

Red Raiders Win Dummy Game From WTSTC Friday, 18-6

Return Drill At Canyon Friday

Using four full teams, Coach Pete Cawthon's Red Raiders Friday night "defeated" West Texas State, 18 to 6, in a dummy game on Tech field.

Friday night, Tech will journey to Canyon to return the scrimmage.

The teams scrimmaged for 90 minutes before calling it quits. Reserves battled for the first 20 minutes without result as far as scoring is concerned, ending all even when two more squads took the field.

Eight plays after changing teams, Tech's Red Amoneit and Don Austin, last year's Picador touchdown twins, teamed with Tom Douglass to score. Douglass crossed the line from two yards out after Amoneit and Austin had worked the ball into scoring position.

Thompson Takes It

Blazing Bill Thompson took over for the Buffaloes then, and worked some neat pass plays to set up the only Buff score. After heaving to Bill Parks for 30-yards and a first down on Tech's six, Thompson carried for the score in two tries.

Charley Dvoracek accounted for the second Raider touchdown by smashing over from the two after Roger Smith had put the ball deep in Buff territory with a 14-yard pass to Francis Bingham and a couple of nice end runs.

A Practice Continues

A long pass, Milton Hill to Lloyd Neely, good for 63-yards and a third touchdown, finished the evening's scoring.

Regular practice sessions are set for this week. The 16th drill of the season was finished yesterday afternoon.

One casualty was recorded in Friday night's scrimmage. Jess Cornell, triple-threat West Texas State half-back, broke an arm on the game's second play.

Locke Fourth In 110-Yard Hurdles

EL PASO, April 16—Bauman Roper leaped to 6 feet 2 1/2 inches in the high jump to register five points of the six Texas Tech acquired in the Southwestern Relays here Saturday. Lewis Locke came in fourth in the 110-yard high hurdles for the other point.

Tech's track team, 13 strong, goes to Abilene today for their first dual meet of the season with Abilene Christian.

Coach Earl Huffman's Red Raiders, hounded by hard luck, lost chances at several other points. The quarter-mile relay came in fourth but was disqualified when officials ruled that J. R. Caldwell and James Foster did not pass the baton in the required distance.

Bobby Holms was leading his heat by a good two yards in the 100 yard dash preliminaries when he strained a leg muscle and was forced to pull out of the race.

Howard Payne won the meet with 30 points to 29 1/2 for Arizona State of Tempe, finishing first in the mile relay to come from behind and capture the title.

Minor Stars In Track

Olton Wins Title In League Meet

Despite sterling individual performances by Max Minor of Tahoka that netted him first places in four events, Olton's Mustangs won the District Three schoolboy track crown on Tech field Saturday, displacing Lubbock's Westerners for the first time in four years.

Olton, adding plenty of second, third and fourth place points to their first place finish in the mile relay, counted 25 points to 20 for Tahoka's one-man team. Registering only 13 points, Lubbock tumbled to third.

Minor established a new meet record in 220-yard low hurdles, turning in a 25.2 performance in Friday's preliminaries. He twice tied the 17-year old century dash mark of 10 seconds flat, once in the preliminaries and again in winning the finals.

He won the 220-yard dash in 23.1 seconds, three-tenths of a second slower than the district record he set last year. In the broad jump he won first with a leap of 21 feet 5 inches.

Olton's twins, Willard and Willis Hedges ran the final two laps on the mile relay team, coming from far behind to edge out Lubbock and Lockney. Both placed in several other events, but won no other firsts.

Mariam A. Ferguson: Jim himself, as proxy for Ma, is "an old war horse," has a "vest pocket vote," is a personal issue on political veneration and vindication, could get sufficient campaign money, Ma's personal appearance speech-making not necessary, formerly known and generally admitted as liberal; a gainst "them" (Ma and Jim) is their age, third term, gross receipts or sales tax, tactical urge of the legislature to pass O'Daniel-sponsored SJR-12.

Jerry Sadler: Is rambunctious commoner, stiff and diligent campaigner, fearless, for a "compromise" and middle-of-the-road resources tax probably has a campaign roll big enough to choke a mule; his political ambitions are premature, is slightly scarred with rumblings of business and official activities, hard and unforgiving in political tangles, leans heavily on cousin Harley.

Albert Derden: Unquestionably honest, is personally talking with many voters, a stand-patter and guardian of "the people's interest," has good radio voice, positively declared himself on an all-inclusive platform "to be lived up to for benefit of all citizens," a legislator versed in statecraft, respected and liked by members of the legislature; has only very limited campaign help, is without political organization, is not generally known, just plain and honest.

Of the straw-vote write-in gubernatorial possibilities, Jerry Mann heads the list. A. B. Cy-cione Davis, although an announced candidate, has had few votes. Others announced and possible candidates for Governor have received only a negligible vote.

Other state candidates, in prospect, may stir into action, and developments occur CAPITOL COLUMN will present weekly counts and comments on the present and new candidates.
