

Elmer "The Great" Tarbox ... plus ... G. L. "Country" Webb ... equals ... Raider Second Touchdown Against Loyola



(Editor's note: This sequence is interpreted from right to left instead of the usual left to right.) The above, last picture in sequence, shows G. L. "Country" Webb racing over the Wolves goal-line for the Raiders second touchdown of the day against Loyola university's Wolfpack. He has just completed a 20 yard gallop, evading the referee, as shown in the next picture, and several visiting Loyolans. How Webb managed to escape both referee and tackler is still a mystery to the 8,000 hysterical fans who witnessed Tech's eight consecutive win. Preceding Webb's pass catching and running feat was Elmer Tarbox's ground gaining spree, shown in picture number three from the right in it's final stages. Elmer has that straight arm protection out there but it wasn't enough to halt the determined Loyola tackler who downed him after Tarbox picked up several yards. Breaking away into the clear, Tarbox is shown in picture number four from the right, leading the way for several befuddled Loyola linemen. He has the edge on them in this action shot and went on for several yards more before tackled as shown in the centerpicture. In the extreme left hand corner shot, Tarbox has just received a short zone pass from the accurate throwing arm of Gene Barnett and is getting ready to open his ground-gaining jaunt that was climaxed in the next play by Webb, who scored on a second pass. The two plays netted a total yardage of 55 yards as the drive initiated on Tech's own 45 yard stripe. This touchdown ended scoring for the first half as the Raider scoring machine came to an abrupt halt until the third period when 13 more points were added. In the fourth quarter the Raiders clicked in every department to run the final score up to 55-0 over the hapless visitors from New Orleans. The victory was Tech's second over 'Moon' Mullins' squad who downed them in 1936 while Tech avenged that loss last year by 28 to 0 in New Orleans.

Flowers Lectures On Tragedies To Sock And Buskin

"In His Night On Taos," Maxwell Anderson introduced a new form of tragedy—to let the tragedy happen to a man's idea instead of the man," said Richard Flowers in an address to the Sock and Buskin dramatic club recently. His lecture was titled "Maxwell Anderson and Tragic Traditions."

Flowers stated that tragedy was rooted deep in the hearts of all theatre lovers and that a good tragedy should make a play goer feel all the emotions and desires of the characters. There are two ideas in tragedy, life and truth. If one has the truth, then he must die.

He traced the tradition of tragedy to 5000 B. C. when the first formal tragedies were introduced to modern times after the World War. Aristotle was responsible for the tragedy character who was always a nobleman who was perfect in every way but let some human perfection wreck his life.

"Elizabeth the Queen" was the first poetic tragedy after the World War and Broadway did not know how to take it. Flowers pointed out that we were living when a very important change occurred in dramatic tragedy.
