

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the three floors will be raised into-place. The \$1,000,000 building has been divided into three sections ,east and west, which are approximately the same size, and the center sec-tion, which is about one third the size of the end sections. It will have five floors. Lifting of the roof and the 425 ton floor sections is done by the Lift Slab Corporation using a pat-ented process by which jacks are installed on the columns with two giant bolts attached to the jacks on each side of the column. Lift-ing speed is regulated by a master control operated by on man with connections to each jack.

control operated by on man with connections to each jack. **STEEL COLLARS** are welded onto the column to hold the slab after the slab is raised into place while the jack holds it. According to Charles Harper of Butler-Kim-mel Architects, this precaution eliminates any possibility of the slab falling. The roof raising will take some eight hours. Completion of the lifting process will take ap-proximately 30 days.
