Arson, Murder Definite In Death Of Weldon L. Cammack

The investigation continues into the death of Weldon L. Cammack, 45, whose body was found in his burning home here late Friday night.

The body of Mr. Cammack was found on the floor of his home by local firemen after an alarm was turned in by a local citizen about 10:15 p. m. Friday night. According to some sources Mr. Cammack had been dead for some time before the fire alarm was turned in, although a full autopsy report was not available to the News.

Owen Davis, Deputy State Fire Marshal, who is a special arson investigator, said that the house was doused with a flammable liquid and that several hotspots were located at the scene and probably were places where the fire was started.

An autopsy report revealed that the local man had been shot once in the chest. Officers do not know the caliber of the gun used, nor have they located the gun.

A three man lab crew from the Texas Department of Public Safety have done a complete photography and fingerprint investigation into the house, but results of the investigation are not known at this time.

Local firemen had the fire out at about 11:00 p. m. Friday night.

H. R. Block and Sid Merchant, Texas Rangers; John Smith, County Sheriff; and local Deputy Sheriff, Gary Freeman are holding an extensive investigation into the death of Mr. Cammack.

Mr. Cammack was buried here Sunday afternoon with the Rev. Bill Brewer, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Hosch Funeral

Home was in charge. A disabled veteran of World War II, Mr. Cammack is survived by his mother, Mrs. Lela Cammack of Big Spring; four brothers, Alvis of Brownwood, Virgil of Levelland, Dewey of Fort Leavenworth, Kan., and Bruce of San Angelo.

Survivors are one son, Mace Blanton, Jr., of Fort Worth and two grandchildren.

Senior 4-H Club Singing Group Wins Sweepstakes Award At Contest

The Santa Anna Senior 4-H Club singing group returned from A & M University Thursday after winning the Sweepstakes award in the Share The Fun contest at the State 4-H Roundup last week. The Sweepstakes award is given only to entries selected unanimously by the three judges as first place in the contest, and such an award occurs only every four or five years, according to the contest director.

There were 24 entries in the contest, representing the 12 Extension Districts in the state. Outstanding talent groups were selected to entertain the Round-up contestants, sponsors, and others attending, at Guion Hall on Wednesday night, and the local youngsters were featured on the program. About 1800 people were on hand for the program, which concluded the state meeting.

Other activities attended by the Coleman County group were a barbecue supper and program on Tuesday evening, the contest on Wednesday morning, and an awards banquet Wednesday evening, preceding the program. At the banquet the local group

sat with other contest winners and were introduced along with their coach, Mrs. James R. Eubank, Sr.

The 4-H singers have been recommended to entertain at the National meeting of Extension Agents, to be held in Louisville, Ky., in October. Detailed information about the group has been requested, and the executive board of the Extension Agents will select entertainment from 4-H talent from eight southern states. Those chosen will be notified within a few weeks.

The local group has made 19 public appearances since being organized in March, and will appear on the County Farm Bureau Talent contest this week in Coleman. Other scheduled performances will be on the Sandy Chappel TV show on KRBC, Abilene, at 12:15 Wednesday.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

On August 25, 1959, I introduced a Resolution in the Congress which would permit two companies of Marines to patrol the streets of Washington, which, of course, is a Federal City, in conjunction with the police.

Again on February 26, 1963 and July 14, the same Resolution was introduced and each of these was referred to the Armed Services Committee where it was opposed by the Defense Department. In fact, Departmental reports, including the District of Columbia Commissioners, were adverse to the passage of this measure.

As time went on it is common knowledge as to what happened and, finally, the Marines and Soldiers were called in to quell riots and looting.

On three different occasions the House of Representatives passed legislation which would have the effect of nullifying many of the supreme Court's decisions affecting arrest and prosecution of criminals. The Senate did not act.

At last, they have done so, and last week a bill was passed which has as its purpose to override certain Court judgments which have handicapped law enforcement and providing assistance to police enforcement in the States.

Title I of the bill provides planning grants and action grants to State and local law enforcement agencies to develop and strengthen the total service. Title II of the Bill seeks to give authority back to the trial courts that may not be handicapped by these decisions which have given encouragement to the criminal as against the public interest. The tendency of the Federal courts, and especially the Supreme Court, to disrupt the finality of State court decisions has eroded respect for law and diminished the fear of punishment.

Another important part of Title II says that the Supreme Court can not review the question of the voluntariness of a confession when the voluntary aspect has already been settled by the highest court of the State. Under the proposed legislation, the standard for admitting confessions as evidence will return to the

time-tested standard of true voluntariness. It sets aside the inflexible and technical rules established in the so-called Mallory, Escobedo and Miranda cases.

Title III, to which much opposition developed, is concerned with permitting wiretapping in the investigation of serious federal crime. This section allows a court to order electronic surveillance under the "lawful search" provisions of the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution. This power will give much needed assistance in the war on organized crime.

The Justice Department has identified an estimated 5,000 members of the Cosa Nostra but has succeeded in indicting only 200 and convicting only about 100 since 1961.

Title IV prohibits interstate mail order sale of handguns. It does not affect rifles and shotguns and does not limit the right of the person under the Constitution to keep and bear arms. It does prohibit all sales of handguns to persons under 21 and to non-residents of the state. It requires gun dealers to be licensed by the Federal Government and to keep records of acquisitions disposition of their sales.

This is a section which gives considerable concern to many of us who have been opposed to the Federal Government injecting itself into this Constitutional right of the individual but as a take it or leave it proposition, with the other desirable provisions of the Law, it was acceptable to the House of Representatives. Personally, I would prefer not to see this sort of license power given to the Federal Government, feeling it is a "foot in the door." On the other hand, the so-called Dodd Bill in the Senate imposes far-reaching restrictions, and the action in the bill approved by

the Congress and sent to the President may stop this further infringement by the Federal Government on gun control.

The omnibus crime control act already bears the imprint of many restrictive changes and additions. If America is to be made safe for its citizens, this is a long step in the right direction.

100 SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS VOIDED DUE TO LOST APPLICATIONS

Anyone who secured a social security account number card in the 451-96-5600 series (5600 through 5699) in early March of this year should get in touch with the Abilene District office, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager.

The carbon copies of those account number cards and the supporting applications were mailed by the Abilene office to the Baltimore headquarters on March 15, but Tuley has been notified they never reached there. Those numbers have therefore been voided until such time that new supporting applications can be secured, he added.

Employers, banks, savings and loan associations, welfare offices, and others making use of social security numbers may want to see whether any of the missing 100 numbers have been reported to them by employees, savers, or welfare clients during the past 3 1/2 months.

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STATE Capital NEWS

Austin, Texas — Sitting in special session to approve appropriations and tax bills for the fiscal year beginning on September 1, the House and Senate began deliberations on how to distribute some \$2,500,000,000, in appropriations.

When that little problem is taken care of, the Legislature will worry about one that's potentially more disastrous, politically. Raising taxes or passing new ones is next. They must raise the

\$125-130,000,000 difference between what the state will have and what it will need.

Gov. John Connally's special session opened on schedule June 4 in a storybook setting: The newly-elected Democratic nominee for governor, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, presided over the Senate, and the newly-elected Democratic nominee for lieutenant governor, Speaker Ben Barnes, held the House controls.

Governor Connally spelled out basically this tax program:

- * A one per cent raise in the state sales tax rate to three per cent with the bulk of the increase going to the cities. Sales tax base would be extended to cover cigarettes, other tobacco products, and such services as haircuts and beauty treatments, laundry and dry cleaning, repairs, telephone and telegraph, and auto parking (\$78,800,000).

- * A \$3,200,000 cut in taxes on the gross receipts of telephone companies was incorporated in his recommendations, same being more than offset by the inclusion of telephone service in the three per cent sales tax.

- * A boost in the auto sales tax rate to three per cent (\$30,600,000).

- * Legalization of liquor by the drink in small bottles, with each bottle individually taxed, and private clubs assessed a 10 per cent gross re-

ceipts tax (\$14,500,000).

- * Transfer of \$7,500,000 from the operators and chauffeurs fund to the general fund spending pocket.

- * A realty transfer stamp (\$1,000,000).

Initial reaction to the \$127,200,000 package was generally cool or downright unfriendly, although many legislators were plainly waiting to see what the folks back home thought of it. Outlook was dimmest of all for the mini-bottle bill. Even many liquor by the drink advocates didn't like it, but they admitted that from their standpoint it was "better than nothing." Hearings on it were started this week by committees of both the House and the Senate.

The House revenue and tax committee is considering Connally's omnibus tax bill. Speaker Barnes, who is not committed to the Connally proposals, apparently will put them to a floor vote on the House next week unless something better is substituted.

Barnes warned that \$150,000,000 in new revenue may be needed if a federal income tax surcharge is passed by congress, slashing state purchasing power and thereby cutting the state's sales tax take.

After all tax items are taken care of, Connally has promised to open the legislative hopper to such other issues as the lawmakers desire—if there's time left in the 30-day special session.

LIQUOR LAW REVISION
Core of the Legislature's revision of the Liquor Control Act probably will be the recommendations of the liquor law revision sub-committee of the House State Affairs Committee. Speaker Barnes turned the problem over to the sub-committee during the LCB controversy.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, chairman of the sub-committee and the full committee reported to the committee on the first day of the session, and the reaction indicated that one major problem could

be whether to allow possession of alcoholic beverages and private clubs in dry areas.

Rep. Jake Johnson of San Antonio, a supporter of liquor by the drink, asked the committee to reject the sub-committee's report because it did not include those prohibitions, which he thinks would provide incentive for liquor by the drink.

Cory, however, closed the meeting before Johnson could get the record vote he sought.

The committee report included 31 points, many of them recommendations to change the law.

The main recommendation included prohibiting legislators from practicing before the LCB, opening all LCB records on violations and complaints to the public; a minimum of 50 members for a private club; a fine for parents whose children are convicted on liquor violations twice; immediate sale of confiscated liquor; increasing license and permit fees; increasing LCB agents' salaries; and providing graduated penalties for repeated violations.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Governor Connally named and the Senate confirmed Calvin Wesch of Kermit as 109th district attorney for Andrews, Winkler and Crane Counties. He succeeds the late Don Nugent.

The Governor also appointed Judge Thomas A. Curtis as district attorney at Amarillo for Armstrong and Potter Counties.

He designated Jerry L. Brownlee of Fort Worth and Publisher Gordon Fulcher of Atlanta to the Texas Water Quality Board.

Dr. L. Harland Ford, executive director of the Region XIX Education Service at El Paso, was named assistant commissioner of the Texas Education Agency for teacher education and instructional services, effective August 1.

The Senate confirmed Connally's selection of San An-

tonio attorney Roy Barrera as Secretary of State. Barrera has been serving since March.

C. M. Hudspeth of Denton is the new vice-president of the State Bar of Texas. He will take office on July 7.

NEW LIFE ON DEATH ROW

The 26 men on death row in Huntsville, and others around the state, now have a new chance at life.

The U. S. Supreme Court has ruled that the death penalty cannot be imposed by a jury from which persons opposed to capital punishment have been excluded. Under the Texas system, a potential juror may be excused if he states that he is opposed to the death sentence in a capital crime. Under this new ruling, however, such persons can be excluded, and according to State Attorney General Crawford Martin, "it will probably do away with the death penalty." A jury must unanimously agree on capital punishment in a case for it to be imposed.

It is presumed that the court's decision also will permit those people now under sentence of death to appeal in federal court. Ruling, however, did not specify whether the decision would cover persons already sentenced. "I seriously doubt," Attorney General Martin said, "if the courts will let a man be executed until the question is decided."

COURTS SPEAK

The State Supreme Court agreed with the lower court on dismissal of a suit filed by a woman who claimed she was given a contaminated

drug at Good Shepherd Hospital in Gregg County.

Controversy over whether Texas or Louisiana law controls a \$150,000 damage suit filed in Texas after a Louisiana man was killed in a traffic accident near Eunice, La., will be reviewed by the Texas Supreme Court.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

Atty Gen. Crawford Martin held constitutional a bill granting tax exemption for fraternal organizations on property used for charitable, benevolent, religious and educational purposes as defined by the constitution.

The purchaser who has paid sales or use taxes on a motor vehicle to another state is entitled to a credit on use tax due Texas.

EDUCATIONAL SPENDING BELOW AVERAGE

Texans spent, on the average, \$127 less per child in its public schools last year than did the rest of the nation. That, according to Texas State Teachers Association, is the size of the state's "education gap."



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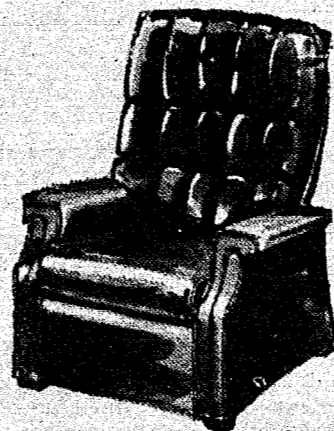

"One who plays dangerous practical jokes on others," observed one court, "takes the risk that his victims may not appreciate the humor."

Of course, if there is on reason to foresee harm, you are on safer ground. Thus, a prankster who wore an outlandish costume was held not responsible for the fright which his appearance caused in the woman next door.

But add enough cruelty or recklessness to your sense of humor and you may have to pay for costly consequences. For example, courts have imposed liability on:

1. A joker who gave a hot foot to a man too drunk to realize that he was suffering a third degree burn;

2. A grocer who packed a dead rat into a bundle of groceries;

3. A wag who informed a woman falsely but convincingly, that her husband had had both legs broken in a smashup;

4. A card player who, while bending down for some money, flipped a fellow player backwards out of his chair.

In fact, in addition to liability for damages, you might even face criminal charges.

A man had an old revolver containing a jammed cartridge. Confident that the gun wouldn't shoot, he playfully brandished it at a visitor and pulled the trigger. To his horror, the gun fired a shot that killed the visitor.

Booked on a manslaughter charge, he pleaded that it was a pure accident—"all in fun." But the court found him guilty.

"Human life," said the court, grimly, "is not to be sported with."

Spincast reels, because of their nature, brought about a major change in casting rods. They became greater in length and much lighter in action. This combination, says Homer Circle, Angling Editor of Sports Afield Magazine, makes an ideal all-around outfit for casting artificial lures in a wide range of weights. It is also capable of casting live baits more efficiently than a level wind reel and without throwing off a minnow or crawfish during the cast.

This is not to say that today's modern level-wind casting reels, with free-spool and automatic drag mechanisms, are not efficient for live-bait casting. They are—but they require a greater degree of skill.

And even many expert casters who prefer the level-wind reel for casting plugs keep a spincast outfit handy for lighter lures such as plastic worms and small spinners.

So hats off to the spincast reel: builder of a new industry, maker of fishermen and catcher of more fish for more people.

Probably the spincast fishing reel has done more to create new anglers, and make better anglers out of older ones, than any other item of fishing tackle in a generation. A prototype was introduced about 20 years ago by the Zero Hour Bomb Company of Oklahoma, whose principal business was making explosive devices to bring in oil wells. Under the shortened name Zebco, it became one of today's most popular spincast reel, and it is still one of the major domestic manufacturers. Today spincast reels are marketed by most major companies and are well worth their price tags.


Time was when a fisherman gave his wife or youngster his old bait-casting reel to take up fishing with. By this time it was backlash-prone, because it was so loose it rattled and vibrated like an electric massager. What a miserable trick to play on a beginner!

The novice who survived this "trial by fire" was surely made of sturdy stuff. Unfortunately, many beginners were lost to the sport of fishing because they never mastered the tricky thumbing required by such a reel.

Then, thanks to American ingenuity, along came the spincast reel. Eureka! Now in a matter of minutes a neophyte, adult or child, can be casting a lure without malfunction—and with a passable degree of accuracy. The youngsters, in particular, can start with a low-cost junior

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
