

City Park To Be Scene July 5 Of Big Soap Box Derby Event

The City Park will be the scene, on July 5, of one of the greatest events open to young boys.

That will be the site of the Soap Box Derby, in which more than two score lads between 11 and 15 will be racing cars of their own construction for prizes that include a try at the All American Soap Box title for the first place winner.

Since the event is one of the features of the holiday (July 4th falls on Sunday) great crowds are expected to see the boys shoot their cars down the paved incline. The race course will be just west of the swimming pool, starting near the concessions building and terminating in the vicinity of the museum building.

Preliminary heats are scheduled for the morning, starting at 10:30. Afternoon finals will start at 2:30. Members of the Lions Club, sponsor of the local event along with Tidwell Chevrolet Company and The Herald, are busy winding up details for the big race. Boys are being visited by official inspectors, to see that they are making progress with their cars, and are following construction requirements. The race course will be marked off this weekend, and boys are being instructed to appear at the City Park next Saturday morning (June 26) for trial runs.

Arrangements are being made for concession stands and bleacher seats. The National Guard unit will assist in handling traffic.

The racers will be started from a special ramp, and the local Carpenters' Union is volunteering the labor to build this.

There will be special grease and inspection racks for the vehicles, to be used prior to the races. Winners will be determined by "heats" with boys paired off in two-man races. One gets eliminated, the other moves up to meet the next heat winner, until a champion is selected.

He gets an expense-paid trip to Akron, Ohio, for the All American Derby in early August. There he competes against other local champions for the final payoff, which includes a \$5,000 scholarship.

Pilots Safe As Trainer Burns After Crashing

Two Air Force officers from Webb AFB escaped but their T28 single engine trainer burned in an emergency landing near Monahans Friday.

At Webb Base hospital, 2nd Lt. Leland B. Phelps, the instructor pilot, was reported not seriously hurt. He was confined for observation. 2nd Lt. Albert W. Johnson, the student officer, was uninjured. The propeller-driven craft burst into flames on impact and was severely damaged before the Monahans fire department came to the scene. Fire was extinguished by foamite. Lt. Phelps was brought to the base hospital in a Farr ambulance from Monahans.

Point of the emergency landing was 13 miles east of Monahans, five miles south of U. S. 80 highway and one mile east of the Crane cut-off. The country was rolling and brush covered.

The plane, one of a formation of T28s in that area at 2:30 p.m. Friday, came down when it had complete engine failure. B. A. Runyan, employe of Stanolind Oil & Gas, told newspaper and radio men at Monahans that he saw the plane circling from U. S. 80 and then disappear into the low dunes. Lt. Johnson and Lt. Phelps made their way to a ranch house about a mile away. Lt. Johnson reported the crash and summoned help. Lt. Phelps resides at 1701 Main and Lt. Johnson at 707 E. 15th.

French To Airlift Own Wounded Home

SAIGON, Indochina, June 19 (AP)—The French High Command said tonight a commercial airliner now delayed in India is scheduled to be the first plane in the homeward airlift of 1,000 Dien Bien Phu wounded.

Robert Becker, vocational agriculture teacher in the Flower Grove High School, accompanied by Earl Holcomb and Clyde Bloodworth as associate advisors, had just gotten back from taking 15 members of the Flower Grove Future Farmers of America Chapter on a tour of South Texas, when we talked with him.

The boys making the trip with three advisors were Wayne Wiggins, Jimmy Heald, Pat Hale, Jerry Caughman, Derrell Froman, Wayne Anderson, John Paul Cave, Donald Bloodworth, Jerry Cave, H. W. Thurmond, Vernon Holcomb, Travis Lillard, Jimmy Welborn and Curtis Miller.

Making trip in a couple of covered pickups they went to San Antonio where they visited the Alamo and other points of interest. They spent a night and did a lot of fishing at Port Aransas, after which they went to Corpus Christi for a night. They then visited Kinksville, where H. S. Howe of

Texas A&I College took them on a tour of the King Ranch. Back to Uvalde they spent three days at Garner Park having a fine time.

The SCS grass specialists are advising all land owners who plan to plant grass next spring to grow a crop this year that will provide a stubble. They say that the stubble may be summer grown or come from small grains in cool season when there is sufficient moisture.

Several Dawson County farmers have good stands of Guar.

Walter Lentz has such a stand on the F. A. Street farm, and J. R. Dennis has good stands on his two farms near Patricia. On his place one mile east and one mile north of Cotton Center a good stand has been obtained by Travis Dean.

Walter Burkett, Herman Burkett and Walter Lentz are planting the soil-building Mung beans with sorghums. Walter Burkett planted 100 pounds with 400 pounds of feed on 80 acres; Herman Burkett planted 100 pounds with 300 pounds of feed on 80 acres, and has also planted some New Era peas with other feeds. Walter Lentz has another small irrigation well and plans to use it mostly for irrigated grasses and alfalfa.

which the sprouts are obtained that are so greatly used in Chinese cooking. There isn't much of a cash crop market for these beans in this part of the country unless they are grown under contract to some Chinese cafe. Large acreages have been planted to Mung beans in the Vernon area.

Blue Panic is a good weed eradicator as is being proven on the farm of Noel Cooper, two miles east and two miles north of Key. This grass, planted last spring, is furnishing plenty of grazing and some of it is four feet tall. It is making seed and reducing the growth of tumble weeds and careless weeds.

Where the grass is up to a good stand the weeds are stunted and have a pale color, but in those spots where a good stand of the grass wasn't gotten the weeds are vigorous, large and have a healthy complexion.

V. W. McGee of Dawson County has had conservation plans written on a couple of places, his farm two miles west and two miles north and three miles west of Punkin Center.

McGee is greatly interested in building the soil on both places with Guar.

Some of the better grasses are showing up and making seed on the C. C. Cannon Ranch, six miles southeast of Key. Considerably more moisture is to be found under spots of good grass than in areas with little or no cover on the ground during the spring rains.

Joe Cannon, who is managing the ranch, has scattered some King Ranch Bluestem Seed over the place and a few of these plants have been found making good seed production. He has some KR seed that he says he may possibly plant in a field.

H. C. Sires at Grandfield in Dawson County has planted 16 acres of Blue Panic Grass in the furrows where there is Sudan up and growing that will furnish some protection against wind erosion.

This planting was in dry soil and will need a light rain to bring it up. Sires was assisted by SCS technicians and used a drill owned by the Dawson SCD. The planting was made at the rate of a pound and a half to the acre.

Alton Youngblood, east of Key, also has planted some Blue Panic in blank rows in Sudan that is about four feet high and making seed. He also will need a rain to bring it up from the now dry soil.

A great many economists have been studying the dairy problem think the quickest way for the dairymen to stop the milk-price skid is for them to butcher most of the 1,950,000 cows and heifers they have added to their herds in the last two years.

The human population has increased but so has milk production per cow.

A lot of this increase in milk production has come from daughters of superior bulls kept by artificial breeding associations, and the number of such cows going into the dairy barns is increasing. There is no reason to think that the production per cow will not also be increased.

Some say the dairymen have been waiting for beef cattle prices to advance and pull them out of the hole. The economists say this isn't likely to happen soon enough to help the dairymen dispose of surplus animals over the meat block. They reason that cattle numbers are still at the highest point in history, and that it isn't anticipated that the dairymen will lose as much by disposing of unneeded cows and heifers now as he will lose to continued low milk prices.

Say these economists in a survey conducted by Capper's Farmer: "It will be smart to sell low producers, old cows, animals with impaired udders and surplus dairy heifers this summer. The man who waits until fall will see cull beef cows from the range country flooding the market to break the price."

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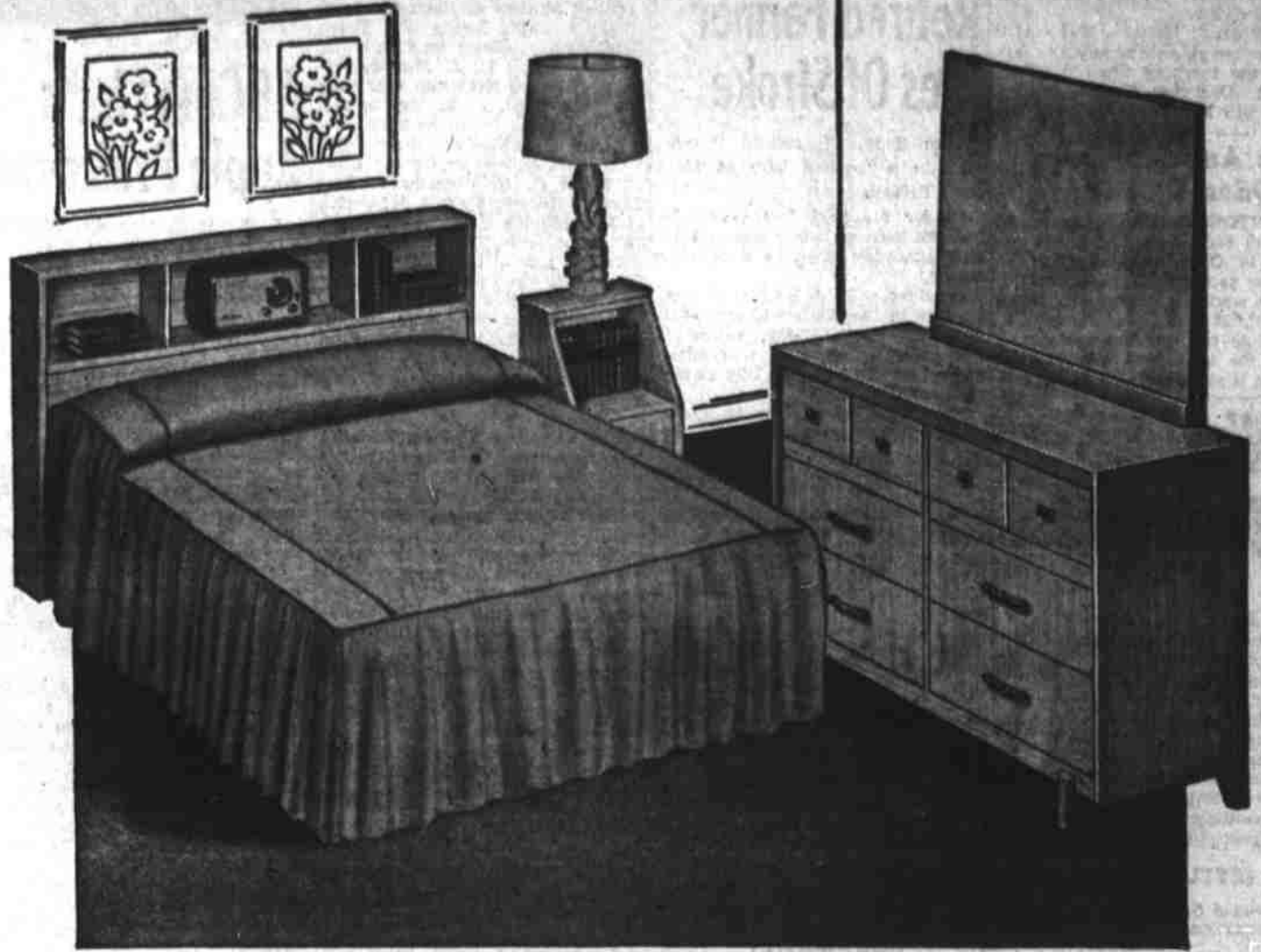
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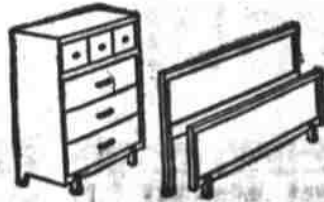

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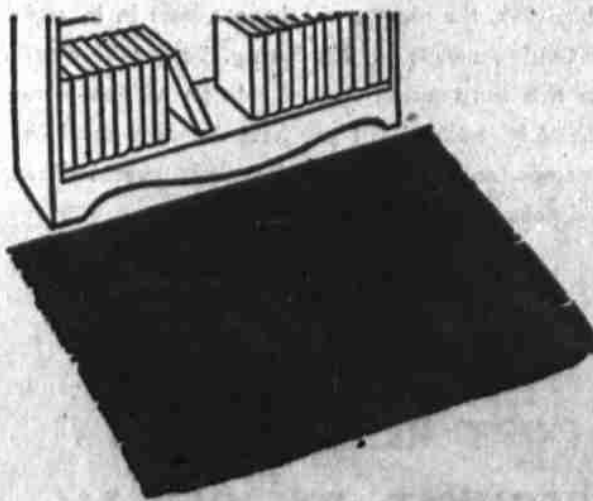

PUBLIC GENERALLY BACKS HIKE

Statewide Survey Indicates Teacher Pay Increase Varies

AUSTIN, June 19 (AP)—The pay raise that Texas teachers won after a two-year legislative struggle will add \$300 to \$400 a year to earnings of most teachers, an Associated Press survey indicates.

The survey also indicates:

1. The public generally feels the teachers rated the raise.

2. There is some resentment in areas where school taxes have been increased.

3. Most schools will not have to boost taxes to meet higher salaries.

A majority of the state's public schools were paying only the state-required minimum salary schedule this past year and will automatically pay the full \$402 increase approved by the Legislature in April.

That means most districts will continue to pay only the state minimums when the new scale goes into effect Sept. 1 coincident with the start of the school year.

Teachers in schools having the minimum will receive from \$2,805 to \$4,434, depending on length of experience and whether they hold a bachelor or master's degree.

In districts paying more than the minimum, average starting pay for teachers with bachelor's degrees will closely approach \$3,150 per year, roughly \$350 more than the state requires.

Schools in rural areas and in cities where populations are increasing only slightly or not at all probably will continue to have a hard time competing for teachers.

Most schools in such areas are paying only the state minimum.

Administrators able to offer more than the minimum generally report they are attracting more and apparently better qualified applicants than in the past.

Even men are asking for teaching jobs in elementary schools in some areas, a "most unusual" situation according to Waco Supt. E. N. Dennard.

Most districts are not finding it necessary to raise tax rates or evaluations to meet teacher payrolls for the coming year, but some are doing so to improve their program or to pay for new buildings.

For the young man or woman fresh out of college with a teaching certificate and a bachelor's degree, the big cities and the oil towns generally offer the best pay, dollarwise.

The Highland Park district in Dallas, for instance, gave almost double the increase approved by the Legislature, jumping from a minimum beginning offer of \$2,403 to \$3,203.

How to distribute the increases in the above-minimum schools produced a wide variety of salary patterns. Some boards preferred across the board raises; others wanted percentage hikes; others thought beginning salaries should be upped the most; and still others said the teachers with longest service should be rewarded with substantially larger checks.

Despite its relatively high salaries for teachers, highly industrialized Corpus Christi still feels the teacher shortage, reported Personnel Director Weldon Gibson.

In West Texas, San Angelo put the emphasis on attracting beginning teachers. The board granted the \$402 raise voted by the Legislature for each of its 350 professional personnel and then added \$196 for beginners and \$66 for a 25-year teacher with a master's degree.

That gives San Angelo a starting minimum of \$3,001 a year, while its highest paid teacher will draw \$4,500.

Supt. G. B. Wadcock thinks the new scale already is paying off. "We have gotten some excellent

applicants for jobs," he reported. Texarkana, on the minimum scale last year, was expected by Supt. H. W. Stilwell to go no higher than the new minimum this year.

One of the leaders of the Texas State Teachers Assn. fight to secure a legislative approval, Stilwell said he has had fewer applicants this year than ever before.

Palestine, also on the minimum, did not find the \$402 boost attracting any more applicants, and said the raise "simply holds the line."

The South Texas city of Victoria, trapped in a net of growth that has doubled its school population in the last five years, will be \$195 above the state schedule.

While Victoria will pay above the schedule, it was the only area in which the poll found people expressing resentment against the level of teacher salaries. Several of the old settlers told a reporter they thought "teachers are becoming unionized and don't deserve any more money."

Competition of surrounding districts which have more money has been partly responsible for forcing Victoria to pay higher salaries.

Though no other district reported any apparent resentment against higher teacher salaries, Fort Worth said there is feeling against sharply raised tax valuations.

Bryan Supt. W. R. Carmichael found the \$402 increase promoting applications from 25 or 30 semi-retired teachers who said they had "decided to re-enter teaching." He thought it would be four years before it could be told whether or not the pay raise definitely will attract new people into the profession.

Lubbock Supt. Nat Williams, who is able to offer a beginning bachelor-degree teacher \$3,300 a year as the result of a \$300 across the board increase, believed there are now more applicants in the elementary field, but less in the secondary schools. He said schools will need more teachers in secondary education in the next few years and predicted the demand will be greater than the supply.

Of 29 districts covered by the survey, nine which had been paying above the minimum last year gave increases of \$402 or more. Twelve which had been above minimum gave less than the \$402 increase but still will remain above the new minimum.

Six were on minimum and automatically gave a \$402 increase. Two which had been on minimum gave more than the \$402.

Districts paying above minimum this year will include the following (with amount of increase and new starting salary for beginning teachers with bachelor's degrees):

Edna, \$282, \$2,865; Goliad, \$402, \$3,090; Big Spring, \$402, \$3,005; Beaumont, \$402, \$3,202; South Park (Beaumont), \$402, \$3,410; San Angelo, \$398 for beginners, \$3,001; Sherman, \$402, \$3,045; Highland Park (Dallas), \$800 for beginners, \$3,203; Fort Worth, \$402, \$3,252; Midland, \$402, \$3,402; Tyler, \$402, \$3,005.

Districts covered by the survey which will continue to pay the state minimum include the following: Vernon (generally, although 19 of 100 teachers are above minimum); Denison, Bryan, Lufkin, Palestine and Marshall.

A band concert and colorful parade will be the afternoon highlight with the crowning of the queen taking place in the park that night.

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York Returns With Wide Knowledge Of Police Work

A 300-page notebook, a broader knowledge of police officering, and a plan "to see that we have a Police Department that Big Spring citizens will be proud of" describes City Police Chief E. W. York, recently returned from a 12-week study at the FBI National Academy, Washington, D. C.

York was one of 81 sheriffs, police lieutenants, captains, chiefs, and policemen that graduated from the academy in ceremonies held June 11 in Constitution Avenue's Justice Building. Officers were chosen from over the nation, on recommendations of mayors and city managers.

Among those enrolled from 48 states, Washington, D. C., and Puerto Rico were three Texans—one each from Corpus Christi and Dallas, and York.

Classes were held in Justice Building eight hours five days a week, York said. After classes he spent from three to four hours each day typing notes which he had taken in class, a requirement of the academy.

But the police chief did manage to "take off" a few times while he was there. He saw the Washington Sens play in three major league games — with Philadelphia Phillies, New York Yankees, and Boston Red Sox. Gettysburg Battle-ground, Mount Vernon, and Arlington National Cemetery were among the shrines he visited.

Main subjects studied by York during his city-sponsored \$850 training were municipal organization and administration, investigation and laboratory methods, photography, public speaking, and public relations.

When, during the last two weeks, the 81-member class broke up into specialized fields, York chose to study organization, administration, and traffic.

Instruction, he points out, was of the highest caliber, teachers being specialists in the fields of police training. Among them were professors from New York and Louisville universities.

Later on York may conduct a similar school for local policemen. "But the main objective is to put what I learned into operation," he says.

York resumes his duties Wednesday. Serving in his capacity at present is Captain M. L. Kirby, but York may be found around the city police office about any time during the day.

While in training he spent a day studying police traffic problems in Washington, D. C., Maryland, and Virginia.

"We think we've got traffic problems here in Big Spring, but they're really nothing compared with those of Eastern cities," York said. He told of being stalled in a

four-block-long 5 o'clock tie-up in Washington.

On being quizzed as to how residents tolerated such congestion, the driver replied, "Oh, after five or six months you just go crazy and it doesn't bother you any more."

Living near the National Presbyterian Church which President Eisenhower attends, York managed to see the President, surrounded by guards, emerging from his Cadillac limousine.

His training also took him to Quantico Proving Grounds, where he fired 350 to 500 rounds daily. And he got gymnastic "work-outs" in police methods at the Justice Building's gymnasium.

York also spent five days classifying fingerprints in the FBI's laboratories.

"I'm really glad to be back home," he says. "Washington is a wonderful place, but not for a small-town man like me!"

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People Too Prone To Rap Business, Speaker Says

FORT WORTH — Business has every right to expect full cooperation of government since it is estimated that business and industry collects 75 per cent of all the taxes paid to government, Vice President Relea Doe of Safeway Stores, Inc., said at the 75th Anniversary dinner of the Texas Press Association Friday night.

"Let us not forget that a corporation is a creature of government," Doe said. "As such, it can be manipulated by government, but it should not be harassed by its parent."

He added that for many years government evidently forgot one old adage "Don't bite the hand that's feeding you."

That was one of the "Three Little Adages and How They Grew," which was the subject of Doe's address.

In emphasizing that "A little learning is a dangerous thing" Doe said that people are prone to accept rumor and propaganda as fact and because of that "for some time the businessman was the whipping boy for those who would obscure the real culprit in our economy. The plan was to keep the 'heat' on business so that the public would forget the wastes and the political maneuvering of the real culprit, which was Federal profligacy through a socialistic type of machination that by taxation was destroying the incentive to succeed."

Although the dollars-and-cents profit of business seems large, the percentage-wise profit has been very much smaller than formerly, he pointed out, and as a result the customer gets more and better products at less in-between costs.

"Everyone, apparently does not understand this," Doe said. "For instance in 1945 the Psychological Corporation survey revealed that only 15 per cent of those interviewed knew that corporation profits nationwide averaged considerably less than 10 cents on each dollar of sales. Eighteen per cent thought it exceeded 50 cents on the dollar."

"Those who think and preach that profits are too high are never caught telling the fact that the average profit on all business from 1930 to 1950 was less than two cents on the sales dollar. Specifically, if our company had sold each dollar of sales at 98 cents the company would have lost money every year for 20 years. If all our profits had been given away for the past 19 years it would have reduced our selling prices by but 1.4 per cent."

Another phobia which needs clarifying, Doe said, is the charge that little business suffers during a wartime economy. "Big business gets many huge wartime contracts because they are equipped to do the job," he said, "but little business does not suffer thereby. A January 1954 report of the Specialists Council in the Pentagon shows that small firms handle 56 per cent of the Army procurement dollar."

Doe urged that through research, survey and study that the facts be obtained, "then shout out the remedies."

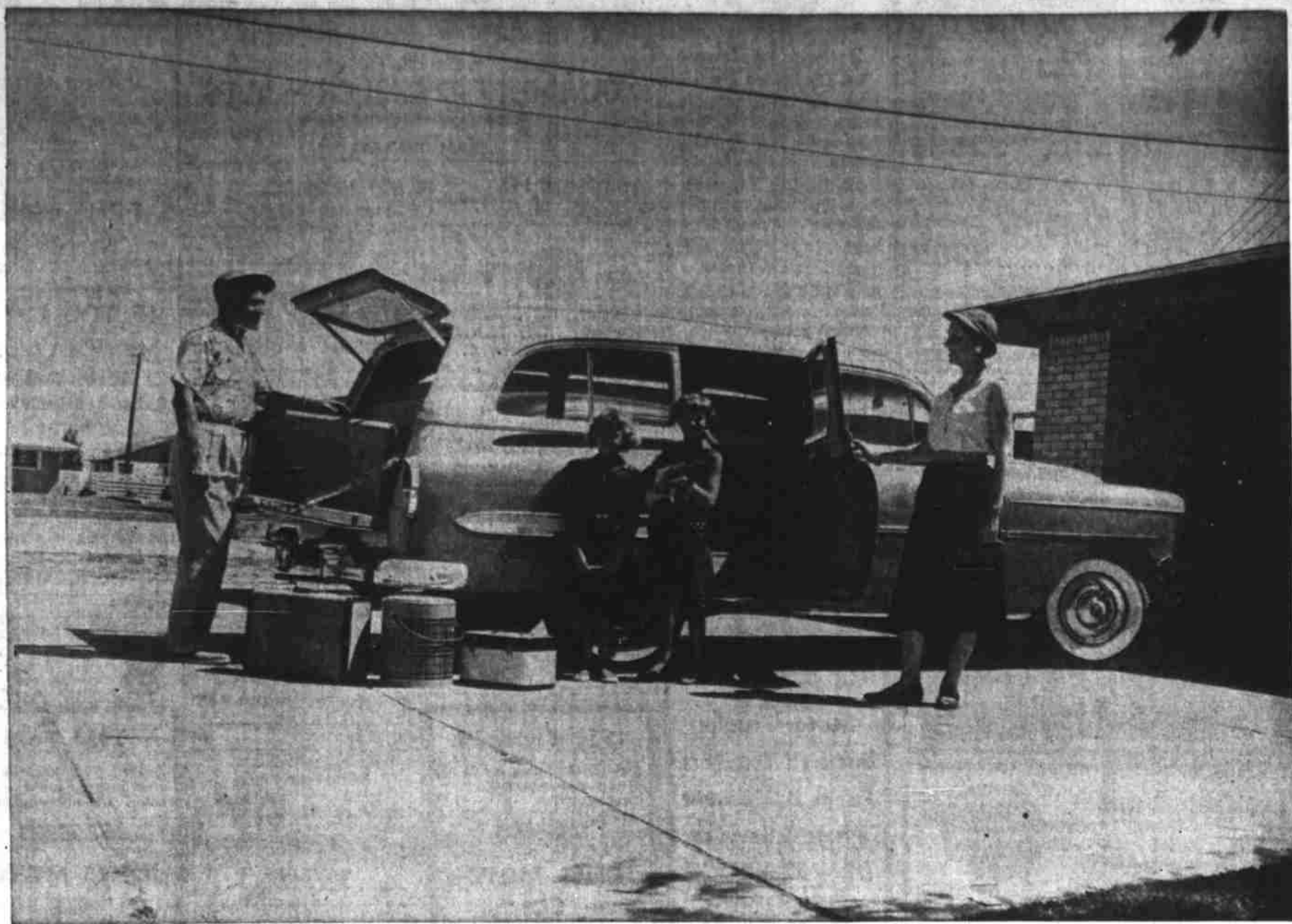

CAB Board Backs Area Air Merger

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Bureau of Air Operations of the Civil Aeronautics Board, has recommended approval for the Continental Air Lines plan to take over Pioneer Air Lines.

V. Rock Grundman, counsel for the bureau, Friday said that if the CAB doesn't approve of this, a merger of Continental with Braniff Airways should be found in the public interest.

He said a Continental-Pioneer merger would result in savings of \$27,000 a year and said it would not alter the competitive route structure in the area nor create a monopoly.

A brief by Grundman said the merger would eliminate competition in just four markets, Albuquerque - Houston, Albuquerque - Midland, Albuquerque-Santa Fe, and Albuquerque-San Angelo.

He said this would be more than compensated for by the establishment of competition in two of American Airlines markets—Dallas-El Paso and El Paso-Fort Worth—and six of Braniff's—San Antonio-Houston, San Antonio-Fort Worth, San Antonio-Amarillo, San Antonio - Waco, Houston - Denver, and Houston-Colorado Springs.

County Judge R. H. Weaver said officials probably will start the acquisition of right-of-way and negotiation of the access agreements Monday.

Other deeds for the right-of-way are expected in the next few days. Funds from the issuance of \$325,000 road bond issue arrived here during the week. The bond money will be used to purchase roadway and relocate buildings and other structures.

The completion of right-of-way from Big Spring to the Mitchell County line will clear the way for freeway construction completely across the county. Contracts have been let for part of the project.

Wall St. Prices Show Strength

NEW YORK, June 19 (AP)—The stock market gave a defiant show of strength this week in a recovery drive that sent it to new peaks since 1929.

The performance elated the bulls and confused the bears who had expected the market to at least make a test of the lows before driving forward.

Two weeks ago the market on average forged ahead to new highs for the year and the best levels since October of 1929.

Then came the smash last week, the worst fall in four years. Before that week was out, some slight recovery had been managed.

That left the market in a position to go through an orthodox consolidation movement, perhaps dropping back in another reaction to see whether buying support would come to the rescue.

But the market did nothing of the kind. On Tuesday it rallied strongly with high-priced railroads providing leadership. That rally continued with diminished strength the rest of the week sending the Associated Press average of 60 stocks up to another new high for the year.

Many had assigned as a cause for the break the worsening situation in Indochina and the gradual breakup in the Geneva conference. But this week those same situations continued.

That strengthened the position of those who stoutly maintained that the break was a technical reaction. Therefore, they reasoned, this week's recovery must also have a technical genesis which, they said, was nothing more than sound values based on an improving economic outlook in the United States.

Airmen at Webb Air Force Base who meet eligibility requirements will be able to take qualifying examinations for entrance into the United States Military Academy (West Point).

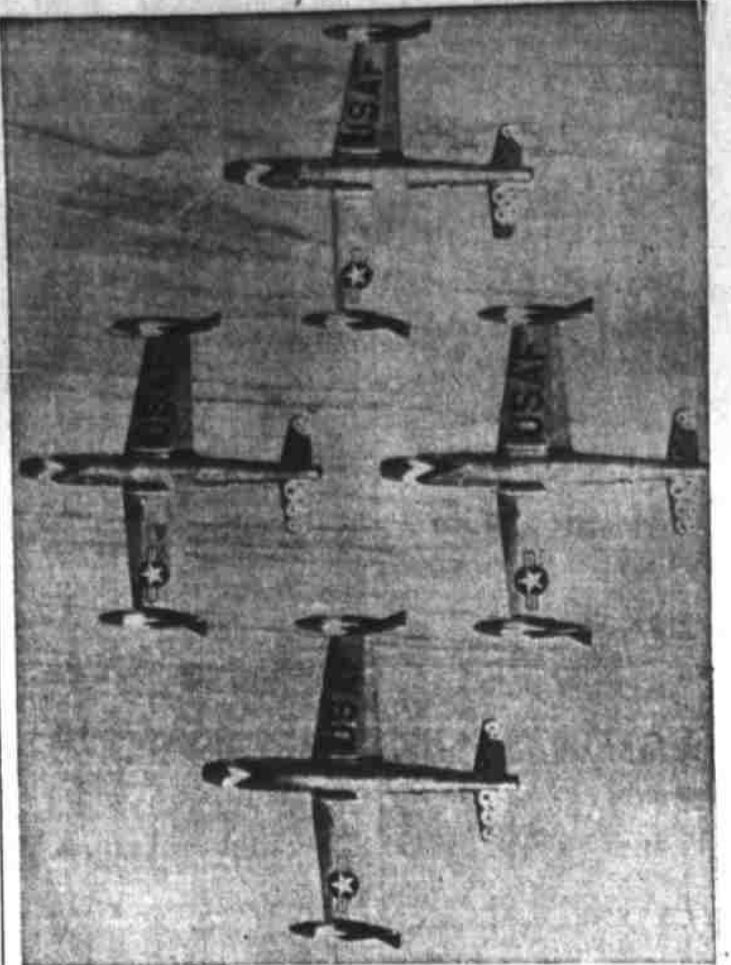
Applications must be submitted by Monday. Qualification examinations will be given on July 12.

Late Planted Gardens Can Still Prosper

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. — Late starters in vegetable gardening still have a chance to make good in the big annual backyard vitamin sweepstakes.

About this time of year certain members of the frostbite brigade among Green Thumbers come around showing justifiable pride in their early crops. Some of these characters seem to get a certain pleasure out of taunting their less forehanded neighbors.

You had your reasons for not starting earlier. Wet grounds, spring fever and just plain indolence are pretty fair excuses. The big idea now is to get in there and dig to see if you can have the last laugh.

Often there are good reasons for starting the garden late. One of these is to make your planting so fresh vegetables will be ready after you return from your vacation. How many times have you seen vacationers return in mid-summer to find the sweet corn dried up, beans rattling in their pods, waist-high seed stalks on the lettuce?

With just a little planning and no more than the usual amount of work, you can have a fall garden that can well make your early bird run for cover. The big danger of course, is that frost may overtake your crops, and so you have to first make sure you know the average date of the earliest killing frost in your locality. Knowing this, and the length of time it

takes for each vegetable to mature, you can go ahead and plant.

Let's say you can expect frost Oct. 1. Some pole lima beans take as long as 90 days to make a crop from the time the seed starts to grow. This means that you can plant your limas as late as the end of June and be safe.

Many vegetables mature in much less time. Carrots, for example, can be expected to make good roots in 70 to 75 days. Swiss chard needs about 50 days from seed to use; collards about 65 days; early beets, 50 days; snap beans, 50 to 60 days.

Experienced gardeners have a timetable something like this in mind when they make several plantings of a crop to be sure of a continuous supply.

There are a couple of tricks to keep in mind when planting the late garden. Charles H. Nissley, specialist in vegetable growing at Rutgers, suggests that when you cover your seed, add soil to half the depth of the furrow, then tamp it down. Now draw loose soil into the furrow, and if your soil has a tendency to bake hard, cover with a thin layer of grass clippings over the furrow to keep it moist.

If time becomes important, you can speed germination a little by using a starter solution. This is made by mixing a cupful of 5-10-5 fertilizer in 12 quarts of water. Let



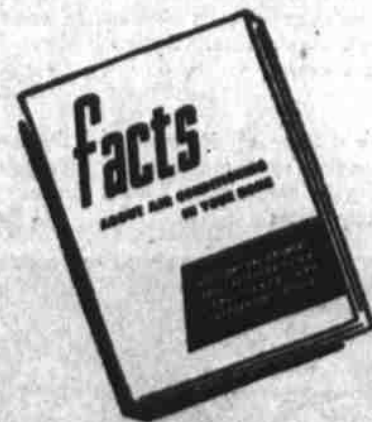

You will get more satisfaction from your room air conditioner when you follow these suggestions. Remember, too, that operating cost is governed by hours of use. Turn your unit off when you expect to be away for several hours. You can quickly lower the temperature when you return.
