

Dr. Jones Named 6th President

Commencement Exercises Scheduled For 643 Members of Class of 1953

Approximately 643 members of the class of 1953 will be graduated in commencement exercises at 8 p.m. Monday in Jones Stadium.

Lewis D. Crusoe, vice president of the Ford Motor company and general manager of the Ford Division, Dearborn, Mich., will be commencement speaker.

Graduating seniors and their families are invited to a reception at 5 p.m. Sunday in the president's home.

The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered by Dr. Granville T. Walker, minister of the University Christian Church, Fort Worth, at 8 p.m. Sunday in Jones Stadium.

The class includes 505 undergraduate and graduate students who completed requirements in May, and 138 who finished their work in January.

The Arts and Sciences Division leads the other four undergraduate and one graduate division in the number of degrees being conferred with a total of 155. Engineering is second with 108, Business Administration third with 98, Agriculture fourth with 76, the Graduate Division next with 42, and Home Economics last with 26.

The second and third earned doctorates and the last professional degree in engineering will be awarded at the exercises. Miss Patricia Fain, Lubbock, is due to receive the first doctorate in chemistry. Miss Fain is the first Techsan to receive a Ph.D. from her alma mater.

B. Arnold Reed, Nimrod, head of the San Angelo College history department, will receive the first Ph.D. in American Civilization. Dr. Estus Polk, Santa Anna, a member of the Texas Christian University faculty, was awarded the first earned doctorate in August, 1952. His degree was in English.

Charles O. Bondurant, Midland, has earned the last professional degree in engineering from Tech. This degree is for practicing engineers who bring a problem encountered in industry to the Tech campus where the problem is solved and written in a thesis. Tech To Award Three Honoraries

Three honorary doctors of law degrees will be conferred during the May commencement exercises of the 1953 graduating class.

Recipients of the degrees will be two Texans and a Missourian. Tech's Board of Directors has approved the honorary degrees for Tech's immediate past president, Dr. D. M. Wiggins; Governor Dan Thornton, an ex-student of Tech and present governor of Colorado; and Fred G. Gurley, president of the Santa Fe Railway Co.

These three degrees will bring to 11 the total number awarded by the college in its 27-year history.

Dr. Wiggins, who resigned last spring as president of Tech, had previously been president of Texas Western College. He is now a vice-president of a local bank.

Mr. Gurley, born in Sedalia, Mo., has served as trustee of the University of Southern California, the Museum of Science and Industry, and Midwest Research Institute. He has been associated with Northwestern University, and the University of Chicago. He holds membership in numerous clubs, both local and national.

Further information on Governor Thornton was unavailable at the Monday deadline.

Rites Include Address By Smith, Jones

Addresses at the inauguration were made by Dr. Henry Nash Smith, professor of American Studies of the University of Minnesota, and by Dr. E. N. Jones, installed as the sixth president of Tech.

Dr. Smith was introduced by Dr. D. M. Wiggins, past president of Tech, who commented in a light moment that Dr. Smith would be welcome to come to Lubbock any time that he could bring with him the rain that had caused the transfer of the ceremonies from the Administration Building green to the First Baptist Church.

In his speech, Dr. Smith commented on the social changes in America that have caused institutions of higher learning to grow more rapidly than in Europe, where such institutions evolved over periods of centuries. He pointed out that in 1890 the South Plains area of Texas had only about 1 person per square mile. It is to be expected, he said, that a college established in an area which has grown so fast would be expected to concentrate on branches of applied science directly related to economic development. Such a college, he asserted, is under pressure "to assume that what is practical is that which pays off."

Wars have nourished the emphasis on natural sciences, he said, since war is "the most notoriously practical of all human undertakings." He stated that "the tendency to bet everything on natural science is dangerous to American society." The nation must rely, he further stated, on humanistic scholarship as well as on technology.

Dr. Smith emphasized the need for artists and critics as well as for scientists. He also discussed the public suspicion of state-supported colleges, indicated by the controversies over loyalty oaths.

Dr. Jones took as the theme of his address the ideal of "righteous dissatisfaction." He interpreted the ideal with the poem "Higher", which has become familiar to Tech audiences.

Dr. Jones charged that the nation is in danger of spiritual dissolution which, he stated, could be more destructive than the A-bomb or the H-bomb. Man, he asserted, demands rights, seeks

privileges, but shuns responsibilities. He proposed that the traditional speech awarding degrees "and all the rights and privileges pertaining thereto" be altered to include "responsibilities."

The new president asked the question "How can we bring together sciences and humanities?" He advocated the inclusion of liberal courses in technical curricula as an answer.

He suggested that the old issue of "liberal versus vocational education" should become "liberal education balanced by vocational education."

Dr. Edward Newlon Jones was officially declared to be sixth president of Texas Tech in inauguration ceremonies held at 9 a.m. yesterday in the sanctuary of the First Baptist Church.

The inauguration, scheduled to be held on the green behind the Administration Building, was moved to the church because of rain which began early in the morning.

The service began with a procession composed of the inaugural marshals, representatives of the Student Association, representatives of the Ex-Students Association, the Tech faculty, delegates of other college and universities, the Board of Directors, and the presidential party.

Music was provided by Herbert Colvin, organist. The Tech Choir, directed by Raymond Elliot, sang Psalm 150 by Lewandowski.

Invocation was read by Rev. H. I. Robinson of the First Methodist Church.

Guests were welcomed by James G. Allen, dean of student life and chairman of the inaugural committee. Dr. D. M. Wiggins, past president of Tech, introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Henry Nash Smith, professor of American studies of the University of Minnesota.

Southwest Conference Votes Against Motion For Expansion

Texas Tech came a little closer, but not close enough in its latest bid for membership into the Southwest Conference. For the third consecutive year the faculty representatives of the league decided that the loop would stay put.

The vote was supposedly three for the addition of Tech and Oklahoma, and four against, Texas University brought up the motion that was seconded by Texas A&M and Texas Christian, but it failed to receive the necessary two-thirds approval. Last year, however, Texas made the motion that Tech be admitted, and no one seconded.

Dr. Gus Hodges of Texas, W. L. Penberthy of Texas A&M, and Dr. Henry Hardt of TCU were the only representatives that would disclose how they voted on the matter.

Rice Institute's representative, Dr. H. E. Bray, had told Tech officials earlier that his school was definitely against the admission of the South Plains school.

The vote Saturday was a voluntary one on the part of the faculty since the conference decided last year not to accept applications in the future.

The motion by Dr. Hodges was that Tech and Oklahoma be invited to affiliate with the Southwest Conference provided "satisfactory details" involved in such a move could be worked out.

The University of Houston, which has made a strong bid to enter the loop last year, was not mentioned in Saturday's motion.

It is possible that further action could take place at the winter meeting of the conference fathers. They don't meet again until that time.

Tech has been trying to get into the league off and on for the past 20 years, while Oklahoma

The Raiders climbed back to a second place tie with Hardin-Simmons by downing Arizona State of Flagstaff 74-69. But the Cowboys broke the tie and sent Tech back to third place by taking an exciting, two-overtime duel, 86-84.

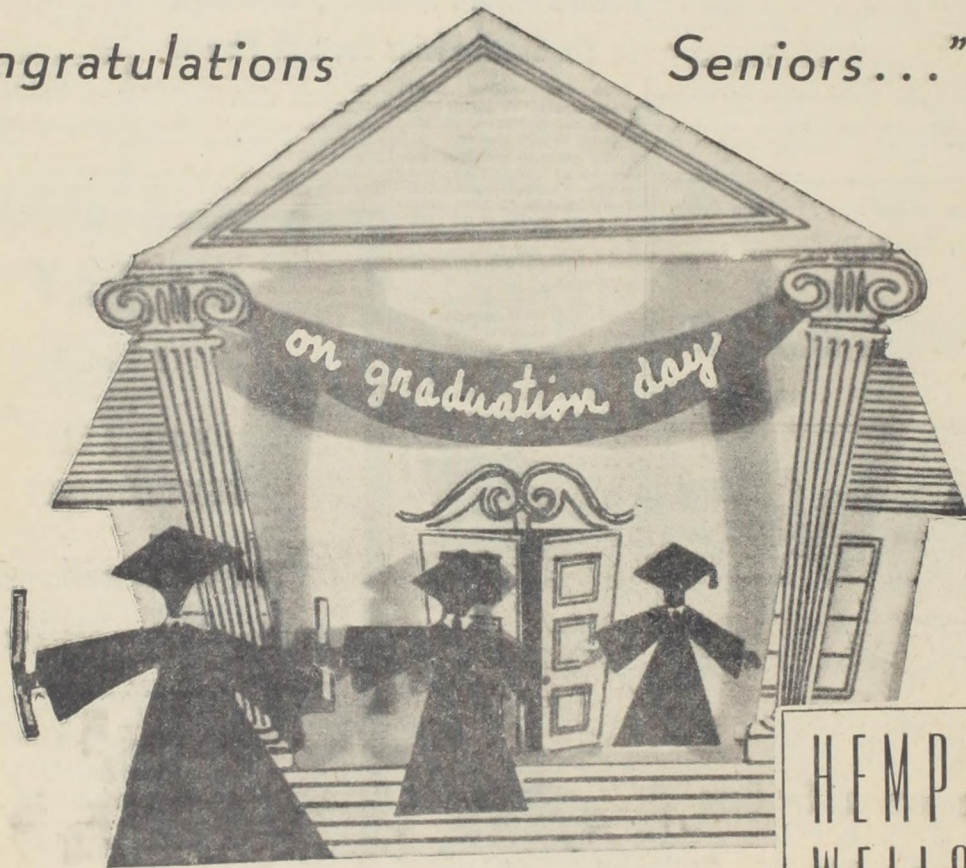
Tech's golfers started weak but finished strong, taking second place in the Border Conference Meet at Abilene May 8 and 9.
