REGARDING APPROPRIATIONS

According to appropriations made by the Texas legislature, Texas Technological college received \$308, 907.65 in appropriations for the next academic year, according to Senator Arthur P. Duggan. The percentage change was 27.8. The per capita appropriation amounts to \$165 in contrast with \$230 of last year.

In commenting upon the appropriation, Senator Duggan said: "That institution, now in its eighth year, has grown to be the second largest of the state educational institutions. Approximately one-third of the students there are taking technological courses. In my judgment, a student attending that institution is entitled to as much appropriation as a student attending any other institution in the state taking exactly the same courses."
