Do His People Approve? LATEST and most ironical of the news we have on Hitler's persecution of the Jews in Germany are Associated Press dispatches which report that even the Italian people disapprove of the methods employed by northern Europe's leading megalomaniae. And it is logical that persons living in the boot-shaped peninsula are able to get a far more accurate conception of actual happenings in Germany than those of us who pride our-selves on living in a democratic nation. Hitler and Mussolini are continuously waving each other's flags, and it is probable that facts slip much more easily along the Rome-Berlin axis than they do through the Nazi censors. Hence it would appear that the Italians come much nearer being on the "inside" as far as violent anti-Semitism of the Reich is con-cerned, than Americans across the sea. When the people of any strong Fascist na-tion, whose own leader has been anything approve of such drastic measures. It would be gratifying to know that the true German does not think as his dictary the orge of Austria, acts.
