this so-called technicality the charge was dropped. Still another case involved an accident in which the driver
of one car collided with another car, causing injury to the driver
in the second car. The case was appealed to a higher court after
the driver in the first car was convicted. In this higher court he was leleared when the fact was brought forth that he didn't
actually strike the other driver, but hit the car, which caused
 an effort to bring our laws up-to-date. As long as the laws
stand as they are, criminals will continue to take advantage of the situation. Every time a crime goes unpunished as a result of such trivial technicalities, liberty dies a little.
