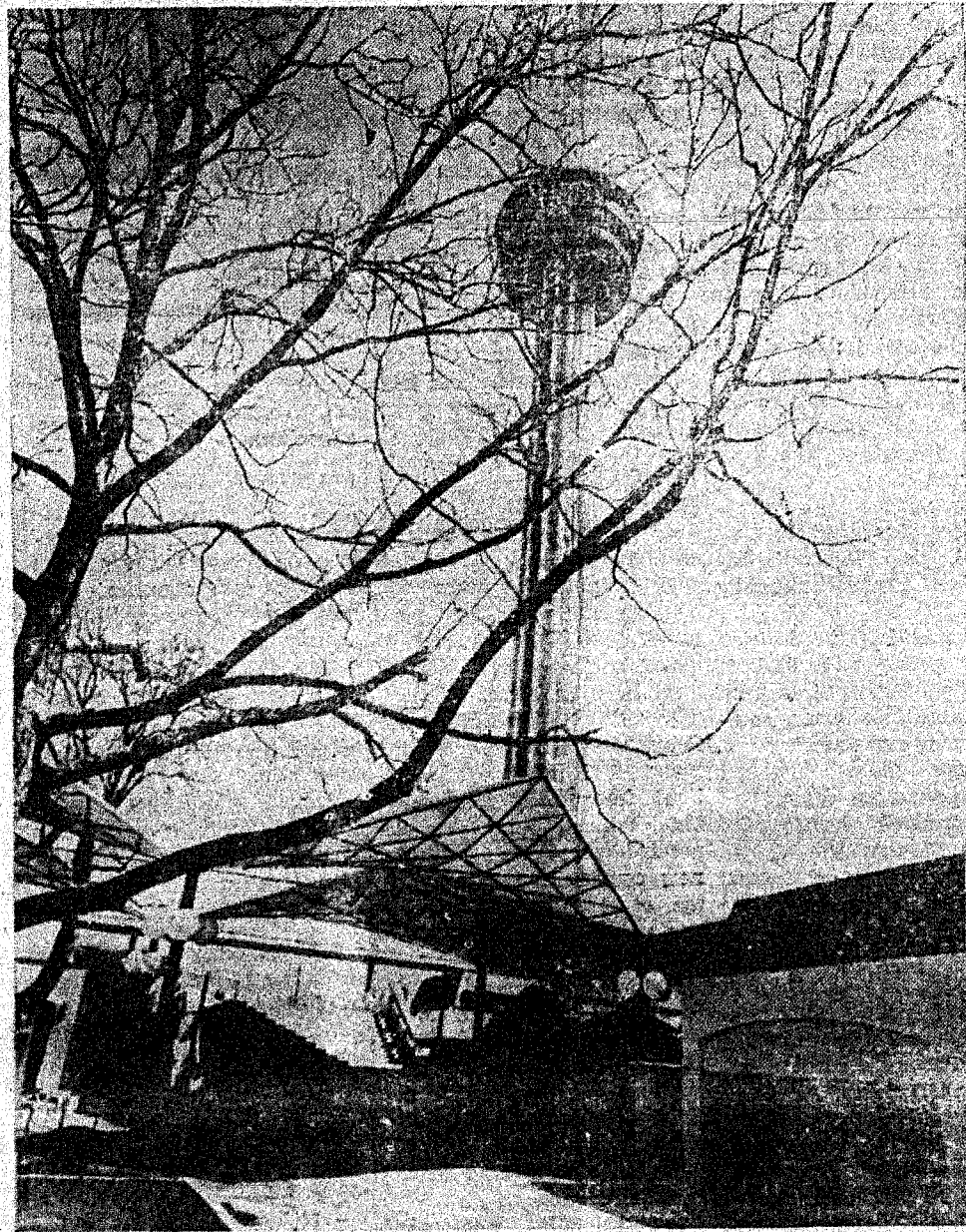

Mayor Proclaims Local Nursing Home Week

Citizen support of a "better life program" to be launched on Mother's Day with a statewide open house observance in more than 600 nursing homes, was urged today by Mayor Ford Barnes.

"Many nursing home patients are alone in this world, having survived relatives or friends" Mayor Barnes pointed out in proclamation issued today. "As mayor of Santa Anna I urge the residents of this city to participate actively in the observance of Texas Nursing Home Week by visiting, and taking a small gift to a nursing home patient on Mother's Day."

The open house observance is sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association and its 19 affiliated local chapters. More than 600 individual nursing homes and related health care facilities are members of the State association. These homes provide more than 70 per cent of the 47,500 nursing home beds available in this state.

Theme of Texas Nursing Home Week is "Nursing Home: For the Better Life." The theme was chosen to dramatize the changes taking place in the nation's nursing homes which, during the past decade, have modernized their facilities and programs and now offer a wide range of therapy and para-medical services to the chronically ill and convalescent patients of all ages.

Game Management Officers Positions Now Open

AUSTIN — Applications for game management officers, formerly called game wardens, are now being accepted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, according to James D. Archer, personnel director of the Department.

Deadline for receipt of application in Austin is May 29. Successful applicants will enter the 23rd Game Management Officer Training School to begin in September at Texas A & M University.

Applicants must be of good character, be between 21 and 40 years of age, in good physical condition, have a high school diploma and stand at least five feet, eight inches tall.

Weight of the applicant must be proportionate to the height — at least 20 lbs. for each inch of height and not more than three pounds per inch of height.

Applicants must have at least 20-40 vision in each eye separately without corrective lenses of any kind. Vision must be correctable to 20-20.

U. S. citizenship and one year's residency in Texas is also required. If selected, the applicant must be willing to accept duty assignment anywhere in the State of Texas.

Written and oral examinations will be conducted in San Antonio, Corpus Christi, La Porte, Tyler, Waco, Dallas, Lubbock, and San Angelo.

Austin, Texas — Governor John Connally has accepted invitations of supporters to actively seek designation as Texas' favorite son Democratic presidential candidate.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough has also been urged by anti-Con-

nally and pro-Robert Kennedy and pro-Eugene McCarthy forces to make a fight against the governor in precinct conventions for the favorite son role. Although critical of Connally, Yarborough has not responded to the call.

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Labor leaders were among those pushing Yarborough as favorite son, but AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education failed to place its stamp of approval on this recommendation. COPE administrative committee opposed commitment of the Texas delegation to Connally as favorite son, and recommended Yarborough for vice president.

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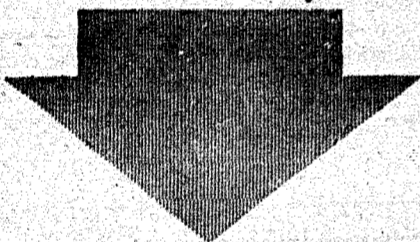
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The issue may set off a major fight in precinct conventions May 4, only place where the average Texas voter will have anything to say about the choice of a presidential nominee.

COURTS SPEAK

Law enforcement officers are sweating out the potential far-reaching effect of a new federal court decision here declaring Texas' disturbing the peace law unconstitutional.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin will file a motion for rehearing and take his appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court if necessary. He called the decision by a three-judge federal panel in the case which originated with Vietnam war protesters displaying signs during a speech by President Johnson in Killean "a tremendous blow to law enforcement."

The Federal judges stayed their mandate pending an opportunity of the state legislature to redefine "disturbance" offense within their guidelines.

They concluded that the existing law, providing fines up to \$200, is "impermissibly and is unconstitutionally broad."

Martin said if the decision stands, police will find it "exceedingly difficult to keep law and order in various communities of our state."

Actually, charges against the anti-Vietnam group had been dropped before the hearing because the alleged offense occurred on federal property. Therefore, the state maintains that the court had no authority to test the statute's constitutionality. Martin says dismissal of the original charges rendered the federal court case moot.

Further, Attorney General argues, Texas law prohibits specific actions which are breaches of peace and do not fall within prior decisions of the U. S. Supreme Court which invalidated some disturbance statutes.

In another federal court case, a San Antonio mother of six sued to collect aid to dependent children, though she did not meet the state's one year residency requirement. She maintained that, since 76 per cent of the welfare money for that purpose came from the federal government, she was entitled to benefits.

Again, a three-judge panel agreed with the plaintiff in a decision that could extend to all welfare, since federal

money is everywhere. Attorney Gen. Martin indicated he will appeal this decision to the U. S. Supreme Court.

A woman who lost her hair after using a home permanent liquid cannot collect damages from Proctor and Gamble Company because failed to follow directions, State Supreme Court has held.

A Houston lawyer disbarred for failing to file lawsuits after accepting legal fees lost his appeal to the high court.

Supreme Court will hear arguments May 8 over former State Savings and Loan Commissioner's denial of application by Oak Cliff Savings and Loan Association for a branch office in Fort Worth. The District court struck down the commissioner's ruling.

The Liquor Control Board had authority to cancel a Monaville (Waller County) grocery store's wine and beer permit, the Supreme Court agreed.

TEACHER PAY RAISE PLANNED

The Governor's Committee on Public School Education will recommend "large and substantial" teacher pay raises with built-in cost of living escalation plan, Chairman Leon Jaworski says.

Jaworski indicated the Committee also will recommend (by August 31 deadline) free public kindergartens, summer schooling, expanded vocational training, new course in programming tax equalization among districts and school reorganization.

Committee will hold a public hearing here April 26 to preview some of its findings in areas of enrollment projections for the next decade, school dropout study, analysis of school and results of an adult and teacher opinion poll.

Jaworski also announced that the Committee contracted with a Dallas company to produce a filmed version of its report and recommendations to the Legislature in January, 1969.

BUDGET BOARD VOTES

Legislative Budget Board recommended a \$2,200,000 special session appropriation to help build and equip new vocational and technical training facilities at Odessa College. The Board also approved \$86,900 and \$46,245 requests of Angelo State College and Midwestern University for associate science degree offerings in nursing.

Members went along with request for \$150,000 supplemental appropriation to help build new facilities at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park and \$10,000 for Higher Education Coordinating Board participation in a study on college education opportunities for Negroes.

Passed over for the time being was a request of the Liquor Control Board for an additional \$2,300,000.

VETS LAND POLICY CHANGED

New veterans land policies have been ordered to limit veterans' purchase to no more than 10 per cent of any one sub-division.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said interest in the revived program — through which qualified veterans can buy land on long-term, low-interest rate arrangement — has been "overwhelming," but too many applications

have been coming in on subdivisions.

"We cannot spend all our money in a few isolated areas," said Sadler in announcing new restrictions. "We have large subdivisions that have put prices on their land far above market value in the area. All veterans should have a change to buy throughout the state and not spend our money in a few large subdivisions."

NEW FORMULAS

The Coordinating Board of Texas Colleges and Universities has adopted new formula rates for submission to the Legislature for the state fiscal years 1970-71.

The Board also approved a second election for creation of a junior college district in Jefferson County, adopted criteria for the creation of such districts, approved a uniform financial reporting system for junior colleges and okayed a \$50,000 research project by the University of Houston on continuing education.

POLLUTION STUDY

The State Health Department's three-year solid-waste survey has been completed in 71 Texas counties that hold some 40 per cent of the State's population.

The department will draw up a state plan based on information from the study (about a year away from completion) for solid-waste collection and disposal, with specific emphasis on regional commissions and councils of government.

SHORT SNORTS

J. O. Smith has resigned as chairman of the State Industrial Accident Board effective May 4, to become hearing examiner for the Social Security Administration in Dallas.

Attorney General Martin named Asst. Atty. Gen. Robert C. Flowers as head of his enforcement division which represents the state whenever the constitutionality of a state statute is challenged in the federal courts.

Governor Connally reappointed Marvin Shurbet of Petersburg and Milton T. Potts of Livingston to the Texas Water Development Board for terms extending to Dec. 30, 1973.

Texas military units at Gatesville, Lampasas, San Antonio and Austin were among 24,500 U. S. reservists recently called to active duty.

State Auditor C. H. Cavness, who's held that job since 1942, announced his retirement, and George W. Mc-Niel, Cavness' first assistant, was named by the Legislative Audit Committee to succeed him.

Parks and Wildlife Commission says three more federal grants totalling \$317,730 have been approved for state

park developments at Amarillo Medical Center, Anzalduas Dam and Delta Lake in Hidalgo County and San Jacinto Battleground in Harris County.

Attorney General Martin has held that the residence of the Council of Churches director in San Antonio is tax exempt.

More than \$99,900 worth of textbooks were destroyed by Hurricane Beulah in the Rio Grande schools, Texas Education Agency calculates.

A two-year demonstration project in the field of adult probation will be carried out in Travis, Hays, Comal, Fayette, Caldwell and Austin Counties with Reps. Ralph Scroggins of El Paso, Vernon Stewart of Wichita Falls and Lamoine Holland of San Antonio serving as advisors.

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Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I owe about \$50 on my 1967 taxes. Should I add that amount to my 1968 estimated tax check?

A—It is advisable to write

separate checks or money orders for the two different tax liabilities to make sure your payments are properly credited. Identify each check with your name and social security number and indicate what tax the payment covers.

The reason for writing separate checks for your 1967 tax balance and your 1968 estimated tax payment is that separate processing operations are involved for the tax payments, the entire amount may be credited to just one tax. This could result in a refund for overpayment on one return and a bill for additional tax on the other return.

It will also be helpful to mail each tax return with the check attached in a separate envelope. This will help assure that the return is properly processed.

Q—I'm 59 and retired last year because of illness. Is my company pension taxable?

A—A pension received for retirement before normal retirement age because of sickness or injury may qualify as sick pay. In that case up to \$100 a week may be excluded

ed from income until you reach normal retirement age. For details, send a post card to your district director and ask for Document No. 5016, Sick Pay.

Q—I filed my tax return over ten weeks ago. Shouldn't I have my refund by now?

A—Yes, if the return was complete and accurate. A return claiming a refund filed early in the year takes from 5 to 6 weeks to process. In most cases, when refunds

are delayed, a letter explaining the delay is sent to the taxpayer.

If you have not heard from IRS, check the address you used on your tax return to see if it is the same as your current address. If not, send your new address to the Service Center where you filed your return. Lack of a current address holds up the delivery of many refunds.

If your address has not changed, contact your local IRS office or write to the Service Center where you filed. Give your name, Social Security number, address, date of filing, type of return filed and ask them for advice about your refund.

Q—I pay medical care insurance for my mother. Can I use the new rules on medical care insurance deductions?

A—Yes, premiums paid for

medical care insurance for yourself, your spouse and your dependents are covered by the new rules. Total all of these premiums you paid last year and deduct one-half of them up to \$150 without regard to the three percent rule. The balance of the premiums should be included with your other medical expenses which are subject to the three percent limitation.

You must itemize your deductions to use this new rule.

Q—My refund came last week and it is about \$40 less than what I claimed. Why?

A—It could be that you made a mistake in arithmetic or used the wrong tax table. An explanation of why the change was necessary should be mailed to you shortly.

To avoid such mistakes in the future, double check your return before you file. If you are married and filing a joint return use the table for married couples filing jointly, not the one for married couples filing separately. Single taxpayers should not use the table for heads of household unless they meet the requirements described on page 3 of the 1040 instructions.

Q—My wife and I own stock which is registered in both our names. Are the first \$200 in dividends we receive tax free?

A—Yes, if you file a joint return. If you file separately each may exclude up to \$100 in dividends.

Q—We adopted a child last year although the final papers didn't go through until this year. Can we claim her as a dependent on our 1967 return?

A—Yes, if the child was placed in your home for adoption in 1967, was a member of your household and the support tests described on page 4 of the 1040 instructions are met.

Q—How do I get the taxes back that were withheld from my wages last summer? This was my only income and I earned less than \$600 for the year.

To obtain a refund of withheld income taxes an income tax return must be filed. You may use the short Form 1040A available at post offices, banks and IRS offices. Be sure to include a copy of your withholding statement showing the wages paid and taxes withheld.

Q—I am employed as a painter and occasionally do some work on my weekends. Do I have to pay self-employment tax?

A—If the net income from your part-time work is \$400 or more you may be liable for self employment tax. For an explanation of this tax send a post card to your district director and ask for a copy of Document No. 5047, Self - Employment Tax.

Q—I use my car for business. Is there anything I can deduct for its operation?

A—Yes, if the cost of its operation qualifies as an allowable business expense. In that case you may deduct your actual expenses in operating the car or a standard mileage rate of ten cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use and seven cents a mile thereafter.

after. Check your 1040 instructions to see if you qualify for this deduction.

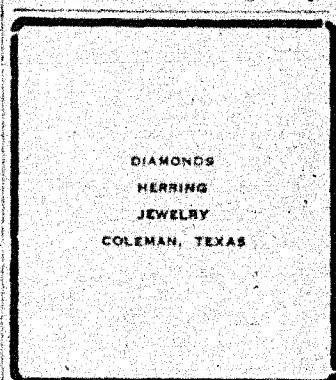
If you use the standard mileage rate, a speedometer reading at the beginning and end of each business trip will establish the amount you can deduct. Tolls and parking fees are deductible in addition to the standard rate.

If you are reimbursed by your company for the use of the car, your deduction must be reduced by the amount of your reimbursement. Any excess of your reimbursements over the expenses should be declared as income.

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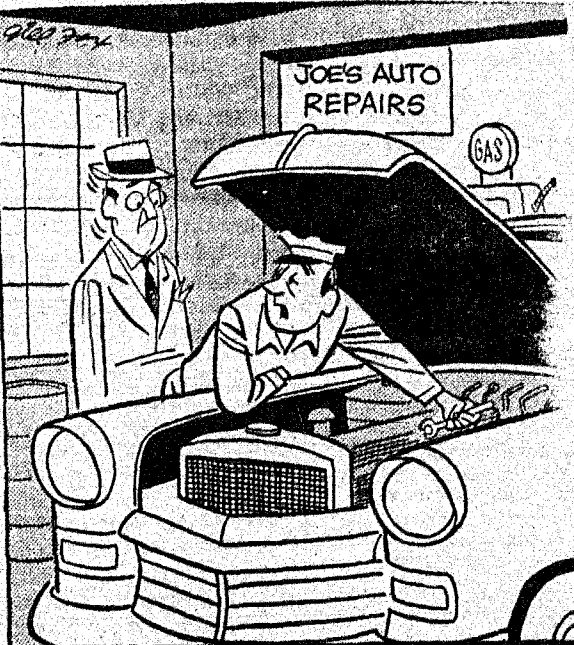


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AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Omar Burleson, M. C.
Washington, D. C. — The following is a short speech made on the floor of the House of Representatives last week:
"Mr. Burleson. Mr. Speaker, obviously the House is proceeding today under sensitive circumstances. Frankly in my opinion we should not be in session at all and specifically, we should not be considering the legislation be-

fore us under prevailing conditions.
"There is not a member here who would not assume that I am opposed to the pending bill but let me say to those of you who support it that you would do well for the country to wait for a more sober and a more calm atmosphere to act than is the obvious case at the present time.
"I think if I were for this so-called civil rights bill, with its open housing feature, I would not want to cast my vote for it while soldiers and marines are having to stand guard in front of this Capitol. I resent threats of force and duress in anything and if I had to legislate under such conditions I would walk out of this Chamber and not return.
"There is a way to honorably and with courage meet this issue, since apparently it is going to be acted on within the next hour or so. That is, to send this measure to conference with the

Senate. Let differences between the House and Senate bills be resolved and brought to each body for approval or disapproval under more calm circumstances.
"This matter has no deadline except the threats of these groups who look for any excuse to riot and demonstrate. If it is not this, it likely will be something else. When the drums call they will be there and it is high time we challenge the drummer. "It is a sad commentary on this Congress if it yields to the pressures of the moment. I for one had rather yield my seat in this House than to do so."

The results of this legislation referred to is well-known to everyone from press reports.
As one who has always taken pride in the House of Representatives of the Congress as the greatest deliberative body in the world, there is reason today to be ashamed of its actions. The shame is not only the results of the vote but also because the House legislated under pressures and threats wholly and completely un-American.
On the vote, 89 Democrats and 106 Republicans stood firm against approval, 152 Democrats and 77 Republicans voted to pass the Bill. As a part of the influences under which this legislation should not have been considered was the fact that flags all over the Nation were fly-

ing at half-mast for a man who had never held any official position and the Presidential Proclamation ordering the action was without precedent.
The flags were not ordered lowered for Travis Crow, age 19 of Tallahassee, Fla., who was burned to death defending his father's small grocery store. The only use of the flag for a boy killed in Vietnam is to cover his casket. Travis Crow and the boy shipped back from Vietnam have not said they would obey only the laws which they thought were good and disobey those which in their opinion were bad.
Crafty men were sent to the Master to ask Him certain questions in the hope of entrapping Him to be brought before a Roman court for prosecution.
They asked the question, "Is it lawful to give tribute unto Caesar, or no?"
The Lord perceived their craftiness and said to them "Render therefore unto Caesar the things which be Caesar's, and unto God the things which be God's."
Roman flags were not lowered when Christ was murdered.

Family Lawyer

Gallantry may impel a bystander to go to the aid of a damsel in distress. But if gallantry doesn't, does law? Do you have any legal obligation to help someone — man, woman, or child — whom you see under attack by a third person?
Generally speaking, the answer is no. If you are a total stranger, having played no role in bringing on the difficulty, you have no duty — legally to go to the rescue.
Thus, bystanders who looked on and did nothing, while a drunken youth slashed a hotel clerk with a knife, were held not liable to the victim. This doctrine is based partly on our traditions of individualism, partly on the difficulties of devising and enforcing a legal standard of unselfishness.
Nevertheless, courts have shown an increasing readiness to find a duty-to-help when there is some special relationship between the bystander and the victim. For then, in a sense, they are no longer total strangers.
What kind of relationship may create a duty of assistance?

One example is the relationship between a merchant and his customer. For instance, the owner of a restaurant was held liable for failing to help a young woman being assaulted by a pair of troublemakers. The court said:
"A restaurant keeper may not sit idly by and leave it to the customer to extricate himself from danger."
Similarly, a protective obligation may arise from other relationships: employer and employee, carrier and passenger, hotel and guest, hospital and patient.
Still, the duty of rescue is not unlimited. The law will weigh the particular circumstances, not only to decide how far it extends.
Was there enough time to interfere before the harm was done? Did the person under attack seem able to take care of himself? Might a rescue attempt have made matters worse?

Thus, a court held that the proprietor of a bowling alley was justified in staying out of a scuffle between a patron and an armed robber. The judge decided that, in the face of a gun, the proprietor's discretion was the better part of valor.

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CORN LEAF APHIDS
This insect, normally no problem in corn and grain sorghum, is causing extensive damage to emerging plants from Central Texas east and south. Weather conditions favorable for population explosions and unfavorable for predator insect increases are largely to blame for the situation, said John Thomas extension entomologist. Fields already suffering damage should be treated at once and local county agents should be contacted for control information. The infestations are expected to spread north and west as planted corn and grain sorghum plants emerge.
