In the disclosure statement, filed last February, Allen said he no longer was February, Allen said he no longer was president of Potomac International Corp. as of January 1978 and added in parentheses "sold business. But Fielding could not explain why if he sale of Potomac International had ccurred in January 1981, there was no occurred in January 1981, there was no mention of either the sale or Allen's re questionnaire. Bob Flynn, an official of the Government Ethics Office, said Monday that if Allen had made a capital gain on the sale of the firm, that amount should have been listed under income. And Flynn said federal regulations require that nominees list on their require that nominees list on their disclosure statements any interest in a disclosure statements any interest in a business held at the end of the preceding calendar year Peter Hannaford, owner of the Han- naford Corp., has said the naford Corp., has said the firm acquired Potomac International on Jan.
