Museum To Be Dedicated June 5

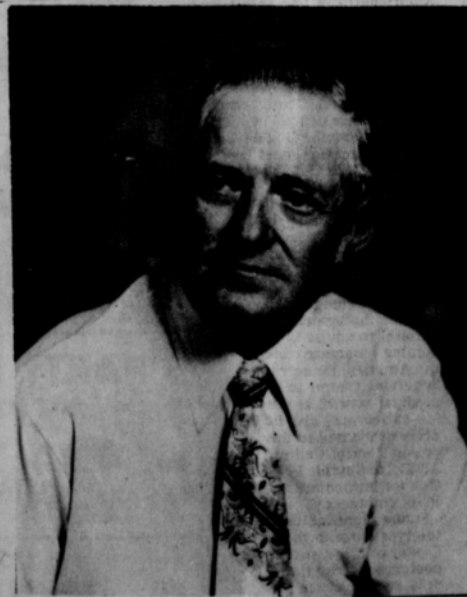

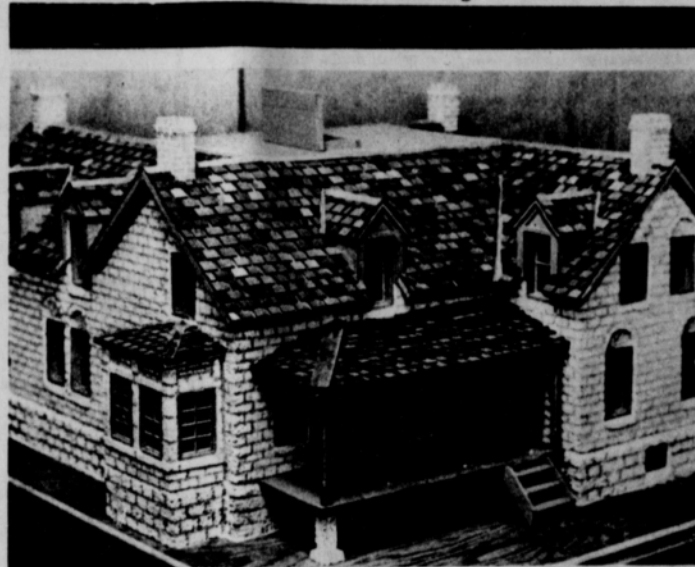

Proposed Water & Gas Revenue Bond Issue Breakdown

The city has called a bond election for June 15, 1976 in the high school auditorium.

If the revenue water and gas revenue bond issue passes it will provide the City of Spearman with the required amount of monies to meet the 40% matching funds required for our E.D.A. grant in the amount of \$214,600, along with \$322,000 provided by E.D.A. It will also provide the \$50,000 that will go to cathodic protection and painting of existing water storage units, along with \$10,400 to pay for the fiscal agents

fees.

This makes the total \$597,000 for both water and gas system reconditioning and upgrading.

Breakdown of the proposals are divided, the water proposal calls for \$81,000 to match E.D.A. Funds, \$50,000 cathodic protection and painting, and \$4,400 for fiscal agents' fees for a total of \$136,000. The gas proposal calls for \$133,000 for required E.D.A. matching funds and \$6,000 for the Fiscal Agent's Fees for a total of \$139,000. Combined total for the two issues is \$275,000.

If the issue passes, the citizens of Spearman would be paying for 46% of the project that would put our gas system in shape to meet the D.O.T. requirements and cut unaccountable gas losses to a minimum, and also provide for either an additional well and storage or an additional two water wells for the city.

The proposals in the bond issue call for bonds to be secured by and payable from a lien on and pledge of the Net Revenues of the City's Water, Gas and Sewer systems.

The upgrading of our gas and water system is of utmost importance to the City and these repairs are going to have to be made, in fact are long overdue, and if the voters approve these proposals in the election they will actually only be paying 46% of the cost with the E.D.A. picking up the tab for the rest of the expenditure.

Absentee voting in the bond election begins Tuesday, June 1 and runs through June 11. Absentee ballots may be cast at city hall during office hours.

CHICKEN MARTINI CASSEROLE

- 4 whole broiler-fryer chicken breasts, halved, skinned, boned
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 tsp. flavor enhancer
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 cup corn oil
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1/3 cup chopped mushrooms
- 1/4 cup dry martini mix
- 1/2 cup sliced ripe olives

Sprinkle chicken with flavor enhancer, salt and pepper. Coat with flour. Heat corn oil in frying pan over medium heat. Add chicken and brown on all sides. Remove chicken to baking pan. Pour off excessive pan drippings and add broth, mushrooms and martini mix. Stir well and pour over chicken. Bake in 350 degree oven, uncovered, about 40 minutes or until fork can be inserted with ease. Garnish with olives. Yield: 8 servings.

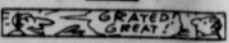

Director Named



Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel

College Station -- Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel has been named director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System's public service agency which provides agricultural, home-making, 4-H and consumer assistance to thousands of Texans throughout the state. Pfannstiel's appointment was made Tuesday by the Texas A&M University System Board of Regents, subject to concurrence of the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture. The appointment is effective June 1. The 2,000-employee service, which operates offices in all but two of Texas' 254 counties, is a joint county-state-federal program which has traditionally served farmers, ranchers and residents of rural communities and is becoming increasingly popular with urban dwellers.

"We have searched throughout the nation to confirm what we thought was the case all along: that we already have in our ranks the best person for this key position," pointed out Board of Regents Chairman Clyde H. Wells in announcing Pfannstiel's promotion. Pfannstiel, 48, has served the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for 27 years, as associate director since 1971. He joined the Extension Service upon graduation in 1949 from Texas A&M. He worked his way up through the ranks, from assistant county agent in Wharton County to county agent in Matagorda County in 1952, to administrative assistant at the service's College Station headquarters in 1956 and to assistant director in 1959.

He succeeds Dr. H. O. Kunkel, Texas A&M's dean of Agriculture, who has served as the Extension Service's acting director since February when Dr. John F. Hutchinson retired as director of the largest state Extension Service in the nation. "Dr. Pfannstiel is undoubtedly one of the most qualified administrative officers in the nation's entire Cooperative Extension Service," Dean Kunkel noted. "He has been eagerly sought by several other agencies but has chosen to stay and serve in Texas."

In addition to his B.S. degree in animal husbandry from Texas A&M, Pfannstiel earned a master's in extension education from Michigan State University in 1952 and a Ph. D. in extension administration from the University of Wisconsin in 1959.

Pfannstiel is a native of Bexar County. He is a colonel in the U. S. Army Reserves and is a member of numerous professional organizations.

Rehabilitation

A number of American Cancer Society volunteers who have successfully adjusted to intestinal surgery are making regular visits to patients in hospitals throughout the area to help others like themselves make a similarly rapid return to an active life.

Judge Johnny Lee, Chairman of the Hansford Unit of the ACS, says the volunteers are living proof that a colostomy--or ostomy--does not have to interfere with a person's work, marriage, travel, or recreation. This surgery sometimes is involved in the treatment of colon-rectum cancer and other abdominal disorders.

"After intestinal operations, some people become virtual recluses because they think their condition is unique," says Lee. "But one reason why it is sometimes hard to convince them that they can lead normal lives is that the other fellow 'sufferers' are living normally all around them that they can't be recognized."

Information about the ACS Ostomy Rehabilitation Program can be obtained by contacting the American Cancer Society. The Hansford Unit Service Chairman is Mrs. Comfort Winders in Gruver. The Society also helps fund the training of allied health professionals specialized in the techniques of caring for patients adjusting to intestinal surgery.

Registration Continues For Nursing Course

Registration is in progress for the Nursing Assistant's course of study at Frank Phillips College in Borger in cooperation with North Plains Hospital. The course, which will be taught by M. S. Carl G. Horst, R. N., will be held from Monday through Friday, for four weeks or a total of 120 hours, beginning Monday, June 7.

The course is designed to help provide nursing assist-ants for local and area hospitals, doctor's offices, nursing homes, and the lay public. Students who com-plete the course will receive a Nursing Assistant's Cer-tificate of Completion from the Office of Occupational and Technological Educa-tion at Frank Phillips College.

Students will study all the areas necessary for a person to become employed as a nursing assistant, such as taking blood pressures, gen-eral patient care, and spec-ial techniques such as iso-lation. It will also cover the nurse-patient relation-ship and special patient care.

Registration for the course will be taken at the Regis-trar's Office from now until classes begin. Fee for the course is \$45. There is no age limit.

Vigil Continues For Hog Cholera

It's been about 10 months since hog cholera made its last appearance in Texas, but hog producers should keep up their vigil against the dreaded disease, urges Jim Kuykendall, County Agent for the Texas Agri-cultural Extension Service.

The fact that hog cholera is still alive and well in the United States is evi-denced by the recent cases in New Jersey, Massachu-sets, and Rhode Island. Since infected herds must be destroyed to pre-vent the spread of this highly infectious swine disease, the disease is costly to producers as well as to the government which pays the indemnities on the basis of an appraisal. As of April 8, indemnities

alone have totaled more than \$2.35 million in the three eastern states men-tioned above.

Hog cholera can remain undetected in a herd for a number of months so all producers should keep a close check on their stock and should report any sus-picious disease signs to a local veterinarian or an-imal health official, cau-tions Kuykendall.

Signs of hog cholera in-clude high fever and loss of appetite. Other signs may include abnormal death losses among young pigs or possible abortions.

The disease can spread rapidly and deal a severe blow to the swine industry unless producers keep a close chek on their herds and report any sick animals, points out Kuykendall.

IRS News

Dallas, Texas--Thousands of low-income North Texans may be eligible for checks of up to \$400 each from the Internal Revenue Service. All they need to do is file a tax return and ask. The Dallas office of the IRS said today that the extra cash, called Earned Income Credit, has been applied for by only 125,000 individuals in North Texas so far this year. Earned Income Credit, a tax break for parents who supported at least one child during 1975 and earned less than \$8000, was available for the first time on 1975 tax returns.

Many people who are eligible for Earned Income Credit have such low incomes that they are not legally required to file tax returns. IRS officials

say there are thousands of these qualified recipients who are simply unaware that Earned Income Credit exists or do not know how to go about getting it.

Even if they paid no withholding tax and have no income tax liability, individuals eligible for Earned Income Credit will receive payments equalling ten percent of their earned income, to a maximum of \$400 on an income of \$4000. Over \$4000 the credit is reduced by \$10 for each \$100 of income.

Individuals who feel they may qualify for Earned Income Credit should contact their local IRS office or call for advice on the IRS' toll-free number, 800-492-4830.
