NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Jimmy Johnston still has a weakness for English fighters. The dapper little promoter who imported Phil Scott here, signed Jack Peterson, light-heavyweight champion of England, to meet John Henry Lewis, the American title-holder, in Madison Square Garden for the championship of the world. The British fighter certainly places a high value on his services. He asks 35 per cent of the gate with a guarantee of 7,000 pounds, or \$35,000 to fight the American negro.

Further assurance that the city's application for a PWA grant toward construction of a water reservoir will be given full consideration if and when allotments are available was given in a letter received by City Manager E. V. Spence.

The assurance came from G. E. Ramsey, Jr., chief expeditor of the projects division, who wrote in reply to a telegram from C. S. Clark, chief of the state board of water engineers. Clark, pointing out the urgent need of attention to the Big Spring water supply, had requested early approval of the city's application.

Ramsey's reply said in part: "Examination of this application has been completed and the reports submitted by the examining divisions find it eligible for approval for a loan and grant. The contents of your telegram telling of the necessity for this project have been noted and you may be assured that it will be given every consideration when circumstances permit."

Ramsey's letter pointed out that possibilities for an allotment remain indefinite.

2 more REDUCTIONS in Long Distance Telephone Rates

Effective September 1, long distance telephone rates are reduced as follows:

- On calls to points over 234 miles distant, the charge for a 3-minute conversation is reduced by amounts ranging from 5¢ to \$1.50, depending upon the distance.
- Overtime charges on "person-to-person" calls are reduced after three minutes of overtime to the lower "station-to-station" overtime rate. (Overtime charges begin after three minutes of conversation.)

This is the seventh time in ten years that voluntary reductions in long distance rates have been made. It is estimated that the new reductions will save telephone users in Southwestern Bell territory \$1,100,000 a year.
