



Raiders Slated To Appear In All-College

Arkansas Named As First Foe For Tech

Seventh Annual Classic To Be Held December 28, 29, 30

THE TEXAS Tech Red Raiders have been invited to attend the seventh annual All-College basketball tournament in Oklahoma City December 28, 29 and 30. The Oklahoma Aggies will, as usual, act as host team. West Texas State was the only other Border Conference team receiving an invitation to the tourney, and are the defending champions.

Due to transportation difficulties, no official acceptance has been forwarded to the hosts from Tech officials.

Baylor, Texas University, Texas Christian, Rice Institute, and Texas Wesleyan complete the list of Lone Star State teams invited to attend. Arkansas is the remaining Southwest Conference team slated to be present at the dribble derby.

The Baylor Bears will meet the Southeastern Savages from Durant to begin the 1942 extravaganza. In the three days following this game basketball fans of Oklahoma City, and the surrounding district, are due to see 23 games of the fastest basketball in the seven year history of the tourney.

Southwestern of Winfield, Kansas, a strong quintet, will tie into the Pittsburgh, Kansas Teachers in the second game of the tourney. The Pittsburgh team was winner of the 1940 tournament.

Things will become much warmer for the afternoon session opening day, when Border Conference clashes with Southwest Conference. The West Texas State Buffaloes, "the world's tallest team," clash with the Texas Christian Horned Frogs in the Buffs' opening game in defense of their 1941 title.

Arkansas, which figures to be right up at the top in the Southwest flag chase, also appears at the afternoon show. It will again be the Border Conference against Southwest Conference, as the Texas Tech Red Raiders, always a threat, take to the floor to give contest to the mighty Razorbacks.

The big event for Oklahoma fans, naturally, is the debut of the Aggies of Stillwater, bigger and better than ever this year. The Farmers will trot out on the court to face the Springfield, Missouri Teachers in the 9 p.m. encounter.

Expected to draw as much attention is the first appearance of the Rice Owls, high-ranking team in the national lists last year and expected to be even better this season. The Owls have a date with the Warrensburg, Missouri Teachers, champions of the 1938 tournament.

To spice the evening bill, Texas Wesleyan, one of the hottest little teams in Texas last season, will engage the Navy Zoomers from the aviation training base at Norman.

The tourney is a double-game elimination affair. The first day will knock half of the teams from the winners' bracket, but not from the tourney. First game losers will drop into the consolation bracket, and a champion will be crowned in each of the two brackets.

Creighton Dropped From List Of Foes

Athletic Director Morley Jennings announced the Texas Tech 1943 football schedule Tuesday. Four Southwest conference teams, four Border conference clubs, and two strong Oklahoma aggregations are listed on the schedule and one game remains to be scheduled.

Tulsa University, the Southwest's only undefeated, untied team in 1942 and its representative to the Sugar bowl New Year's day, is the only newcomer to the schedule.

Creighton University was the only 1942 opponent not listed. The new schedule will not only give the Red Raiders opportunity to show their skill to Southwest conference teams, but will also qualify them for the Border conference crown again.

New Physical Education Plan Coming

Tech To Be Key Center In New Victory Program

Jennings, Langford Return From Austin With Instructions

Texas Tech will be a key center in the Victory physical education program, as headquarters for the widespread high school set-up, Mrs. Johnnie G. Langford announced Monday following her return from the physical institute in Austin.

Tech will also be one of the Texas colleges and universities which will put into effect the new physical fitness program of the national health and emergency service of civilian defense, she said.

Mrs. Langford, who attended the institute with Morley Jennings, head of the men's department of physical education, said she was favorably impressed with the co-

operation of health officers, school officials, and physical education instructors with army, navy, and air corps representatives who attended.

This institute brought together a faculty of civilians and military men for one of the first, if not the first, convention of its kind in Texas, she said.

Three delegates from the army, three from the navy, and one from the air corps occupied prominent places on the program of the convention and informed physical education representatives that efficiency in the armed forces is seriously impaired by physical disabilities and poor health of enlistees.

They praised the value of the program that is planned and asked it be carried to the nth degree by schools affected, Mrs. Langford said.

The program is expected to begin on the Tech campus about the

middle of January when an institute for West Texas high school physical education teachers is to be held here. Mrs. Langford announced the state department of education will notify the college of definite dates and the work to be explained in the institute.

The college plan is expected to be put into effect soon afterward, with physical education departments, home economics division and health services to cooperate in insuring good health and physical fitness for college students.

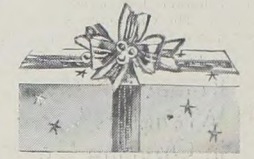
