIGH GO

The championship race opens on two fronts in Texas schoolboy football this week but an interdistrict clash between Longview, defending state champion, and Woodrow Wilson, the Dallas power, headlines the schedule.

The Lobos, rated by their coach, P. E. Showell, as weaker than last season when they downed Wichita Falls in the finals, will go up against a real test in the campaign opener because Woodrow Wilson has been generally picked to win the title in the very tough Dallas district.

The Oil Belt, grown so bulky it had to be split into two divisions, has one conference game scheduled, with Mineral Wells at Breckenridge. Breckenridge is one of the favorites in the eastern division which has Brownwood, Cisco, Eastland, Stephenville and Ranger as other members.

The other conference game is in District 4 with Fabens clashing with Austin (El Paso).

Jackets To Marblehead
There are 61 games on the schedule this week, 29 of them inter-district nature and three of them intersectional tilts, featured by the clash between Port Arthur High and Marblehead, Mass., at Marblehead. Ninety of the state's 109 class A teams have games.

Corpus Christi, rated at the top in South Texas, plays Denison, the District 5 favorite, in another headliner and Wichita Falls tackles the always strong Masonic Home team from Fort Worth. Lubbock, Panhandle favorite, gets a rugged test from North Side, the Fort Worth power.

Tyler, one of the favorites in Longview's district, opened the season last week with an impressive 49-0 victory over Jacksonville. This week the Lions play North Dallas, ranked close to Woodrow Wilson in the Dallas sector.

Lamasa, a graduate from class B ranks, made an impressive start with a 51-0 victory over class B Tahoka. This week Lamasa plays Big Spring, one of the favorites in the western division of the Oil Belt.

Pampa, which smashed Clovis, N. M., 65-7, in an intersectional game, takes on Riverside of Fort Worth Friday. Plainview, also a member of the Panhandle district, and which downed Kerrville of District 12 by a 7-0 count, tackles Bowie, the El Paso district favorite.

Two games were played in District 2 last week, El Paso defeating class B Chillicothe, 27-0, and Quanah losing to class B Wellington, 34-0, in something of an upset. Vernon defeated Frederick, Okla., 21-0, in a practice scrimmage.

Kitts May Lead Team To 2nd Conference Title In Row

HOUSTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Jinxes notwithstanding, there's heavy argument it will be the "same song, second verse" in the Southwest Conference football derby this fall.

Or, interpreted, Rice Institute and its Ernie Lain-Olle Cordill combine, has its loud backers for a second straight flag—a little stunt that has never been pulled. Coach Jimmy Kitts is distinctly silent on that matter, but does venture out with:

"If we get the breaks—and we'll have to get them—we have the ball club to win."

Coach Kitts is an honest man, and no one, under a casual glance at his rosters, has reason to doubt his word that:

"My first string will be stronger this year."

But, the skipper adds, he has his weak points. Reserves are not too plentiful at the guards and ends. Where four very able guards were available last year, Squire Kitts now finds a shortage occasioned by graduation and scholastic failures.

"It's going to take some juggling there," he plans to shift Jimmy Rogers, a blocking back who played fullback at Greenville High, to a guard. And then I have Matt Landry and Bill Hamer, two good boys from last year."

Ends available are good but the supply is low. Unless the scene changes, Kitts plans to start the season with Walter Williams, 187 and tough, and Dan Eager, a 210-pounder. This latter gent, a six foot, three inch boy, could be a household word before the season's end.

Stories that Lain has gained in poundage, may be a trifle slower are not true. The big passer-runner does carry around about 220 pounds, but he carries it well and still will again go the burden of scoring most of the points.

Slightly larger, bronzed and apparently rife of a slight nervousness that popped out in his sophomore year, is Olie Cordill, the Big Spring boy who attends to all the little loose ends that Lain leaves.

Regarded by many as Lain's equal in his kicking foot and running ability, Cordill will figure in the Rice attack.

With Lain and Cordill will be Jake Schuele, a veteran who has shown terrific blocking form; Jack Vestal, carrot-topped sophomore likely to be about the fanciest line backer in conference history; Earl Glasie, a terrific 200-pound sophomore fullback who can block and tackle; Dan Coffee, Paul Hancock and Doug (Scott) Sullivan.

Rain Slows Up Performers In Natl. Amateur

Par May Not Be Needed To Gain Medal Honors

OAKMONT COUNTRY CLUB, OAKMONT, Pa., Sept. 12 (AP)—A steady drizzle of rain added to the notorious hazards of Oakmont's famous 6,981-yard stretch today as 165 competitors, led by John Good-man of Omaha, sallied forth on the first of two 18-hole qualifying rounds in the national amateur golf tournament.

The only benefit of the rain was the slowing up of the lightning fast greens that took such a heavy toll of shots in the national open here three years ago.

Beno Janssen, Jr., 16-year-old Oakmont champion, and Alvin Dolans, Roanoke, Va., fired their first shots at 7 a. m. (EST). The field following them was held up for 12 minutes as the starting judges waited for Jack Busby, Princeton, N. J., whose automobile slipped off the road en route to the club. Busby was not injured.

The general prediction was that a pair of 80's would be good enough to land among the 64 qualifiers, and that 145—one over par for 36 holes would be a cinch for the medal. That figure won't be the medal for Roland Mackenzie here in 1925.

TRANS-OCEAN PLANE DOES 'ADMIRABLY' ON TEST FLIGHT

SEATTLE, Sept. 12 (AP)—The Boeing Clipper, first of six giant flying boats being built for Pan American Airways' transatlantic service, performed "admirably," engineers reported, in her first extended flight above northwestern Washington today.

The carried what the Boeing Aircraft Co. said was a new American record load—water and lead ballast added to make the weight of plane and cargo 77,500 gross pounds—and will be laden to her rated capacity of 82,500 pounds gross load, on future flights.

Cobb Just Misses New Speed Record

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, Sept. 12 (AP)—John R. Cobb of London, the big man with the little car, made a courageous attempt to set a world record for an automobile speed record here today, but fell short by less than three miles per hour.

The wealthy Englishman, piloting a 7,000 pound shark-shaped racer, was clocked at 242.53 miles per hour on two flashing drives through the measured mile, but his gallant bid was not enough.

Captain George E. T. Eyston's mark of 345.40 miles per hour, made here Aug. 28, thus stood an assault which far exceeded the retired army officer's original average last year of 311.236.

Cobb, sitting in the nose of his four-foot high "Raiton," which is new to the flats, was timed officially at 343.8 on the south run and at 341.8 on the backward run.

Two runs were 84.5 on the southward sprint and 347.49 on the return.

Cobb, obviously disappointed, said he would run again as soon as minor mechanical repairs are made. He declared it might be before the week-end.

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Official Vote Is Announced

Attorney General's Race Polled Biggest Runoff Total

BEAUMONT, Sept. 12 (AP)—Greatest interest in the democratic run-off primary August 27 was in the race for attorney general, the official canvass by the state party executive committee indicated today.

The total number of votes cast in that contest was 857,845. The next largest number was the 837,781 which voters cast to decide the struggle for the railroad commission.

In both contests, candidates favored by W. Lee O'Daniel, democratic nominee for governor, were defeated.

KING'S COUSIN IS TAKEN BY DEATH

LONDON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Prince Arthur of Connaught, a first cousin to King George VI and son and

heir to the 85-year-old Duke of Connaught, died in his sleep today after ten months of poor health. He was 56.

Known as the "handyman of the royal family," he had carried out numerous state missions for his uncle, Edward VII; was personal aide de camp to four kings, Edward VII, George V, Edward VIII and George VI; was one of four courtiers of state, in the absence in India of George VI in 1911-12, and had served as governor-general of South Africa.

M'CASLAN RETURNS FROM PISTOL MEET

L. P. McCaslin, state highway patrolman, returned Sunday from Camp Perry, Ohio, where he participated in the national pistol matches and an officers' training school. McCaslin, one of seven picked

men from the state highway patrol, won 1919 places in the restricted class over a field of 378. He also won a sharpshooters medal for use of the Thompson machine gun and qualified as a pistol expert in the police training school. McCaslin was awarded a diploma from the training school for handling and disarming suspects.

GRAHAM, Sept. 12 (AP)—A bullet-pierced skeleton found in a canyon near here has been identified as that of Bill Umphress, one of four men who escaped the Sherman jail on July 26.

Sheriff Henry C. Williams, Jr., of Graham, said identification was established through a ring found on a finger bone.

Williams said officers believed Umphress was shot to death. Charred portions of the skeleton indicated an attempt had been made to burn the remains.

An automobile used by four men who kidnaped E. E. Hughes, of Burkburnett, at Bridgeport on July 29 was found near the scene. Three other jail fugitives were apprehended after the kidnaping.

PLEADS INNOCENT TO SLAYING CHARGE

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Sept. 12 (AP)—Herbert W. Sprague, 53, of Portland, Me., an itinerant barber, today pleaded innocent in municipal court to a charge of murdering Barbara Driscoll, 8, whose body was found under a building in a railroad yard Sept. 4.

Judge J. R. Waldron held him without bail and continued his case for a week on request of Rockingham county Solicitor Stephen Wheeler who was awaiting pathological analysis of blood stains allegedly found on Sprague's clothing.

Sprague was arrested last night when police said they found him asleep in an abandoned warehouse, several empty bar rum bottles by his side.

FORD COMPLAINS LABOR HEARING WAS UNFAIR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—The Ford Motor company complained to the National Labor Relations Board today that the examiner who heard charges of Wagner act violations at the company's Long Beach, Calif., assembly plant did not conduct "a full and fair hearing."

This complaint was included in a list of exceptions the company filed to the trial examiner's report. Thomas H. Kennedy, the examiner, held that the company had interfered with the rights of its employees to join the United Auto Workers union (C. I. O.).

The examiner also recommended that the management of the Long Beach plant withdraw bargaining recognition from the independent automobile workers organization and bargain with the U. A. W. upon request.

CITRUS MARKETING PROGRAM APPROVED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—The Agricultural Adjustment administration announced final approval today of an amended marketing agreement program for oranges and grapefruit grown in Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy counties, Texas.

The order placing the agreement in operation becomes effective immediately. Officials said the amended agreement was signed by handlers representing more than 63 per cent of the grapefruit and 59 per cent of the oranges shipped from these three counties in interstate and foreign commerce.

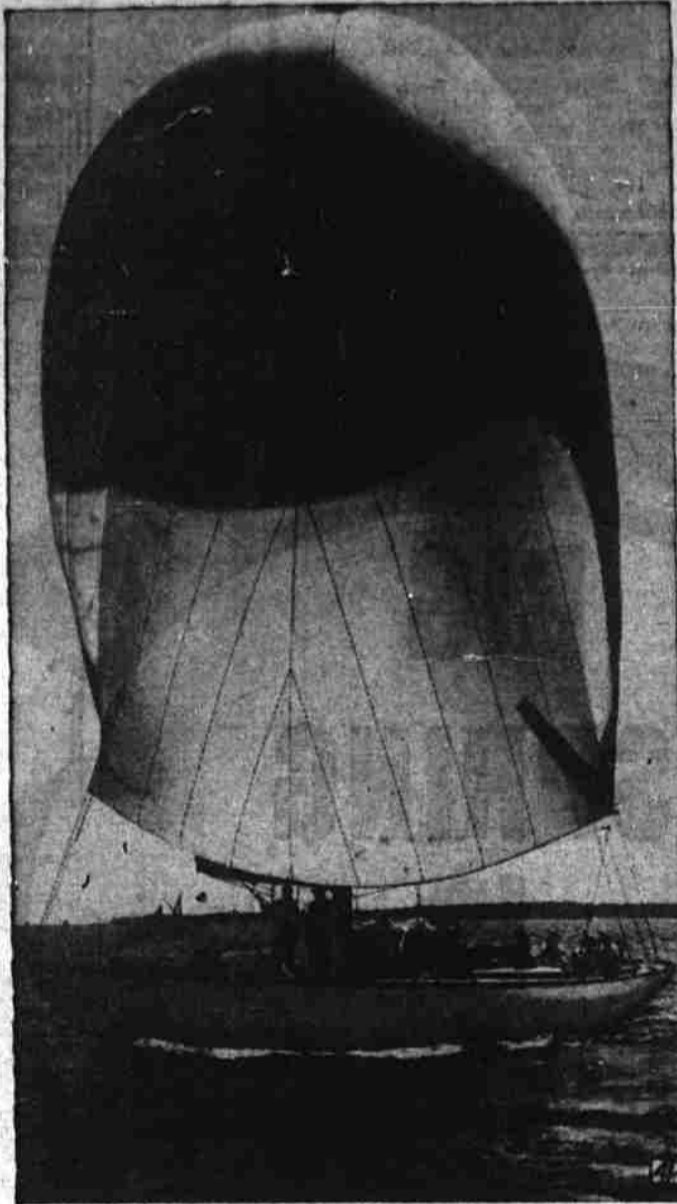

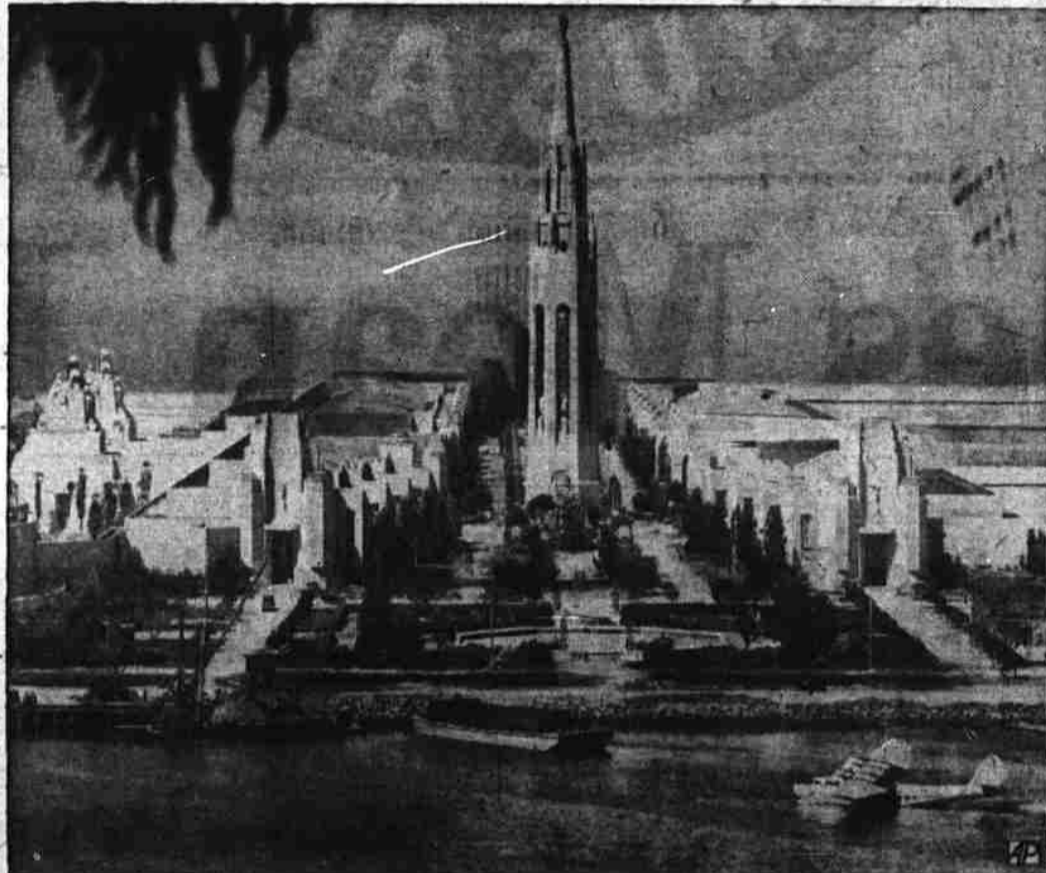

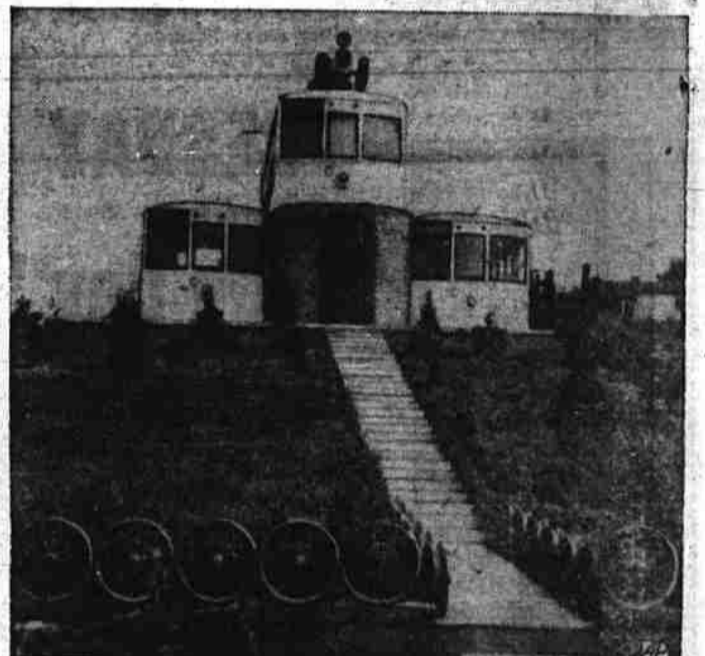

Balance at the end of August stood at \$59,850 in comparison with \$97,139 at the end of the preceding month, and \$35,348 as of Aug. 31, 1937.

The officers salary fund had a balance again by virtue of a \$10,000 transfer from the general fund. During the month, the fund showed receipts of only \$1,234.53 against disbursements of \$2,350.26.

Likewise, general fund receipts of \$216,79 against disbursements of \$2,848.81 further trimmed the balance of that fund. While the road and bridge fund was requiring \$4,894 during the month, receipts to it amounted to only \$89.54. French Leaders Renew Study Of Problems

PARIS, Sept. 12 (AP)—United States Ambassador William C. Bullitt conferred today with Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet as the French cabinet, worried over complications in the grave Central European crisis, assembled to review once again France's military and political preparedness. Sources close to the government said the cabinet discussions would include a report on "external problems and diplomatic conversations."

Bonnet returned from league of nations meeting at Geneva and his conversations there were expected to furnish much of the review before the cabinet.

Besides Bullitt, the foreign minister also saw Stanislas Leszczynski, Czechoslovak minister to Paris, and Belgian Ambassador Le Tellier.

The tension slowed trading on the Bourse. Almost all government bonds dropped and most bank stocks either lost slightly or were inactive.

The franc slipped to 27.12 to the dollar during the morning in comparison with Friday's close at 26.98. The closing quotation, however, was 27.03.

Financial sources said that they, like government officials, were waiting to hear what Hitler said at Nurnberg. The French position was simply:

"We are doing all we can to preserve peace; we are ready for war."

War. "On other frontiers too we have made sacrifices. We have acted more than loyally."

"I believe that the cause of European peace is not served by creating the impression that Germany is indifferent to the fate of the three and a half million (Sudeten Germans) in Czechoslovakia," he went on.

"Let the gentlemen in London be assured of this," he shouted. Reviewing the first weeks of the crisis arising from the autonomy demands of the Sudeten Germans, Hitler denied Germany had any intention of marching into Czechoslovakia at that time, four months ago.

Assertions to the contrary he branded as "lies."

"I demand that the oppression of the three and a half million Germans in Czechoslovakia shall cease," he told the cheering audience.

"The right of self-determination must be given to them!" The Arabs in Palestine "may be alone and defenseless, but the Germans in Czechoslovakia are not," he said.

Hitler said that he gave orders on May 28 to begin immediately with hurried completion of fortifications on the western frontier which had been under construction for two years.

He disclosed that Fritz Todt, noted as Germany's builder of highways, had been placed in charge of these operations.

Hitler finished his speech at 8:53 p. m. (2:33 p. m., E.S.T.)

At present, he said, 362,000 workers, 100,000 labor service men and numerous army engineering and infantry battalions were at work on the fortifications.

Daily 8,000 freight cars transport material amounting to 100,000 tons into this region, he continued, "and I can assure you the work will be completed before winter sets in."

Delving further into the Czechoslovak situation the reichsfuehrer said:

"The overwhelming majority of this state was forced without being consulted to obey this state. They were suppressed and their right to live taken from them."

"Among the majority of the suppressed nationalities are three and half million Germans, nearly as many as the total population of Denmark."

"These (the Sudeten Germans) are creations of the almighty, and he did not create them to be surrendered to foreign force."

"He did not create 7,000,000 Czechs to act as guardians of 3,500,000 Germans!"

They said no military measures such as strengthening of garrisons in the Sudeten regions were contemplated, nor was it considered necessary to have soldiers on patrol.

But Cerny was empowered to take drastic action tonight without further consultation with other members of the government.

The government decided to rely chiefly on the civil authorities. It was hoped that the police would be adequate to meet any emergency.

HITLER' AIDE IN NEED OF REST

NURNBERG, Germany, Sept. 12 (AP)—It was officially announced today that Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering, chief lieutenant of Reichsfuehrer Hitler, had become ill Sunday night and would need several days "of absolute rest."

The absence of the No. 2 Nazi from this morning's military display on Zeppelin meadow was noted and at first it was reported he was cloistered with Hitler in the hotel where the Fuehrer was preparing tonight's speech on which may hang the fate of Europe.

But a doctor's communique announced:

"Field Marshal Goering has contracted inflammation of the lymphatic glands in the right leg. In addition he has catarrh of the throat. His feverish condition demands several days of absolute rest in bed."

Goering became ill toward the end of yesterday's strenuous participation in the tenth annual rally of the Nazi party.
