Bond Sales Reach 34,842

During the first quarter of 1968 United States Savings Bond sales in Coleman county totaled \$34,842, according to a report received today from Robert I. Bowen, Chairman of the Coleman County Savings Bond Committee. 25 per cent of the county's 1968 goal of \$140,000 has been achieved.

Savings Bond sales in Texas during the month of March totaled \$14,174,187 which is an increase of 8 per cent over the same period of 1967. During the first quarter sales totaled \$45,978,599 and 25 per cent of the state's goal of \$84.5 million has been achieved.

The Treasury Department reports that March sales of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares over the Nation totaled \$419 million, bringing the quarterly sales to \$1,340 million.

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—My buddy says you can deduct all your medical insurance premiums this year and I say only half of them can be deducted. Who's right?

A—In a way, you both are. Premiums paid for medical insurance have always been deductible as a medical expense by taxpayers who itemize their deductions.

For 1967 however, one half of these premiums up to \$150 may be deducted without regard to the requirement that medical expenses be reduced by three per cent of the taxpayer's income.

In effect, the new rule on medical insurance premiums, allows a deduction for part of these premiums even when the taxpayer's other medical expenses don't exceed three per cent of his income. Any excess premiums are included with other medical expenses. The 1040 instructions explain this in detail.

Q—I am expecting a refund but don't have one of the envelopes you're supposed to use to mail the return. What should I do?

A—Mail your return to the Internal Revenue Service

center for your area. You can obtain the exact address by checking page 10 of the 1040 instructions or by calling the local Internal Revenue office.

Q—Are membership fees in a charitable organization like the YMCA deductible as a contribution?

A—No, dues, membership fees and assessments paid to a charitable organization are not deductible if you receive benefits and privileges in return. However, you may deduct any gift you make to a qualified organization.

Q—I've been supporting my mother since she retired last fall. Can I claim her as a dependent?

A—If your mother had a gross income of \$600 or more last year you cannot claim her as a dependent. Check the 1040 instructions for full details on the dependency tests.

Q—My losses from stock transactions were greater than my gains last year. Can I carry over any of my unused capital losses from 1967 to offset 1968 profits?

A—Yes. Unused capital losses may be carried over from year to year until they are used up.

Q—I read where a retired person is entitled to a credit against his tax. Is that so?

A—There is a provision in the law, which permits retired persons to reduce their income tax by up to 15 per cent of their "retirement income." This provision is explained on Schedule B, Form 1040. Copies are available at many banks, post offices and local IRS offices.

Q—I had to hire someone last year to take care of the children while my wife was recovering from an operation. Can I deduct what I paid her?

A—You may be able to take a child-care deduction if your wife's illness incapacitated her for 90 days or more. There are limitations, however. Page 9 of the 1040 instructions explains this provision in detail.

Q—My bank sent me a statement on the interest I earned last year on my savings account. Should I send this in with my return?

A—No, interest or dividend statements do not have to be filed with your tax return.

Q—I got married last year. Do I need another Social Security number since my name changed?

A—No, continue to use your number but notify the Social Security Administration that your name has changed so they can bring their records

up to date.

Don't forget to put your FED TAX Q & A No. 2 number accurate on any tax return you file. Failure to do so delays refunds for many taxpayers each year.

Q—I held two jobs last year and too much was withheld for Social Security. How do I get it back?

A—If more than \$290.40 was

withheld for Social Security in 1967 because you had two or more employers, you may take a credit for the overpayment against your income tax. Enter the overpayment on line 18 of Page 1 of Form 1040.

Q—Is the Federal tax I pay on my telephone bill deductible?

A—No, Federal excise tax-

es are not deductible.

A—Are special assessments for sidewalks or other additions that improve the value of your property are generally not deductible. Water bills and similar service charges are not deductible either.

Q—My son is stationed in

Viet Nam with the Marines. What do we do about his tax return

A—Military personnel in a combat zone do not have to file tax returns while stationed there. They may wait til 180 days after leaving Viet Nam.

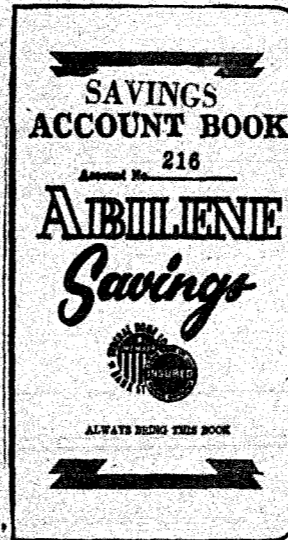

Austin, Texas — Hard driving candidates for governor are coming down the stretch after a long campaign which has failed to fire up the voters.

Probably about 50 per cent of the total eligible electorate of just over four million will decide the outcome on

Saturday, May 4. Strong Democratic runners include Lieut. Gov. Preston Smith, John Hill, Waggoner Carr, Eugene Locke, Don Yarborough, Dolph Briscoe and Edward L. Whittenburg. Pat O'Daniel has campaigned extensively in recent weeks. Other candidates, Johnnie Mae Hackworth and Alfonso Veloz, have done little campaigning.

In the Republican primary, a warm gubernatorial contest features Paul Eggers, John R. Trice and Wallace Sisk.

Another hard fought contest on the Democratic ballot pits House Speaker Ben Barnes against Don Gladden and Gene Smith for lieutenant governor.

There are two Supreme

Court races in the Democratic primary.

Place 1—Matt Davis vs. Sears McGee.
Place 2—Tom Reavley vs. James G. Denton.

There is just one other statewide contest on either ballot:

Comptroller Robert C. Calvert is opposed by Dallas Blankenship. Democratic, Republican and American parties have scheduled referendums on legalizing sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on local option, pari-mutuel wagering on the horse racing, also on local option, and establishment of a state milk-price-fixing commission.

Democrats expect sharp fighting in their precinct conventions Saturday which decide makeup of the national presidential nominating convention delegation and shape of the state party organization. Gov. John Connally is campaigning for favorite son presidential designation, leadership of the national convention delegation and binding of delegates under the unit rule. Liberal opposition opposes both Connally as favorite son and the unit rule. Republican conventions Saturday will see strong efforts to name Sen. John Tower as their favorite son candidate.

Voters have been warned they cannot participate in affairs of the new American Party supporting George Wallace for president if they vote in either the GOP or Demo primaries Saturday or go to major party conventions. American Party needs 14,000 members to get Wallace on the November ballot.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held that the "open meetings" law of 1967 is valid and constitutional. Opinion cleared the way for first court action at Brownsville under the new act. Cameron County Criminal Dist. Atty. F. T. Graham requested the opinion after the Brownsville Herald complained its reporter was barred for an hour from a meeting of the Brownsville Public Utilities Board last January 25.

In other new opinions, Mr. Martin concluded that: Department of Public Safety can pay a commercial transportation company to move the household belongings of a highway patrolman transferred to a new duty station when state-owned equipment is not available.

Beer can be sold from a 2 5-8 gallon container at a licensed bar.
The State must pay the claim for \$6,700 for the administrator of an estate in absence of any evidence that the documents submitted with the claim are false.

Harris County Hospital District may spend money to pay employees' travel expenses in recruiting activities but can't pay those of applicants or moving expenses.

COURTS SPEAK
In an important new opinion, Court of Criminal Appeals has held that trial

judges must interrupt criminal trials and get a jury verdict on a question of sanity if the issue is raised by evidence.

Following that decision, the court reversed two convictions, ordering new trials for a young Petersburg woman accused of stabbing a baby to death and for an Andrews County man sentenced to life imprisonment as a habitual criminal. Court also ordered a new trial in a Lubbock County murder case and closed the book on 21-year-old Kenneth Allen McDuff's unsuccessful appeal from the death penalty for murder of three teenagers in Tarrant County a year and a half ago.

Supreme Court, reversing intermediate court, upheld trial judgment that landowners' suit to stop Fort Worth annexation of 6.3 acres of land in 1963 is void.

STATE BUILDING-HOUSING CODE URGED
Senate Study Committee of Slums and Slum Clearance has called for statewide minimum building and housing codes and other action encouraging individual initiative in the area of home improvements.

Housing code, committee said, should be established by a state agency, designed to protect health and should include physical requirements and establish a desired occupancy ration. Building code was recommended for a January, 1970, effective date.

Other committee recommendations:

- Encouragement of local non-profit neighborhood corporations to plan neighborhood renovation.
- Establishment of a state-guaranteed loan program to assist with renovation and compliance with codes.
- Creation of a State Housing and Planning Commission to administer programs

GRANTS APPROVED
Governor Connally has approved six supplemental state regional planning grants totalling \$18,153.

Biggest of grants, \$8,559, will go to North Central Texas Regional Planning Commission, a voluntary association of local governments in 10 counties of the Dallas-Ft. Worth region. Same organization received an earlier grant of \$22,000 for a variety of studies.

Other voluntary associations of local governments receiving grants were Alamo Area Council of Governments, San Antonio, \$3,691; Coastal Ben Regional Planning Commission, Corpus Christi, \$2,030; Concho Valley COG, San Angelo, \$570; El Paso COG, \$1,765; and West Central Texas COG, Abilene, \$1,533.

EDUCATION CONFERENCE
The top official with the U. S. Office of Education made a plea for expanded bilingual education programs here during the first session of the National Conference on Educational Opportunities for Mexican-Americans.

Harold Howe II, U. S. Commissioner of Education, said local school districts have failed Mexican-American children because our society has treated persons who are different as inferior.

He said bilingual education gives proper dignity to the Spanish speaking by not mak-

ing their language and customs appear inferior.

SHORT SNORTS
The Governor's Committee on Public School Education, in a first installment preview of its recommendations to the legislature, says enrollment will remain about the same for the next decade or so.

The Governor has proclaimed May as "senior citizen month" in Texas.

Mrs. John Connally dedicated the Texas Tropical Trail along Padre Island and Rio Grande Valley, one of 10 off-the-beaten path routes through scenic-historic Texas areas.

Parks and Wildlife Department has bought 64.5 acres in Starr County for white-winged dove nesting areas.

Bard Logan, San Antonio city directory agent, is new chairman of the American Party of Texas, succeeding former State Sen. Weaver Moore of Houston who re-

signed.

Republican state headquarters has added five new staff members: Mrs. John De Le Garza, public relations. Miss Judith A. Rutledge, assistant to Executive Director John M. Stokes; Henry Smith, coordinator of candidates; Lewis E. Berry, Jr., research division head; and Kent Span, research.

Texas Animal Health Commission reports that Dimmit, Calhoun, Limestone and Zavala counties have qualified for certification in the crash program to clear up brucellosis in as many counties as possible by the end of the year.

Food Dollar Stretchers

Food prices are like the weather — everyone talks about them. The important difference is that with food prices you can do something about them, reminds Gwendolyn Clyatt, marketing specialist at A & M.

You can't change the price but you can receive more for your money if you make wise choices.

With careful planning and shopping you can stretch your food dollar. Resolve to keep alert to what your market is featuring by watching food ads. Plan your menus to include as many "specials" as possible, suggests the specialist.

Try to remember the regular prices so you'll know if the special is really a good value. Buy good values in quantity if you can use them and if storage space allows.

Make a shopping list, and remember to take it with you. This helps cut down on impulse buying, says Mrs. Clyatt.

Take the time to shop in your favorite store. Every week there are new and different items from which you can choose. Take some just window shopping time to look around for them.

Figure the "real" cost and not just the price per unit. The cost per pound or unit of an item is often misleading, if you do not check the number of servings, according to Mrs. Clyatt. The cost per serving is the true measure of cost.

For example, meat which has a large amount of bone at a lower price per pound will often cost more per serving than boneless meat that sells for a higher price per pound.

When selecting convenience foods, consider time and cost. Some cost the same or slightly more while some cost less than those with no convenience built in, she said.

FRECKLED BANANAS

When bananas are covered with little brown spots, they are ready for mashing and mixing into puddings, breads and cakes. To hold ripened bananas a few days, refrigerate them, suggests specialists at Texas A & M University. But be sure to wrap them tightly in a plastic bag to prevent their odor from spreading. Their skins will turn brown but the inside will stay the same for a few days. Keep unripe bananas at room temperature until they ripen the way you like them.

Texas Ranks High In License Sales

Austin—Texas ranked 3rd in the nation in the number of paid fishing license holders and fifth in the number of paid hunting license holders during 1967, says Robert G. Mauermann, deputy director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

California led the nation in paid fishing license holders with 1.8 million and Minnesota followed with 1.3 million. Texas had 1.13 million and the only other state with more than a million was Wisconsin with 1.12 million.

Texas with 642,328 paid hunting licenses trailed the states Pennsylvania, Michigan, New York and California, Pennsylvania reported the highest license sales in the nation with 995,190.

Hunters and fishermen paid \$154,804,733.45 for licenses during the year with 2,129,662 fishing licenses at 14,685,732 hunting licenses.

Total fishing licenses, tags, permits, and stamps issued increased from 28 million to 27 million in the same period.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.—Last week, April 23, the British introduced another resolution in the Security Council of the United Nations, calling for stronger sanctions by all nations against Rhodesia.

When the first sanctions were placed against Rhodesia by the U. N. in 1966 the United States supported the action. At that time those of us who felt this was none of our Government's business wired Ambassador Goldberg and the State Department, urging opposition.

The British admit that the more mild form which was passed in 1966 has not been effective. In fact, Rhodesia has been doing pretty good with its economy and is even stronger than it was at that time. It and South Africa are the most stable governments on the entire African Continent and yet the majority of the nations of the world who are not doing a very good job of running their own business, want to tell them how to run theirs.

Some months ago former Secretary of State Dean Acheson bluntly declared that the restrictions imposed by the U. N., which the policy of the U. S. and Great Britain favored, "is a patent illegality, despite a layer of blarney sanctimony."

Mr. Acheson also posed the question, why have not embargoes on arms shipments been imposed against such areas as the Middle East and North Korea where threats to neighboring states are a reality. He also reminds the U. N. and the world that attempts at sanctions have never proved effective any way. They were attempted under the old League of Nations and failed.

Suggestions that Britain or any other Nation should attempt to crush Rhodesia by armed might and so bring war and destruction to that peaceful country, is total irresponsibility and next to insanity. It can not be imagined that any English-speaking troops could be induced to bomb or fire upon a people which gallantly fought beside them in both World Wars.

If Winston Churchill were alive today Britain would still have her place in the world and in all likelihood there would be no Rhodesian "problem." When Prime Minister, he made it clear that he favored the principle of ultimate democracy, free of any racial, religious or language restriction in South Africa, but he felt that the actions against that nation had to be dealt with in patience, tolerance and understanding.

The conclusion is clear that sanctions against Rhodesia have failed and will fail, and the lesson it should teach is that trade embargoes should never be tried because they are futile. They violate the rule that threats to restrain trade should never be used to exert political leverage. History, no less than common sense, claims foreign trade as the arch civilizer and peacemaker.

Directly, the United States is an economic loser. Ian Smith's government has not changed its policies but American has missed Rhodesia's supply of vital chromite, which we must have for producing chromium and stainless steel. Rhodesia and Russia are the only major producers of chromite, so the U. S. has had to turn to Russia for its source of supply. Since Russia has a new customer in the U. S., she has hiked the price 20 per cent. which means that when the end product goes on the American domestic market, it will cost more.

The economy of the United States is the backbone for all free nations, and unless it remains strong, who are we to try to tell other nations how to run their internal affairs. And this is exactly what it is—an internal affair in the British Commonwealth. Eliminating the dollar drain is one way we can help ourselves and, yet, our government has denied a mineral company of Pennsylvania a permit to ship chromite to the United States from its own mines in Rhodesia.

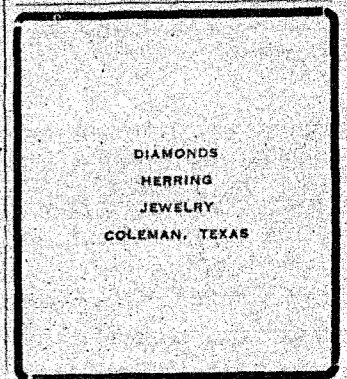
Our policy towards Rhodesia and South Africa is an emotional one, just as is the racial situation here in the U. S. In this instance, we are permitting our policy to be set by a concern of "world opinion." World opinion is not helping us in the many problems we have here at home and in South Vietnam. Our State Department and our ambassador to the U. N. are immediately being furnished a copy of this release, in addition to a letter strongly protesting our support for the British Resolution filed last week.

CONDITIONS FAVORABLE FOR CONTROL OF BITTERWEED

The poisonous bitterweed can be controlled by spraying infested areas with 1 lb. per acre of 2,4-D low volatile ester. Application should be made, advises G. O. Hoffman, A & M specialist, when the plants are growing vigorously and in the bud stage and when the temperature is above 55 degrees F. Since soil moisture conditions are good over areas of Texas where the weed is most damaging, Hoffman believes that

spraying this spring will pay good dividends. He suggests a visit with the local county agent for details on a spraying program.

**Stillhouse Hollow
Stocked With Bass**

Belton—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department last week stocked 735,000 black bass fry in Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir, according to James C. Searcy, superintendent of Eagle Mountain State Fish Hatchery for the Department.

Searcy said 175,000 of the fry were from the San Marcos State Fish Hatchery and 560,000 from Eagle Mountain. Fred G. Lowland, inland fisheries supervisor at Waco, says this completes the black bass stocking program at the reservoir which now contains 6,430 acres. The lake will cover 11,000 acres at spillway level.

The reservoir was stocked at the rate of 100 per acre. "Best results have been recorded from bass fry stocking at this rate," Lowman

said. Department fisheries personnel plan to stock liberal numbers of catfish this fall, Lowman said.

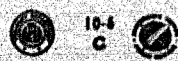

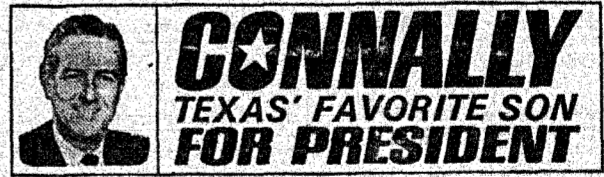

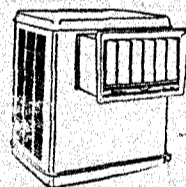
