



Biologists Meet Problems Of Bats in the Belfry'

Bothered by "bats in the belfity?" That's one of the problems—literally—confronting Tech biologists Dr. William W. Milstead and Dr. Donald W. Tinkle.

THE TWO MEN, working on a government grant from the National Institute of Health, are studying the natural history and habits of Southwestern bats.
The study is directed by Dr. R. W. Strandtmann, Tech professor of biology.
The Tech researchers have been successful in banding and studying bats found in several South Plains and Panhandle communities, particularly a colony of the small mammels making their home in the First Methodist Church "belfry" and school gym in McAdoo, about 60 miles east of Lubbock.


