tors spoke on the future of the Tech as an industrial school, commending the student body as a body of men and women who were not afraid to work with their hands and urging the senators to increase the appropriation for the textile department, calling the attention of the visitors to the fact that at present Tech is only offering the A. B. degree.

Col. Thompson was followed by Mr. R. M. Underwood of Plainview also a member of the board sanctioned everything Col. Thompson had said and referred to Tech as "our school." Mr. Kinross, Lubbock's member of the board welcomed the senators to the city and extended thanks for their visit to the Tech.

The afternoon was spent with Dr. Horn going over the college plant and reviewing proposed development of the institution. The members of the committee expressed surprise at the work turned out in the textile department.

Monday evening after the work of the day was over, a spirit of fun ruled in the last gathering of the day. The faculty of the college and the citizens of Lubbock were hosts to the visitors at a banquet at Hotel Lubbock.

After an excellent meal, the toastmaster Spencer Wells, called on Dr. Horn for an introductory speech, who gave way to Senator Wood, who again impressed the gathering with his jovial manner. Senator Wood referred to "your own dear senator, Bledsoe, who has been voting me like a free negro." Senator Wood introduced Senator Lewis of Navasota, who entered into the spirit of gaiety that prevailed throughout the evening.

Mr. Arthur F. Duggan, president of the West-Texas Chamber of Commerce extended a welcome to the visiting people and explained that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce reached 1,000,000 people and had had quite a part in securing Texas Tech for this part of the state. Mr. Duggan pointed out that this portion of the state paid its share of taxes into the coffers of the state and as such tax payers they were entitled to receive any benefits that might come their way.

Senator Miller of Weatherford succeeded in "pouring it on" West Williams of Waco, a former member of the legislature, who had preceded him on the program.

Senator Witt of Waco complimented Lubbock on the admirable spirit of West-Texas and on their whole-hearted cooperation of Tech and what Tech stands for, stating that Lubbock citizens were not approaching the Senate committee in a spirit of begging but in a spirit of doing.

Following the visit of the committee President P. W. Horn and E. W. Providence, business manager, left with the party for Austin Monday night where they will appear before the committee. Both the house and senate committees have visited the Tech and have made a thorough investigation. Judging from public and private statements of the visitors Tech will get a liberal share of the money available for educational purposes.

Those who have the appropriations in charge are seemingly convinced of the great needs of Texas Technological college. This school is being urged as a special case owing to the fact that it new and urgently needs money for more buildings to accommodate the large student body and also in order that more courses may be offered to take care of the demand for more junior and senior work. It is stated that the state lacks some three to five million dollars of having enough money to meet the needs of the various state educational institutions of higher learning as outlined by the board of control.

President Horn and Mr. Providence appeared before the joint committee of the legislature this week and presented the claims of Tech. Much consideration has been shown the institution and officials are hopeful that enough money will be appropriated so that the school may go forward in its program of growth and development for the next two years.

Governor Moody has called a special session of the legislature to meet Monday, May 9, at which time the appropriation bill will be acted upon. The faculty, student body, and people of Lubbock have united in showing their loyalty to the institution and in urging the great needs of the school for a liberal appropriation. This loyalty was noted especially by the visiting lawmakers.
