WEST FIELD PRORATION CHANGED Poison Sufficient To Kill

Majors Fear New Drilling Will Result

Producers Meet In Fort Worth With Railroad Commission

FORT WORTH-The average potential basis of proration in the western end of the Howard and Glamcock County field was abolished and a compromise plan of establishing allowable two-thirds on straight potential and one-third on acreage was recommended to the Railroad Commission at a conservation hearing held here Friday in the Texas Hotel.

R. D. Parker, chief supervisor of the rail and gas division, presided. Much discussion resolved around special water allowances in the field and the present rated potential, resulting in formation of an operators' committee which will disseminate producing problems through a subcommittee of engi-

Under the existing conservation order in the area, the western por-tion of the field is prorated strict-40-acre units with only mar ginal allowance permitted from all

Patman plans to offer a resolution giving the bill special status. Hainey, Illinois, democratic floor leader, predicted the rules committee would kill the resolution.

WASHINGTON (A) - The house ways and means committee reaf-firmed yesterday's unfavorable report on the proposal to pay veter-ans the bonus with two billion dollars of new currency. The action was taken because under the rules, any member voting with the major-ity has the right to ask reconsideration the following day. None asked. The situation now is even if the measure is brought to the house by a discharge petition, and even if it passed there it would be too late for action by the senate.
