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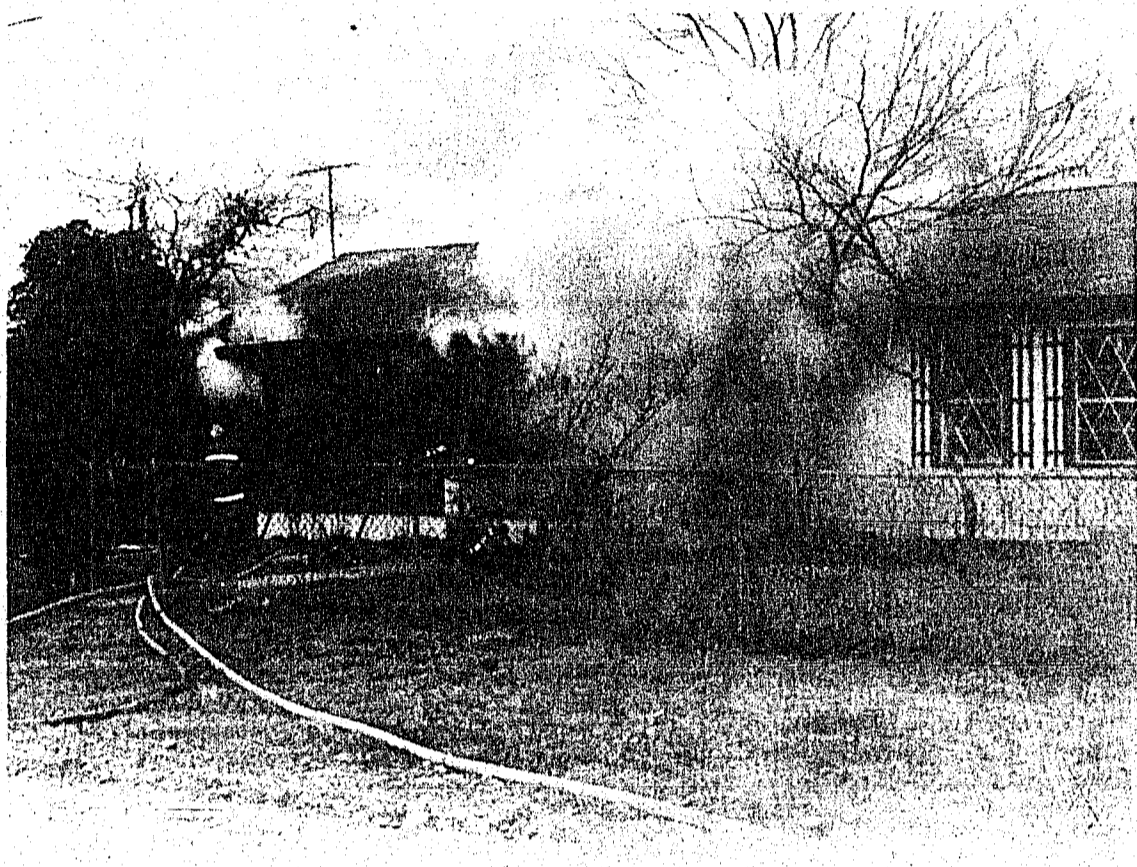

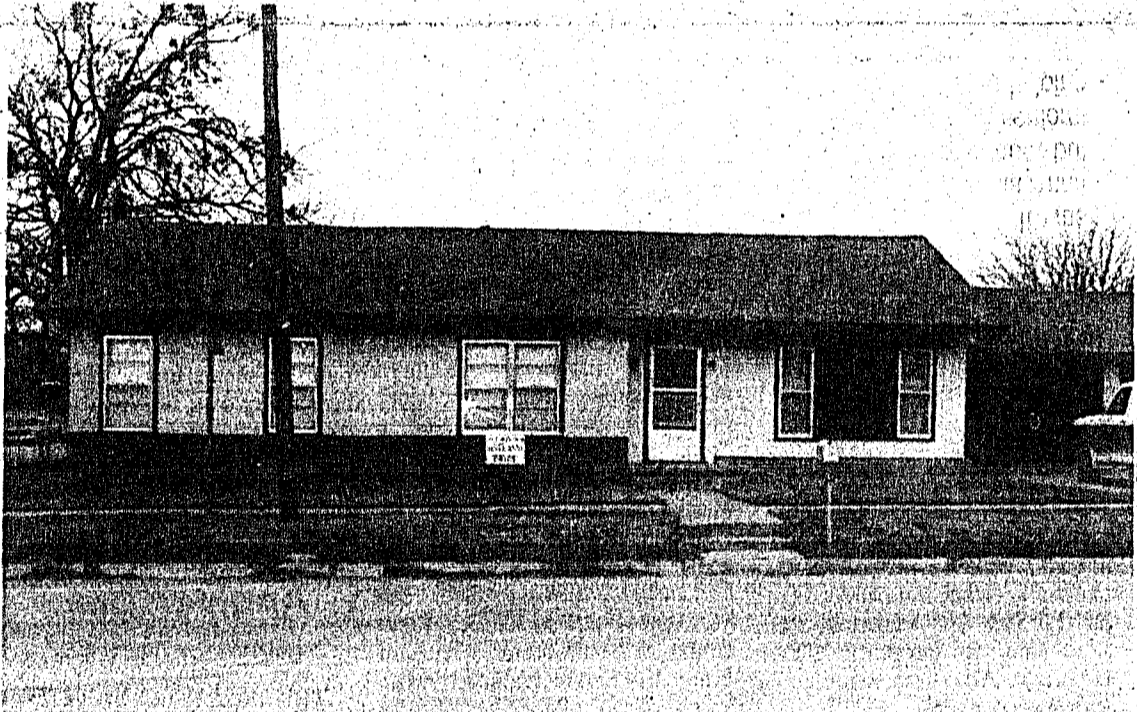

## Co. Commissioners Stop EMS Subsidy

Coleman County Commissioners met in a special meeting on Friday and voted unanimously to discontinue the ambulance subsidy as of January 31, 1992 when the agreement between the county and Coleman EMS Medevac Ambulance Service expires.

Commissioners, also voted to not call an election to allow voters to decide whether to approve an emergency services tax district to fund the ambulance service.

On February 1, 1992 the only ambulance service in the county will be operated by Henderson Funeral Home in Santa Anna.

Don Henderson, owner said "I have operated for 20 years and will continue to operate, but only in the immediate Santa Anna trade area, for as long as it is feasibly possible."

Dennis Doris, operator of

Coleman EMS Medevac, told commissioners that he cannot operate without the \$7,000 monthly subsidy the county has been providing.

Coleman County Judge, W. W. "Pete" Skelton said, "It's not what we wanted to do, it's what we had to do."

Commissioners are on record as saying the county can no longer afford to subsidize an ambulance service and did not include the \$7,000 per month subsidy in the budget for the fiscal year of 1991-92.

Commissioners feared that raising taxes to pay for the subsidy would force a tax rollback in the county, but Precinct 3 Commissioner Vernon Slate said Friday, "I believe it's (raising taxes) worth the chance that we won't have a rollback because I think the

people are aware it's for an ambulance service."

The county began subsidizing an ambulance service in 1987 after three Coleman funeral homes discontinued offering ambulance service. Since 1987, the county has spent approximately a quarter of million dollars in subsidy payments.

#### THE CHOICE TO MAKE

As parents we are given the awesome responsibility to teach our children to make right choice in life...to chose the right and not the wrong. As we study the Bible, we as parents, are told to "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6) The Bible clearly teaches that parents are to "bring them up in the training and admonition of the Lord." (Ephesians 6:4) We as parents must teach our children and youth God's way, rather than accepting society's way. We must teach them how to say "yes" to those things which are good in life and how to say "no" to those things which are not good in life. It all boils down to helping our children and youth to know what is the right decision to choose. Do you remember when the "Just Say No To Drugs" campaign began? Parents, teachers, and the church all rallied around our nation's leaders to teach our children and youth to "Just say no to drugs." We were, and still are, teaching them to "Choose life" rather than death.

Our society is currently teaching our children and youth to make another choice in life, but this time they are being taught to make the wrong choice. Our children and youth are currently being given the message, "Just Say Yes to Sex" rather than "Just Say No to Sex". Due to our society's tragic misuse of sex, our children and youth are given the message that it is acceptable to participate in a sexual relationship before marriage. 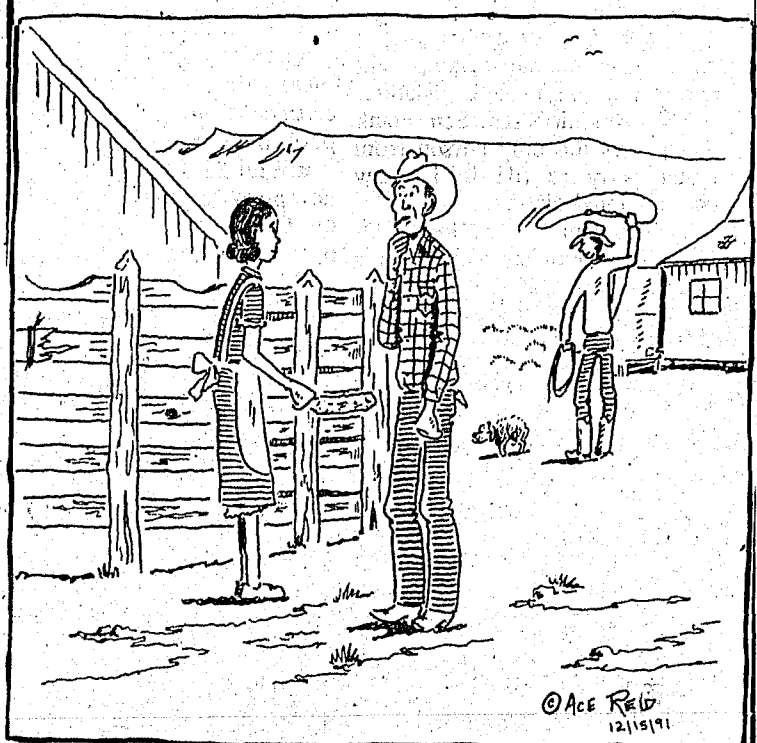

### Council Votes To Buy New Police Car

The City Council met on January 14, 1992 at 6:30 p.m. at the Coleman County Telephone Coop. Meeting Room. Mayor Gale Allen-Brock called the meeting to order with all council members present. Other present were Alys Pelton, Derriel Warnock and Carlos Torres.

The Invocation was given by Thomas Hays.

The police report was reviewed. Carlos stated that the holidays had been quieter than expected. Also, the grand jury agreed with the findings in Ricky Makuta's death being accidental suicide.

Superintendent of Operations Derriel Warnock received two bids on a new police car. Taylor Motors bid was for a Pontiac Boneville fully loaded for \$10,885. Bledsoe Ford bid was \$10,800 for a fully loaded Mercury. The current police car can replace the Ford LTD that Warnock uses. Carlos said he had test driven the two cars and preferred the handling of the Pontiac. Councilman Danny Kellar made the motion to purchase the 1991 Pontiac with a 3 year time warranty with annual payments. Councilman Jim Spillman seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Warnock reported that the New Year started off with a fire hydrant being run over, triggering a few incidents. There were 3 large water leaks due to the fire plug being hit. A new water tap had to be done as only one person was on the old line that was plugged as it was thought to only serve the old fire plug that was hit. There were 6 small leaks also during the month, and as much work as possible was done on the streets. The closing on the sewer farm project took place Friday January 10. Payment for the land involved will probably be this week or next.

Councilwoman Karen Morris made the motion to go into executive session with Councilman Emmitt Simmons seconding. The motion carried.

Councilman Thomas Hays made the motion to return to open session with Councilman Emmitt Simmons seconding. The motion carried.

Councilman Danny Kellar made the motion to renew the contract with the Coleman County Appraisal District. Motion carried with the signing of the contract.

Councilwoman Karen Morris made the motion to pay the accounts payable. Councilman Thomas Hays seconded and the motion carried.

**AUSTIN** - The U.S. Supreme Court may have brought Texas, screaming and kicking, into a new decade where two bona fide political parties will compete for independent voters.

Last week, the high court rejected the state attorney general's request to throw out federal court redistricting plans which Democrats fear will give Republicans a majority in the Texas Senate and close to one in the Texas House.

### Ruling Blasted, Praised

Immediately, various Democrats loudly criticized the three-judge federal panel, the Texas Republican Party, and even their own leaders for misplaying their legislative cards.

"What the Republican Party failed to accomplish at the ballot box, they've engineered" from behind the bench, cloaked in the black robes of Republican judges," said Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

But the "Republican Party" of Texas halted the ruling.

"For the first time, we're going to have fair elections for the state Senate," GOP chairman Fred Meyer said.

The court's ruling means that Texas will be among the 11 states holding presidential primaries on Super Tuesday - March 10.

### First in Speaker's Race

The race to replace Speaker Gib Lewis drew two historical firsts last week: the first woman and the first black candidates.

State Rep. Betty Denton, D-Waco, became the first woman to announce, closely followed by Wilhelmina Delco, D-Austin, the first black to seek the post.

The rules reform movement seems to be all the rage with speaker candidates now, as the oft-criticized committee chairmen of Speaker Lewis now talk reform.

### Judges Went Too Far?

U.S. Attorney General William Barr said federal judges went too far in trying to correct unconstitutional conditions in Texas prisons and will support efforts to remove court-imposed limits on prison populations.

State officials estimate 3,000 empty prison beds could be freed for use.

The population limit placed in Texas by federal judge William Wayne Justice prompted the early release of thousands of criminals from Texas prisons and spurred the Legislature to raise billions for new prisons with taxes and bonds.

### New Ethics Commission

Some describe it as a "weak sister," but the new Texas Ethics Commission got a political football thrown at it right off the bat, nevertheless.

Tom Smith, director of Public Citizen, a watchdog group, asked members to regulate campaign contributions in the coming House speaker's race, and "fill in the gaps" of a traditionally loose structure.

Smith said the commission also should decide if outgoing Gib Lewis can continue to use political funds to pay legal expenses for his

upcoming ethics trial in Austin.

### Lottery Start-Up

State Lottery Director, Nora Linares said she has mailed out more than 56,000 applications to retailers who want to sell \$1 lottery tickets for the state.

Linares hopes to enlist 15,000 to 20,000 retailers in the next four months. The retailers will make a nickel on every dollar ticket they sell.

To receive a license, applicants must submit a \$125 application fee, a set of fingerprints, and undergo a criminal history check.

### Other Highlights

Former Gov. Mark White resigned from the Hermann Hospital Trust board, the third trustee to do so amid a probe of trustee abuses. Media reports linked the Houston hospital's \$245,000 meat purchase from financially troubled Granada Foods to White, a partner in the law firm representing Granada.

State Sen. Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena, challenged Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, to a "street bowl," to promote anti-gang and drug efforts. The bowl will

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

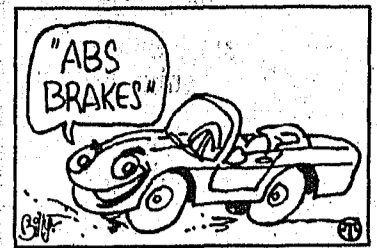

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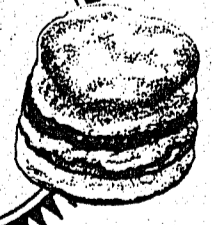

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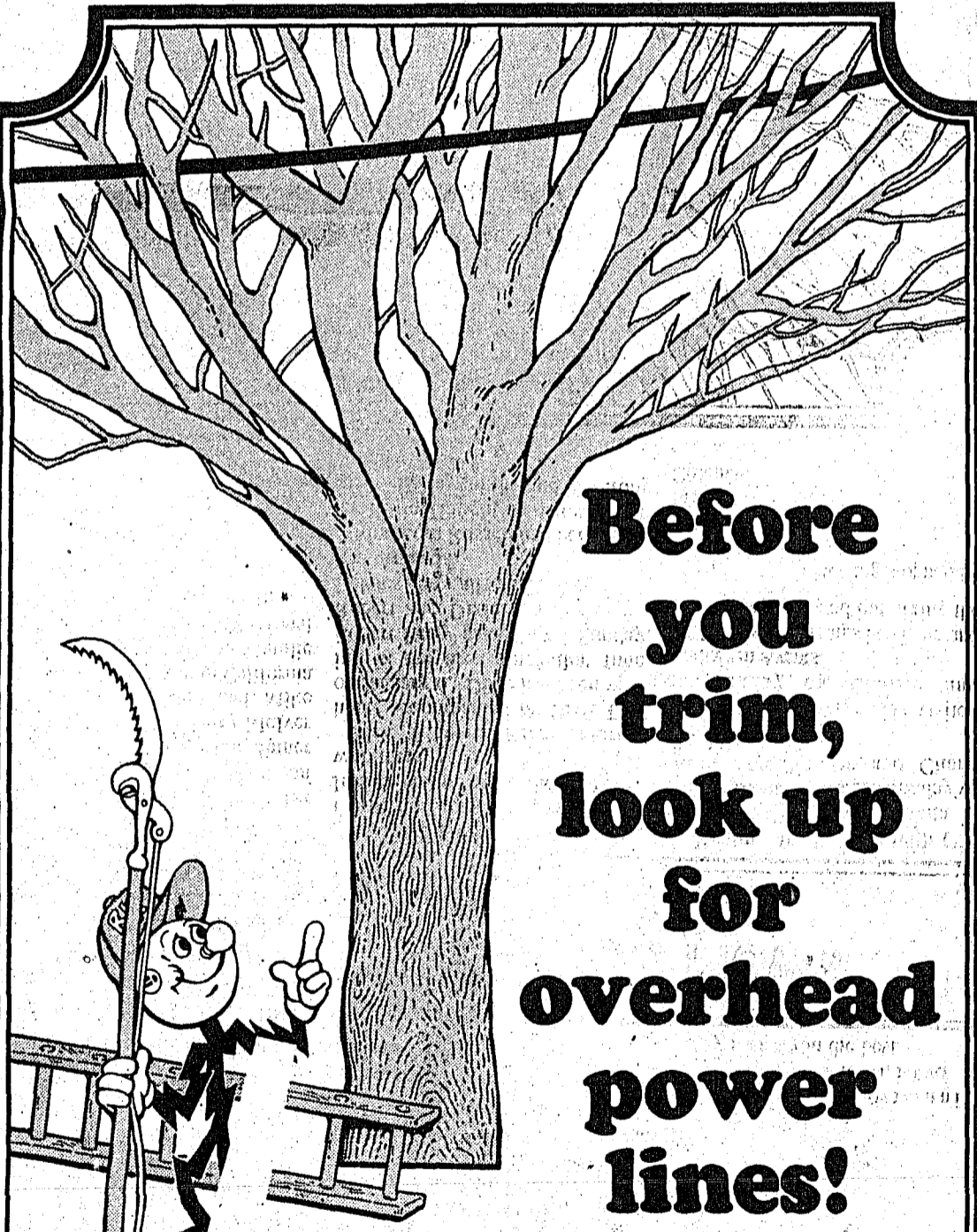
