## Raiders face big test in Baylor, Teagle

Tech no sooner gets through with one team blessed with a player of All-America talent than the Raiders have to deal with another team equally blessed.

Arguments may live up many a pool hall from Waco to Houston, but one thing is for certain, the Tech basketball team is in no better shape now that the Ricky Pierce Show is over with and the Terry Teagle Show is coming up next.

Teagle's show starts at 7:30 p.m. Saturday at the Heart O' Texas Coliseum in Waco.

Both Pierce's and Teagle's shows are entertaining — unless you play for the Raiders. After two games against Pierce, Rice's All-Southwest Conference forward, Tech might even look forward to an outing against Teagle, Baylor's All-SWC forward.

Pierce riddled the Raiders defense 34 points Wednesday as the Owls won 76-56 at Autry Court in Houston. The latest loss dropped Tech to fourth place in the conference race with a 6-6 mark. The Raiders are 14-8 overall.

Tech played a man-to-man defense throughout the game,

however, Pierce seemed to thrive on the Raider strategy, Rice head coach Tommy Suits said after the game.

"We like opponents to run a man only for the reason that we can get Ricky the ball, when he wants the ball," Suits said. "For the rest of our guys, I don't think it matters."

However, for Tech, the game was worse than the score indicates.

Tech was dominated totally by Rice. While Pierce was having his way offensively, the Owl defense harassed the Raiders offense to submission. Tech made only 36.5 percent of its field goal attempts (19 of 52). The Raiders were six of 22 in the first half.

"In the last game, we tried to press and got our defense spread out," Tech head coach Gerald Myers said Wednesday. "They turned our press to their advantage."

While Rice took advantage of the Tech press Jan. 19, the Owls took advantage of a tired Raiders squad that had played four conference games in eight days, including a 91-82 overtime win against Texas A&M Monday.

"We had only one day to make any changes," Myers said.

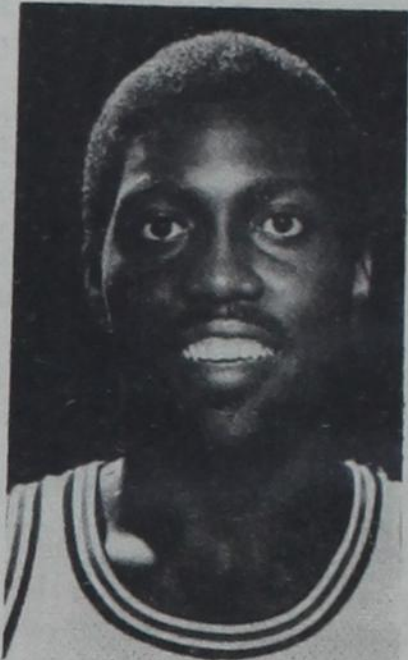
"You can't do much in one day, however, we tried to prepare for what Rice does."

One aspect of the Owls' game that they do well is rebound. Led by 6-9 forward Kenny Austin, Rice outrebounded Tech 43-29. Austin led the way with a game-high 12 boards.

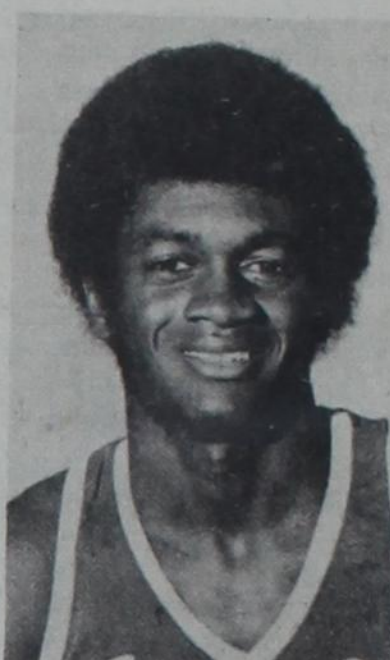
The game became frustrating for the Raiders early on as the Owls limited Tech to one field goal for the opening 6:32 in the first half.

With the Rice game a part of the past, the Raiders must concentrate on the Baylor Bears (6-5 and 13-8 going into Thursday's game with Arkansas), who were 78-71 losers Jan. 23 in the Coliseum. And Teagle, a 6-5 senior who scored 23 points, has harassed opponents for three seasons. He's continuing his reputation this season with his long-range jump shots that seem to come from the heavens.

Teagle, however, like mortal men, must play basketball with four teammates. Baylor's other starters are 6-6 forward Joe Copeland, 6-8 center Ozell Hall, 6-4 guard Jay Shakir and 5-6 guard Ronnie Blake.

# Reggie lives life after NY

NEW YORK (AP) — Reggie Jackson described his 14-year major league baseball career as a "ride through Disneyland" Thursday and insisted he had no plans to desert his first love anytime soon for his mushrooming outside interests.

"I love baseball. I plan to play as long as I am healthy and can produce," the newly signed California Angels slugger said. "I hope we can get in the World Series and I think we have as good a chance as anyone else."

"I'd like to play in 135 games, hit 30 home runs and have around 100 RBI. One of my goals is to hit 500 home runs. I am only 75 away. I can hardly wait to hit my 426th and 427th."

The 35-year-old outfielder returned to the scene of his greatest triumphs as a home run hitter for the New York Yankees to sign a contract as automotive editor of Pen-

thouse magazine. Penthouse publisher Bob Guccione was at his right hand and a penthouse Pet, Corinne Alphen, leaned over his shoulder as he signed what was reportedly a six-figure contract to contribute six articles a year for the magazine.

"I have tinkered with cars ever since I was a kid," said Jackson, born in Wyncote, just outside Philadelphia. "My first car was a 1955 Chevy and I still have it. I can take cars apart and rebuild them. All my life, I have thought I might someday go into racing."

Jackson said he had close to 47 automobiles in California, many of them valuable relics, and perhaps his most valuable is a \$100,000 Rolls Royce coupe. His stock ranges from a 1933 Willis to a variety what he calls Chevy "muscle" cars, prized Porsches and Rolls Royces.

Jackson refused to get into a verbal war with his former

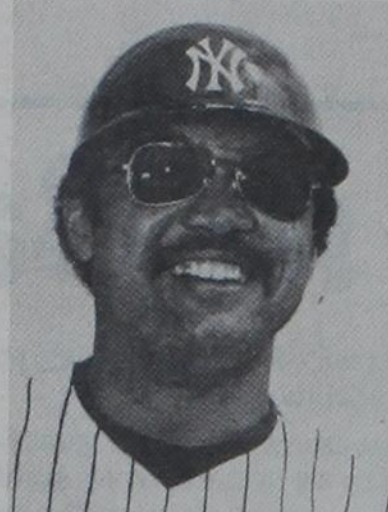
Yankee boss, George Steinbrenner, saying:

"I don't want to say something and have George snap back at me from Florida and then have to answer him again," he said. "I don't want to knock the guy. I had some bad times and good times in New York. But as for the tough times, I tried to turn them around and make them positive."

Asked how he felt about returning to New York, which he captivated with charisma and home run power for five years, Jackson said, "My blood still runs through the city. It is a part of me. I am grateful for that. There seems to be a great feeling between me and the people."

He added that he was not glad to be leaving but said, "I am happy to be going home."

Jackson signed an estimated three-year, \$2.7 million contract as a free agent with the Angels after



Steinbrenner declined to renew his contract.

Asked what he thought of Steinbrenner's new plan to concentrate on speed at the possible expense of power, Jackson refused to comment directly to that question but let his feelings be known when he was queried about the New York Mets' signing slugger George Foster for a reported \$10 million.

# Vaulter hopes history repeats itself

NEW YORK (AP) — Billy Olson, seeking to become the first pole vaulter to clear 19 feet indoors, will have history riding on his side Friday night in the 75th Wanamaker Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden.

Forty years ago, in the Millrose Games, Cornelius Warmerdam made track and field history by becoming the first vaulter to clear 15 feet indoors, and 20 years ago, John Uelses was the first to soar 16 feet indoors, in the same meet.

"I'll be going all out (to clear 19 feet)," said the 23-year-old Olson, the sensation of the 1982 indoor season. "I'll be pulling out all stops."

Olson already has broken three indoor records this season. On Jan. 16, he smashed the American indoor mark by leaping 18-6½ in the U.S. Olympic Invitational at East Rutherford, N.J. On Jan. 29, he bettered the world indoor best by vaulting 18-8¾ in the Toronto Star Maple Leaf Indoor Games, and last Saturday night, he broke that record by clearing 18-9¾ in the Portland Federal-Mason Dixon Games at Louisville, Ky.

"I think there is the possibility you will see the first 19-foot pole vault indoors Friday night," said meet director Howard Schmertz. "Olson just missed going over at that height in Toronto. He brushed the bar."

Actually, he got over the bar easily, but he threw his arms back too hard as he began his descent, knocking over the bar.

"I know I can jump 5.80 (meters, 19-0¼)," said Olson.

"Right now, I'm thinking 5.85 (19-4¼)."

Olson, three-time NAIA champion while at Abilene Christian University in Abilene, Texas, also has won at Philadelphia, Kansas City and Dallas this season, and leads the indoor Mobil Grand Prix circuit with 110 points. It has been a remarkable comeback for Olson, who missed the entire 1981 indoor season after suffering a broken left arm in a gymnastics accident in late 1980 and was in a cast for six months.

Olson will be joined by a host of 1982 record-setters in the Millrose Games.

Among them are Renaldo Nehemiah in the 60-yard high hurdles, Carl Lewis in the long jump, Stanley Floyd in the 60-yard dash, Don Paige in the 1,000 meters, Mary Decker in the women's mile, Debbie Brill in the women's high jump, Evelyn Ashford and Jeanette Bolden in the women's 60-yard dash, Candy Young in the women's 60-yard hurdles, and Jim Heiring in the mile walk.

Other top competitors include Herschel Walker and Mel Lattany in the men's dash, Dwight Stones and Franklin Jacobs in the men's high jump, Alberto Salazar and Suleiman Nyambui in the 5,000 meters, Steve Scott and John Walker in the men's mile, Earl Bell and Dan Ripley in the pole vault, Rod Milburn in the men's hurdles, Larry Myricks in the long jump, Stephanie Hightower in the women's hurdles, Francie Larrieu in the women's mile and Joni Huntley in the women's high jump.

# Texan Busceme may not fight champion Arguello, says manager

BEAUMONT (AP) — Veteran boxing manager Hugh Benbow threatened Thursday to withdraw challenger Bubba Busceme from Saturday's title fight against World Boxing Council lightweight champion Alexis Arguello if the fight is shown locally on television.

The fight is scheduled to be telecast nationally by CBS but blacked out within a 150-mile radius of the Beaumont Civic Center. Benbow said he learned Wednesday night, however, that the fight would be televised locally if it sold out 24 hours before the fight.

"A lot of people borrowed money to come see Bubba fight the best fighter in the world pound for pound,

because they were told that was the only way they would get to see the fight," Benbow said. "Where I come from a man's word is his bond and I'm not going to double-cross these people who have been so nice to Bubba."

Top Rank, Inc., New York, is co-promoting the fight with Sports Associates, Inc. of Fort Worth.

Larry Beaulieu, executive news director of KFDM-TV, CBS's Beaumont affiliate, said the fight would be televised locally if it is sold out.

"It is our understanding with CBS that their contract with Top Rank includes a provision for the blackout to be lifted if there is a sellout 24 hours before the fight,"

Beaulieu said.

The whole problem may be academic because 1,000 tickets, about half of them in the \$50-\$75 range, remain to be sold.

Irving Rudd, a Top Rank spokesman here, said Benbow's outburst was hurting ticket sales.

"There's no way the fight will be sold out by 4:30 Friday," Rudd said. "I think the fight will sell out Saturday with walk up sales but there's no way they'll make it by 4:30 so what's the problem?"

Benbow said his contract with Sports Associates called for a blackout with no sellout provision

"Bubba and I aren't going to show up anywhere near the Civic Center unless I have a contract saying it will be blacked out locally," Benbow said. "They can do whatever they want elsewhere, but they're not showing the fight here."

Arguello, 73-4, and Busceme, 27-3, continued to wind down their workouts Thursday in preparation for the first title fight ever in this city, where Busceme became a hometown hero fighting in the amateur ranks.

Arguello, one of only six fighters ever to hold three world titles, is a heavy favorite.

### Women's tennis

The Tech women's tennis team travels to San Antonio today where it will face Texas-San Antonio at 2 p.m. and Trinity Saturday at 1 p.m.

The Raiders owned a 18-8 record going into Thursday's match against Baylor. Tech suffered a 7-2 loss to Texas and won a 6-3 contest against Lamar last weekend.

Texas-San Antonio is playing its initial season in intercollegiate competition. One player on the squad is Lubbock native Lisa Doggett.

When Tech plays Trinity Saturday, the Raiders will face the nucleus of the 1980 squad which was ranked second nationally in the AIAW standings. Tech played Trinity twice last season. The Raiders lost both meetings, 8-1 and 9-0.

Emilie Foster, who coached at Tech from 1976 to 1978, is in her fourth year as coach of Trinity.

### Men's swimming

The Tech men's swimming team travels to Dallas this weekend for the seven-team SMU Invitational at the Perkins Natatorium on the SMU campus. The action starts at 2 p.m. today and lasts until Sunday.

"The purpose of this meet is to get our guys accustomed to a championship list, or the order of events for a championship meet," Tech swimming coach Ron Holihan said. "We are expecting some outstanding swims in this meet."

Holihan said he had tapered down the workout load preceding the SMU meet in an effort to improve the swimmers' times.

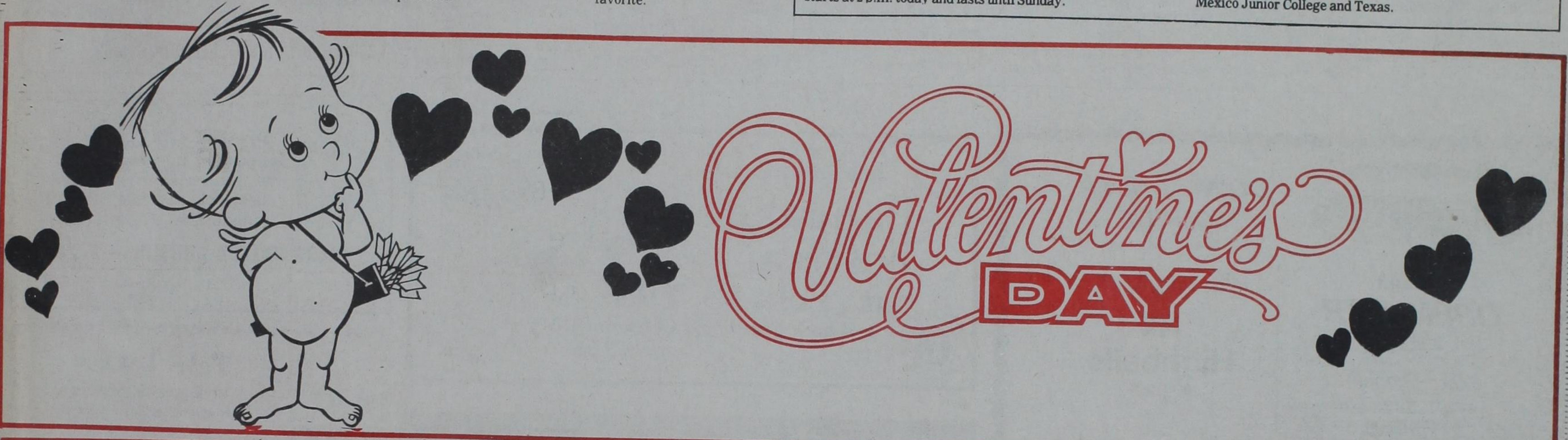
Tech divers Richie O'Neil and Rich Dorsey will take the week off since no diving events will be conducted at the Invitational.

UD Reporter

The Lubbock City Council unanimously agreed Thursday to preserve the red paving bricks found in many of the streets near Tech.

Council members decided to extend a resolution designed to protect the red bricks installed on Broadway Avenue in the early 1920s to include all bricked streets in the city.

Under the new policy, the bricks would have to be restored if any improvements were made in the street. Bricked roads such as Broadway and Main Street currently are repaired with concrete

and asphalt patches.

The council's decision will affect only future road improvements and repairs. The decision will not require portions of brick streets already patched with asphalt or concrete to be repaved.

Members of the Urban Design and Historic Preservation Commission and the Planning and Zoning Commission already had adopted a similar policy regarding Broadway.

The Urban Design and Historic Preservation Commission is interested in preserving the character of Broadway as a visual connection between downtown and

Tech, City Manager Larry Cunningham said.

"Our brick streets are unique to the area and should be preserved," City Director of Planning Jim Bertram said.

City council members also agreed to support the Chamber of Commerce Highways, Streets and Roads Committee in a list of priority area highway improvements before the Texas Highway Commission Wednesday in Austin.

The Chamber of Commerce committee's recommenda-

tions include the continued funding of Interstate 27 through Lubbock; the creation of an outer loop within 20 years by upgrading and designating existing farm-to-market roads; and continued study of the development of an east-west thoroughfare off of U.S. 62 at about East 19th Street and Quirt Avenue to the Brownfield Highway and Loop 289 interchange.

The committee also added a new proposal at the council meeting to their original list. The committee recommended changing Third and Fourth

Streets to a one-way pair between the Tech Freeway and the railroad near Avenue H.

In other action, the council decided to give Yellowhouse Canyon area residents two weeks to sign a provisional pro rate contract for water and sewer services.

Yellowhouse Canyon residents requested that the city provide water and sewer services to the area because the present owner, Travis Martin, reportedly has provided poor service.

of Mass Communications, Billy Ross, chairperson and professor of the mass communications department, said.

The mass communications department set a goal to be a separate school at its inception in 1970, Ross said.

"We are on record with the administration as desiring to be separate," Ross said. "Our goal hasn't changed."

The title "school" is

preferable to "college" because a school is a smaller academic unit, Ross said.

Advantages resulting from a separate School of Mass Communications include a funding increase, the addition of another professional program to the university, improved faculty and student recruitment and more productive graduates, Ross said.

"I have no objection to the college staying intact,

but we want a separate school," Ross said.

Further attempts will be made by the mass communications department to attain a separate mass communications school in the future, Ross said.

In reviewing the overall picture of the university, no weakening will occur in the College of Arts and Sciences if the proposed reorganization is accepted, Lawrence Graves, dean of the college, said.

If you haven't had enough by now, then after the performance your chauffeur will drive you to Tara restaurant for the Scarlett and Rhett Dinner. There you can "treat your loved one to an elegant delight".

Dinner for two includes pate en crute, salad, stuffed baked potato, Chateaubriand bouquitiere, desert and wine. Not bad and you can escape for only \$28 plus gratuity, which rounds it to about \$35, if you're a big tipper.

Then it's off to the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum for the Foreigner concert, where you can see one of the biggest concerts in Lubbock. Tickets are \$11. Bryan Adams will open the

8 p.m. show.

Foreigner will pick it up probably around 9:30 p.m. and you can listen to the dream words of "Cold As Ice" and "Waiting for a Girl Like You" until about 11:30 p.m.

If you buy your beer at the Coliseum you might be able to get out of there for under \$30, which includes tickets. Be sure to buy your tickets early because if you don't, the price goes up \$1 per ticket on Sunday.

If you're not too tired, intoxicated or in the mood for other things, then it's about time for a little intimacy. If there is still time on the limousine's meter, then go out to a nice quiet place for an aperitif. One of the most intimate places in town is the bar at the Lubbock Inn.

# Oscar sees 'Red' for 12 nominations

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Reds," the saga of an American in revolutionary Russia, and "On Golden Pond," a bittersweet drama of a man facing old age, scored top honors today in the 54th annual Academy Award nominations.

"Reds," with 12 nominations, and "On Golden Pond," with 10, were selected for best picture of the year along with "Atlantic City," "Chariots of Fire" and "Raiders of the Lost Ark."

Paul Newman was something of a surprise by being selected for his sixth Academy nomination for his role as the media victim in "Absence of Malice." The other nominees for best actor had been anticipated: Warren Beatty, "Reds"; Henry Fonda, "On Golden Pond"; Burt Lancaster, "Atlantic City," and Dudley Moore, "Arthur."

Katharine Hepburn, already winner of three Oscars, col-

lected her 12th nomination for her performance as the indulgent wife in "On Golden Pond." The other nominees for best actress: Diane Keaton, "Reds"; Marsha Mason, "Only When I Laugh"; Susan Sarandon, "Atlantic City"; and Meryl Streep, "The French Lieutenant's Woman."

Jane Fonda, winner as best actress for "Kluge" in 1971 and "Coming Home" in 1978, was nominated for best supporting actress for 1981 for her role as the resentful daughter in "On Golden Pond." The other nominees: Melinda Dillon, "Absence of Malice"; Joan Hackett, "Only When I Laugh"; Elizabeth McGovern, "Ragtime"; Maureen Stapleton, "Reds."

The 77-year-old John Gielgud scored his second nomination for best supporting actor with his role as the dutiful butler to Dudley Moore in "Arthur." He was previous-

ly named for "Becket" in 1964, but has never won an Oscar.

Other nominees for supporting actor: James Coco, "Only When I Laugh"; Ian Holm, "Chariots of Fire"; Jack Nicholson, "Reds"; Howard E. Rollins Jr., "Ragtime."

Warren Beatty, who has never won an Oscar, was nominated in four categories: actor, producer of best picture, co-writer and director of "Reds." The other nominees for directing were Louis Malle, "Atlantic City"; Hugh Hudson, "Chariots of Fire"; Mark Rydell, "On Golden Pond," and Steven Spielberg, "Raiders of the Lost Ark."

Nominated for best foreign-language film: "The Boat Is Full," Switzerland; "Man of Iron," Poland; "Mephisto," Hungary; "Muddy River," Japan; "Three Brothers," Italy.

# Tony winner more than just laughs

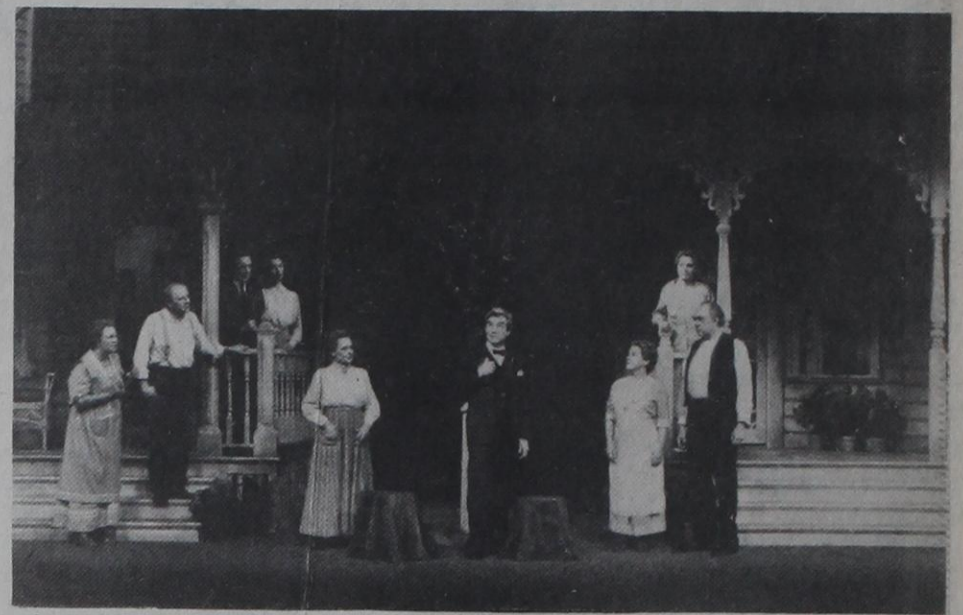

Morning's At Seven has been described as a comedy. The critics have called it hilarious, ridiculous and zany. But Wednesday night's performance of Morning's At Seven showed much more than the comical side of the play. In it, one found that the play has a dramatic side with a deep meaning. The story showed how people arrive at self-realization and learn to accept themselves and each other.  
Morning's At Seven deals with the lives of four sisters and their relatives. The setting is Midwestern America in

the backyards of two of the sisters, Ida Bolton and Cora Swanson. Another sister, Aaronetta Gibbs lives with Cora and her husband, Theodore (Thor), and has done so for close to 50 years. The other sister, Esther Crampton, lives close by, but her husband David refuses to let Esther visit her sisters because he thinks they are "morons."  
Ida Bolton's husband, Carl, is beset by "spells" as he asks himself, "Where am I in life?" while placing his head against the kitchen wall or a tree in the backyard.  
Ida and Carl have a son, Homer, who has lived at home

for 40 years. He has been engaged to his girlfriend, Myrtle, for seven years. Needless to say, each character has a problem that they must face during the course of the play. Cora Swanson wants to move out with her husband to another house and leave Aaronetta behind so that Cora and her husband can spend the rest of their lives together.  
Aaronetta also has a problem. When she began living with Cora and Thor, she had a mild affair with Thor. Aaronetta has been threatening Thor for the past 45 years with revealing the affair. These threats continue once

Aaronetta discovers that Cora wants to move. The manner in which the characters discovered and faced their problems was truly magnificent. Author Paul Osborn was a genius of his time when he penned the play in 1939. The performance of the play was flawless; but remember, the troupe has been on the road for more than three months performing nightly. The cast also has a tremendous history of performing in off-Broadway and Broadway productions. So what can one expect but a perfect performance.  
Richard Nelson's subtle

lighting was superb, as was the set design. As evening drew near during the first act, the dimming effect was so noticeable that it provided a truly realistic dusk. William Rittman's set was definitely typical of the 1920 era. The only thing missing was a gossip fence. As the play closed, it appeared that most of the Lubbock audience approved of the performance but not of the play. Most people went looking for a comedy, and indeed it did contain humor. But the main emphasis of the play was on the problems and secrets that families hide from one another.
