Rainer Wins **Top Position** In First Vote

Glenn Rainer, Lubbock business dministration junior, was electI president of the Student Ascleation Wednesday, April 14, inst vote in recent years at Tech.
Boosted by a spirited election tilly the preceding night and days
vigorous campaigning, the genral elections drew more than 2,30 students to the four campus olls.

An estimated 45 per cent of the eligible student body participated in the voting, compared to about 20 per cent last year.

Excitement and anticipation ran high in the Student Union Building on the election night as a large crowd, including most of the candidates, waited until after 10 p.m. watching the tabulations as the votes were counted.

Rainer, who has served as a member of the student council for two years, led the race for president with 1,128 votes which was a clear majority over the other two candidates. Cary Kennedy of Pampa was runner-up with 964 votes; Kate Brown of Lubbock polled 144.

In the race for secretary, Gwen Williams of Lubbock defeated Danna Stamper of Dallas by a vote of 1,580 to 621. Melvin Deardorff, sophomore, of 1996 14th St. was unopposed for business manager.
