

Luxury Before Necessity . . .

Recreation outranks health facilities at Tech.

Within the last week we have learned rather graphically that as students we place more emphasis on recreation than on health.

that as students we place more emphasis on recreation than on health. The average student thought little of the inedaquacy of the Infirmary building—that is, until half of it burned last Wednes-day. Then groups of students began wondering why it was we bucking for a Student Union building. It seems to go back to the quality in human nature which takes good health for granted. We care more for a place to gath-er, play bridge, drink coffee or just "fellowship" than we do for an adequate place to go when we get sick. The student patients who were evacuated from the Infirmary when it blazed very likely never thought they would need medical care, though they pay something over six dollars per semester in health fees. Because of its auxiliary standing the Infirmary building state college structures. Thus the charred half of the health cen-ter will be rebuilt. Meanwhile the permanent, fireproof walls of the Student Union, to be built by specific donations from groups, profits from the Tech Bookstore and the backlog from health and activity fees, will be raised.

According to present plans a permanent health center will only be possible through the next phase of Tech's building pr-o gram, scheduled for 1955 or 1956. We have placed a luxury be-fore a necesity. Now we can but hope for an interlude of four fireless years for the Infirmary.



Dear Editor: Perhaps I can answer some of the questions that have recently been raised as to the identity of the personages whose likenesses appear on the front of the Admin-istration building.

the personages whose likenesses appear on the front of the Admin-istration building. Dr. Paul Whitfield Horn, first president of the college, gave much thought to the inscriptions and the plaques that should adorn the building. In Volume I, Numher I of the Bulletin of Texas Tech-nological college, eatilled The Col-lege That Is To Be (late in 1924, Doctor Horn explained his choices. One series of plaques represents the seals of the six nations under whose flag Texas has existed: France, Spain, Mexico, the Repub-ic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States. Another group includes "the busts of five of the greatest men known in the history of Texas, namely, Sam Houston, Stephen F. Austin, David Crockett, Albert Sidney Johnston and J. S. Hogg," Another group-includes "the busts of five of the greatest men in the history of America, namely, Go-lumbus, Washington, Lincoln, Lee and Wilson."

history of America, namely, Ca-lumbus, Washington, Lincoln, Lee and Wilson." Doctor Horn called especial at-tention to two of the inscriptions: Mirabean B. Lamar's "Cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy. It is the only dictator that free men acknowledge, the only security free men desire," and Solomon's "Righteousness exalteth a nation." The names of the great histor-ical figures that appear on the south side of the Administration building were also chosen by Doc-tor Horn after much thought. W.B. Gates Dean of Graduate Studies Thanks Doctor Gates, for solv-ing the mystery of "The Name-les Faces."-Ed.
