# Arizona Looms As Certain Winner In Border Meet Today

## Track Coach Expects Case, Cowan To Win

### Strong Raider Golf Team Enters Border Circuit Matches At Tucson

TODAY in Tucson, Ariz., Tech will soon discover how they stand in Border conference track, golf and tennis competition.

If Arizona university is true to form on the cinder track, there won't be any Bold Ventures representing Tech, forging ahead of the touted Arizona favorites. But the Matadors, longshots to win the conference track title, will be 100-1 shots that will come through with flying colors in the pole vault and the two mile in record breaking time.

#### Over Thirteen Feet

Maurice Cowan is one of Tech's longshots. Arizona doesn't know it, but the Tech vaulter has bettered by one foot, any mark made by any other conference competitor this spring. The conference record is 12 feet and nine inches, but Cowan made 13 feet six in trying competition at the Drake Relays. If he is pushed, which is doubtful, the Tech ace may make his goal, 14 feet.

The other longshot that the rest of the conference hasn't heard about is the Almon flash, John Case. The greatest two miler in the Southwest today is the name attached to the lean Matador marmarathon runner.

#### Faces Competition

The two mile is expected to fall and fall hard. The time is 10:30 something, but the Raider runner has already clipped 40 seconds from that time. But unlike Cowan, Case will have competition in the Blue Brigade's captain, Larry Davis.

Davis holds the present two mile and mile records. But the Arizona's specialty is the mile which he does in 4:28. He has been clocked at 10:13.5 in the two mile. However, the time made by Arizona may help establish a record better than Case himself ever thought of making in the Border meet.

#### What Other Chances?

There are practically no other shots that the Raiders will possibly cop. Case is entered in the mile run, but probably won't get more than second. His best time in the mile is 4:36.

With Brashear and Jordan running the 440 in 55 flat, not more than third or fourth can be expected in that event. Arizona will take the first three places, if not all four. In the 100 yard dash, New Mexico university's Linder and Arizona's Carl Risner, the present century champ, will battle for the first two places.

#### Guzick Shows Promise

The 120 high hurdles will go to Arizona and Tempe State. Tempe will take the first two places and Arizona has the next best times. Clyde Jarrett of Arizona, who has been making the 880 in 1:57.6 and even lower won't have any competition. Reginald Jordan's best time is 2:10, hardly sufficient to tie place with Arizona, Tempe and Flagstaff strong in the middle distances.

Frank Guzik has been giving the discus plenty of trouble in practice. The big Sherman Jew has tossed the discus as much as 125 feet which may be enough to place. In the high jump both Keahey and Stout may place. However, Arizona's star high jumper and Neagle of Flagstaff have been jumping six feet or more consistently.

Harry Jordan and Marshall Gordon will face a bear in the U of A's (See ARIZONA, page 4)
