WITH TODAY'S RUNOFF, the most success ful Tech election in recent years will draw to a close This election was successful from the standpoint of student voting, candidates and campaigns, as Tech election resembled a real one for the first time in at least four years.

Students turned out in large numbers at polling places for both segments of the election - a rarity in recent years at Tech

With approximately 100 candidates vying for 35 positions, the competition was intense, and candidates for key positions developed good platforms, represent ing the interests of large numbers of students, in order to win the support needed for election.

In the campaign for student votes, candidates at tempted to outdo each other with gimmicks calculated to please the voters. The Tech student was, in turn, carried to class, entertained by jazz bands, talked to in government classes, approached on the way to class and goobered.

Campaigners drove cars decorated with campaign logans over the campus, pedaled bicycles decorated in the same manner and even rode horses. These proceedings, although raising the ire of a few faculty members who wanted to get some work done, provided a wel come diversion for the student, as well as making him feel important.

Another result of the active campaigning was the building of interest in their government among the students. With this added backing, the Student Council will be in a better position to see that provisions helpful to the student body are carried out.

An aspect of the large group of candidates running - and the large voting turnouts - was the fact that the majority of persons elected to positions had to develop platforms that represented the interests of a majority of the students. A few small groups just didn't control enough votes to elect a person to office

This election also saw candidates elected on the basis of qualifications and platform, rather than on the basis of their personal popularity and that of the organizations they belong to.

The election represented a step in the right direc tion toward building a strong student government by attracting talented candidates, good platforms and good campaigns. Now it remains for those in office to add further prestige and backing to the Student Council by seeing that student demands and needs are cared for, and it remains for the student body to see that they do.
