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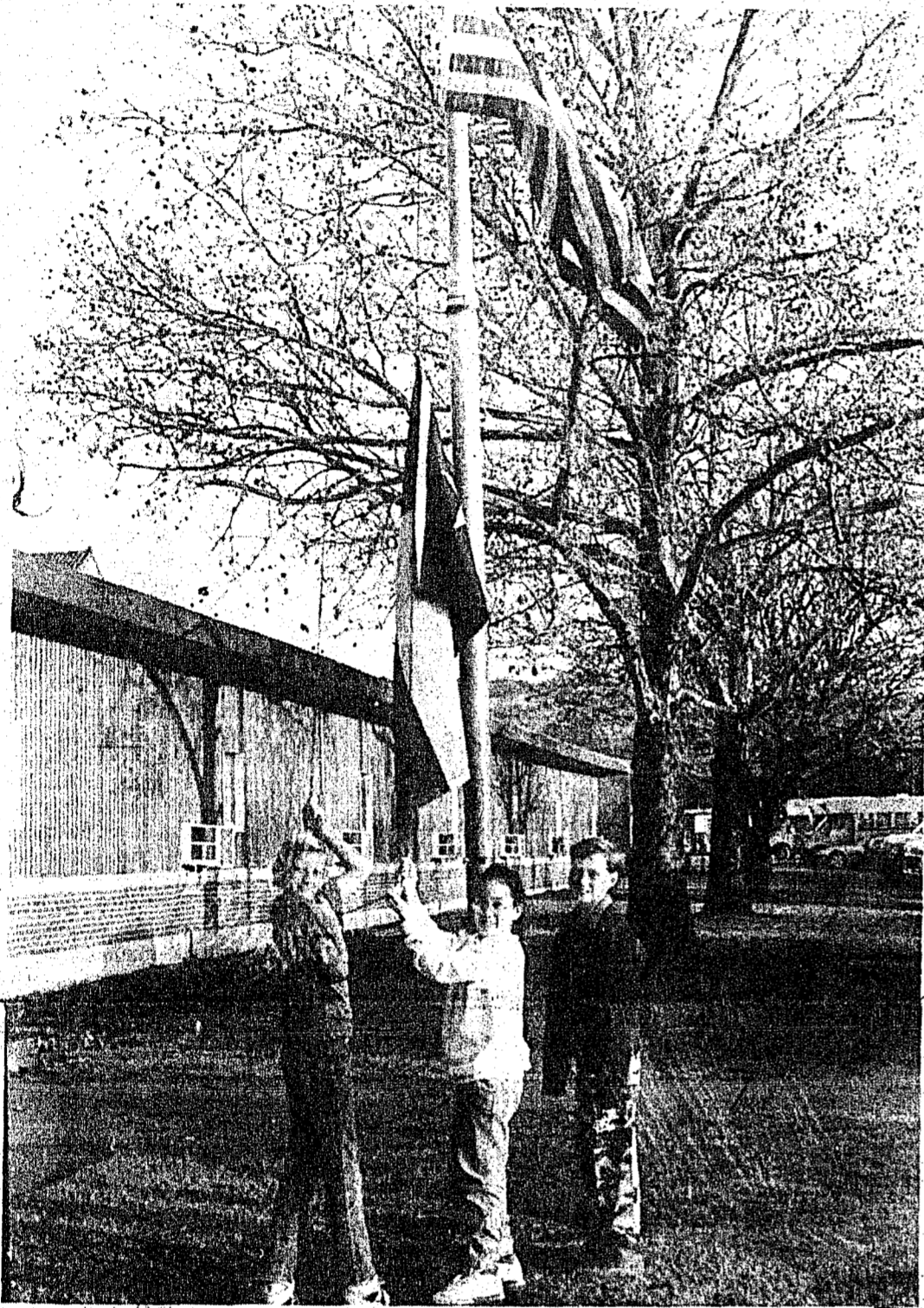

## Troy Fraser Announces For Senate Seat

January 17, 1992--Republican State Representative Troy Fraser, today announced his candidacy for Texas Senate District 25 which includes Coleman County.

"I'm running because, as a businessman and legislator, I'm familiar with what it takes to make payroll and create jobs. I want to do more to bring economic growth to this area," said Fraser, who built a manufacturing company with plants in Texas and Arkansas.

Fraser said opposition to the state income tax would be a key part of his campaign. "The Senate is a hotbed of pro-income tax supporters. When elected, my first act will be to sponsor a Constitutional Amendment to prohibit a state income tax," he said.

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock continues to flip-flop on his support for a personal income tax. "My election as an opponent of the state income tax will give Bullock second thoughts about bringing his income tax proposal to the floor of the Senate," Fraser said.

Fraser also said controlling government spending would be a top priority. He pointed out that, because of our state's economic recovery in 1990, revenues were up 11%. "But rather than live within our means," he said, "liberal Senate Democrats insisted on a 22% spending increase--a record \$12 billion jump to \$60 billion leading to the third largest tax increase in Texas history."

"I led the fight in the House to stop the tax and spend agenda of the liberals," Fraser said. "The House voted to cut more than \$2 billion from the budget, but the Senate added it back. If Texans needed reasons to replace some Democratic

Senators, the state budget gives them \$60 billion worth.

Fraser, the first Republican elected to the Texas House from District 69, was named "Legislator of the Year" by the National Republican Legislators Association

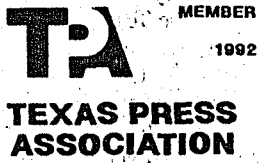
### \*NOTE FROM CITY HALL\*

## Max R. Woodward

Funeral services were held Thursday, January 23, 1992 at First Presbyterian Church in Sherman for Dr. Max Reagan Woodward, 89, who died Monday, January 20, in a Sherman Nursing Home. Interment was in West Hill Cemetery under the direction of Dannel Funeral Home. Dr. Williams C. Poe, pastor, officiated at the services.

Dr. Woodward was born in Gatesville, the son of Walter B. and Mary Olivia (Cole) Woodward. He and his family moved in Santa Anna in the early 1900's. He attended school in Santa Anna, graduating in 1919, and later graduated from The University of Texas at Austin and Medical School in Galveston. He interned as house physician at Neathery Hospital (now Wilson N. Jones Hospital), in Sherman. He specialized in pediatrics, doing graduate work at Harvard Medical School, Boston's Children's Hospital and the University of Vienna in Vienna, Austria.

He established Woodward Clinic for Children in Sherman and was widely known in the field of pediatrics. In addition to local and area professional organizations, Dr. Woodward served as chairman of the pediatric section of the American Medical Association in 1967 and served as a member of the executive board of the American Academy of Pediatrics and was district chairman in 1958 from the academy at the World Pediatric Conference in Brussels, Belgium. He retired from practice about 10 years ago.

Dr. Woodward also had agricultural interests in Grayson County and was a member and deacon of First Presbyterian Church and a member of Rotary Club. In 1969, Woodward was honored as Ex-Student of the Year by the Santa Anna Ex-Student Association and cited the award as being one of the greatest honors he ever received.

Dr. Woodward married Frances Drane in Sherman in 1929. She died in 1983.

Survivors are a son, Dr. John Woodward of Dallas; a daughter, Elizabeth (Betsy) Johnson of Lakewood, Colorado; and five grandchildren. Local survivors are a niece and nephew, Mary Lela Clifford and Tom Kingsberry.

### A NEW YEAR

Looking out this morning through the window of the soul I saw someone coming near to me. He had come down the road of time. "What is your name?" I asked. He replied, "I am that I am."

At this I was puzzled. It was so like an old story I had read in some ancient Book. "What an odd name," I answered.

"But I have another name," he said. "Some people call me The Ancient of Days."

And I was still more astonished, not knowing quite what it meant, and I feared to ask. He saw that I was troubled and perplexed and he went on: "I am Alpha and Omega, the first and the last. I am he that lived, and was dead; and behold I am alive for evermore."

And while he spoke, I noticed that he carried under his arm a bundle of books at which I wondered. "You are interested, I see, in these books," he said. "They are yours. Don't you recognize them?" and I had to confess that I did not remember ever having seen them before.

I was now very much puzzled, for I had no recollection either of writing the books; or even of their existence. And now a strange thing happened. "Count these books," said my visitor. And I counted them. "Twelve," I said.

"Would you like to look inside?" he asked. And I opened the books, one after another. They were all of nearly the same size, varying only in the number of pages. Some had thirty pages, and others thirty-one, while one of the books only had twenty-eight. But none of them had thirty-two. And then he said "Take these books inside and hold them open, one by one, before the fire."

And lo, as I did so, a writing which before was invisible stood out in living characters. And I was astonished to see that it was indeed my own handwriting. I felt rather ashamed of it for the writing was not very good. On the contrary it was very bad writing in some places.

"I wish you," he said, "a happy New Year," and began to move away. "And I hope that with the New Year your writing will improve" And with that he said "Good-by."

Now tell me, my friends, what was the writing in those books? The answer is, of course -- all that I had thought, and said, and done, every day through all the months of the year that had gone.

If you want your life to be filled with Christian joy and gladness try the following simple recipe: Learn something beautiful every day; look for something beautiful every day. Then do not forget to do something beautiful every day. God can lead and guide us much better when we are active in Christian service. 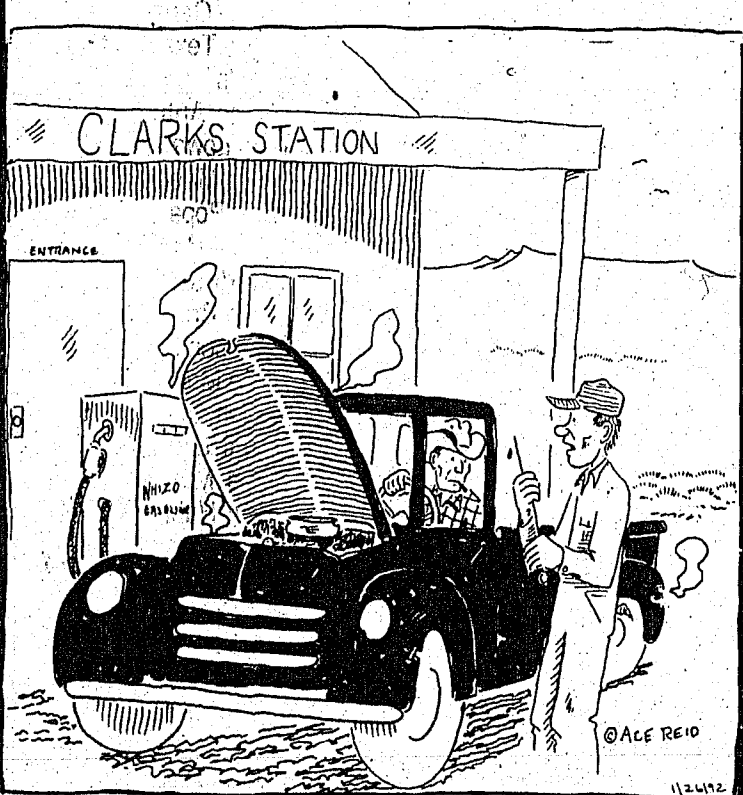
Makes 3 dozen  
2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour  
1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 cup margarine, softened  
1 cup sugar  
2 teaspoons almond extract  
1/4 cup Egg Beaters 99% Real Egg Product  
6 tablespoons raspberry preserves  
Confectioners' Sugar  
Glaze, recipe follows  
Combine flour and baking soda; set aside.

In bowl, with electric mixer at medium speed, beat margarine, sugar and almond extract until creamy. Add egg product; beat 1 minute. Gradually stir in flour mixture until blended. Chill dough for 1 hour.

Shape dough into 36 (1-inch) balls; place 2 inches apart on lightly greased baking sheets. Make a small indentation in each ball with thumb. Spoon 1/2 teaspoon preserves into each indentation. Bake at 375°F for 10 to 12 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool on wire racks. Drizzle with Confectioners' Sugar Glaze.

Confectioners' Sugar Glaze: Combine 1 cup confectioners' sugar and 5 to 6 teaspoons water.

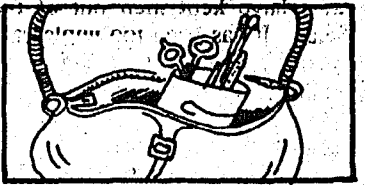
I recommend you watch this movie. I'm sure you will enjoy it as much as I did.

## Two Juveniles Apprehended After High Speed Chase

Two Santa Anna juveniles were apprehended over the week-end after leading several law officials on a high speed chase Saturday night.

The case began in Coleman when city policeman there spotted a 1991 Mercury Cougar that had been reported stolen in Santa Anna Friday night. The youngsters managed to elude the Coleman policeman and led the Highway Patrol and Department of Wildlife officials (game wardens) on a chase over rural roads in the county before coming back to Santa Anna where Police Chief Carlos Torres managed to hem them up on the High

School parking lot after a chase through the streets of Santa Anna. One youth was apprehended there while the other fled on foot. He was picked up Sunday.

According to a report from Chief Torres on Monday, the youths were in the custody of Juvenile Detention at Abilene.

Torres again advises citizens to keep their vehicles parked in lighted areas if at all possible and to always keep them locked when not in use.

He adds that any items of value stored outside should be in a lighted area. He also encourages you to report any activity that might be suspicious—day or night.

## Entries Being Sought for 1992 Texas Beef Cook-off

Changes in consumer lifestyles have generated changes in the 1992 Texas Beef Cook-Off including more opportunities to win more prize money than ever before.

Entries are now being accepted up to March 1, 1992, for this annual event that will be held April 23-24 at the Ramada Inn in Wichita Falls, Texas. All persons entering the contest will also receive a coupon good for \$3 off any beef purchase.

"The Texas Beef Cook-Off has traditionally sought out the best beef dish in Texas from amateur cooks," Leigh Kimbell, chairman of the 1992 Texas Beef Cook-Off, said. "Yet the daily lifestyle of consumers doesn't always allow them to prepare the best dish. They want good nutrition for their children, they want less calories, they want convenience, they want tasty dishes for parties, and they want to stretch their food dollars. The 1992 Texas Beef Cook-Off will reflect all these consumer needs."

This year, 15 contestants will compete for a total of \$10,000 in prize money. First place overall will win \$3,000, second place overall will win \$2,000 and the winner of each of the five categories will win \$1,000. The five categories will be: Beef Meals Kids Like; Best Under 300 Calories Per Serving of Beef Recipes; Most Convenient Beef Recipe; Beef Recipes for Entertaining; and Budget Beef Meals.

"One recipe can fit several categories," Kimbell said. "The more categories a recipe fits, the more opportunities a contestant has to win the overall prize."

Entries may include oven or range prepared recipes, microwave recipes and outdoor barbecue recipes in the five categories.

Only the highest ranking oven or range prepared recipe will advance

to the National Beef-Cook-Off for a chance at the top prize of \$15,000. However, all microwave and outdoor barbecue recipes will advance to the national competition for a chance to win the Southwest Region. All recipes should include suggestions for a complete meal featuring the beef dish.

Anyone 18 years of age or older who resides in Texas and is not a food professional or a beef producer may enter the 1992 contest. Each contestant must have an original, innovative beef recipe.

The entries will be judged by a five-member panel of national food experts. Dishes are rated on taste, appeal, ease of preparation and appearance.

### Save Employment Tax Records

Farm employers need to keep all records relating to employment taxes they have paid for at least four years after the due date of the return period to which the records relate or the date the taxes are paid.

These records include such things as employees' names and social security numbers, cash payments for farm work, deductions for income and social security taxes, and any records of non-cash wage payments.

### HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** - A Rio Grande Valley district judge ruled last week that Texas discriminates against Mexican-Americans in college funding and gave legislators 16 months to find a remedy.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock reversed his call for a state income tax, saying he would not work for a tax increase next session.

In other events last week:

■ House Speaker Gib Lewis pleaded no contest to two minor charges and paid \$2,000 in fines, in exchange for prosecutors dropping two ethics charges on which he faced trial this week.

■ The National Women's Political Caucus touted Gov. Ann Richards as a potential candidate for vice president; Richards pushed the wreath away again, but rumors persist she wants it.

■ Former Gov. Mark White resigned from a Houston hospital board and his law firm in the wake of a conflict of interest scandal and personal financial problems.

### Judge Overrules Jury

In striking down the Texas university and college funding system as unconstitutional, Judge Ben Eures Jr. said it denies Mexican-Americans equal opportunity.

Texas Atty. Gen. Dan Morales, who unsuccessfully defended the state, afterwards said he also thinks the state discriminates against minorities in its funding

system.

The jury determined Texas didn't give Hispanics equal access to the University of Texas and Texas A&M, but found no discrimination against Hispanics in distribution of higher education funds.

Eures Jr. overruled the jury on the discrimination question.

The ruling, issued in a lawsuit filed by League of United Latin American Citizens, comes at a time when many state officials believe the Texas Supreme Court will soon throw out the Legislature's reform of public school finance.

Unhappy with federal judges who rewrote the Legislature's redistricting law, Gov. Richards lashed out last week against judicial meddling, and included a warning to Texas Supreme Court justices that the Legislature may let them write a new school funding law if they strike the reform.

### Lost Tax Dollars?

In case that happens, some of the state's largest businesses sought relief to insure the return of school property tax dollars they expect to pay by Jan. 31.

But State District Judge Scott McCown took only 15 minutes to reject their request to delay collection and use of those taxes.

State law holds that once a tax is paid, it cannot be refunded; the pre-emptory challenge to the new tax might get businesses past that stopper.

Homeowners and businesses which paid school property taxes in '91 in order to receive a federal income tax deduction will lose the tax money, even if it is declared collected illegally, income tax deduction will be out of luck.

### Lewis Avoids Trial

Speaker Lewis took the no contest deal to avoid the public embarrassment of a trial, and 18 months jail term if found guilty, but afterwards he claimed to have

been railroaded by political foes.

The indictments against Lewis came out of a probe into lawmaker-lobbyist relationships by Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle.

Last week, Earle said the probe, which cost thousands of tax dollars, was worth it because Lewis was finally removed from office. "The clear winner is the public," Earle said.

Earle, an Austin political fixture, was elected chief prosecutor in the '70s when Gov. Ann Richards served as a Travis County Commissioner.

### Bullet Train Gift Rapped

Texas Railroad Commission chairman Lena Guerrero, a Richards appointee, came under heavy fire last week for accepting \$10,000 from a partner in the bullet train syndicate which last week won a \$5 billion state contract.

Dallas oilman Barry Williamson, her Republican opponent, said she should "give a complete accounting of all contributions she had asked for or gotten from high-speed rail interests."

Guerrero said the gift did not influence her vote, that she had gotten political contributions from project opponents, and that "Unlike Mr. Williamson, I do not have the personal wealth to draw on to finance my campaign."

### Other Highlights

■ Watchdog group Public Citizen asked the Texas Ethics Commission to monitor political gifts made by lobbyists to candidates for speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

■ Former U. S. Atty. Gen. Edwin Meese, speaking in Dallas, called for less federal court interference in state prisons.

"Some of the most ...outrageous rulings have been here in Texas," he said, urging tougher punishments for lawbreakers.

■ The man sentenced to death for raping and killing an elderly nun, who was given a 30-day reprieve by Gov. Ann Richards, will get a pardon and parole board hearing this week.

The prosecutor, Potter County DA Danny Hill, accused Richards of pressuring the board into granting a commutation.

■ Gay rights activists asked the State Board of Education to require public school textbook publishers to reveal homosexual and bisexual historical figures.

# Winchell Bridge To Be Closed For Repairs

TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPT., BROWNEOOD—The Colorado River Bridge on U. S. Highway 377 at Winchell will be closed for repairs in late February or early March, according to officials of the Brownwood District of the Texas Department of Transportation.

A detour will be created for motorists traveling between Brownwood and Brady. The detour will begin at the Traffic "T" in Brownwood. Traffic will be directed to go west on US 67-84 to Santa Anna, then turn left onto US 283, and continue south through Fife to the US 87 intersection northwest of Brady.

"We first noticed problems on the north abutment of the Winchell bridge after the flood of April, 1990," said Will Parks, TxDOT area engineer from Brownwood. "With the recent flooding last month, the problem has gotten much worse. The bridge is still safe to cross, but we've eliminated overweight loads."

This concrete bridge, known as the Winchell Bridge, was completed in May of 1989. It replaced an old steel truss bridge, a familiar landmark for area residents. The old bridge was too narrow, and its design would not allow it to be widened to modern design standards, Parks said.

"There is nothing wrong with the design or construction of the new bridge," he added. "Seepage from the unusually large rainfall has opened a type of natural spring, causing a soil failure known as a rotational slide. The increase in groundwater pressure has caused concrete damage underneath the north end of the bridge."

An additional 85 foot span will be built on the north side of the bridge, which will cross the soil failure.

It is expected that the bridge will be closed to traffic three to four months while the structure is being repaired. Unless additional damage occurs, the bridge will remain open until construction begins.

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
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
