



### Revisions Planned For Constitution

Two proposed revisions of the Tech Student association constitution will be voted on in the general election April 8, said Jim McGraw, chairman of the Student council constitutional revision committee.

Section 500 of Article V has been revised to read: There shall be a general election on the second Wednesday in April of each spring semester for the purpose of electing all Student association officers, representatives and yell leaders.

Election date would thereby be changed to Wednesday, since there is a larger enrollment for MWF classes and publicity for the election could be given in the Tuesday Toreador, he said.

New Sections -Added
Second of the proposed revisions is that section 507 of article V be replaced with two new sections, 507-A and 507-B, to clarify nomination procedure. Section 507-A will read: Any person desiring to be nominated as a Student association executive officer or yell leader, shall, at least two weeks before the general election, present a petition to the President announcing his intention to run for the office. Each petition, unless otherwise provided in this constitution, must be signed by at least 5 per cent of the members of the association based on total enrollment figures of the current semester as furnished by the registrar.

Section 507-B contains the same wording as section 302, article III, which would be removed from the constitution. The article will state: Representatives to the council shall, at least two weeks before the general election, present a petition to the president announcing his intention to run for the office.

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

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### Tech Thinclads Finish Fift In University Class at Meet

The Raider Track team placed in six events to finish fifth in the University Track and Field meet held Friday and Saturday at Fort Worth.

SMU won the university divi-sion with 55% points. Houston was second with 32 points and Arkansas and Baylor tied for third with 15 points each. Tech was able to muster 10 points to finish fifth.

Jerry Fairley finished second in the 220-yard dash. Buddy Goode of SMU won the event with a time of 22.2.

Jim Farrell placed third in the 120-yard high hurdles. Val Joe Walker of SMU won this event with a record time of 14.1.

Don Covey leaped 21 feet 7 inches to finish third in the broad

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Bobby Cavazos tied for fourth place in the high jump with Rodney Guidry of SMU at 5 feet 6 inches. Jerry Norton of SMU and Bob McFarland of TCU tied for first place with jumps of 5 feet 10 inches.

Tech's 440-yard and mile relay teams both finished fourth, giving Tech a total of 10 points for the meet.

Tech competed Saturday without Sonny Stanford, Bobby Hawkins, Bill Killough and Ben Wilson, all of whom were dropped from the squad Friday morning for training rule infractions.

The Tech swimming team was decisively beaten by the Southern Methodist aquatic group and Texas A&M list week.
