

# Tech Hosts Houston In Home Finale

Texas Tech winds up its 1956 home football schedule tomorrow afternoon, as the Red Raiders face the tough University of Houston Cougars at 2 p.m. in Jones Stadium.

For a number of the Raiders, tomorrow's game will mark their final appearance in Jones Stadium. Fourteen seniors are among the Big Red squad. They are:

Ends Ken Vakey, Dan Law, Jimmy Clark and Bobby Young; tackle Bob Kilcullen and Doug Campbell (chosen this week to the INS all-Southwest second team); center Barton Massey; quarterbacks Don Williams and Buddy Hill; halfbacks Ronnie Herr, M. C. Northam and Hugh Fewin.

#### Pair to Be Out

Out of this list of seniors, two will definitely not see action against the Cougars. They are Kilcullen and Massey, out with injuries. Heir hasn't played in three weeks, but there is a chance that he will be able to play tomorrow, along with Howard and Law, out with injuries last week.

## Tech To Sponsor June European Trip

Fifty-one days of travel in Europe and six semester hours' credit will be offered this summer by the Tech foreign language department.

The trip will be from June 27 to Aug. 16. Round-trip cost from New York and back will be \$1,198, including air transportation, meals, hotel accommodations and sight-seeing trips. Expenses may be arranged in a time-payment plan, according to Dr. John C. Dowling, head professor of foreign language and sponsor of the trip.

Headquarters for students will be Paris, where part of the time will be spent in classes at the Sorbonne, Europe's oldest university, and the rest for sightseeing in seven countries. Tickets to the Opera, the Folies Bergeres and other tours are included in cost of the trip.

Credits may be received in French 131-132, 231-232, 331-332 or 435-436. Persons interested should (See EUROPEAN TRIP, p. 2)

Houston this year has a fine 5-2-1 record, and has already been crowned Missouri Valley Conference champions. Among the Cougar victories are a 13-0 win over Oklahoma A&M, who tied Tech, and a 14-0 decision over Tulsa, 10-7 winners over the Raiders last weeks.

#### Houston Record Given

The other Houston victories

have been over Mississippi State, Wichita and Villanova (26-13, last week). The two losses have been to the University of Mississippi, 14-0, and Auburn 12-0. The tie was a magnificent 14-14 deadlock with Texas A&M, conquerors of Tech 40-7, marring an otherwise perfect slate for the Aggies.

The Raiders last week were never able to get their offense

rolling as it had the previous week against TCU, and consequently took their fifth loss of the season.

Quarterback Charley Wynes' first period field goal spelled the difference in the game; although Tech held a temporary 7-3 lead late in the third period, after halfback Bobby Kyzar had taken a John Riddle pass 24 yards for

his first touchdown of the year.

#### Hurricane Roars Back

But Tulsa came marching back for a touchdown, and the three points were the difference, 10-7. It is the first time that Tech has (See RAIDERS, p. 4)

## CARE Seeks Tech's Dollars For Hungary

Ten thousand dollars will be the goal of a Christmas CARE Drive on the Tech campus to aid college-age Hungarian refugees.

The drive, which will begin Monday, Dec. 3, immediately after students return from their Thanksgiving holiday, will last for approximately two weeks. All money will have to be in, counted, and sent four days before Christmas Holidays begin for the refugees to receive Tech's Christmas gift to them for the hardships they endured.

If students alone contribute to the drive, about \$1.25 will be needed from each student. If both students and faculty contribute, \$1.00 will be needed from each person, according to Ted Carthel, who is in charge of gathering information for the drive.

No SWC school has conducted such a drive before, and only one college, Louisiana State University, west of the Mississippi has tried it before. It has been attempted in the Ivy-League colleges, but it took 12 schools to raise \$10,000, stated Ted Carthel.

"If the student body will realize the significance of this drive it can put a gold star by Tech's name, and will create pride in Tech for doing something like this," said Carthel.

## Tech Tries For TV Permit

Final decision as to whether or not Texas Tech will have an educational television outlet on Channel 5 is in the hands of the Federal Communication Commission in Washington.

The application, actually a move to reclassify the proposed station from a commercial outlet to one of educational value, is the second attempt made by Tech.

The first was made in October of 1954 and was rejected by FCC officials.

Estimates have been made that it will take from six months to a year before the FCC makes its decision on the application.

"If Tech's petition is approved," says M. L. Pennington, vice president and Tech comptroller, Channel 5 will serve both students and the general public in many education ways."

Plans call for the station to be set up in a manner in which it

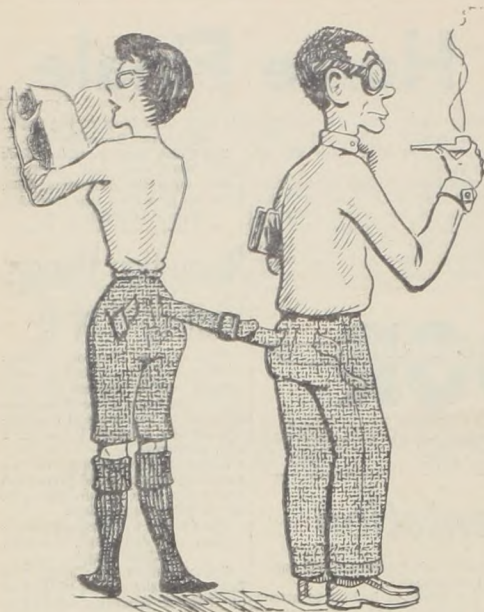
can operate on both open and closed circuit. The closed circuit will be in operation for Tech students only.

Tech's petition to the FCC contains an inventory of all available TV resources on the campus, according to Dr. S. M. Kennedy, chairman of the Radio-Television Committee. The information was obtained from a questionnaire sent to faculty members.

Recently the Avalanche-Journal carried a front page story stating that a 16-year-old Michigan youth had been expelled from school for — all things — wearing an Elvis Presley haircut.

We've heard Presley accused of a lot of things, but now, in a round-about-way, he's credited with depriving a youth of one of his most cherished possessions, the right for an education. For this is what it amounts to.

The judge, in handing down a ruling in this case, maintained: "The court does not quarrel with the right of the individual to be as ridiculous as he chooses to be. However, the school board has the responsibility to maintain discipline."

(Evidently this particular Michigan school had adopted a rule making it a specific offense for male students to wear long hair, i.e., Elvis Presley haircuts).

In effect, this decision censored Presley for his looks, and made it unlawful for students to emulate the popular singer. This ruling seems extreme. It intimates that the youth would have been a better student with short hair. May we suppose, then, that if the youth had a crew-cut he would have been an "A" student? The fact is he is failing at five of his courses.

While Presley continues to take his lumps from his critics, his female counterparts — Monroe and Mansfield — enjoy relative quiet. We're yet to hear of a girl being expelled from school for imitating these two, and there must have been hundreds at one time.

As an afterthought, what if Einstein had spent his youth in the present generation and had worn his hair as he did in his later years?

The series between the two teams stands at two wins for Tech and three for Houston, the Cougars taking the go-ahead win last year, 7-0. An interesting sidelight to the game is the fact that the head coaches of the opposing

teams — Billy Meek of Houston and Dewitt Weaver of Tech — are both graduates of the University of Tennessee.

For the third time this season, the Tech game has been designated as the official student trip for the visitors. The Houston delegation is expected to expand the crowd for Tech's final home appearance of the year to some 18,000.

## Tech Fresh Lose To West Texas 'B'

West Texas State's "B" team defeated Tech's freshmen yesterday afternoon at Canyon, 33-20. The WT squad, composed of footballers up to the varsity level, held a 20-0 halftime advantage, being played on more than equal terms by the Raiders when substitutes were inserted, according to Tech Coach Tom Hamm.

Quarterback Ronny Rice scored first for the Raiders, on a 40-yard keeper play. Tech's second TD was set up by a pass interception and runback of about 60 yards by Forrest Johnson. David Houston took the ball across on a quarterback sneak, from the three yard line.

Fullback Wallace Miller scored the final Picador touchdown, skirting right end from about 15 yards out. Points after were scored by Bourland (1) by placement and Mickey Baron (running).

Hamm selected guards Miller Matthews and Gene Lay for outstanding line play, along with tackle Bobby Cline. He cited as defensive play of the game of situation wherein right end Ed Stordland slammed an opposing back, took the ball from the stupefied runner, and almost got away for a touchdown, being downed after a 30-yard ramble.

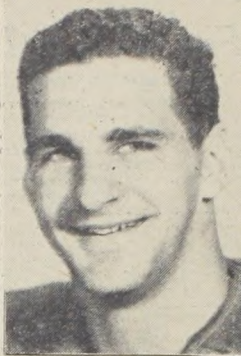
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## Vakey Is Tech's Leading Receiver

Left end Ken Vakey, one of the few Raiders who has started every game this season, will be one of 14 seniors performing for the last time in Jones Stadium tomorrow.

Vakey leads Tech in pass receiving, having caught 10 for 121 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown pass from Buddy Hill, which averted a shut-out in the Texas A&M game.

The San Antonio athlete is a good all-around man. In the Oklahoma A&M game, grading of films showed Vakey with a percentage

of 90, probably tops for the Raiders this season.

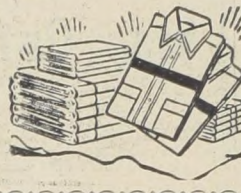
Vakey was a standout in the TCU game. He caught Ken Wineburg from behind on the latter's 50-yard run to avert a possible Frog touchdown. Ken was the principal downfield blocker on Charlie Dixon's 60-yard TD run, screening out Wineburg and another Frog.

Since big Bob Kilcullen has been out of action with his broken wrist, Vakey has been acting alternate captain in place of the injured tackle.

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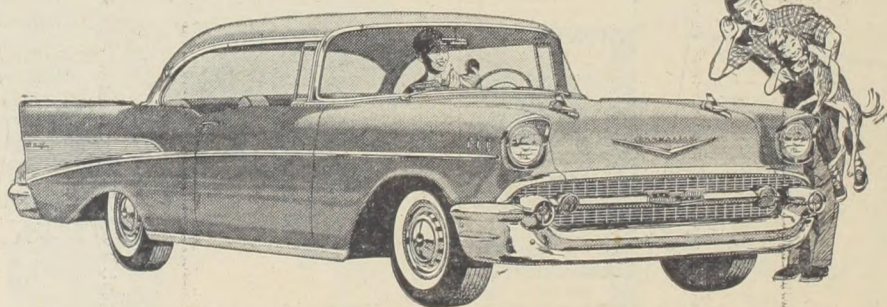
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


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
