Best to Enter Gym This Year

Walker was high point man for Tech with a total of 7 points. Canyon simply displayed the best form of any team to enter the Tech gym this season. Their long, effective passing and airtight defence forced the Matadors to make all of their shots from the center of the floor. They also played a smooth game, in fact so smooth that they made only 8 personal fouls and the Matadors were able to make 4 of these chances count. The box score shows that the Buifs only made 2 more field goals than the Matadors but they made more than twice as many more field goals than the locals did. Two Matadors were forced from the game with 4 personals while none were given the air of the Teachers.
